Many will not vote in school trustee election

Voting for school board members for Haskell CISD has changed drastically. This is a result of the suit filed by the Lulac Organization against the Haskell CISD. There are now seven (7) single member districts, each to represent one trustee. For the May 6 election, two members will be elected representing single member districts one (1) and six (6). It is extremely important that school district voters be aware of the following points.

1. Voters will receive a new voter registration card in mid April which will indicate the single member district in which the voter lives.

2. Only voters who reside on or within the line of single member districts one (1) and six (6) may vote in the May 6 election. (Please refer to your new voters registration card and/or the map provided in the paper.)

3. Each voter in single member districts one (1) or six (6) will get

one vote.

4. Early voting begins April 17, 1995 at the school administration building and ends May 2, 1995. Early voting hours are from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Again only voters living in single member districts one (1) and six (6) may vote.

5. Voters living in single member districts one (1) and six (6) may vote on May 6, 1995 at the Haskell National Bank Community Room between the hours of 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

If you have questions, please call the school administration building at 864-2602 and ask for Billie Lindsey or Bill Stewart.

NOTE: Remember that only voters residing in single member districts one (1) and six (6) will vote, and only for candidates running in their district. Note the map printed and the voter registration card and the location of the single member district # on the card.

Services held for area lawmaker, David W. Ratliff

David W. Ratliff, 82, Texas lawmaker for over 21 years, died Tuesday, Mar. 21, at Stamford Memorial Hospital after a sudden illness.

Services were held Friday, Mar. 24, at Central Presbyterian Church in Stamford with Dr. Ron Holloman and Dr. Paul C. McGlasson officiating. Burial was in Willow Cemetery at Haskell, directed by Kinney Funeral Home.

Born April 20, 1912, in Decatur, he was the son of the late Lemuel David and Myra Pace Ratliff. His family moved to Haskell in 1921 from Decatur. He graduated from Haskell High School in 1930 and attended Austin College in Sherman and North Texas State University in Denton.

Because of the depression, he turned from pre-law to radio and continued in that field.

He married Priscilla Gladish on July 17, 1931, in Madill, Ok. They moved to Stamford in 1945, where he built and owned radio station KDWT until 1960.

In 1950, he was elected to the Texas House of Representatives, where he served two terms. After the death of Harley Sadler in 1954, Ratliff was named, through a special election, as senator of the 24th district. The district stretched from Garza and Young counties in the north part of the state to Glasscock and Coleman counties in the south. He served as senator until 1972.

Ratliff was a charter member of Abilene Boys Club and was a Rotarian. He was a member of the Sons of the American Revolution. He was a member of Central Presbyterian Church. He served in the Civilian Military Training

Corps at Ft. Sill, Ok., in 1930.

He was preceded in death by a son, David L. Ratliff, a daughter, Mary Jane Maniloff, seven brothers and one sister.

Survivors include his wife, Priscilla Ratliff, of Stamford; one daughter, Lynnora Ratliff of Dallas; one son, John Ratliff of Austin; two sisters, Mrs. Frances Pearson of Orange and Mrs. Lynn Pace of Haskell; six grandsons, Robert Ratliff of Oceanside, Calif., Ben Ratliff and Peter Ratliff, both of Austin, Chris Maniloff, David Maniloff and Jeremy Maniloff, all of Dallas; and one granddaughter, Rebecca Ratliff of Baltimore, Maryland.

Donations, both work and money, needed for Gazebo

Representatives of the Chamber of Commerce Gazebo Committee appeared before the Commissioners Court on Tuesday, at their regular meeting and asked for support and help with the Gazebo fund. Mattie Merle English reported that the fund has \$1500 that was made through two programs, the Harvest Carnival and the Talent Show. She the cost to build the gazebo is estimated around \$6,000. English said, "We are ready to get started on the work."

Judge Roberson said that when the project is started, the commissioners would help, when they aren't working on other county work in their precincts. Roberson pointed out that both donations of work and money are welcomed by the public for the fund. Roberson said, "I think this can be built with contributions. I don't think we have to depend on money from the city or county." All of the commissioners agreed to help with the project as time allowed.

The proposed gazebo will be built on the northeast corner of the courthouse lawn and will be approximately 40' round. Anyone in the county will be able to make use of it. Bo Tatum, treasurer of the Business Association was designated to be in charge of the fund and Ed Walling and Bud Turnbow will be in charge of the committee to coordinate the building of the gazebo.

