Chamber honors Chapman

Long time Haskell attorney Ben Charlie Chapman is recipient of Haskell's Most Outstanding Citizen award from the Haskell Chamber of Commerce.

Presentation of the annual award was the highlight of the

chamber's 58th annual banquet Saturday night.

Chapman, former 39th district judge, former district attorney and former county attorney was recognized for his many years of service to the community.

Now 90, Chapman still practices law with the Adkins, Chapman and Fouts law firm in Haskell. He grew up in Rochester and graduated from law school at Cumberland University in

Lebanon, Tenn., in 1930. He was elected county attorney in 1933, district attorney in 1937 and district judge in 1942. He served 30 years as district judge. He is the father of present district judge Charles Chapman.

He is an active member of the First Presbyterian Church. He headed the local chapter of the American Red Cross for several years, including the World War II era.

In addition to the Outstanding Citizen award, the chamber paid tribute to three former Haskell businesses which played significant roles in the history of the business community. Wallace Cox Jr., whose grandfather founded Jones-Cox & Co. in 1905, was presented a plaque for his work in the business which closed in 1990. Other plaques went to Edna Mae Lyles, who operated Lyles Jewelry for 58 years until it closed last year, and to Opal Adkins and Veta Furrh, who owned The Personality Shoppe in Haskell

"Let us do your Easter baking," said a spokesperson for the sponsoring group.


Genealogical club plans bake sale

Indian nine drops non-district game

The Haskell Indian baseball team remained unbeaten in district 7-2A play after last week, but the Indians dropped their third non-district game of the season.

In a game played Friday at Olney, the Cubs scored four runs in the second inning and made that cushion stand up for a 4-3 victory over the Indians.

Haskell got a run in the third and two more in the fifth, but was unable to overtake the Cubs.

The Indians got 6 hits while Olney was collecting 7.

"Our pitching and defense were all right, but we just had too many strikeouts," said Coach Johnny

Brian Brzozowski went the first two innings for the Indians, giving up 4 hits and 4 runs, two of them

unearned. Shannon Meeks came on in the third and went the final 4 innings, holding the Cubs scoreless while allowing 3 hits. He struck

Jason Torres had 2 hits and 2 runs-batted-in for the Indians. Brzozowski's double was the Indians' only extra base hit.

The Indian record now stands at 7-3 (4-0 in district) with two of the three losses coming by a single run. The Indians have played only two of their 10 games at home.

Candidates file for school, city elections

The names of five candidates for three seats on the Haskell School Board and names of three candidates for two City Council positions will be on the ballots for the upcoming school and city elections.

The filing period for the May 7 elections closed last Wednesday.

Latest candidate to file for the school board was Belia Abila, who will oppose incumbent Tom

Hairgrove for position 4. Incumbent Tiffen Mayfield is being opposed by David Middleton for position 5. The only candidate filing for position 3 was Randy McLelland. Bill Perry, position 3 incumbent, did not file for re-

election. School Board members are elected at large.

Nick Jimenez was the latest candidate to file for City Council. Other candidates include David Davis and incumbent Ruby Turner. The two receiving the greatest number of votes in the city election will be elected. Incumbent Kim Nemir did not file for re-election.

Ken Lane is the lone candidate for mayor, to succeed Pat Henry who is not seeking a second term.

It will be one of the least spirited city campaigns in recent years. Last year, 11 candidates ran for three City Council seats. In 1992, the city had two candidates for mayor and seven aspirants for the council.

Early voting for both the school and city elections will begin April 18 and continue through May 3.

Rochester

There are only three candidates for three City Council positions in the Rochester city election.

Bobby O'Neal, David Lisle and Mark McGhee all are unopposed. O'Neil and Lisle are incumbents.

For the Rochester school election, four incumbents are running unopposed. Danny Bass, Hank Byrd and Joel Bevel are candidates for re-election, and Jean Carver is a candidate for election to an unexpired term to which she was appointed.

Rule

Three candidates for two City Council positions have filed for the Rule city election.

Jerry Cannon, Chris Trussell and Nona Norwood are the council candidates. Two will be elected. None of them is now serving.

Mayor Malcolm Herttenburger is unopposed for re-election.

In the school election, incumbents Kenny Tanner and Clayton Stegeomoeller are unopposed for re-election.

Paint Creek

Only names on the ballot for the Paint Creek school election will be those of two incumbents.

Unopposed for re-election are Vern Howard and Steve Barbour.
