

Commodities due next week

The schedule calls for distributions in Rochester on Tuesday, Sagerton on Wednesday and Rule and Haskell on Thursday.

In Haskell, the food will be distributed from 8 to 10 a.m. at the Experienced Citizens Center.

Board appointments, discussion of a co-op road project and naming a city attorney highlighted last week's meeting of the Haskell City Council.

Nick Jimenez was appointed to the Housing Authority, Kim Meredith and Jill Druesedow were re-appointed to co-chair the recycling committee, E. J. Stewart was re-appointed to the water board and Ruby Turner was appointed to the ambulance board.

The Council also voted to retain Bill Jones as city attorney and changed the meeting time of regular meetings to 5:30 p.m. on the second and fourth Mondays of the month.

The Council tabled a request to join the county and country club in providing the funds for re-paving of the road to the country club. The proposal called for each to provide \$5,000 of the \$15,000 cost.

City administrator Sam Watson told the Council that the county has loaned one of its older cars to the city to be used as a vehicle for the

fire chief, resulting in a one-percent discount on the fire key rate. The car was painted by Bobby Hanson for the cost of the paint.

Watson also reported that the city will earn a 5-percent key rate reduction by having three firemen attending fire school this summer at Texas A&M.

Mayor Ken Lane told council members that it is his understanding that Haskell can qualify for a Type 4 landfill almost immediately. This type of landfill can accept anything except putrescible materials and must be covered only once a week. I could accept such waste as old furniture, tree limbs and construction materials. White goods (refrigerators, stoves, etc.) could be stacked there.

The Council asked the mayor to check into the feasibility of this type of landfill.

The Council adjourned into executive session to discuss the LULAC suit against the City.

All money from the dinner and auction will be used to benefit the American Heart Association.

His students later were successful in college science classes because of his teaching, and many of his students entered science-related fields because of his influence.

"While Mr. McCoy's way was never the easy way, it was the Haskell way.'



Tax Planning Should Include Estate Planning

It's just not true that estate taxes are only a concern of the very wealthy. In fact, you are potentially exposed to estate taxes at rates beginning at a whopping 37% if the value of your estate exceeds \$600,000. (In effect, you have a \$600,000 exclusion before the tax kicks in.) The \$600,000 threshold can easily be surpassed by many middle class families that simply own a nice home and have adequate life insurance coverage. Other assets that can push you over the threshold include retirement plan accounts, closely held business interests, and your cars, furnishings, collectibles, etc. Remember, what makes the estate tax so nasty is that it starts at a 37% rate.

The good thing about estate taxes is that thoughtful estate tax planning can greatly reduce and often eliminate the IRS's bite. An estate tax plan is simply a series of steps that allows you to carry out your wishes regarding the disposition of your wealth in a manner that minimizes estate taxes.

For example, a married couple with assets worth up to \$1,200,000 can often arrange things so that each spouse can take advantage of the \$600,000 exclusion. The couple can then transfer all that they own without paying any federal estate taxes. In the worst case scenario, where the entire \$1,200,000 is included in the estate of one spouse, the IRS would collect \$235,000 in estate tax. With even minor planning, the \$235,000 could have gone to the couple's heirs instead.

The above is a simple example. In real life, estate planning is usually more complex. But the bottom line is that good estate planning can often save big tax dollars-and who isn't interested in that?





he greatest invasion force ever assembled stood off the French coast as dawn broke on June 6, 1944: 9 battleships, 23 cruisers, 104 destroyers and hundreds of troop transports, 5,000 ships bearing 100.000 men.

The naval bombardment that began at 5:50 that morning was the first assault on five beaches code-named Utah and Omaha for the Americans to the west, and Sword, Juno and Gold for the British and Canadians to the

Another 195,700 sailors fired guns, ferried supplies and cared for the wounded on the ships and landing craft in the English Channel, while 31,000

airmen flew bombing runs and reconnaissance missions



The attack had been long in coming. From the moment British forces were thrown into the sea at Dunkirk in the face of stunning German attack, military strategists had planned a return to the Continent. Only then would the Allies be able to confront the enemy's power directly on the ground.

