

Amy Lynnette Cunningham, daughter of Donald and Denia Cunningham of Haskell, has been awarded three academic scholarships from Texas Tech University in Lubbock in recognition for her ability and scholarly performance.

Cunningham has been awarded the Presidential Endowed Scholarship, Texas Tech's most prestigious scholarship. This scholarship is worth \$2000 per year for five years. She also has been awarded an Honors scholarship of \$500 per year for five years. Also awarded to Cunningham from the Department of Mathematics is a \$1000 scholarship for up to four years. The scholarship package will total \$16,500 over the next five years.

To be considered for a Presidential Endowed Scholarship, a student must have demonstrated

academic achievement, leadership in school or community activities, be in the top ten percent of their graduating class, have maintained at least a B-plus average during the junior and senior years of high school and scored a minimum of 31 on their ACT or 1350 or better on the SAT.

Presidential Scholars are required to maintain a cumulative grade point average of 3.5 and carry a minimum load of 12 hours a. semester. They are also required to attend various events throughout the year, at which time, they will be recognized as a member of an outstanding group of scholars at Texas Tech University.

Cunningham has also receive six hours of English credit by scoring a 36 on the English portion of the ACT. The minimum requirement is a 28.





81 Years Ago Aug 22, 1914

War Situation in Europe

Another week has passed, and the fighting daily between the German army in Belgium, and the allied forces, has taken a death toll of many thousand lives. The French and English have captured more than two hundred German vessels, aggregating a tongue of more than a million tons. Several minor sea fights have taken place and the Germans have lost a few cruisers. Japan has given German order to get out of China, Germany won't do a thing, so she has more war on her hands.

79 Years Ago

Sept. 9, 1916

Any attempt to audit or analyze the mathematics of the war is bound to prove futile and unsatisfactory. The computation of the cost cannot be expressed in the number of lives or the amount of money. The second anniversary of the beginning of the war calls forth some appalling figures.

77 Years Ago

Jan. 12, 1918 As the year 1918 passed us along to a new season, most of us find ourselves possessed of different viewpoints from those entertained a year ago. We are in war fighting lest civilization itself pass beyond humanity's grasp. One by one our boys by the million have started on the road to the battle line in France, lost to home and friends for a time and perhaps for good. But they are not gone, there is the home tie that goes out to them, making a connecting link between the old fireside and France.

July 6, 1918

American troops sent overseas numbered 1,019,115 July 1. This was made known Thursday night by President Wilson who gave the public a letter from Secretary Baker disclosing a record of achievement which the President said "must cause universal satisfaction" and which "will give additional zest to our national celebration of the Fourth of July." The first units, noncombatant, left American shores on May 8, 1917, General Pershing following 12 days

Aug. 10, 1918

The local board has received the information that the first Haskell County boy has lost his life in France. Press Rogers, was killed in France, July 15. No details of the death have

Feb. 13, 1942

Haskell County's first casualty in the present World War was reported this week, when Mr. and Mrs. Owen Cox who live several miles southeast of this city were notified Wednesday that their son, Orville J. Cox, was killed in action in defense of his country on Sunday, Feb. 8, in the Philippine Islands. Young Cox, graduate of the Paint Creek Rural High School with the class of '40, presumably was killed while fighting with General McArthur's forces on the beleagured island.

52 Years Ago Mar. 5, 1943

Lieut. John E. Fouts, Jr., 27-yearold Haskell pilot in the Army Air Forces who has been in active overseas service since last September, was commended Monday in an Associated Press story out of New Delhi, India, for shooting down Japanese bombers in the enemy's raid last Thursday on an Allied air base in Northeast India. Lieut. Fouts was one of 15 American pilots who took part in smashing the Japanese raid, in which 28 enemy craft were knocked down or believed destroyed, official summary of the action showed.

July 23, 1943

Mr. and Mrs. W.P. Everitt of the Rochester section were notified recently that their son, Kral who is in the U.S. Navy, had been awarded the Purple Heart decoration for wounds received in action several months ago in the North Africa war zone. The Rochester sailor also received a promotion recently and now has the rating of Boatswain Mate, first class.

Aug. 20, 1943

Parents of two Haskell Co. soldiers who are prisoners of war of the Japanese, received their first messages from their sons since the fall of the Philippines, last week, when Dale Anderson of this city and Mr. and Mrs. J.L. Tidwell of the Vernon community southwest of Haskell received almost identical messages from their sons, Pfc. Alton L. Anderson and Pfc. James T. Tidwell. The messages were composed from printed sentences on postcard forms which afforded multiple choices in composing messages passed by enemy censors.

