The Haskell Indians had little time this week to lick their wounds from their loss to Quanah as they prepared to do battle with the Knox City Greyhounds who invade the wigwam Friday night.

There's plenty of incentive for the Indians. Not only are they anxious to prove they are a better team than they showed last week. but they haven't forgotten last year's Knox City game.

didn't do was move the ball in the first half. Quanah's nose guard, 130-pound J. J. Jalomo, was getting in the Indian backfield and stopping the offense before it could get started. In the second half, the offense did much better.

## **City of Haskell** sales tax rebate continues decline

Sales tax rebates to the City of Haskell continue to fall behind those of a year ago, although the latest rebate from the state comptroller indicates a lesser decline.

The rebate check received this week was in the amount of \$13,499.15, and was the city's share of sales taxes collected in July.

This compares with a check for \$14,313.90 for the same period last year and represents a 5.69-percent decline.

For the year to date, Haskell has received \$160,099.90 from its 1.5cent sales tax levy. That's 8.04 percent below the \$174,113.85 received in the first nine months of 1993.

Only other Haskell County city to receive a rebate check this month was Rule, which received \$999.00, somewhat less than the \$1,220.89

that city received for this period last. year. Rule has a 1-cent sales tax.

For the year, Rule has received rebates totaling \$15,190,71, or 5.56 percent less than last year's \$16,086.08 for the January-to-September period.

Rochester, which also has a 1cent sales tax rate, has received \$5,605.07 so far this year, compared to \$5,761.48 last year.

Weinert's rebate this year has totaled \$1,628.23, compared to \$3,707.83 last year. O'Brien's 1994 rebate has come to \$1,326.47, compared to \$1,490.95 last year. Weinert and O'Brien also have 1cent rates.

Beginning Oct. 1, Haskell merchants will begin collecting an additional half-cent sales tax, but the effect of this increase will not show up in rebate checks until December.

## City OKs budget; tax rate .2598

The City Council last week adopted a \$1,342,929 budget and set a tax rate of 25.98 cents.

While the tax rate is an increase of 2.97 cents over this year's rate, it will have minimal effect on taxes for the average taxpayer, said city administrator Sam Watson.

Taxes will increase \$6.81 on a home valued at \$22,493, the taxable value of an average home in Haskell. Total tax on an average home will go from \$51.76 to

year's. The increased tax will help offset the loss of income from the landfill which has been closed since April.

Property taxes are expected to bring in \$126,200 of the money needed to finance the budget. Sales taxes should bring in another \$216,000, not including the halfcent economic development tax which cannot be used for operation of the city. Water sales and garbage and sewer fees will bring in most of


"They should have won that game," said Indian coach Dwayne Gray, who pointed out Knox City lost six fumbles.

Lou Gilly has a new title.


The long-time Haskell County county agent/home economics is now officially known as Haskell County "Family and Consumer Sciences Agent."



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


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## Life-threatening stroke requires prompt treatment

Question: What exactly is a stroke and what are its symptoms?

Answer: A stroke is a life-threatening event in which the brain's vital supply of oxygen is disrupted. A stroke can affect the senses, speech, behavior, thought patterns and memory. It may also result in paralysis, coma and death. A stroke occurs when an artery to the brain bursts or becomes clogged by a blood clot, cutting off the supply of oxygen to a part of the brain. Brain tissue that is deprived of oxygen dies within minutes. As a result, the part of the body controlled by those brain cells cannot function properly.

A stroke may happen suddenly, but it often follows years of a slow build up of fatty deposits inside the blood vessels. High blood pressure and atherosclerosis, the build up of fatty plaque in the arteries, increase the risk of a stroke.

About 10 percent of strokes are preceded by transient ischemic attacks, or TIAs. These ministrokes can occur days, weeks or even months before a major stroke. They usually last less than five minutes and have many of the same symptoms of a stroke. Be-



cause a large percent of people who experience TIAs suffer strokes, often within days, prompt medical attention for TIAs is essential. Symptoms of a stroke include: • Sudden weakness or numbness of the face, arm and leg - usually on one side of the body. • Loss of speech, or trouble talking or understanding speech. · Dimness or loss of vision, particularly in only one eye. • Unexplained dizziness, unsteadi-

ness or falls. • Sudden, severe headache.

If any of these symptoms occur, it's important to get immediate emergency medical care. The degree of recovery from a stroke variesgreatly, but much depends upon prompt treatment to minimize the brain damage.

## **Business Repairs**

If you expect to pay big money on business repairs, you should know the tax difference between a repair and a capital expenditure.

A repair can be deducted on your tax return for the year in which it was made. An outlay for a capital expenditure must be capitalized and written off over a period of years.

The difference can have an impact on your income taxes. For example, if you spend \$10,000 patching up a store roof so that it doesn't leak, you can deduct the entire \$10,000 on your tax return. But if you spend \$10,000 to replace the roof, you must capitalize the expense and depreciate it.

It may be in your best interest to expense your repairs rather than capitalize them, but how do you know which is which? Tax experts agree it's a gray area, but the IRS offers this guidance: if the expenditure increases the value of your property, makes it more useful, or lengthens its life, the expenditure must be capitalized and depreciated. Otherwise, it's an expense.

For instance, if you have a machine that requires you to replace parts to keep it running, the cost of the parts is considered an expense because you're maintaining the machine's existing life. But if you replace those parts during an overhaul of the machine, that's usually considered a capital expenditure, because the overhaul has lengthened the machine's life.

Since the decision to expense versus capitalize can be a gray area, make sure that you are able to justify your decision with thorough documentation.