During the first months of 1944 the United States and Great Britain concentrated land, naval and air forces in England to prepare for the operation, named "Overlord."

The day before, five-foot swells and low clouds compelled General Dwight D. Eisenhower, commander-in-chief of the Allied Expeditionary Force, to postpone the assault to the 6th.

Airborne units led the invasion. Just past midnight, the U.S. 82nd and 101st Airborne Divisions dropped near Ste. Mere-Eglise and Carentan to secure roads and beach exits from which the U.S. VII Corps could push to capture Cherbourg.

By first light, the entire horizon off Normandy was filled with the Allied armada. The massive naval arsenal began bombarding German positions along the tops of the cliffs, and 2,000 planes bombed the beaches.

The landing by regiments of the 1st and 29th Infantry Divisions and Army Rangers on Omaha Beach was wrenching. The first wave landing at 6:30 a.m. found the beach was a tangle of obstructions. Enemy guns fired down from cliffs and concrete cones, logs tilted seaward and slanted poles strewn across the narrow strip of beach thwarted the assault at the water's edge for much of the morning.

Mid-morning reports painted such a bleak picture of battlefield conditions that Lt. Gen. Omar Bradley considered pulling off the beach and landing the troops elsewhere. Losses had been high - 2,500 men killed in action — but if chaos ruled at first, raw courage asserted itself and by day's end, Americans controlled Omaha Beach. The Utah Beach landings took place about a mile south of the planned target, an error that helped the U.S. 4th Infantry Division by reducing the losses. Landings in the British and Canadian sectors also went well. By the evening of June 6, 1944, Allied power had prevailed all across. the Normandy coast. The Americans had yet to surge far enough inland to prevent enemy artillery from hitting the supply depots and unloading points they were building along the beaches, yet more than 100,000 men were ashore, the first of millions who would follow.

Pecan producers should check trees

It is time for pecan producers to begin conducting surveys for the destructive pecan nut casebearer.


Casebearer eggs are just visible to the naked eye and are greenish white when first deposited. They become a reddish color before hatching.

When eggs are found, trees should be tagged and inspected daily. Eggs hatch in four to five days after they are deposited. The larvae migrate to buds below the nutlets where they feed for one to two days before entering the nutlet.

Estimated spraying dates should be set five to eight days after eggs are found. The pecan nut casebearer larvae should be killed before they enter the nutlet. Once inside, they are protected until they emerge from the nutlet.

A second insecticide application may be required where eggs are found and nutlet damage continues seven to 10 days after the first insecticide application. This is especially true in case of a hard onehalf inch or more rain which will reduce spray residues by 40 to 60 percent.

Currently, the estimated spraying dates for the Haskell County area are from May 29 to

Northwest Publishing Co. of Salt Lake City has notified Haskell native Gene Mullins that publication of his western novel, *Dog Bark*, is imminent. The book should be available to bookstores by June 2.

Dog Bark, set in the 1880s in the Haskell area, is Mullins' first published work. He has written four other novels that are scheduled for publication in the near future. Two are westerns: Bear Paw, a sequel to Dog Bark, and Kill the Man Again, which continues the story of some of the characters. Weeds and Thorns is a modern romantic mystery and The 8:45 Booger Bear, a murder mystery, also are set in Texas. Mullins, a 1959 graduate of Haskell High School and a former teacher and coach, is now working on *Buffalo Horn*, a saga of the Kiowa Indian nation in the 19th century. He also plans a further historical novel about the tribe, *Kiowa Koitsenko*.

Mullins has spent years studying the history of Texas and the native Americans of the area. He and his wife, Beth Wasserman Mullins, collect western and Indian art and artifacts.

