Paul Cox wraps up 'sweet' job in Russia

By Mary Kaigler "The family joke is that Mom always threatened to send me to Siberia. She finally got her

In less than a month after their daughter Emily left to live and study a year in Australia, Jo and Wallace Cox bid "bon voyage" on March 9 to their youngest son, Paul, as he prepared to fly to Moscow to work in Russia.

In a move many are calling the voyage into the final frontier, Mrs, Inc., the world's largest candy manufacturer, is now selling candy

in the former Soviet Union. Working on what sounds like a mighty "sweet job" to any chocolate lover who loves to travel, Paul Cox, Haskell native, has been

on that voyage, spearheading the "Snickerization" of Russia. Paul works as a vice president of

Amherst Human Resource Group, a Chicago-based consulting firm specializing in the recruitment and placement of sales professionals. Each year Amherst conducts hundreds of searches for M&M/Mars and is the exclusive human resource firm in the United States coordinating the candy company's massive 1994 project in Russia.

Several years ago M&M/Mars, the three-billion-dollar business unit of Mars, Inc., began opening doors in the Eastern Bloc, and last vear introduced Russia to the "melt in your mouth, not in your hand" campaign. However, no melting

was in store for Paul, as his first stop was a cross-country tour that included Siberia, one of the coldest, most desolate regions in the world.

With plans to spend three to six months in Moscow, Krasnodar on the Black Sea, Taskent and parts of Siberia, recruiting over 700 office managers, sales representatives and sales managers, teams of recruiters from both M&M/Mars and Amherst Human Resources traveled from city to city.

Although a crash course in speaking Russian helped Paul prepare for the job, the team hired some American-born Russians who speak the language fluently. Considering the present political climate in the area, M&M/Mars

Indian nine meets Cisco in bi-district

They're in!

The playoffs, that is.

The Haskell Indian baseball team will meet Cisco in a bi-district playoff in Abilene Friday night.

The game will begin at 6 o'clock at Hardin Simmons University's Hunter Field.

Haskell completed the second half of the district 5-2A season in second place (behind Jim Ned) with a 6-1 record. The Indians had tied for first in the first part of the district round robin, along with Jim Ned and Rotan, as all three teams went 6-1.

The Indians draw a tough assignment in state-ranked Cisco, champion of district 6-2A. Cisco was a regional finalist last year.

Indian coach Johnny Kinzy said his team will face Cisco's outstanding pitcher, Ferguson, in the bi-district tilt. The Indians will counter with their ace, Shannon Meeks, who posted a 9-2 won-lost record in district play.

The winner of the Haskell-Cisco game will advance to an area playoff game, to be played Saturday, May 28, at a site to be determined.

District 5-2A champion Jim Ned will meet DeLeon Friday in Brownwood.

It took a couple of days, but the Haskell Indians finally got in their final 5-2A baseball game, and took an 8-0 win over Hamlin.

The two teams got in the first inning of their game last Tuesday in Hamlin before the rains came. Chuckie Castillo led off the game with a homerun.

Castillo was a bat with runners on second and third when the game was halted in the top of the first.

The rest of the game was rescheduled for Thursday, but wet grounds made it impossible. It was finally played out Saturday, picking up where it had left off Tuesday.

The Indians scored 2 runs in the second and added 3 in the fourth and 1 in the fifth. Castillo went 2 for 4, including

his homer. Jason Torres also was 2

Shannon Meeks went the

distance to pick up the pitching victory. He allowed 6 hits and struck out 7.

With the victory, the Indians closed the second half of district play with a 6-1 record, and in second place behind Jim Ned (7-0). They also had a 6-1 record in the first half, a mark which tied them for first place with Jim Ned and

Cypert leads offense

Cody Cypert led the Haskell Indians in four important offensive categories in the just-completed district 5-2A basketball season.

The junior thirdbaseman batted a cool .500 (21 of 42) to lead the team in that category. He also led the team in doubles with 7, in slugging percentage with .810, and in on-base percentage of .617.

Chuckie Castillo, who was second in hitting at .480, led the team in runs-batted in with 24.

Sharing the team homerun leadership were Castillo, Casey Larned and Shannon Meeks with 3 each. Jonathan Tatum led the team in stolen bases with 8.

Jason Torres was the team's third leading batter with a .413 average. Batting an even .400 was Chris Silvas.

Other batting averages were Tatum, .375; Stacy Walker, .354; Cory Breckel, .333; Larned, .277; and Campbell, .212.

As a team, the Indians batted a robust .363 with 150 hits in 414 plate appearances. They scored 148

Included among the hits were 28 doubles, 3 triples and 15 homeruns.