In other business, the court approved two additional dumpsters

to be added to the county park at the lake for the spring-summer season. The tanks will be removed the 1st of October.

Commissioner Turnbow reported that the Mental Health Building repair work has been completed. Commissioner Hester reported that the dikes have been removed along State Highway 2163 right-of-ways.

City Council awards bank bid

The Haskell City Council awarded the bank depository bid to First National Bank at their regularly scheduled meeting on Tuesday night.

In other business, a motion was approved by the council to accept the Zoning Board's decision to deny Robert Tribbey's rezoning request. Mayor Ken Lane recommended to the council they consider rezoning

property, 1/2 block deep, on both highways through town for commercial purposes.

A motion was approved to give EDC permission to hire a grant writer and pursue it in the time frame they deem necessary.

Haskell High School twirlers headed for state with seven

At the regional contest held at Brownwood in September of 94, the seven Haskell High School twirlers qualified for state, but were told that seven was an illegal number, according to their teacher and sponsor, Rozlyn Love. They were told that only six twirlers were allowed in the UIL rules. Love said that Haskell has gone to state every year for 12 years and that she had seen more than six in team competition.

Love decided that she was not going to make a decision until February, because she thought someone might drop out, but no one dropped out, so Love wrote the director of UIL and told him of the

dilemma. He replied and said the rules were right and they could have no more than six twirlers. Band director Michael Copeland had also called UIL and had been told the same thing, only six would be allowed.

Love said that she and the girls all sat down and had a brain storming session and decided to write letters. Five of the girls and one parent wrote letters to UIL and sent them a video tape of their performance, which apparently made an impression on someone at UIL; because all seven girls will be competing at the UIL State Competition to be held Memorial Day Weekend in San Marcos.

Food allergies and intolerances

Many people suffer from food allergies and other allergies—especially during the spring. One in three persons believes that he or she has an allergy to food, yet only one percent of adults suffer from true food allergies.

A true food allergy is the body immune system's abnormal response to certain foods or food ingredients. Eating the slightest amount of an offending food can cause a life threatening reaction. Physical responses to food allergies include: skin, nose/lung, and stomach/intestinal reactions.

Symptoms can develop within two hours after eating the food. Persons experiencing adverse reactions should seek medical evaluation.

Common foods causing allergic reactions in adults are fish, shellfish, peanuts, nuts and eggs. Foods such as milk, eggs, peanuts, wheat and soy may cause food allergies in children.

Food additives are rarely linked with food intolerance reactions. Sulfites—a preservative—are safe for most people, but dangerous for severe asthmatics. According to the Food and Drug Administration, monosodium glutamate (MSG) can cause mild symptoms after consumption in some person, but is reported as safe for the vast majority of persons.

If you suspect that you or a family member may have a food allergy, then contact the American Academy of Allergy and Immunology Physician's Referral and Information Line at 800-822-2762.

One of the best approaches to treating food allergies or food sensitivities is by avoidance of suspected foods. Food label reading on a regular basis can help you detect the presence of ingredients that must be avoided. 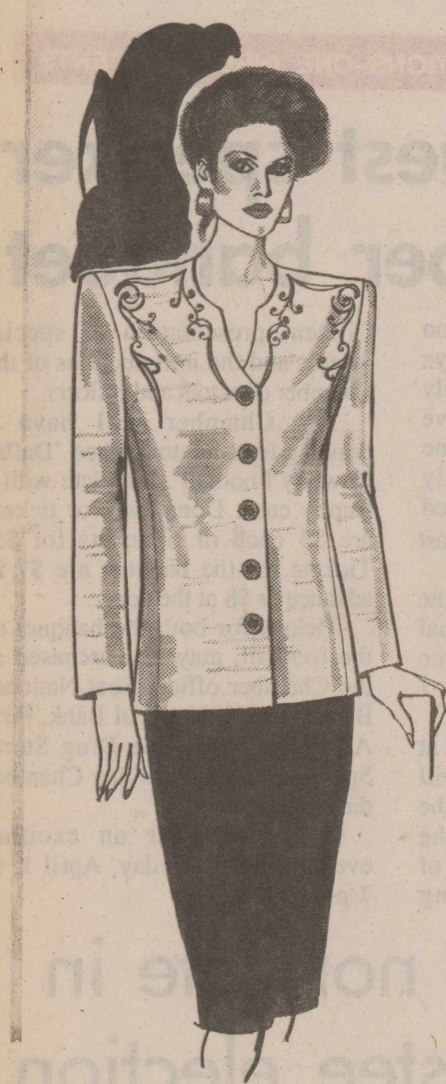

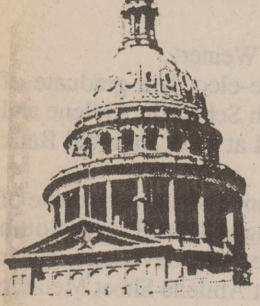

AUSTIN — The Texas House has approved a bill that would slap juvenile offenders with tougher sentences, build more detention facilities for them and lower from 18 to 16 the age at which a court could transfer an offender to the adult prison system.