Mullins is a retired teacher and coach who taught history, government, geography and economics to high school students in Marlin and Navasota.

director or to hold any position of trust in the Cooperative who is not a member receiving service from the Cooperative at his primary residential abode in the area served by the Cooperative, or is in any way employed by or financially interested in a competing enterprise or a business selling electric energy or supplies to the Cooperative, or a business primarily engaged in selling electrical or plumbing appliances, fixtures or supplies to the members of the Cooperative, and no person shall take or hold office as a director who is the incumbent of or candidate for an elective public office in connection with which a salary is paid. When a membership is held jointly by a husband and wife, either one, but not both may be elected as director, provided however, that neither one shall be eligible to become or remain a director or to hold a position of trust in the Cooperative unless both shall meet the qualifications herein above set forth. Any director who shall miss three (3) Board of Directors' meetings in a row, without an excuse duly accepted and noted by the Board, shall lack eligibility to further serve and it shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to remove him from the Board. No former employee whose employment has been terminated by the Cooperative may be eligible to serve as director. Any employee who resigns or retires from employment by the Cooperative shall not be eligible to serve as a director for a period of ten (10) years following such resignation or retirement. Nothing contained in this Section shall, or shall be construed to, affect in any manner whatsoever the validity of any action taken at any meeting of the Board of Directors, unless such action is taken with respect to a matter which is affected by the provisions of this Section and in which one or more of the directors have an interest adverse to that of the Cooperative.

In the event an incumbent director, having served on the Board of Directors a minimum of six years, ceases to meet the requirement of receiving service from the Cooperative at his primary residential abode, such incumbent director shall nevertheless be qualified to continue to serve as director so long as he remains a member of the Cooperative and his primary residential abode is located within the area served by the Cooperative, or in close proximity thereto.

SECTION 4.03. ELECTION. At each annual meeting of the members, directors shall be elected by secret written ballot by the members and from among those members who are natural persons; provided however, that when the number of nominces does not exceed the number of directors to be elected, and if there is no objection, secret written balloting may be dispensed with and voting may be conducted in any other proper manner. Directors shall be elected by a plurality of the votes cast unless the members in advance of any balloting resolve that a majority of the votes cast shall be required to elect, and this Bylaw provision shall be drawn to the attention of the members and explained to them prior to any balloting. Drawing by lot shall resolve, where necessary, any tie vote.

SECTION 4.04. TENURE. The business and affairs of the Cooperative shall be managed by a Board of seven (7) directors which shall exercise all of the powers of the Cooperative except such that are by law, or by the Articles of Incorporation of the Cooperative, or by these Bylaws conferred upon or reserved to the members. Beginning with the Annual Meeting of the members of the Cooperative held on August 21, 1954, two (2) members of the Board of Directors shall serve for a period of one year, two (2) members shall serve for two years, and three (3) members shall serve; and beginning with the Annual Meeting of the members held in 1954, those directors who terms expire, such vacancy shall be filled for a period of three years.

SECTION 4.05. NOMINATIONS. It shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to appoint, not less than sixty (60) nor more than ninety (90) days prior to the date of a meeting of the members at which directors are to be elected, a Committee on Nominations, consisting of not less than five (5) nor more than eleven (11) members of the Cooperative who are not existing Cooperative employees, agents, officers, directors or known candidates for director, who are not close relatives (as hereinafter defined) or members of the same household of such existing employees, agents, officers, directors or known candidates for director, and who are so selected so as to give equitable representation on the committee to the geographical areas served or to be served by the Cooperative. The Committee shall prepare and post at the principal office of the Cooperative at least thirty (30) days prior to the meeting a list of nominations for directors to be elected. Any fifteen (15) or more members of the Cooperative, acting together, may make additional nominations in writing over their signatures, listing their nominee(s) in like manner, not less than twenty (20) days prior to the meeting, and the Secretary shall post such nominations at the same place where the list of nominations made by the Committee is posted. The Secretary shall mail to the members with the notice of the meeting, or separately, but at least ten (10) days prior to the date of the meeting, a statement of the names and addresses of all nominee(s) showing clearly those nominated by the Committee and those nominated by petition, if any. The chairman at such meeting, after all nominations so made have been duly announced, shall call for additional nominations from the floor. Notwithstanding the provisions contained in this Section, failure to comply with any of such provisions shall not affect in any manner whatsoever the validity of any action taken by the Board of Directors after the election of directors.






