Champion Indians meet De Leon Friday in Clyde

The 8-2 Haskell Indians, champions of district 7-2A will meet the district 8-2A runnerup De Leon Bearcats at 7:30 p.m. Friday in a bi-district playoff at Clyde.

It promises to be a close contest between two teams with similar records. The Bearcats posted a 7-3 season record and a 4-1 district mark to finish behind champion Dublin.

The Bearcats lost, 21-7, to Dublin, but ran over their other district rivals, Cisco (22-14), Baird (18-0), Ranger (41-0) and Albany

In non-district play, De Leon

defeated 3A Eastland, 14-13; beat Early 31-11; and topped Bangs, 34-13. Their two non-conference losses were to third-ranked Goldthwaite, 27-0, and 3A Comanche, 17-0.

Haskell and De Leon have met two common opponents and the results of those games indicate the two teams are evenly matched. De Leon defeated Baird, 18-0, a team the Indians beat, 10-6. The Bearcats won over Albany, 22-0, while the Indians defeated Albany, 25-0.

Leading ground-gainer for the Bearcats is Brad Bunting, 170pound senior halfback who has rushed for about 900 yards. Edward Meza, 200-pound senior fullback, has gained more than 500 yards.

Quarterbacking the Bearcats is 140-pound junior John Weaver, who has passed for more than 1,100

Anchoring the Bearcat defense are middle guard John Burk, 270pound junior, and a pair of senior defensive ends, Dan Davis and Buddy Whitt, both 175.

Haskell, which has won four in a row, holds victories over Munday (20-18), Knox City (40-14), Albany (25-0) and Baird (10-6) in non-district, and 7-2A wins over Hamlin (7-6), Anson (27-7), Hawley (58-0) and Rotan (52-0). The Indians' only non-district loss was to Quanah (32-12) and their district loss was to Stamford (27-

The Indian offense is led by their two halfbacks, junior Justin Lisle and senior Casey Larned, and senior quarterback Cody Cypert.

They operate behind an offensive line which has improved greatly since the late-season return of two injured starters, guards Stacy Walker and Brandon McFadden, to lend help to center Jamie Hodgin and tackles Martin Limones and John Isbell.

The Indian defense has been spectacular recently, allowing only 13 points in the last four games. Limones is the nose guard, Stephen Campbell and Bucky Harvey the ends, Robert Ortiz and Michael Rodriquez the tackles, Hodgin and Ryan Olson the linebackers, Keiland Riley and Cypert the corners and Frankie Masias and Larned the safeties.

Several other Indians have contributed to the team's success.

The winner of the Haskell-De Leon game will meet the winner of the Ozona-Winters game next week. Ozona and Winters play this Friday in San Angelo.

Indians' record best since 1979

Haskell's 8-2 regular-season record is the best by an Indian team

The Indians opened the 1994 season with a 20-18 win over traditional rival Munday.

After losing, 12-32, to Quanah, the Indians came back to win three in a row, 40-14 over Knox City, 25-0 over Albany, and 10-6 over Baird, to boost their non-district record to 4-1.

They opened the district 7-2A Members of the Radio team are season at Stamford on Oct. 7. After leading 10-0 late in the second period, they saw their lead melt away and the result was a 27-10 loss to the Bulldogs.

The loss to Stamford must have inspired the Indians. After that bad

County voters go against national trend

Republicans may have scored big victories Tuesday across the nation and across the state, but traditionally Democratic Haskell County went against the trend.

Only Republican candidate to win here was native son Rick Perry, who received 1309 votes to Democrat Marvin Gregory's 842 as he easily won re-election as State Agriculture Commissioner.

Closest race in Haskell County was for U.S. Senator, where Democratic challenger Richard Fisher picked up 1063 votes to Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison's 1056. Statewide, Hutchison easily won reelection.

County voters gave Democratic Gov. Ann Richards a 1309 to 893 edge over Republican George W. Bush, although Bush won statewide.

Haskell County gave Congressman Charles Stenholm an even greater vote of approval, casting 1517 votes for the 8-term Democrat, while Republican opponent Phil Boone got 669 votes here. Stenholm won re-election in a fairly close contest.

Democratic State Sen. Steve Carriker polled 1411 Haskell County votes to Republican Tom Haywood's 721, although Haywood apparently upset the veteran





I hope this will bring to your attention the urgency of the matter even if you just own a car and your home and are over 65 years of age. Please seek advise on your estate.

This is one of the many services Farm Bureau offers to its members free of charge.

If a person owns a farm and isn't careful, Uncle Sam could inherit it. More than 80 percent of all U.S. farms are family owned and many of them will face a transition during the next decade and a half. But that doesn't mean the heirs will take over. History shows that the second generation takes over just 30 percent of family farms. The rest disappear or is sold to outsiders due to inheritance tax.

Farm owners need a succession plan to protect against the peril that often pulls the plug on family ownership, the federal estate tax.

Flu can be prevented with influenza vaccine. A yearly vaccination is about 75 percent effective in preventing flu and reducing the severity of the flu.