A similar bill is up for Senate consideration this week.

Rep. Toby Goodman, R-Arlington, said his bill, which passed 118-24, "emphasizes protection of the public and public safety."

In a *Houston Chronicle* report, he said arrests of juveniles in Texas increased 43 percent and homicides involving juveniles tripled from 1985 to 1993.

After the House approved the measure, Gov. George W. Bush, said, "I'm very happy. I think it's a good bill." Bush advocated many of the provisions of the bill during his election campaign.

If the bill passes the Senate, the age at which juveniles can be tried as adults would be lowered from 15 to 14; more than a dozen felonies would be added to the determinate sentencing list carrying terms of 10 to 40 years; and minimum periods would be set for time served before an offender could be paroled without court approval.

The bill also would:

- Establish guidelines for local juvenile boards and judges to apply to offenders;

- Allow fingerprinting and photographing of juveniles accused of a felony or a misdemeanor punishable by a jail term; and

- Establish a statewide computer database for the juvenile justice system for use by law enforcement agencies.

The bill would require \$14.8 million in tax-backed bond proceeds to expand the Texas Youth Commission capacity by 1,448 during the 1996-97 budget period.

Senate Flushes Casino Issue

A proposed constitutional amendment to legalize gambling casinos in Texas died last Monday in the Senate State Affairs Committee, which voted 8-4 against it after Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock said casino lobbyists "betrayed" him.

The vote stopped further consideration of the issue in the current legislative session. Had it passed on a two-thirds vote of the Senate and House, Texas voters would have seen the proposed amendment on a statewide ballot this fall.

Casino companies reportedly budgeted about \$1 million to pay lobbyists this session.

Three similar bills have been approved by the Senate, but each died in the House Calendars Committee.

Because the bill is being sent to the House earlier than in past legislative sessions, Zaffirini said, it stands a better chance of succeeding, coupled with the fact that Rep. Debra Danburg, D-Houston, has sponsored a companion bill.

In 1989, another such bill by Zaffirini was approved, but then-Gov. Bill Clements vetoed it when some police officers objected to wording in the bill.

A&M - UT Swap Plan Chills
Meanwhile, Zaffirini's plan to place Laredo's Texas A&M International University under the University of Texas system, which the Senate approved two weeks ago, apparently is in for a bumpy ride as it moves to the House.

Zaffirini contends that putting the university under the UT system would enhance the study of border health issues, but Sen. Jeff Wentworth, R-San Antonio, said, "It doesn't ring true."

And Texas A&M Chancellor Barry Thompson promised to fight the bill in the House, calling it "poor public policy."

The *Houston Chronicle* reported that a tense relationship between Zaffirini and TAMIU President Leo Sayavedra may be at the heart of the matter.

Opponents say changing control of the campus from A&M to the UT system would cost as much as \$5 million; proponents say \$250,000 or less.

Other Highlights

- Quote of the week: "The chair appreciates it very much — nearly." — House Speaker Pete Laney, thanking members for singing Happy Birthday to him March 20 at the close of House business. Laney, D-Hale Center, turned 52.

- In an effort to meet a Texas Supreme Court suggestion, the Senate Education Committee endorsed a bill by Sen. Teel Bivins, R-Amarillo, that would help provide more money for school districts to build classrooms.

- The lobbyists were able to set a hearing on a casino gaming bill by Sen. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, against Bullock's wishes.

- Bullock said he told the lobbyists to first make sure they had enough votes to pass the measure before they "wasted" the Senate's time with a committee hearing.

- Two days after the committee voted down Ellis's bill, 15 senators united to rebuke casino lobbyist Lloyd Criss, a former state representative from La Marque. Criss raised ire when he asked whether Bullock got the committee to kill the bill because his parliamentarian, Bob Johnson, has sons who are part-owners of the Gulf Greyhound Park. Johnson's sons also are dog track lobbyists and oppose casino gambling.