One Haskell boy, one from Sagerton, an army nurse and soldier from Rule are among 100 men from West Texas who were taken prisoners in the Philippines when the islands fell to the Japs. With reinvasion of the islands by American troops fresh hope has been given to these war heroes. The Haskell youth who was on Corregidor when it fell was Lyndell Anderson, son of Dale Anderson; Lt. Maud Williams, a nurse, is one of the two Rule prisoners. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Rufe Denson. The other Rule prisoner is Sgt. Hugh B. MCoy, son of M.J. McCoy. Travis Tidwell, son of Mr. and Mrs. J.F. Tidwell of Sagerton is also a prisoner of the Japs.

50 Years Ago

Jan. 12, 1945 There's a little bit of Haskell in a U.S. Army hospital in London where two young Haskell soldiers, both wounded, happened to be placed in adjacent wards. They are Pfc. Roy Frierson, infantryman wounded by shrapnel on the battlefront in France and Sgt. Sam Henshaw, paratrooper with an Army Airborne unit veteran of the Normandy invasion, who has a broken leg. In letters to their parents and friends here, Pfc. Frierson and Sgt. Henshaw wrote that they were having a big time together; that they had recalled many

good times spent together at home.

Lieut. Marshall J. Rogers of Rule has been killed in action somewhere in the Pacific, where he was surgeon on a supply ship in the U.S. Navy, according to a message from the Navy department Tuesday to his parents, Dr. and Mrs. M.W. Rogers of Rule. No particulars as to how the young surgeon and Naval officer met his death were given in the message, which said that burial would be at sea or in the vicinity of the disaster.

Apr. 13, 1945

President Franklin D. Roosevelt who had guided the United States through the darkest days of war almost into the full light of victory, died at 1 p.m. Thursday at Warm Springs, Georgia. Death was due to a cerebral hemorrhage. The President had been ill since returning from the Yalta Conference.

June 1, 1945 S-Sgt. Roy E. Hodgin, one of the first Haskell county soldiers to be captured by the Germans, has been liberated. So far as is know, he was the last Haskell prisoner of war. Liberated Apr. 22, Sergeant Hodgin had been a prisoner since Sept. 13, 1943, when he was taken early in the Salerno landing. He has has written his wife, the former Ruth McGuire, that he is well, feeling all right and hopes to be home soon.

45 Years Ago July 13, 1950

The Defense Dept. at Washington Friday authorized the drafting of men for the armed services to help meet the Korean situation. It announced President Truman had approved the move. Oct. 19, 1950

A Rule corporal has been killed in battle in Korea, first Haskell county soldier to lose his life in the Korean fighting. He was Cpl. William Glenn Hewitt, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Hewitt of Rule, and former residents of this city. According to information received by the parents, Cpl. Hewitt was killed while fighting with the Marine First Division on Sept. 24.

Dec. 21, 1950

Second Lieut. Vaughn Ray Stuart, U.S. Marine Corps, was wounded in action in the Korean theater Dec. 1, according to a message received by his father, Raymond Stuart of this city. Neither the nature nor seriousness of the wounds received by the young Haskell Marine officer was indicated in the War Dept. message, which stated that he was wounded "in the performance of his duty in the service of

44 Years Ago Mar. 15, 1951

A Haskell soldier, Pfc. Arville F. Wilfong has been reported missing in action in Korea since Feb. 12, 1951, according to a message received from the War Dept. late Friday by his father, M.C. Wilfong, of Haskell. No further particulars were contained in the message, and the father was advised that he would be notified promptly when further information was available.

42 Years Ago

May 7, 1953 U.S. Navy surgeons cheated death twice in two of the most amazing stories of medicine to come out of the Korean War, according to a United Press dispatch from the Western Front in Korea. One of the surgeons mentioned in the dispatch and credited with performing a delicate and miraculous life-saving operation is Lt. (Jg) Frank Spencer of Haskell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Spencer, Sr. of near Haskell. The dispatch read: Twice in recent weeks shell fragments have cut gaping holes in the hearts of two American Marines The ruptured hearts.

World War ends as Germany signs Armistice terms of allies.

