

on tax rate

The Haskell CISD Board of Trustees voted unanimously Aug. 16 not to increase taxes.

The 1994 tax rate will remain at \$1.2268 per \$100 of property value. The school tax rate has remained the same for three years because of excellent management and planning on the part of the Board of Trustees, administration

It is important, however, for taxpayers to remember that prior to the 1993-94 school year, more state monies were generated as school districts made more local effort through increased tax rates. This process helped generate much of the additional revenue needed to operate the school and to put the district on solid financial ground.

Beginning with the 1993-94 school year, state dollars for Haskell CISD were frozen at a level of some \$300,000 less than the dollars received in 1992-93. State dollars also will be frozen some \$300,000 less in 1994-95, making a total of \$600,000 fewer dollars over two years. As a result of frozen levels of state dollars, ncreased tax effort does not

generate additional state dollars. The school administration and Board of Trustees felt that at this point, the district could operate at least one more year at the present tax rate and, if necessary, on reserve funds. Each of us, as taxpayers, must realize however, that as the legislature again meets in January to make decisions on school funding, we may again find it necessary to increase taxes in order to generate additional state dollars needed to operate our fine district. As we all know, it is impossible to accurately speculate on what the lawmakers of the state may do.

We wish to thank the citizens and taxpayers of the district for their most generous support and we will make every effort to hold taxes at a reasonable and necessary level. We will strive to operate the district at reasonable costs and at the same time provide a well rounded education for the children of the

The City Council Tuesday night approved a request to re-zone an area at Avenue C and South 1st Street from general residential to industrial to allow the erection of some rental storage buildings.


The property, owned by Jerry Larned, is the back half of the lots on which some apartment units are now being constructed.

meeting each other at some midway point before deciding that both would attend the Company M reunion Sept. 9-10. The reunion is held in Springfield since that is where the 147th regiment was organized as a National Guard unit before being activated during World

Jordan said he had wondered if the company ever had a reunion and had often checked an American Legion publication which listed reunions, but had never seen this one mentioned

Jordan entered the army at Fort Sam Houston in April 1943, took basic training at Camp Wolters and was then sent to New Caladonia in the South Pacific. It was there he was assigned to the 147th which had not yet arrived at New Caladonia. "I had to wait two weeks for them to get there," he recalled.

"The 147th had been in combat at Guadalcanal and a lot of the troops had malaria and other ailments," Jordan said, "so they were sent to R&R on Samoa for a while."

Jordan joined the outfit after it arrived in New Caladonia. He said they trained for a while and then went to occupy the island of Emirau. "We just occupied it, there wasn't any fighting there, but it was a horrible place," Jordan said. "We then returned to New Caladonia for more training before being sent to Iwo Jima."

The 147th arrived in Iwo Jima in March 1945 to help relieve the Marines who had taken the island in February in what has been described as "inch, for inch, the bloodiest battle in U.S. military history."

The heavy fighting was over by the time we got there," Jordan said, "but we still had some 'mop up' to

The outfit stayed there until September when it got orders to move on to a similar "mop up" assignment in Okinawa. "We were on the beach loading up when we got word the war was over," Jordan recalls. He learned later that the 147th was to have participated in the invasion of Japan, which was pre-emptied by the Japanese surrender.

It was then that Jordan and his pal Ramey parted company. "He had enough points to get out, so he got to go home," Jordan said. "I went on to Okinawa."

Jordan was discharged in January 1946. He re-enlisted in the army during the Korean War and spent another 18 years in the service before he retired in 1968.

Jordan is very much looking forward to the Company M reunion. Ramey had the company's old first sergeant send him a package of materials, which included a picture of those attending the last reunion and a roster with names and addresses. "Ramey was the only one in the picture I could recognize," Jordan said. "Judging from the looks of the old gang, I don't expect any wild partying at our reunion."

Then he added, "Except for Ramey and me. We seem to be the only ones who failed to get old and used up."

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

At the request of an out-of-town reader whose name I have forgotten, am pleased to re-publish the following column which originally appeared in this space a couple of

My grandmother called a bicycle a "wheel." To her, a movie was a "talkie." And when she announced she wanted to listen to the radio, she verbalized the noun: "I think I will radio a while.'

Such terminology was common among those of her age group.

Thinking of it reminds me that a lot of words and terms that were common in bygone days no longer are used. Some have disappeared from our vocabularies simply because they don't fit today's lifestyles, others because they have been superseded by other words and terms, and some just died.

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In the old days when you ordered a glass of milk, in a restaurant or at home, you had to be specific. You ordered "sweet milk," unless you wanted buttermilk or "clabber."

Light bread was that stuff that came in a loaf, usually from a

Tires were casings, a motel was a tourist court, coal oil was a fuel used in a stove or a John Deere, and a cistern was an in-ground reservoir where you captured rain water that ran off the roof of the house.

Central was the telephone operator, a thresher was a combine, a peck was a measurement used in sacking potatoes, fried pies were turnovers, and a penny postcard was a postcard that cost a penny.

A flour sack dress was a dress made from the printed sack that flour came in, and a half-sole was a new leather replacement on the part of the shoe sole that had been worn

A milk bottle was what the name implies, and a syrup bucket with holes in top usually contained, not syrup, but your lunch which you shared at noon with the ants.

An ice box was not for sixpacks, but a home refrigerator with store-bought ice, and a rumble seat was an outdoor seat on the back end of a Ford coupe. (Remember the song, "Oh give me a date, in a Ford V-8, with a rumble seat for two.")

Tennis shoes were those rubber and canvas things you bought at the dime store that made your feet smell, and a dime store actually sold things for a dime (as well as a nickel and a penny).

A "tramp" was a hobo who hopped off a freight train, knocked on the door and asked for something to eat.

You didn't change your oil, you "drained it" (or "dreened" it), and you didn't can vegetables, you "put them up."

You "pulled bolls" in the fall, put the cotton in a "cotton sack" and weighed your haul on a "pea If you were dieting, you were

"falling off" and if you looked like your dad, you "favored" him. A number of things were known by their trade names. Many people called a camera a Kodak and a record

player was a Victrola. Some terms and words have different meanings today. Fourletter words were those like "love"

and "hope" and "help." And I remember a fourth-grade teacher saying she thought "gay" was the prettiest word in the English language.

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

Friends of the family are invited to come join in the fellowship.

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
