## Interesi running high for Tuesday election

A heavy turnout of voters is expected in Haskell County
Tuesday for the general election to name a U.S. Senator, a U.S. Representative, a Govemor and a host of other state, district and county officers.

Polls will open at 7 a.m. and remain open until 7 p.m.
A higher-than-usual turnout in early voting indicates a keen
nterest locally in the election As of mid-momind Tuesday 192 interest locally in the election. As of mid-moming Tuescay, 192 voters had voted in persol with te county terk and to others mail ballots, but early in-person voting will continue through Friday.
Creating most interest in the election are the races for Governor and U.S. Representative. Democrat Gov. Ann Rich ards is seeking a second term and is opposed by George W. Bush, Republican. Congressional race, eight-term, Democrat incumbent Charles W. Stenholm faces a challenge from Republican Phil Boone.
In the race for the U.S. Senate, Republican incumbent Kay Bailey Hutchison is opposed by Democrat Richard Fisher. Pierre Blondeau, a Libertarian, also is a candidate. Hutchison was
elected last year to fill the unexpired term of Lloyd Bentsen. Eight other non-judicial state offices will be decided Tuesday.

Of most local interest is the race for Commissioner of Agriculture