Polygraph Bill Moves

- The Senate unanimously approved a bill sponsored by Sen. Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, that would bar courts from dropping a case because a rape victim refuses to submit to a lie detector test.



Texas Senate Review

The Texas Senate Finance Committee, chaired by Senator John Montford of Lubbock, has completed the Mark-up sessions and expects to have a committee vote on the appropriations bill next week.

The Senate convened on Monday and passed Senate (SB) 65 sponsored by Senator Mike Moncrief of Fort Worth which requires state agencies to adopt temporary smoking policies which will eventually be replaced by a complete smoking ban in all state buildings and public hearings held by state agencies. Currently Texas does not have a law prohibiting or restricting smoking in state office buildings. Texas is one of six states with no law for its buildings.

Also on Monday, the Senate passed CSSB (Committee Substitute Senate Bill) 261 sponsored by Senator John Leedom of Dallas which makes a person who owes a delinquent motor vehicle fine liable for interest on the fine, attorney's fees, and other expenses. Many cities and counties write off hundreds of thousands of dollars of uncollected fines for violations of motor vehicle laws and ordinances each year.

On Tuesday, the Senate passed CSSB 222 sponsored by Senator Judith Zaffirini of Laredo which prohibits peace officers from requiring a victim of sexual offenses to take a polygraph examination prior to or after charging a defendant with the offense. The Senate also passed CSSB 68 sponsored by Senator Royce West of Dallas which prohibits the reckless discharge of a firearm in municipalities. The legislation make the offense a Class A misdemeanor.

Other business of Tuesday included SB 1420 sponsored by Senator Carlos Truan of Corpus Christi relating to temporary registration permits for commercial motor vehicles from Mexico.

On Wednesday, the Senate passed CSSB 281 sponsored by Senator Buster Brown of Lake Jackson which creates offenses and provides punishment for attempting to evade apprehension from a police officer. Currently, evading arrest is a Class B misdemeanor. During the past year, numerous cases were reported in which innocent persons lost their lives because of high speed chases in order to evade law enforcement. No provision exists to address the death or serious bodily injury of an innocent citizen as a result of such an attempt. The bill increases the penalty to a Class A misdemeanor for evading arrest, to a 2nd degree felony if serious bodily injury results, and a 1st degree felony in the event of death occurs during an attempt to evade police officers.

On Thursday, the Senate passed a package of 13 bills designed to reform the Texas Medicaid system. Goals of the reform package include up to one billion dollars in savings in state revenue while expanding services to more than 500,000 additional Texans. A key component of the Medicaid reform, SB 10 sponsored by Senator Judith Zaffirini of Laredo implements the intergovernmental initiative which outlines the goals of a restructured health care delivery system built around a state and local partnership for indigent care. Those goals include improving health care access and quality, controlling Medicaid costs, maximizing Medicaid funding by obtaining federal match for local and state dollars currently spent but not matched, and expanding Medicaid eligibility to persons who are currently receiving health care funded by those unmatched federal dollars. Other parts of the legislative package include standards, patient and provider education, creating a Medicaid database, physician protection, fee schedules, and venter drug programs. The Medicaid reform legislation was a result of an interim study done by the Senate Health and Human Services Committee, chaired by Senator Judith Zaffirini of Laredo, under the direction of Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock.

The Senate stands recessed until 8:00 am, Monday, March 27, for the Senate local and uncontested calendar.

Haskell County, the best truck growing county in Northwest Texas...the land of cattle, horses, hogs and sheep...the best watered section in West Texas."

Editor's note: I am turning my column over this week to Brooke Baker-Conner and Cody to pay a special tribute to their husband and father, Kevin Conner.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the citizens of Haskell and the family and friends of Kevin Lee Conner who attended his services or sent their prayers to our family.

I heard over and over how much Kevin was loved and I saw the sorrow in so many faces. Everyone knew Kevin, they knew the boy who played football, who stood up for his friends and who loved so completely that he touched an entire town. Now, I would like to introduce you to someone else. I would like to tell you about the man Kevin had become.

Kevin and I fell in love my senior year, his junior year, and we were soon blessed with a beautiful son who was born my freshman year of college. He was still in high school, and he drove all night long to be by my side as his son entered the world. As I labored, he held my hand and made me laugh, and when Cody came screaming into life, he cried.

