



AUSTIN — Sen. Bill Ratliff's ambitious 1,088-page school reform bill would strip much of the Texas Education Agency's authority over local schools and shorten the school year from 180 days to

Ratliff's bill would place local school districts under an operating charter and cede more control of education to parents, teachers and school boards.

The bill has already drawn opposition over proposals it contains that would allow private school vouchers, charter schools, textbook selection by school boards and recall elections of school board members.

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, who has endorsed Ratliff's bill and wields considerable power in presiding over the Senate, has acknowledged that special interest groups are working against the bill.

Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant, chairman of the Senate Education Committee, has been described by Bullock as "the most knowledgeable person about education in the Senate" and "the best appointment I have ever made."

House Approach Cautious

In contrast to Ratliff's sweeping package of education reforms, Rep. Paul Sadler, chairman of the House Education Committee, is leading a more cautious effort that allows limited experimentation with innovative methods of education.

Last week, Sadler, D-Henderson, said his committee was working on a bill that would limit charter schools to a few pilot projects and may not propose the implementation of private-school vouchers.

"I think we will structure a school system that looks very traditional," Sadler told the Houston Chronicle, adding that he anticipates "great reluctance" among lawmakers to alter the school finance system recently approved after bouncing in and out of state district court for years.

Sadler also pointed out that Ratliff's proposal to cut supplemental funding to the smallest school districts could force many of them (400 to 500) to consolidate.

Regarding Ratliff's proposal to reduce the minimum number of days children must attend school, Sadler said, "We need to add days to our school year, as many as money will allow us."

Lawsuit Liability Compromise
The House and Senate sponsors
of lawsuit liability reform bills

announced last week that they

had reached a compromise that would free companies that aren't responsible for most of the blame in a lawsuit from being forced to pay all of the damages.

"Joint and several liability" is one of many tort reform measures under consideration in the Legislature, though business lawyers and trial lawyers on opposite sides of the debate agree that the liability issue is the corner stone of tort reform.

Rep. Rob Junell, D-San Angelo, and Sen. David Sibley, R-Waco, jointly announced that in most cases, companies would only be liable for 100 percent of the damages if they are found at least 51 percent responsible for the injuries.

Under current law, companies could be forced to pay 100 percent of damages if they are found as little as 11 percent responsible.

Sex Education Poll
Most Texans say the state should

require grade schools to educate children about sex, sexually transmitted diseases and the use of condoms, according to the winter

Texas Poll.

The telephone survey of 1,011 adults, conducted Feb. 2-11 by the University of Texas for Harte-Hanks Communications Inc., showed that 56 percent of Texans favor mandatory sex education in

However, 32 percent of respondents said sex education in schools has done more harm than good, the poll indicated.

Support for condom education was higher among respondents under age 30 (73 percent) and Democrats (69 percent) than Independents (68 percent) and Republicans (52 percent). Fifty percent of respondents 60 and older favored condom education.

Kids' Lotto Temptation

Rep. Dan Kubiak, R-Rockdale, says he is skeptical about the new vending machines that will be dispensing scratch-off tickets from the Texas Lottery.


"I don't want them near schools. It makes it too easy for youngsters to play," he told the *Houston Chronicle*.

Texas Lottery Commission Director Nora Linares said store personnel will be able to turn off the vending machines by remote control if children attempt to use them — but only 10 percent of the machines have the remote control feature.

Other Highlights

In response to the announcement by Kelly Air Force Base that 258 employees will be terminated, Gov. Bush last week dispatched the state Rapid Response Team to San Antonio and instructed the Texas Department of Commerce to assist the impacted workers.

The 15-member State Board of Education would no longer be elected under a bill being considered by the House Committee on Public Education. The measure by Rep. Curtis Seidlits, D-Sherman, would reduce the panel to a sevenmember board appointed by the

Texas Senate Review

The Texas Senate convened on Monday and passed Senate bill 165 sponsored by Senator John Leedom of Dallas, which removes the 90day window in which a retired or former judge must be certified in order to become a visiting judge. In order for a judge to become a visiting judge after leaving the bench, they must make an initial certification of willingness not to appear and plead as an attorney after leaving active service. Current law requires them to make application to the presiding judge within 90 days of leaving the bench, Senate Bill 165 removes the 90-day requirement.

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On Tuesday, the Senate passed Senate Bill 360, sponsored by Senator John Montford of Dallas, which provides for the continuation of the Texas Commission for the Arts. The Texas Commission for the Arts is subject to the Texas Sunset Act and will be automatically abolished unless statutorily continued by the legislature this session. The commission is responsible for the development of a receptive climate for the arts, to attract visitors and outstanding artists to Texas, to sponsor activities aimed at encouraging the arts in Texas, and to advise the state on works of art and the artistic character of state buildings. The legislation was drafted on the recommendation for the agency's continuation by the Sunset Commission.

Also on Tuesday, the Senate passed Senate Bill 71 sponsored by Senator Gonzalo Barrientos of Austin which increases the minimum supervised counseling experience requirement for a person applying to be a licensed professional counselor. The bill requires an applicant for a professional counselor license to complete 36 months or 3,000 hours of supervised experience.

