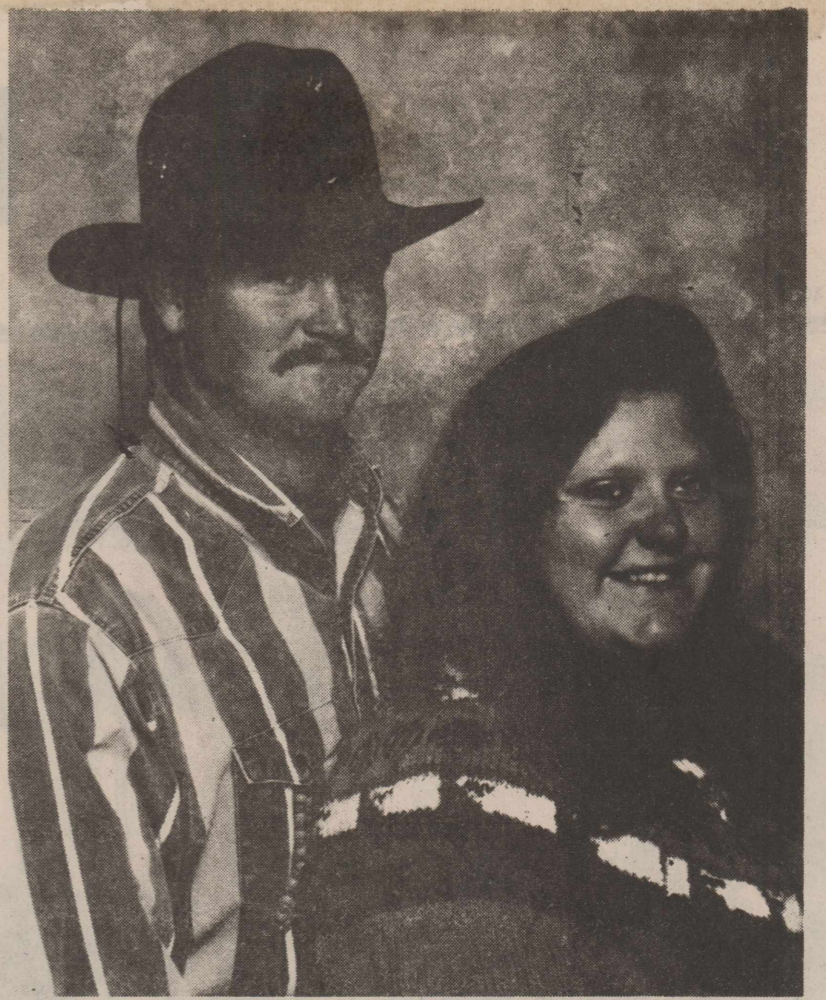

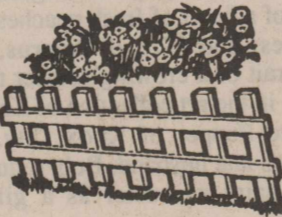

From the Inside Out

"A heart full of joy and gladness will always banish sadness and strife," the lyrics promised.

"Look for the Silver Lining." At age seven I thought it must be the most beautiful song in the world, and I sang it incessantly, day and night. Perhaps trite in its simplistic approach to coping with the realities of life, to me it was the epitome of how we need to look at everything that happens; always remembering that "somewhere the sun is shining," and that the "right thing to do is make it shine for you."

Along with the song, I was hooked on Pollyanna books. I read every episode several times, living through each adventure right along with her as she blithely found a redemptive quality in every situation.

Although Pollyanna has become a derisive synonym for someone with her head in the sand, who never sees the reality or recognizes the problem, I still admire the girl's attitude. It has always seemed to me that she and St. Paul and Hoagy Carmichael were operating on the same philosophical wave length; looking for, thinking of and accentuating "anything of good report."

While not now as naive as Pollyanna, nor ever as deep as the Apostle Paul, I'm nevertheless convinced that much of what makes us happy or content, in spite of whatever situation or place we are living in, is learning to recognize and appreciate the value of small things that give us a particular pleasure and enrich our lives.

No doubt it would be easy for each of us to make a list of our pet peeves, gripes and dislikes about certain situations or the way some things are done in our community. Such things are indeed a reality and can become larger than life and twice as important to us. Many of them we all share in common, (and no doubt many of them could be solved in common visionary "possibility thinkers" fully supported by a whole community

dedicated to making progress into the 21st century).

More challenging, more varied and infinitely more pleasant to consider, however, would be a list of the good, perhaps even small things that we like about our town, and that we enjoy being a part of. Things that, although they don't solve our problems, add a dimension of joy, give us a little boost, lift us out of ourselves, make our day, smooth out our frown lines and even replace a big, old pain with a little new pleasure for at least a moment.

The luxury of spending quality time sitting on the patio sharing morning coffee and crossword puzzles with my roommate of 49 years.