Kevin graduated from Haskell High in December of 1993, and he and I began our life together in College Station. He was filled with the need to support us, and he found a job the day after Christmas. The man worked from seven until three in the morning every night at McDonald's and he would wake up at ten to watch Cody as I went to class. He worked so much overtime that in one week he had more overtime than regular hours.

Kevin and Cody had a love that I was occasionally jealous of. When Cody was four months old and got his first tooth, Kevin, after only two hours of sleep, held him and rocked him and told him to scream his head off if he wanted to, it wouldn't bother daddy.

His life's desire was to protect Cody and me, and to make a better life for us. He wanted to become a prison guard, not only because of the pay and benefits, but also because he felt it would suit his temperament. He passed the

qualifying test with flying colors, one of the forty who were accepted out of the hundred that applied. After numerous background checks, he dressed in a jacket and tie and went to his interview with his stomach sick from nervousness.

He was turned away; his application was not complete because his high school transcript was not signed. He was really sick then. He would have to wait another three months before he could apply again. I was determined that nothing was going to stand in our way. After numerous phone calls, we were able to get a copy of his transcript faxed to Huntsville, even though school was not in session at that time.

He got his chance to attend the training school, because he of course charmed his interviewers with those dark eyes. For three weeks, we were without income as he lived alone in Huntsville and attended classes. He graduated, and he worked three jobs as he waited three months to be placed with a unit.

I want you to know that he drove two hours to his prison job every night, worked the ten to six shift, and then he drove two hours home and picked Cody up from daycare. I also want you to know that he loved his son to distraction and that seeing him as soon as he got into town brightened Kevin's day after spending the night in prison at his job.

Kevin left Haskell because of me, and we were so far away that he didn't get to come back very often. But his friends and family were always in his heart, and he spoke of you often. Kevin promised me forever, and because of his love for God, I know that we will have it.

Thank you so much for your love and concern. Kevin was all gentleness and goodness, and I know that he had a place for everyone he met in his heart. I am sorry not many of you got the chance to meet the man he had become, but I am so glad you were there to love the boy.

Now, more than ever, public health programs and services are needed so that we can ensure the best possible health for everyone. Providing safe living the working environments, developing methods to immunize populations against infectious disease, maintaining good nutritional standards, and having good prenatal care for everyone are vital endeavors—and such primary and preventive measure can mean the difference between life and death.

Every day, thousands of individuals across our country are working to build healthy communities, meet the needs of our diverse population, plan appropriate responses to natural disasters, educate individuals about workplace hazards and encourage responsible behavior in all that we do. Their leadership is helping America to address one of humanity's most essential concerns, and their service is building a safer, healthier future for all of our people.

NOW, THEREFORE, I WILLIAM J. CLINTON, President of the United States of America, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of the United States, do hereby proclaim the week of April 3 through April 9, as "National Public Health Week." I call upon all Federal, State, and local public health agencies to join with appropriate private organizations and educational institutions in celebrating this occasion with activities to promote healthy lifestyles and to heighten awareness of the many benefits good health brings.

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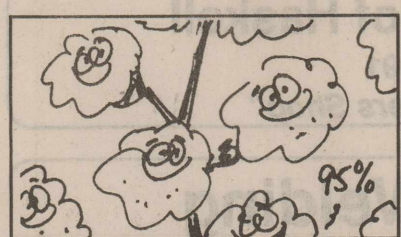

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

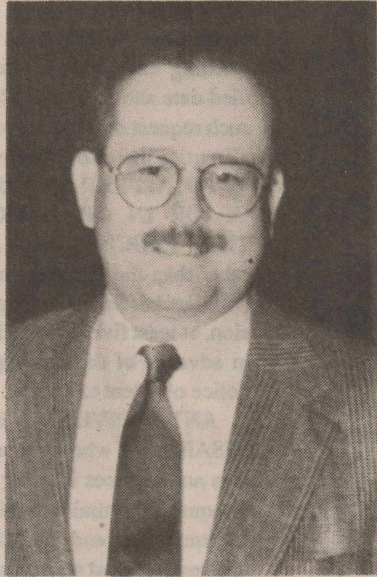

Steve Munday appointed executive vice-president of Cattle Raisers Association

Steve Munday, a native of Haskell, was recently appointed executive vice president of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association. News of the appointment came with an announcement, from TSCRA, of a realignment of existing staff and job duties to ensure the continuation of "our proven ability to provide valuable services and benefits to our members," its new president, Chaunce O. Thompson Jr. said.