Wednesday at the State Capitol was Collin County Day, Matagorda County Day and Corpus Christi Day. These events are held so that community leaders can meet with state leaders and agency heads to discuss the needs of their communities.

Senator Mike Moncrief of Fort Worth attempted twice to pass Senate Bill 65 which relates to smoking in public places and public meetings. Currently Texas does not have a law prohibiting smoking in state office buildings, and is one of only six states without such laws. Senator Moncrief's motion to bring the legislation up for discussion failed after two attempts.

Also on Wednesday, the Senate confirmed several gubernatorial appointees including Mr. Patrick Henry Wood III of Travis County to the Public Utility Commission. Upon confirmation of Mr. Wood, Senator Gonzalo Barrientos of Austin made a motion to instruct the Nominations Committee, chaired by Senator Teel Bivins of Amarillo, to bring the other pending Public Utility Commission nominee to the Senate Floor for a vote. Dr. Sarah Goodfriend of Austin was appointed to the board Sept. 1, 1993 by former Governor Ann Richards and has been serving pending Senate confirmation. The motion failed by a vote of 16 yeas to 14 nays. A motion of this type must have a two-thirds majority approval to be in effect. Nominations left pending upon the adjournment of the legislative session are automatically rejected.

The Senate Education Committee, chaired by Senator Bill Ratliff, began the first of a five-week series of meetings to be held relating to the rewriting of the Texas Education Code. The meetings are being broadcast via closed-circuit television throughout the Capitol and the Capitol Extension.

On Thursday, the Senate passed Senate Concurrent Resolution 24 sponsored by Senator Jerry Patterson of Pasadena memorializing Congress to propose an amendment to the United States Constitution exempting desecration of the American flag from protection by the First Amendment. Passing of the legislation marks the fiftieth anniversary of the flag raising at Mount Suribachi at Iwo Jima.

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
WTU teaches students to "Play it Safe Around Electricity"



Exposition Show finishes record breaking run

The 99th edition of the Southwestern Exposition and Livestock Show finished a recordbreaking run and immediately began making plans that will lead to the show's 100th anniversary program January 19 through February 4, 1996.

Several records fell during the recent Stock Show. Most significant was the entry list of 18,851 head, by far out-distancing last year's peak of 18,005. Other records to tumble included 147,728 paid rodeo attendance, an entry of 735 cowboys in the rodeo lineup, and a rodeo purse of \$335,750 that helped push the Stock Show's premium and purse monies to a top of over \$650,000.

Grounds attendance swelled to 789,000, just short of the peak of 813,100 set in 1992. Broadening the Stock Show's International Program, the show hosted 518 guests from 56 foreign nations. The new Livestock Producers Program for members of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association generated 1,060 special industry guests.

Another high spot was in the Invitational Ranch Horse Sale when the top two horses among the 15 consigned drew peak bids. A 7-yearold entry from Pitchfork Land and Cattle Company of Guthrie, Texas, placed first in the demonstration and sold for \$18,000. Second place, which drew \$17,000, was a 6-year-old gelding from Boone Ranch of Archer County, Texas.

Winners in the Coors Cowtown Cutting competition, held at each of the 28 rodeo performances, included Fort Worth Star-Telegram Publisher Rich Conner in the non-pro division aboard Pam's Moon Bar; and Ms. Lindy Burch, a professional trainer from Weatherford, Texas, who rode the Oxbow Ranch entry Shesa Smart

For the first time ever, the grand and reserve grand champion steers came from the same family, brothers Andy and Brandon Conrad, 4-H Club members from Claude, Texas. Andy's champion was bought by grocer giant Winn-Dixie Texas for \$54,000, while older brother Brandon's reserve sold for \$25,000 to Manny and Billy Rosenthal, Coors Distributing Co., Communications and First Interstate Bank. In all, the 2,121 head of junior show steers, lambs, barrows and wether goats that were sold collected, \$1,018,475 in auction monies for the young exhibitors.

Need More Time To File Your 1994 Return?

You may have a good reason for not filing your 1994 tax return by the April 17th deadline. Perhaps you have financial transactions or joint ventures that didn't get summarized in time. Or perhaps you simply haven't had time to pull all your tax information together.

To avoid penalties for filing your 1994 tax return later than April 17th, you must file an extension request and show an estimate of your tax liability. If your estimate of the total taxes due exceeds the amount you have already paid in, you are required to send the difference along with your extension request. If your tax estimate on the extension request is less than the tax on your final return, you may be subject to penalties. The extension request does not ask you to explain why you want additional time to file.

The first extension must be filed on or before April 17th, the normal due date of your tax return. It gives you until August 15th to file your return. Additional time beyond August 15th can be obtained by filing a request for further extension. This second extension requires that you state the reason for the delay.

It's better to file for an extension than to simply file your tax return late. For every month your tax return is past due without the formal extension, the IRS will impose a five percent penalty (up to 25 percent of the total amount due) and will require that you pay interest on any taxes

The bottom line? If you decide to file for an extension, make sure you estimate your tax liability accurately and pay the amount due by the April deadline.

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
Commissioners Court approves MHMR repairs

Commissioner Ray Perry sat in for County Judge Roberson who is out of town. Commissioner Bill Perry was also absent from Tuesday's meeting.