Meeks was the Indians' leading pitcher, getting 9 victories and losing 2. In 72 innings, he struck out 80 and walked 41. His earned run average was 2.43.

Continued from page 1 was prepared from the start to pull out of the operation immediately, if needed.

In spite of the tight security measures that were made necessary by the possibility and fear of heavyhanded extortion demands being made there by Russian "mafia" on foreign based companies, the recruitment went well and Paul was able to complete his work sooner than first expected.

Recently returning to his Chicago office, he said in a phone interview, "The Russian people still have so much to learn about democracy and free enterprise, yet they all know and ask about Michael Jordan. Whenever I mentioned that I'm from Chicago, they immediately associated it with Al Capone and the Mafia. These are the images many of them have of America.'

Asked what prepared him for this particular type of work, Paul said that after graduating from Texas A&M he spent two years traveling as a recruiter for his fraternity, not knowing what he really wanted to do as a career. But it was a good experience, he says, for him to grow personally and professionally. "It helped me to recognize and isolate an aptitude for communicating well with others. I found that I share some of my sister Sarah Snailum's innate, intuitive ability to sum up and summarize situations and people." Capitalizing on that ability as a human resource consultant, he now fits together people and jobs.

While living in Chicago, working for Amherst, Paul has enjoyed taking advantage of the many opportunities there in the cultural arts. Especially enjoying

music, he also composes, having written eight songs while there.

Speaking in a voice remarkably similar to that of his dad, during a phone conversation the day before he left to fly to Russia, Paul's appreciation and love for all his family was obvious. When asked if he has any expectations of ever settling back in Texas, he said, "Oh yes. There are some opportunities I'm considering; possibly in Houston. It's great for a small town country kid to get to go half way around the world for a while, but my family is important to me. My parents are young, but none of us are getting any younger. Our family is growing and the little ones are growing up. I'll be back there to enjoy them." He added jokingly, "Mom says it's okay for us (children) to live in Texas as long as it is at least a hundred miles

Equally obvious was Wallace's appreciation and love as he spoke of this dedicated Christian son who has been "an absolute delight and joy to know and to raise"; one to whom neither parents remembers every having to raise their voice.

When this native son of Haskell finished his work in Russia, no doubt many people there were left with a sweeter taste in their mouths for Americans, in more ways than one; not only because of the Snickers they will soon be savoring, but also for Paul Cox having been there with his special gift for communicating well with

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
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

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
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The old saying, "It is better to give than to receive," applies perfectly to gifts for estate planning purposes. You can give \$10,000 annually to any number of recipients without paying federal gift tax. Married couples can double this amount by gift-splitting; a gift of \$20,000 from one spouse is treated as if it came half from each.

Gifts do more than help out children who need the money. They also reduce your estate so your heirs will pay less estate tax on your death. Apart from annual gift giving, you can transfer (during your lifetime or through your estate) a total of \$600,000 with no estate or gift tax liability. On amounts above this threshold, you or your heirs will be faced with taxes on the excess at rates of 37% to 55%. So a consistent program of annual gift giving can create substantial tax savings.

Note that gifts to individuals do not entitle you to an income tax

deduction. A gift isn't a charitable contribution. Conversely, a gift doesn't constitute taxable income to the recipient. Gifts of income-producing property may, however, reduce your taxable income. Once you've given the property away, the recipient, not you, receives the income it produces and pays any income tax due on it.

One advantage to annual gift giving is that it is relatively simple to do, especially if you're giving away cash. Another advantage is flexibility. You're not locked into anything; you can see how much you can afford to give away each year. You can give away anything-cash, stock, art, real estate. Valuation is the fair market value on the date of the gift. Subsequent appreciation, if any, belongs to the donee's estate, not yours.

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about:

- · the value placed on your property · any exemptions that may apply to you
- the cancellation of an agricultural appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
- the local governments which should be taxing your property

 any action taken by the appraisal district that adversely affected you.

Informal Review: Taxpayers are encouraged to make an appointment with an appraiser to discuss their property value. This may be done by calling (817) 864-3805. They should bring information to substantiate why they feel that their property value is incorrect. The appraiser will discuss their property and may recommend an adjustment to the Appraisal Review Board. If the taxpayer is satisfied with the adjustment, he does not have to appear before the ARB.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board: If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date, and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 604 North First, Haskell, Texas.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB

Review by the District Court: After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of

appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

Deadline for Filing Protest with the ARB*

Usual deadline: On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves the records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special deadlines:

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may lile a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day

if it falls on a weekend or holiday.
