City, school elections scheduled for Saturday

City of Haskell voters will elect a mayor and two City Council members and Haskell Consolidated School District voters will name three members to the Board of Trustees in city and school elections Saturday.

In addition, city voters will vote for or against a half-cent sales tax to be earmarked for promotion of economic development.

Balloting in the city election will be at City Hall. School voters will cast their ballots at the Haskell National Bank community room. Polls at both places will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Ken Lane is unopposed in his candidacy for mayor to succeed incumbent mayor Pat Henry who is not seeking re-election to the post he won two years ago.

Incumbent Ruty Turner is a candidate for re-election to the City Council. Other candidates are David C. Davis and Nick Jimenez. The two receiving the most votes will be elected.

Two incumbent School Board members face opposition. Tom Hairgrove is opposed by Belia Abila for Place 4, and Tiffen

Mayfield is opposed by David Middleton for Place 5. Randy McLelland is the lone candidate for Place 3. Although candidates run for specific places on the board, they are elected at-large.

Perhaps most interest in the city election centers on the sales tax proposition. This will be the fourth time in the past four years, the proposal has been presented to voters. It failed to pass, 131-116 in 1991, 486-408 in 1992 and 428-279 in 1993.

For the first time, however, there is organized support for the passage of the measure. Lane, the mayor-to-be, is actively supporting the tax. On the other hand, the incumbent mayor, Henry, has publicly called for its defeat.

If passed, the half-cent increase would boost the local sales tax rate from 1.5 cents to 2 cents. Coupled with the state sales tax rate of 6.25 cents, the overall sales tax rate in Haskell would go from 7.75 cents to 8.25 cents.

Haskell voters approved a half-cent increase in the sales tax in 1991 with the stipulation that receipts from the increase would be used to decrease ad valorem taxes.




Lightning KOs Free Press phones

Sales tax needed

If you buy a pair of shoes at the Mall of Abilene, you are charged a tax to help finance industrial development in Abilene. If you buy an item at Wal Mart in Stamford, you are

contributing to the industrial development of Stamford.

But if you, or someone from Abilene or Stamford or Rule or Rochester or Timbucktoo spends a dollar or a thousand dollars in Haskell, not one cent goes toward industrial development in Haskell.

In other words, Haskell residents give little or no thought to helping other communities attract industry, but when it comes to helping their own, they have refused.

Three times the voters of Haskell have said "NO" to a proposal to increase the local sales by one-half of one percent, a miniscule amount which would add a penny to the cost of a hamburger, a half-buck to a \$100 purchase.

The Free Press has remained silent in past elections. But now, on the fourth attempt to pass the tax for industrial development, The Free Press calls upon the electorate to pass the proposed tax and add some muscle to the town's efforts to obtain an industry which is required to reverse the community's downward spiral.

A half-cent sales tax would generate about \$70,000 a year for industrial development. Most of it would be paid by out-of-town shoppers. Without this money, Haskell is at a critical disadvantage in competing with other towns in attracting new payrolls. There are no funds to present our pitch to companies wishing to re-locate or set up new plants. Other cities have these funds. Haskell doesn't.

WTU announces new manager here


Fred Hernandez has been named Haskell area manager for West Texas Utilities Company.



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



Be informed

Editor: In a letter to the editor last week it was indicated that the voters would lose control of the money set aside for economic development.

Nothing could be farther from the truth. The management of this money is governed by a complex set of state laws. Mismanagement can result in strong penalties.

Check Your Withholding

Taxpayers who received refunds after filing their 1993 income tax returns may feel they've come out ahead. But such taxpayers are just now putting into their pockets money which they might have had last year to pay off high-interest credit card bills or to invest. And they've earned not a penny of interest on that money!

If you find yourself in this situation, now is a good time to adjust your withholding for 1994. Ask your employer for a new Form W-4, and take the time to complete it carefully. If your only source of income is from a single job and you take the standard deduction, you can complete the form in a few moments. Use the worksheets if you have nonwage income, more than one job, adjustments to income, itemized deductions, and/or a working spouse.

If you can accurately project your tax liability, you can use a more straight-forward approach to figuring withholding. Determine your approximate 1994 tax, then subtract the tax withheld during the year to date. Divide the difference by the number of pay periods remaining in the year to determine how much should be withheld each period. Consult the withholding tables (found in IRS Circular E, available from your company's payroll clerk) and find how many claimed allowances will result in the correct withholding. Enter that number on Form W-4.

Don't use overwithholding as a method of forced saving. Instead, arrange for a monthly transfer from your checking account into a mutual fund or other savings vehicle.

You may, of course, find that you have too little tax withheld. You should also adjust your withholding to avoid penalties for underpayment. Make quarterly payments of estimated tax, if necessary.





Lou Gilly gave a report on the 4-H Fashion Show April 10, and also gave the program for the day, "Make a Difference with Quality Clothing."




