Indians need win at Hawley Friday

Haskell's Indians travel to Hawley Friday night to take on the winless Bearcats in a game the Indians must have to stay in the district 7-2A championship race.

By all indicators the Indians are supposed to win this one. But indicators often mean nothing in district 7-2A where the also-rans often knock off the top teams.

The Indians remember too well that they lost to a 1-4 Stamford team three weeks ago. And just in case that memory has faded, they can recall that a 1-6 Anson team led them for three quarters last Friday.

Hawley has lost all eight of its games, including a 69-6 decision to Hamlin last week. The Bearcats have given up a staggering 360

points, while scoring only 47 themselves.

Haskell, coming off last week's 27-7 win over Anson on the heels of a 7-6 squeaker past Hamlin the week before, has boosted its overall record to 6-2 and its 7-2A mark to 2-1.

The Indians looked like anything but a title contender in the first half against Anson. But they came back strong after intermission. "I was real proud of the team for the way it came back," said coach Dwayne Gray. "They responded well and matured a lot in the second half."

After Friday, only one more game of the regular season will remain. The Indians' final district game will be Friday of next week when they host Rotan.

Early voting perks interest in election

Considerable interest in the Nov. 8 general election is evidenced by the 77 county citizens who had voted early in the county clerk's office by Tuesday morning. Another 28 voters had requested mail ballots.

Early voting will continue through Nov. 4.

Several important state and district races will be decided in the Nov. 8 election.

Most interest in state races centers in the race for governor where Democratic incumbent Ann Richards is locked in a heated race with Republican George W. Bush, son of the former president.

Republican U.S. Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison is being challenged by Democrat Richard Fisher.

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, Democrat, is opposed by "Tex" Lezar.

Attorney General Dan Morales, Democrat, faces opposition from Republican Don Wittig.

State Comptroller John Sharp, Democrat, is opposed by Teresa Doggett, Republican.

Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, Democrat, faces Republican Marta Greytok.

Of wide local interest is the race between Haskell's own Rick Perry and Marvin Gregory. Perry, the incumbent, is the only Republican holding a state office.

In the 17th Congressional District, eight-term incumbent Charles Stenholm, Democrat, is facing his most serious challenge in the person of Republican Phil Boone.

And in State Senate District 30, Democrat incumbent Steve Carriger is opposed by Republican Tom Haywood, the same candidate he defeated four years ago.

