New community network

Cancer coalition targets local area

By Darlene Walton Many of you may not know, but a local group has been involved in the war on cancer in Haskell, Kent, Stonewall, Knox and Throckmorton counties.

The group is part of a larger organization of volunteers known as the Big Country Cancer Coalition. The coalition is sponsored by the Texas Cancer Council (a state agency) and is coordinated by the West Central Texas Council of Governments (WCTCOG) in Abilene.

About two years ago, the Council of Governments received a grant from the Texas Cancer Council to identify the needs of the residents in our region as they relate to cancer and the issues surrounding it. WCTCOG surveyed the residents of the 19 counties it serves and found some interesting results.

wants to be seen, heard and felt

Small-town Texas is about to hit the big time.

More jobs, tourism revenue and political influence are on the line with the birth of a new regional leadership coalition.

The Texas Midwest Community Network, announced last week by community leaders from 13 area towns, is designed to bring big-city clout to rural Texas.

At a press conference last Tuesday morning at the T&P Depot in Abilene, TMCN steering committee chairman Rick Rhodes of Sweetwater introduced members of the non-profit organization, and explained the regional strategy involved.

"TMCN's mission is to identify, develop, and encourage leadership and participation from all communities in the region," he "By enhancing said. communications and sharing information from all members, TMCN will develop regional marketing strategies for tourism and economic development."

The organization, almost a full year in development and planning, has received support from an impressive list of legislators, organizations and businesses.

State Sen. Steve Carriker, whose

Texas Senate district includes many joined the network as of the communities involved, sees great potential for the organization.

"Representing a widespread rural constituency as I do, it's clear that indifference or petty rivalries have no function in this day and age," Carriker said. "Rural and smalltown Texans need to stand up and be seen, heard and felt as a strong, unified political force in the state. It's a matter of staking our claim and claiming our share.'

Leland Beatty, executive director of Texas Rural Communities of Austin, one of the backers of the network, believes it comes down to solving problems instead of just talking about them.

"What is TMCN about? It is about rural communities getting involved in everything from rural tourism to leadership development to simply communicating on state issues. TMCN is about addressing the rural problems of Texas and finding solutions for those problems. It's about education and growth."

Each town pays 5 cents per capita to join the network and has one vote. Three communities brought their membership dues to the press conference last week. Baird, Albany and Haskell officially

representatives presented checks. The network has received about \$3.000 in dues.

TMCN advisors include Patty Tenorio of Texas Rural Communities, Dennis Gloyna of Southwestern Bell, Mike Schweikhard of Lone Star Gas, David Scott of West Texas Utilities and Rick Womble of West Central Texas Council of Governments.



focus primarily on education and prevention. The reasoning behind this is that while we don't know all the causes of cancer, we do know some of the behaviors that put people at high risk. Also, the survey done a year ago showed that roughly 75 percent of us don't know the "seven warning signs" of cancer.

While some efforts have been made in developing this plan to the point that it can be easily implemented in our communities, due to waning support it has been extremely difficult to make the kind of progress we need to ensure that our plans make a difference in our community.

Remember, the Texas Cancer Council is a state agency which means that state tax dollars have been set aside to be used in our community efforts to address our own needs. Wouldn't it be a shame if those funds were used elsewhere because we thought cancer would never touch our lives? The study done in our region showed that we have roughly a 1 in 10 chance at developing cancer in our lifetimes (slightly higher if you're a male).

We can change that, but only if



we all do our part. That doesn't mean we want each of you to send in a donation or knock doors in your neighborhood. Each of us has something to offer our communities in this effort. It may be providing space or time in local media to informative articles or programs about cancer prevention; it may be that we would be willing to speak to a local civic group about breast cancer, or maybe we would talk to a high school class about the dangers of overexposure to the sun. The point is for any community-based action plan we need community involvement.


Please don't let this opportunity to impact our community for the better go by without asking yourself how you can help. We need the support of many more of our residents in order to make any plan for action work for our communities.

Class of 1950 meets in Abilene


The HHS class of 1950 held a reunion June 17-18 at the Embassy Suites in Abilene.

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

Parents need to know when to be involved

Youth sports take a commitment from both child and parent, but knowing when to sit back and cheer may be a parent's hardest job.

The more emphasis that is placed on fair play, having fun and challenging oneself, the better for the child, says Dr. Fran Pirozzolo, a psychologist for the Houston Astros and a neuropsychologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Parents may work on the fundamentals of a sport with a child, but once the child joins a team, the instruction should be turned over to the coaches.

"At practice and games, the parent's role is to cheerlead," Pirozzolo said. "Differing sets of instructions from parents and coaches can really put a child in conflict."

He does urge parents to watch for coaches who promote rule breaking and winning at all costs.

"Never underestimate the impact your support can have on a child,' he said. "Don't pass up the opportunity to praise your child for doing his or her best, especially on bad days."
