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





Haskell scored a run in the third and added two more in the fourth to tie the game at 7-7. But the Indian defense committed 5 errors which led to 5 Cisco runs in the fifth. The Indians managed just 6 hits

off winning pitcher Dusty Ferguson and were charged with 7 errors. Cisco tagged Shannon Meeks for 9 hits and the Lobos had 5 errors. Meeks struck out 7 and issued 4 bases on balls as he closed the season with a 9-3 record.

Larned was the Indians' top hitter with 3 hits in 4 trips to the plate. He had a single, double and a triple, scored 2 runs and knocked in 2

Chris Silvas had a double and scored a run, Cody Cypert was 1 for 3 with 2 runs and an RBI, and Campbell was 1 of 4 with 2 RBIs.

Cisco was last year's regional finalist with nine seniors, seven of them starters. Haskell, in only its second season of baseball, has just two seniors, Jonathan Tatum and Jason Torres.

'We put the ball in play enough but we made too many crucial errors," said Coach Johnny Kinzy. "Our inexperience showed and Cisco's playoff experienced proved to be the difference. But I am very proud of our team. We've come a long way in two years."

The Indians were district 5-2A runnerup with a 12-2 district record. They were 15-7 for the year.





Maybe someone needs to tell the Texas Department of Commerce that West Texas is economically

depressed. That agency doesn't seem to know it. A report out of that office last week listed the state's top 10

counties in per capita income for Guess what? Six of them were

in West Texas.

And guess which county was ranked No. 5? Throckmorton County with a per capita income of \$24,378.

Sherman County topped the list at \$36,822, followed by a couple of Panhandle counties, Hartley (30,630) and Hansford (\$28,701). Sparsely populated Loving County (\$25,184) was ranked fourth, just above Thorckmorton.

No. 6 was Collin County (\$24,363). Kennedy County was in seventh place (\$23,606) and Dallas County was eighth (\$23,420), followed by another pair of Panhandle counties, Oldham (\$23,200) and Dallam (\$23,190). The report also compared the

growth of per capita income over a six-year period (1987-1992), and guess which county was first? If you don't say Throckmorton, go to the back of the class.

Our neighboring county to the east experienced a 79.5-percent gain from its 1987 per capita income of

No. 10 in growth was another Haskell County neighbor. Stonewall County per capita income increased from \$11,706 in 1987 to \$18,072 in 1992, a 54.4percent increase.

The report did not list counties other than the top 10 and the 10 with the biggest gain.

It is interesting to note that Dallas (city) had the highest per capita of the state's metropolitan areas (\$22,424). Houston is second at \$21,737.

Those two cities, along with Fort Worth-Arlington, are the only metro areas in Texas with per capita income above the national average (\$20,105).

The metro area with the lowest per capita income in 1992 was McAllen-Edinburg-Mission with \$9,802, slightly less than a couple of other border areas, Laredo (\$10,387) and Brownsville-Harlingen-San Benito (\$10,649). The state's only other border metro area, El Paso, is fourth from bottom (\$12,497).

Closer to home, Abilene metro had \$17,263 which put it in 16th place among the state's 27 metropolitan areas, but its 27.9percent growth since 1987 was near the bottom in 24th place.

The government has raised its estimates of homeless Americans from 600,000 to 7 million.

Travelers advised to avoid water

A word of advice for travelers venturing into less developed areas of the world:

Avoid ice cubes.


In places with poor sanitation and hygiene, wise travelers will shun anything made from water that may not have been properly treated, says Dr. James H. Runnels at Baylor college of Medicine in Houston. This includes ice cubes, usually made from tap water.

"For liquids, you best bet is carbonated beverages or drinks made with boiled water," he said. "Even bottled water should be carbonated. Otherwise, it may be nothing more than a bottle refilled at the tap."

Chlorination is no guarantee that water is safe, even though it does reduce the microorganism amount.

Citizens asked to help blood shortage

By Brian Burgess Haskell County Red Cross Chairman

A 4-year-old leukemia patient at Children's Hospital In Oakland, Calif., was in critical condition because no blood was locally available for her transfusion.

At the same time at Methodist Hospital in Houston, a 62-year-old man had to wait for days with the fear that his aortic aneurysm might rupture before the hospital could get the blood needed to perform the lifesaving surgery.

All across the country, during January of this year, many electivesurgery patients had to endure agonizing delays because the unthinkable had happened: The nation's blood banks were running out of blood. Normally when one region is low it can get blood from a region that has an overage. This time there was no surplus blood available anywhere. Hospitals had to conserve what blood they had for emergencies.

Every year, 4 million Americans receive transfusions using a total of 14 million units of blood. Unless more Americans are willing to roll up their sleeves and give, the blood may not be there for everyone this summer.

Why are we running short of blood?

(1) It is inconvenient and folks just don't care like they used to. Because of AIDS, much greater care is used in drawing, handling and testing blood today. As a result, our blood supply is safer than it has ever been. And as a result, the questioning and screening process for donors takes twice as long. As more folks follow the "do your own

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thing", fewer of them are willing to be grilled on their sex lives and health history. The number of people in Haskell County who give blood to the Red Cross has dropped from 100 to 60 in the past 10

(2) Related to (1) is that we are becoming a violent nation. If present trends continue, experts claim, gun deaths will replace auto accidents as the nation's leading cause of traumatic death by 2000. These injuries use massive amounts of blood.

(3) New medical technologies--bone-marrow, organ or tissue transplants, cancer treatments, joint replacements---are saving lives, but requiring more and more blood.

Demand is up, supply is down. Every healthy American should give blood. One time will help, but what we really need are donors who will donate two, three or four times