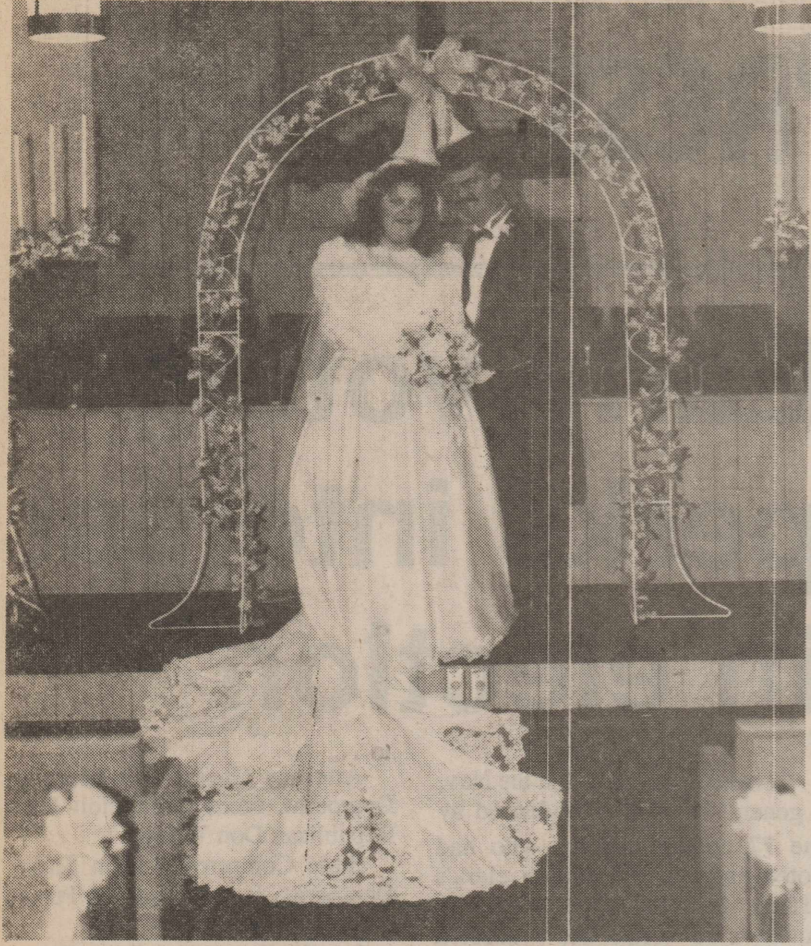
Big night

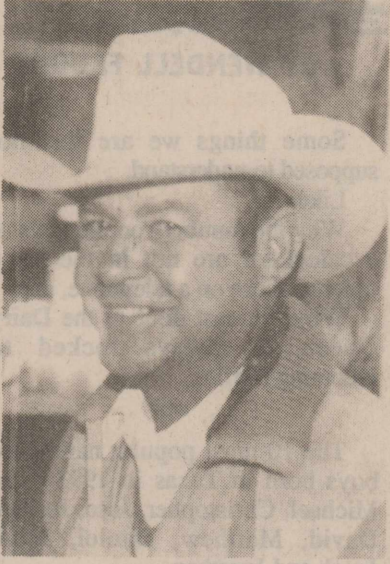

Indians storm back to beat Anson

Those Indians can too score in the second half.

After three consecutive games in which they scored all their points before intermission, the Indians did an about face at Anson Friday night, getting all their points in the second half as they came from behind to defeat the pesky Tigers, 27-7.

The victory boosted Haskell's district 7-2A record to 2-1 (6-2 overall) and moved the Indians a step closer to the playoffs.

Anson drew first blood, getting

The Tigers drove to the Haskell 3-yard line late in the second period, but the Indian defense and a 10-yard penalty thwarted the drive.

The Indians' first touchdown came on their first possession in the third quarter. Ryan Olson recovered a fumble on the Anson 36, and nine plays later, Cody Cypert went over from a yard out. Big gainer in the drive had been a 15-yard run by Casey Larned. The Indians were unable to get off the

extra point attempt, so Anson still led, 7-6.

Larned got all of the Indians' 21 fourth-quarter points, scoring three touchdowns, running over a 2-point conversion and kicking an extra point.

The Indians drove 66 yards for their first fourth-quarter touchdown. The drive began late in the third period as Keiland Riley clicked off runs of 10 and 22 yards, and ended less than 2 minutes into the fourth period when Larned ran 9 yards for the score. Larned took a pitchout from Cypert and went in for the 2-point conversion as Haskell went out front for the first time, 14-7.

Less than three minutes later, the Indians had their third touchdown. Martin Limones recovered an Anson fumble at the Tiger 36. Riley made a yard and then 17, before Larned raced the

final 18 yards for the touchdown. This time, Larned booted the extra point as the score rose to 21-7.

Midway through the final period, Cypert intercepted Martinez' pass at the Tiger 35 and returned it for what appeared to be another Haskell touchdown. But the Indians had been flagged for an illegal block at the 14 and were penalized back to the 24.

Eight time-consuming ground plays later, Larned scored from the 8. It mattered not that Larned's extra point kick attempt was wide of the mark.

For the second consecutive week, Larned was the Indians' top ball carrier, getting 123 yards on 19 carries. Riley rushed 13 times for 86 yards. Justin Lisle gained 47 yards in 10 carries.

Olson was credited with 15 tackles to lead in the defensive category. Riley had 12 tackles and Lisle had 11. Larned had 8 and Frankie Masias had 7.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (SWBT) has filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) to restructure the current PLEXAR I and II service offerings. This restructure will significantly change PLEXAR I and II services.