According to unofficial reports received here as we go to press, the world war has come to an end. The following telegram was received from A.H. Belo and Co., publishers of the Evening Journal and the Dallas News by John W. Pace and Co, their local representatives in this city at 2:30 this afternoon:

"About 11:30 today, the Evening Journal issued an extra saying that the war is over; that Germany had signed an armistice. Second extra said the greatest war of all time came to an end at 2:00 p.m. today. The Allies and Germany signed an armistice three hours earlier on the field of battle. The Americans took Sudan that morning."

53 Years Ago

Jan. 16, 1942 The President told Congress he would order the U.S. Armed Forces to a world-wide front to find the enemy and "hit him and hit him again whenever and wherever we can reach him." He War Dept. Jan. 29, advising them that their son, Sgt. Elma (Bud) LeFevre had been wounded in action in Italy on Jan. 6. No other details were given but a letter from the Sergeant himself arrived a day later. He wrote: "I am in the hospital, lost my right foot but am getting the best of care. Don't worry, because I am okay. May be home soon." The letter was dated Jan. 15.

May 5, 1944 Lieut. Willard Brian Corley of Haskell, co-pilot on a Flying Fortress, was recently reported killed action while on his 19th mission over Germany. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. A.Y. Corley who live 4 miles southwest of Haskell.

Corp. Loyd Webb, 27, son of Mr. and Mrs. Buck Webb of Rule was killed in action in Italy recently, according to word received by his parents from the War Dept.

May 26, 1944

Lieut. Parramore Sellers Jr., son of Mrs. Bessie Mae Sellers of this city, was first pilot on a B-24 Liberator on the first daylight raid over Hollandia, former Japanese air base and stronghold in Dutch New Guinea, news releases Aug. 17, 1945

The second world war, history's greatest flood of death and destruction, ended Tuesday. The surrender of Japan announced Tuesday evening by President Truman set off a spontaneous observance of Victory, in which the entire citizenship of Haskell joined in unrestrained thanksgiving that the end of the worlds' most destructive war was at hand.

Aug. 24, 1945

Casualty list for Haskell county during World War II, as compiled from files of The Free Press, lists 147 servicemen as killed, wounded, missing in action, or held prisoner of war by the enemy during the conflict. Listed in the gasping for life, sp. ed blood six feet in the air. One heart . oped beating. But Navy surgeons, work calmly and quickly, plugged the ugly les with their fingers and skillfully s. ed the hearts together. Both men are live today, fighting an uphill battle t doctors expect them to win. July 30, 1953

The Korean War has cost the lives of at least seven Haskell County fighting men. Another has ben listed "missing in action" since early in the conflict and six men have been wounded in action, according to a check of newspaper files and other sources made this week. Those killed were Cpl. William Glenn Hewitt, Cpl. Kenneth Biard, Sgt. C.L. Beasley, Jr, Cpl. R.V. Hagle Jr., Pfc. Billy Jack Lusk, M-Sgt. Era H. Brown and Lt. Russell J. Lear.

29 Years Ago Nov. 10, 1966

Sgt. E-5 Milburn H. Starnes, husband of Mrs. Beverly Starnes of Haskell, died in Vietnam on Nov. 3, according to a telegram Mrs. Starnes received from Kenneth G. Wickham, Major General U.S.A., the Adjutant General, Washington, D.C. Sgt. Starnes was on a combat operation when he was hit by hostile small arms fire.

28 Years Ago May 18, 1967

Marine Lance Cpl. Dennie Lee Johnson, 23, of Weinert, was killed in action in Vietnam on May 8. He was the husband of Mary Alice Johnson of Knox City and the son of Mr. and Mrs. A.D. Johnson of Weinert. Cpl. Johnson had entered the Marine Corps on Feb. 28, 1966, and had been sent overseas in Sept., 1966. He was assigned to Company B, 1st Battalion, 3rd Marine Division.

June 29, 1967

SP/5 Randal Blair, son of Olton A. Blair of Haskell, has been awarded an Air Medal for distinguishing himself by meritorious achievement while participating in sustained aerial flight in support of combat ground forces of the Republic of Vietnam during the period of Aug. 23, 1966 to Mar. 21, 1967. Blair also received the Army Commendation Medal and distinguished himself by heroic actions while flying as door gunner on the lead ship of a fire team spotting enemy positions and providing suppressive fire.

After searching through a lot of newspapers, I could not find the date of the first Haskell County serviceman to lose his life in the Vietnam Conflict, nor did I find a writeup on the ending of the war and how many fatalities occurred.

A visitor's bureau with maps of the activities will open at 10 a.m. in the lobby of Hamlin National Bank.





