County rates No. 86 in liquor sales

When it comes to eating and drinking, Haskell County appears to score a lot higher in the latter.

Figures released by the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts for 1993 reveal that Haskell County ranked No. 86 among the state's 254 counties in liquor sales, 182nd in food store sales and 206th in restaurant sales.

County liquor stores reported 1993 sales of \$1,434,996. While the No. 86 rating may sound quite high, it drops in importance when it is noted that the comptroller's findings list liquor sales in only 125 counties. Many Texas counties are dry and have no liquor sales. Also, in compiling the statistics the comptroller included only those counties with four or more reporting outlets.

Aside from liquor, Haskell County scored highest in clothing sales. The 1993 sales of \$1,704,808 placed the county in 110th place, not bad for a county which ranks No. 186 in population.

Also rating high in Haskell County were automotive sales of \$16,007,947, a figure which put the county in 139th place.

The county ranked above its population rank in five other categories:

Home furnishings, \$880,136 (No. 163); general merchandise, \$1,269,962 (No. 165); total retail trade, \$41,059,388 (169th); building materials, \$2,288,006 (176th); and food stores, \$11,016,466 (182nd).

In two other sales areas, Haskell County equaled its population rank, being No. 186 in both transportation and utilities (\$1,108,509) and total wholesale trade (\$8,833,816).

Total gross sales in the county came to \$55,595,141, good enough for 191st place among the state's counties; construction sales were \$535,728 (200th place), and restaurant sales were \$1,632,282 (206th place).

Auditorium renovation is underway

Work began last week on the renovation of the auditorium at Haskell secondary school.

Electra Construction Co. of Electra is contractor for the project. It is expected to be completed in mid-February.

Plans call for a 270-seat auditorium, expandable to accommodate 450 with the removal of participations enclosing two classrooms which will be housed in the building. The classrooms will be located in the west end of the

building. The building, which now measures 44 by 80 feet will be enlarged by 27 feet on the east side, making a total area of 44 by 107 feet. Restrooms, dressing rooms and storage will be located in the enlarged portion of the building.


The auditorium will be virtually all new, Superintendent Bill Stewart said Monday. It will contain new heating and cooling, new carpeting, a new stage, new seats, new lights and a new stage curtain.

The existing auditorium has been used very little in recent years. Mass assemblies, including graduation exercises, have been held off campus.

Stewart said the renovated auditorium will give Haskell firstclass facilities for its drama and speech departments.

The cost of \$445,000 is part of a \$467,000 package which also includes a \$22,000 enlargement of the elementary cafeteria to provide for freezers and food storage.

Mechanically, it was about as close to perfect as you'll see the Indians, or anyone else, play.

There was not one turnover by the Indians. There were only 2 penalties, for 15 yards.

Twice, Cody Cypert buried the Lions near the goal line with his pin-point punting. The blocking in the line, as well as by the Indian backs, left nothing to be desired.

And the defense was superb. The Lions could get no closer than the Haskell 24, and then they were thrown back to the 30.

Only three other times did the Lions cross midfield, reaching the Haskell 43 twice and the Indian 48

And for the second week in a row, the Indians used eight ball carriers.

The Indians got off a number of good runs. Justin Lisle, who ran 73 yards on the game's second play, also had runs of 19 and 10 yards. Cody Cypert had runs of 17, 16 and 12 yards and Casey Larned clicked off a 16-yard beauty.

The Indians converted 6 of 12 third-down situations and 1 of 2 fourth downs.

Haskell's lone loss, to Quanah, is cushioned somewhat by the fact that the 4-0 Q-Indians are on a rampage. They've scored 182 points, 45.5 per outing.

Quanah has yielded only three touchdowns, two of them to

Coach Dwayne Gray was pleased with a lot of things.

For one thing, the Indians had only two penalties for 15 yards, compared with 9 for 75 yards the previous week.

And there were no turnovers.

Dr. Jesse Vaughter

Dr. Jesse Gordon Vaughter, who came to Haskell as a young dentist 60 years ago, died Sunday of heart failure. He had been admitted to the Haskell hospital on Friday with a failed hip joint.

Funeral services were Wednesday morning at the First United Methodist Church with the Rev. Sid Parsley officiating. Burial was in Willow Cemetery, directed by Holden-McCauley Funeral Home.

Dr. Vaughter was born March 23, 1907, in Byers, Texas. He graduated from Byers High School in 1924 and attended Clarendon College in Clarendon. After a period working in his brother's drug store, he attended the University of Louisville (Kentucky) and was graduated as a Doctor of Dental Surgery in 1931.

That same year he opened a dental practice in Rochester. He moved his practice to Haskell in 1934. In 1937 he married Peggy Taylor of Frisco, Texas. For three years during World War II, Dr. Vaughter served as a lieutenant in the United States Navy in the South Pacific. Except for that time he maintained his dental practice in Haskell until he retired in 1977.

Dr. Vaughter was an active member of the First United Methodist Church where he taught Sunday School for many years. He was a life member of the American and Texas Dental Associations, a Master Mason for more than 65 years and a 60-year-plus member of Lions International. A member of the Haskell Country Club, he enjoyed his golf games as much as he did having coffee with friends at the drug store.

Dr. Vaughter is survived by his wife, Peggy, of the home; a son, James Gordon Vaughter of Washington, D.C.; a daughter, Elizabeth Barrett of Houston; two grandchildren, Adrienne Barrett and Michael Barrett, both of Houston; two brothers, Hiram Vaughter of Amarillo and James Victor Vaughter of Carmichael, Calif; and a sister, Mary Nelda Rice of Grand Prairie.

He was preceded in death by a brother, Hall, who was superintendent of Haskell schools for several years, and a sister,