The restructuring of PLEXAR I will, among other things: (1) reduce the maximum line size from 30 to 9; (2) obsolete and grandfather certain optional features; (3) eliminate the requirement to subscribe to Feature Package Two in order to subscribe to certain optional features; (4) reduce the nonrecurring and monthly rates of certain features; and (5) increase the nonrecurring charges for the PLEXAR I System Charge (\$2.10 to \$8.00), Call Transfer Disconnect feature (\$3.00 to \$8.00), and Convenience Dialing I feature (\$6.35 to \$8.00). All current PLEXAR I customers will have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR I service, switching to the new restructured PLEXAR I service, or switching to PLEXAR II service with ten or more lines.

The proposed PLEXAR II restructure will, among other things: (1) change the tariffed offering to serve the market segment of 10-74 stations; (2) create two station pricing structures, one for customers with 10-29 stations, and one for customers with 30-74 stations; (3) reduce the sensitivity for the loop portion of the rate to two price bands: 0-2 miles, and beyond 2 miles; (4) offer a PLEXAR II basic station that can be flexibly configured, from a number of standard features, to meet the individual customer requirements; (5) change the way the termination liability is calculated so the customer is responsible for 65% rather than 56% of the present worth of the remaining monthly payments in the contract; (6) create an option that allows month-to-month customers to convert to long term contracts of at least three years and receive a credit or "contract signing bonus"; and (7) establish a System Subsequent Change Charge which applies per serving central office when changes are made that affect the entire system.

Current PLEXAR II customers will also have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR II service, or switching to the new restructured PLEXAR II service. PLEXAR II customers with at least 75 stations also have the option of switching to PLEXAR Custom service in certain situations.