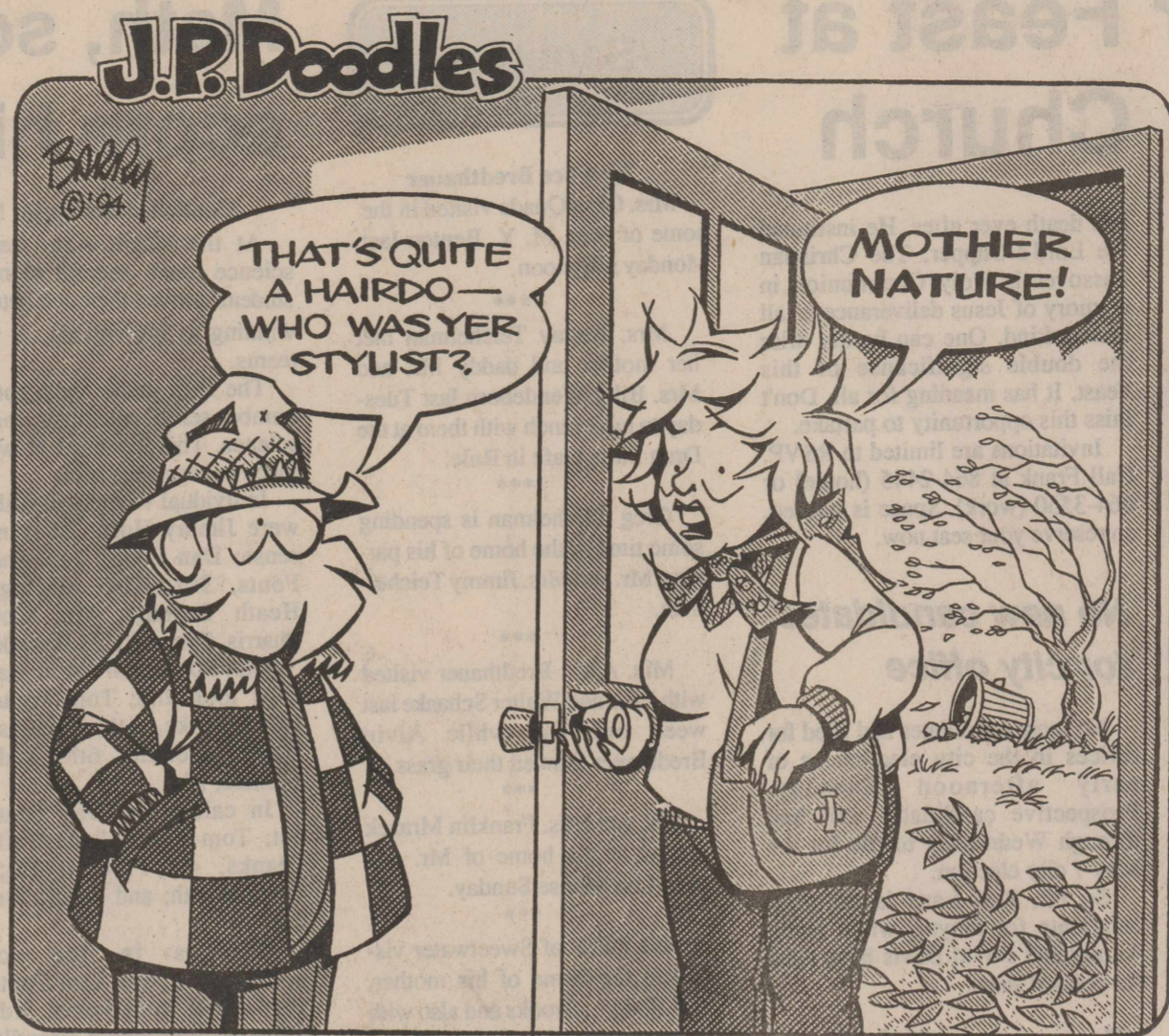
Writing a column for *The Haskell Free Press*, and having my private studio to house the paper trail of following my Muse.

Green Thumb

Since it is March, it is time to plant seeds of annuals for summer and fall blooming. Plant dahlia tubers in deep holes (about 5 or 6 inches) and be sure and stake when planting them.

Established perennials need to be fed with an organic fertilizer and pansies with liquid manure.

Divide perennial phlox. Make cuttings from chrysanthemums or separate older plants.

If you haven't fed your lawn, do so but be sure you don't miss any spots; if you do the lawn will not keep it a secret. Fertilize shrubs and trees if they are not in the lawn area where they will otherwise be fed.

If you're interested in plants that love shade, include these: impatiens, begonias, violets, pansies, and lilies.

Blooming plants such as marigolds, zinnias, geraniums, chrysanthemums, daisies, irises, peonies and gladiolus can tolerate the sun.

Fitness experts say low-level activities like gardening are one way to help prevent coronary heart disease. One hour of gardening has been compared to a half-mile stroll or a leisurely 30-minute ride on a bicycle.

When lifting heavy things, use your legs and protect your knees with pads during long periods of kneeling. For pads, use shoulder pads slipped into scraps of carpet or tow sack.

Gardening can account for a lot of exercise. But there are some benefits I value very much. In the yard, I daydream and assort my problems. Many frustrations have been solved in patches of weeds. I am then more relaxed to do creative work which I love.

For you, my readers, I wish to pass along this little hint. When I'm preparing hanging baskets or containers for planting, instead of placing rocks, or broken glass on pottery in the bottom for drainage, I can use pine cones, either whole or broken, depending on the size of the container. The cones provide good drainage and break down by the end of the season, enriching the soil.

Starting seeds from scratch sounds much more complicated than it actually was. You might compare it to baking a cake from scratch. Once you've done it, you realize how easy it was. It was a satisfying experience, one that was kind to your wallet.

He has served as president of the Rotary Club and Chamber of Commerce and was named Outstanding Citizen of the Year in Monahans.

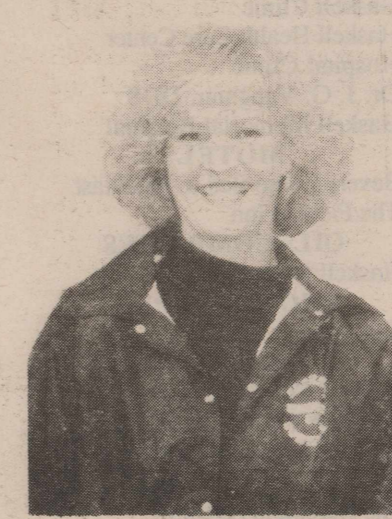
