
Tom Hairgrove and Tiffan Mayfield were re-elected to the Haskell School Board, Ruby Turner was re-elected to the City Council and David Davis won a seat on the City Council in the contested races in Saturday's school and city

elections.

Elected without opposition were Ken Lane as mayor and Randy McLelland to the School Board, Place 3.

At the same time, Haskell city voters approved a half-cent sales tax for economic development.

Indians suffer

4 on the School Board by defeating Belia Abila, 514-129. Mayfield won re-election to Place 5 by edging David Middleton, 334-296.

Davis garnered 514 votes in his race for the Council and Mrs. Turner got 467. A third candidate, Nick Jimenez, polled 175 votes.

The new mayor and the newly elected Council members were sworn in during Tuesday's City Council meeting.

Lane succeeds one-term mayor Pat Henry who did not seek reelection. Davis replaces Kim Nemir who did not run for re-election to the Council.

The sales tax proposal, appearing on the ballot for the fourth consecutive year, passed by a comfortable 409-260 margin. The 149-vote margin was an exact reversal from the 1993 election when the proposal was turned down, 428-279.

Proponents of the tax attributed their victory to an organized effort in educating the public of the merits of the tax. They stressed the fact that Haskell was at a disadvantage in competing for industry with other area communities that have the tax money to work with.

The new tax will generate approximately \$70,000 a year for economic development. The City Council will appoint an Economic Development Board to administer the funds. The board will answer to the City Council in the same way as the Zoning, Parks, Ambulance and other boards and will be subject to an annual audit.

Most neighboring cities of comparable and larger size already have the economic development tax, including Stamford, Knox City, Munday, Hamlin and Anson.

Haskell sixth-graders had their annual balloon lift-off Friday afternoon. Students received a helium-filled balloon for every 300 pages they read in a reading contest. 

By Gladys O'Neal Haskell Garden Club If you really care about your plants, mulching in your garden is a must.

A mulch is any substance spread upon the ground to protect the roots of plants from heat, cold or drought, or to keep fruit clean. It is a long established horticultural practice.

Mulches may be organic or inorganic. Organic mulches might include straw, compost, sawdust, whereas, inorganic includes plastic, rocks and other non-plant materials. A layer of mulch on your soil will increase water intake by preventing runoff.

Maintenance labor can be reduced as good mulching eliminates the need for weeding. Mulched vegetables are cleaner when they are harvested. Fruits of tomato, melon and squash never touch the soil.

Many materials are readily available for mulching, such as compost, straw and sawdust. Compost is usually the best, as it is usually free of weeds and is. inexpensive. Mulch should be applied thickly enough to leave a 3inch layer after settling.

Straw from a lot or stable or chicken pen has a relatively high nitrogen content because its is mixed with manure. It is an excellent mulch for your vegetable garden.


Wood chips and sawdust do not work well in your vegetable garden because they have too little nitrogen in relation to carbon. They are better to use just as a weed control.

There are some plants that grow well in the shade: vinca, teeberous begonia, impatiens, caladium, coleus, pansy and fibrous begonia.

Plants that grow in the sunshine are dwarf marigold, geranium, ageratum, dwarf zennia, celosia, dwarf dahlia, pinks, petunia, annual phlox, dwarf salvia and dwarf snapdragon.

If you decide to mulch, be sure to water well before mulching.

MEDICARE COVERS HOME HEALTH CARE

Home Health Care is a covered service available to Medicare beneficiaries that often allows a comfortable and welcome alternative to treatment in a hospital or nursing home. Medicare pays for a comprehensive range of health services at home if the patient is eligible for care.

- In order for care to be covered, the patient :
- Must be homebound
- Must require either nursing, physical therapy, or speech therapy
- Must need part-time and intermittent care rather than continuous or custodial services
- Must be under the care of a physician
- Must have the care certified by the physician as being medically necessary

Once those conditions are met, the patient may also receive social services, home health aide services, occupational therapy, and needed medical supplies. A home health agency certified to provide Medicare home health services will be able to determine whether the home health services requested by a physician are covered by the program and must inform the patient of this determination prior to beginning care.

In the event that Medicare does not agree to pay for care, the agency is not allowed to bill the patient if the care has been represented as covered.


Home health care has been a covered benefit under Medicare since the beginning of the program in 1965. It has steadily increased in popularity as both physicians and patients have come to recognize the commonsense benefits of home treatment. Patients tend to recover more quickly and are less prone to complications when they receive care at home and, since home care currently has no deductions or copayments, the patients usually have no out-of-pocket expenses for covered care.

Opposes gun bill

Editor: Every night on the evening news we are forced to face the blight of violent crime infecting our nation. Even closer to home than the television, more and more Americans find themselves touched in some way by crime, whether the

victim is a relative, a neighbor, a co-worker or even themselves.

I am alarmed by violent crime involving any gun. Unfortunately, the so-called Schumer/Feinstein "assault weapon" ban being considered by the House of Representatives is misdirected.

The first problem is that it attempts to control certain semiautomatic weapons and not the criminals who use them. The second problem is that this effort has focused on these undefined "assault weapons" which account for less than 1 percent of recorded violent crime, while handguns or other means of violence continue to be the preferred tools of most gang members, drive-by shooters, muggers and other criminals.

Thirdly, and perhaps of greatest concern to me, is that this bill is just one more example of legislation which goes beyond the rhetoric used to advertise it. For example, there may be 19 weapons identified in the Schumer/Feinstein ban, but BAFT already has identified 26 weapons which it will add to the list of prohibited guns. Opening the door further to this sort of "government by unelected bureaucrat" shatters my confidence that the second Constitutional amendment actually will be protected in the future.

Unfortunately, sensationalism from both sides of this issue has crowded out the central issues at the crux of our crime problem. I must vote "no" in this instance, while continuing my commitment to addressing the crime problems which trouble us all.

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

Prescription Drugs from Nonprescribers: Beyond distribution of illegal performance-enhancing drugs, the National Collegiate Athletic Association has uncovered the practice of athletic departments distributing prescription drugs without physician or pharmacist intervention. In addition to being illegal, this practice puts athletes at risk because no one is monitoring potential drug interactions or side effects, the drugs often are stored incorrectly, and often they are distributed without labels to delineate the drug or the administration schedule.