The restructuring of PLEXAR I will, among other things: (1) reduce the maximum line size from 30 to 9; (2) obsolete and grandfather certain optional features; (3) eliminate the requirement to subscribe to Feature Package Two in order to subscribe to certain optional features; (4) reduce the nonrecurring and monthly rates of certain features; and (5) increase the nonrecurring charges for the PLEXAR I System Charge (\$2.10 to \$8.00), Call Transfer Disconnect feature (\$3.00 to \$8.00), and Convenience Dialing I feature (\$6.35 to \$8.00). The proposed PLEXAR II restructure will, among other things: (1) change the tariffed offering to serve the market segment of 10-74 stations; (2) create two station pricing structures, one for customers with 10-29 stations, and one for customers with 30-74 stations; (3) reduce the sensitivity for the loop portion of the rate to two price bands: 0-2 miles, and beyond 2 miles; (4) offer a PLEXAR II basic station that can be flexibly configured, from a number of standard features, to meet the individual customer requirements; (5) change the way the termination liability is calculated so the customer is responsible for 65% rather than 56% of the present worth of the remaining monthly payments in the contract; (6) create an option that allows month-to-month customers to convert to long term contracts of at least three years and receive a credit or "contract signing bonus"; and (7) establish a System Subsequent Change Charge which applies per serving central office when changes are made that affect the entire system.

Current PLEXAR II customers will also have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR II service, or switching to the new restructured PLEXAR II service. PLEXAR II customers with at least 75 stations also have the option of switching to PLEXAR Custom service in cer-

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

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

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Indians blow away Rotan, 52-0

It was raining, and cold in Haskell Friday night.

But neither rain, nor cold nor gloom of night kept the Haskell Indians from their assignment.

They scored all six times they had the ball in the first half and then on their first possession in the second half as they coasted to a 52-0 victory over the Rotan Yellowhammers.

The victory, the Indians' eighth against two losses, and their fourth district 7-2A triumph against a single loss, gave the Indians half interest in the district championship and a first-place seeding in the playoffs.

Justin Lisle, who scored five touchdowns during the night, scored three times in the first period as the Indians shot to a 20-0 lead. He got one more in the second period, and Casey Larned scored twice as the Indians bolted to a 39-0 halftime lead.

Lisle scored again on the Indians' first second-half possession to boost the score to 46-0. The Indians' final touchdown was scored by Harrison Druesedow in the final period.

The Indians got their first touchdown three plays after taking over on the Rotan 20 after Yellowhammer punter Jay Bens Alls was smeared after chasing down a high snap on a fourth-down punting attempt. Lisle carried three straight times, for 11 yards, 7 yards and then 2 yards for the touchdown. Cody Cypert booted the extra point and the Indians led, 7-0, with 8:54 to go in the first period.

After the Indian kickoff, the Hammers ran three plays and then fumbled at their own 24 where the Indians recovered. Larned picked up 6 yards, 5 yards and 4 yards, and then Lisle took it over from 9 yards

out. Cypert's extra-point kick made it 14-0 at the 6:54 mark.

Following the Haskell kickoff, Rotan ran three plays and punted to the Indian 47. Three plays later, Lisle romped 48 yards to make it 20-0.

The Indians took over again late in the first period when Alls punted to the Haskell 34. A 34-yard run by Keiland Riley and a 15-yard penalty against Rotan helped move the ball to the Rotan 14 as the first quarter ended.

On the second play of the second period, Larned bolted over from the 3 and Cypert's kick made it 27-0 with just a minute gone in the period.

Chris Silvas set up the Indians' next touchdown when he intercepted Rusty Goodwin's pass on the Rotan 45. He ran it back all the way, but a penalty at the 27 moved the ball back to the 37. Eight plays later, Lisle went over from 3 yards out and the Indian margin mounted to 33-0 with 5 minutes still remaining in the half.

Haskell's sixth first-half touchdown came after the Indians took over on the Rotan 32 following a short Hammer punt. Lisle picked up 5 yards and then Larned ran 27 yards for the touchdown

Rotan brought the kickoff back to the 15. After Joey Sepeda lost a yard, the Yellowhammers got their first first down on a 20-yard pass from Goodwin to Alls. But they then lost 11 yards on the next two plays as the half ended with the Indians out front, 39-0.

Riley returned the second-half kickoff from the 13 to the 45. Highlighted by Larned's 23-yard run and in spite of a 15-yard penalty, the Indians moved to the Rotan 30, from where Lisle scored his fifth

touchdown.

Rotan's deepest penetration followed. Goodwin's 14-yard run and a 15-yard penalty against the Indians helped the Yellowhammers move from the 23 to midfield, but Goodwin lost 9 yards and a penalty moved the ball back to the 35. Alls netted 12 yards after a 10-yard penalty wiped out most of a 29-yard run and then Mik Everett intercepted Goodwin's pass on the Haskell 26.

For the first time, the Indians didn't score on this possession. They made only 6 yards in three runs before Cypert lifted a 38-yard punt to the Rotan 30, the Indians' only punt of the night.

Haskell's final touchdown came midway through the final period after a 13-yard Rotan punt gave them possession at the Rotan 35. Jace Yates had runs of 11 and 5 yards and Druesedow picked up 4 and 3 before he went 12 yards for the touchdown.

Lisle was the Indians' leading ball carrier, getting 155 yards on 15 carries. Larned picked up 121 yards in 12 carries.

The Haskell defense held the Yellowhammers to a minus-5 yards rushing as the Indians constantly threw Rotan ball carriers for losses. The visitors had 24 yards passing

It took 32 running plays to get the first seven touchdowns.

They went 20 yards in 3 plays, 24 yards in 4, 53 yards in 3, 66 yards in 6, 37 yards in 8, 32 yards in 2 and 55 yards in 6.

Altogether, they had 12 possessions. They scored 8 times, fumbled twice, punted once and had the ball when the game ended.