United States Dept. of Agriculture releases special upland cotton quota

High cotton prices have triggered, for the sixth time, a special import quota that will permit importation of a quantity of upland cotton equal to one week's domestic mill use, the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture has announced. The special import quota that will permit the importation of 48,036,600 kilograms (105,902,662 lbs.) of upland cotton was established on May 17.

The quota applies to upland cotton purchased not later than Aug. 14, 1995 and entered into the U.S. not later than Nov. 12, 1995. The special import quota identifies a quantity of imports that is not subject to the over-quota tariff rate of a tariff-rate quota. Future quotas, in addition to the quantity being

The 1949 Act requires that a special import quota be determined and announced immediately if, for any consecutive 10-week period, the Friday through Thursday average price quotation for the lowest-priced U.S. growth, as quoted for Middling 1-3/32 inch cotton, delivered C.I.F. Northern Europe (U.S. Northern Europe price), adjusted for the value of any cotton user marketing certificate issued, exceeds the Northern Europe price by more than 1.25 cents per pound. This condition was met during the consecutive 10-week

period ending May 11. The 1949 Act requires that such quota apply to upland cotton purchased not later than 90 days and entered into the U.S. not later than 180 days from the date the quota is established. The quota amount is equivalent to one week's consumption of upland cotton by domestic mills at the seasonallyadjusted average rate of the most recent three months for which data are available. The quota that will be opened on May 17 is based on consumption data for the period Jan. 1995 through Mar. 1995.

This quota is established under Presidential Proclamation 6301 dated June 7, 1991 and is referenced as the Secretary of Agriculture's Special Cotton Import Quota

Announcement Number 6, in Chapter 99, subchapter III, subheading 9903.52.06 of the Harmonized Tariff Schedule.

The quota is not divided by staple length or by country of origin. The quota does not affect existing tariff rates or phytosanitary regulations. The quota does not apply to Extra Long Staple (ELS) cotton.

The 1949 Act contains two provisions for upland cotton import quotas. The two quota types differ by the price weries used to trigger them, the quota amount and the length of the quota period. The quota announced now is established in accordance with Section 103B(a)(5)(F) of the 1949 Act. This quota has been activated by

Northern Europe prices and is equal to one week's domestic mill consumption. The quota period is 180 days.

In contrast, the limited global import quota covered under Section 103B(n) of the 1949 Act is activated by U.S. spot market

prices and is equal to 21 days of domestic mill consumption. That quota period is 90 days. The 1949 Act prohibits the quota periods of the two quota types from overlapping.

Crop scouting methods to be taught at workshop

Training of scouts who survey crops to assess pest infestation levels in integrated pest management (IPM) programs in the area will be conducted in Plainview June 1, by the Texas Agricultural **Extension Service.**

The workshop at the Ollie Liner Agricultural Center, on south U.S. Hwy. 87 (Business Route), is open to summer scouts of private consultants, pesticide applicators and producers who scout their own fields. The workshop will begin at 8:20 a.m. and end at 4:40 p.m.

This year's workshop has been accredited by the Texas Dept. of Agriculture (TDA) to award five continuing education units (CEUs) toward recertification of

private applicators. Included in these CEUs will be one unit for laws and regulations and 0.5 units for pest management.

Greg Cronholm, Extension Service pest management agent for Hale and Swisher counties and workshop coordinator, said this year's course will cover for the first time one hour on worker protection standards. This will be presented by Lubbock TDA representative Bill Rogers.

Infant immunization figures improved by Shots Across Texas


Infant immunization rates in Texas have received a healthy shot in the arm, according to a study sponsored and analyzed by the Texas Department of Health (TDH).


Dr. David R. Smith, Texas Commissioner of Health, attributed the improved immunization rates largely to the success of Shots Across Texas, a statewide initiative begun more than a year ago. "This initiative has helped to make immunizations available in Women, Infant and Children (WIC) Nutrition Program clinics, developed an extensive network of grassroots immunization coalitions, funded special inner-city immunization projects and helped make vaccine more accessible throughout Texas," Dr. Smith said.

Survey results show that 55 percent of Texas children age two and younger are immunized. Among the three major ethnic groups in Texas, Hispanic children enjoy the highest rate of ageappropriate immunizations, followed by Anglos and African-Americans.

About 59 percent of Hispanic Texans no older than 24 months are appropriately immunized. Among Anglo children, that rate is 57 percent, while 39 percent of African-American children in this age group are adequately immunized.

The camp director is Texas Tech Assistant Baseball Coach Frank Anderson, who is in his fifth season at Texas Tech.