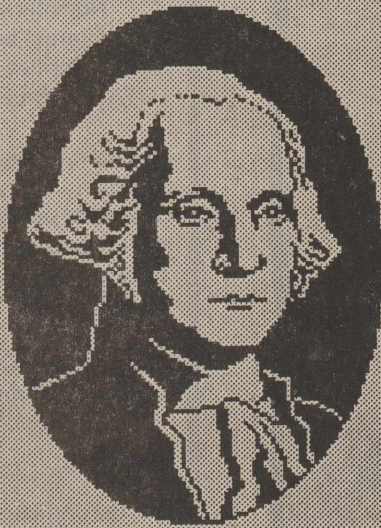

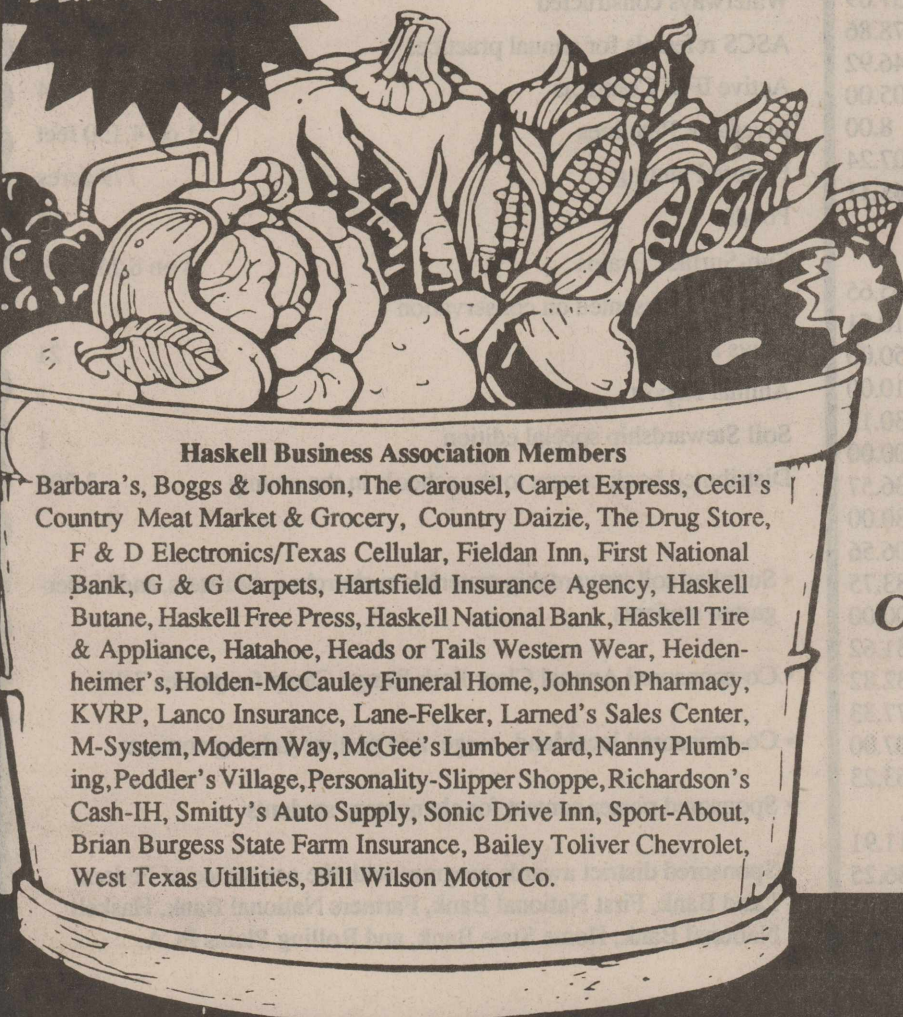

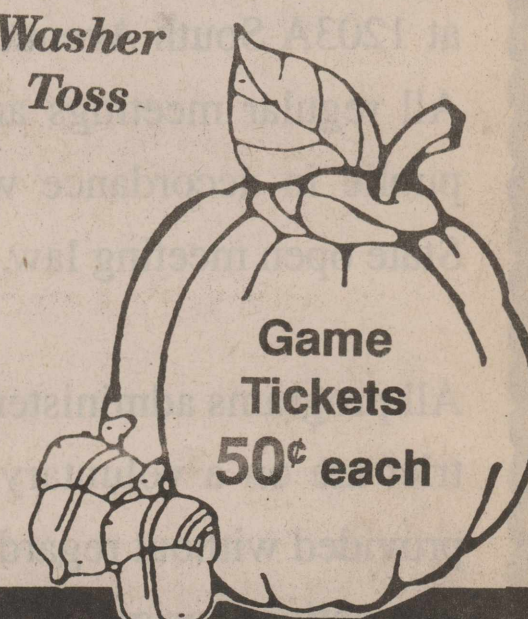

Dispelling myths about ideal weight

While Americans have become more health conscious, some still may have difficulty separating myths from realities when it comes to nutrition and physical activity.

"You can never be too thin" is definitely one of those myths, says Carol Suter, professor and nutrition specialist with the Texas Extension Service.

"In reality, being too thin or too heavy increases your chance of developing health problems," she said. "A healthy weight depends on how much of your weight is fat and where the fat is located in your body."

Other factors also help determine an individual's healthy weight, she said. For example, healthy weight will be influenced by whether a person has weight-related medical problems, such as elevated

cholesterol or diabetes, or a family history of such problems.

Assuming that the scale is the best way to determine if you're fit or fat is another way that people too often arrive at the wrong conclusion.

"The scale does not reflect your body composition," Suter said. "The body is more than just mass. It's muscle mass, skeletal mass, fat mass and organs, which includes the skin."

The scale does not differentiate between fluid or fat weight, she said. It does not take into account that:

- It takes 3,500 calories to make a pound of fat.
- Two cups of water weighs one pound.
- Sudden weight changes are

usually from fluid shifts in the body.

"If your weight suddenly rises five pounds, it would require consuming an extra 17,500 calories.

More sophisticated measuring techniques such as the bioelectric impedance do a reasonable job in calculating fat, Suter said.

"However, experts believe that there still is not a clear method to determine optimal body weight--that which is optimal for good health, for peak performance or for appearance."

The waist-to-hip ratio is a simple way to determine if your weight is a health risk, she said. Measure around your waist and the largest part of your hips. Divide the number of waist inches by those of the hips to obtain the risk ratio. The high-risk ratio is 9.95 or above for men, or 0.80 for women.

Nutritionists agree that a low-calorie diet is a good way to achieve a healthy weight, but not the best way when it becomes extreme. Chronic dieting, under-eating, or skipping meals can contribute to a sluggish metabolism, which could make it harder to lose weight.

"Fueling your metabolism is like stoking a fire," Suter said. "If you remove the wood, the fire will diminish. To fuel the metabolism, a sufficient amount of calories must be consumed or the body will slow down to compensate.

Proper dieting requires following the recommended daily allowances of the USDA Food Guide Pyramid, she said.

Another myth is that "increasing aerobic activity guarantees that you'll reach your metabolic peak. While aerobic exercise such as cycling or jogging can help boost metabolism, research shows that strength training, such as weight lifting, plays a vital role. Weight-bearing activities help build and maintain muscle growth. The more muscle you have, the more calories you burn.

There are many reasons for people to add regular activity to their lives, Suter said. It helps individuals reach and stay at a healthy body weight, reduces body fat, can lower blood pressure, lowers some blood fats (total cholesterol), but raises the "good" kind (HDL cholesterol), improves

blood flow and increases strength and endurance.

However, be careful in selecting an exercise routine, especially if you have a health problem. Experts recommend that before deciding on any exercise or diet plan, consult a doctor, dietitian, exercise specialist or all three. Remember, too, that activity with weights and other fitness equipment requires proper training and usage to avoid injuries.

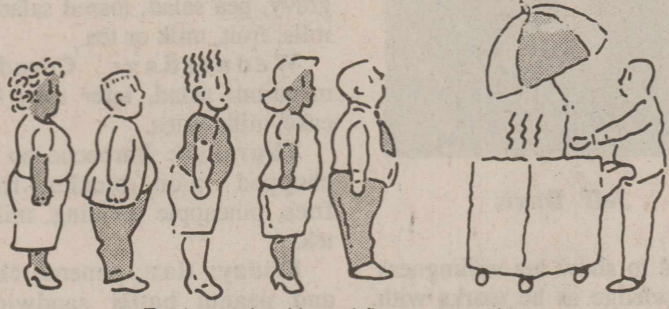

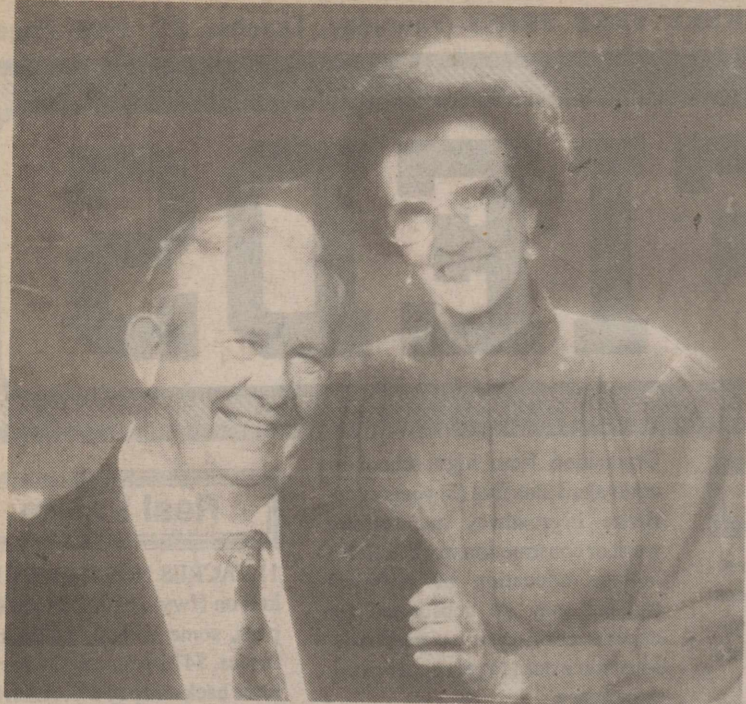
