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### OPS Is Preparing To Make Effective Its Regulations On Beef Prices

Lubbock, May 8—Office of Price Stabilization officials of the Far West Texas district, which includes Bailey, prepared this week to put into effect the new beef regulations.

"The new orders covering beef, which makes up nearly half the nation's best diet," District Price Executive C. J. Taylor said, "were the highlights this week of the rapidly expanding and developing government price program."

"The new regulations will regulate the price of beef from cattle on the hoof to the steak and hamburger at the corner grocery," he said. "The only unregulated price will be those between producers. The program begins with the pricing at the stockyards."

"The regulations are designed to check advancing prices of live cattle and bring them in line with wholesale and retail prices," Taylor said, thus restoring an operating margin for those slaughterers and retailers who have experienced a price squeeze in the last few weeks because of uncontrolled cattle prices."

In a further move the OPS regulation provide for lower retail prices in the fall, the first reduction coming on August 1 when retail prices will be reduced by about 4 cents a pound, followed by a similar rollback October 1.

The wholesale ceiling prices became effective May 9, and the retail prices will go into effect May 14. However, retail stores have until June 2 to post their ceiling prices in their stores for beef.

To highlight other pertinent pricing regulations, Taylor emphasized that the general ceiling price regulation, or "freeze" still covered practically every merchant who sells either goods or services—unless he has been specifically removed by subsequent "tailored" regulations.

Although the deadline for filing pricing charts by retailers of consumer goods (wearing apparel, furniture, notions, department store goods, etc. under CPR 7 and amendments) has been postponed until May 30, OPS officials are urg-

ing they be sent to the district office, Broadway Building, 1202 Texas Avenue, Lubbock, Texas, as soon as possible so that they may be acknowledged, processed, and filed.

There's a deadline for grocery stores, too, Taylor points out. Grocery stores are scheduled to begin their operation under tailored regulations CPR 15 and CPR 16 by Monday, May 14. They are required by the federal pricing program to be in compliance by that time.

They were supposed to have filed their category report (form 5) in the district office by April 28. Taylor said a large percentage of them have done so; but he urged those who had not, to do so immediately.

And there was a filing deadline for restaurants, soda fountains and other eating and drinking establishments, too. It was April 30 under CPR 11 when they were scheduled to have filed their food costs per dollar of sales with the district office. Although the deadline has passed, however, the reports continue to come in and OPS officials are urging that they be filed.

Another development of the past week was extension of Ceiling Price Regulation 1 which means passenger automobiles will stay under present price ceilings indefinitely.

Officials reminded again that most businesses were covered by the General Ceiling Price Regulation, or "freeze" and that until they comply with the tailored regulations removing them from the freeze, they remain under it and are required to comply with it.

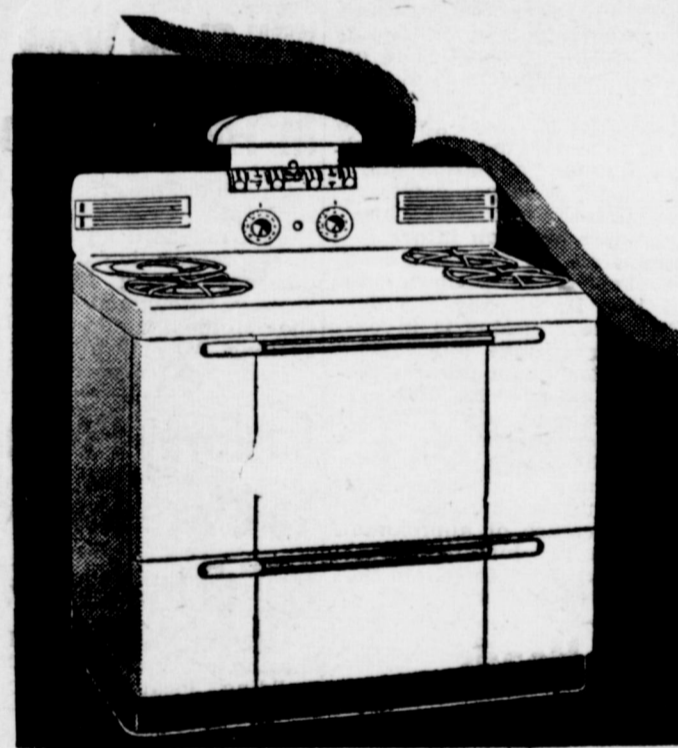

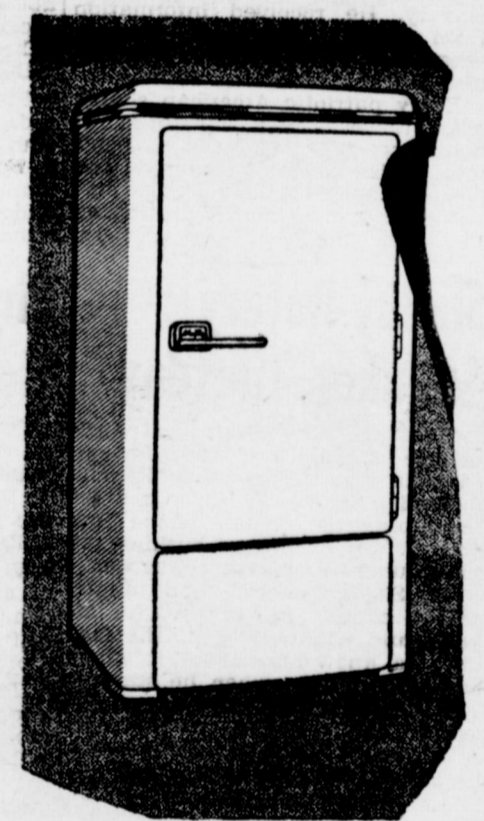

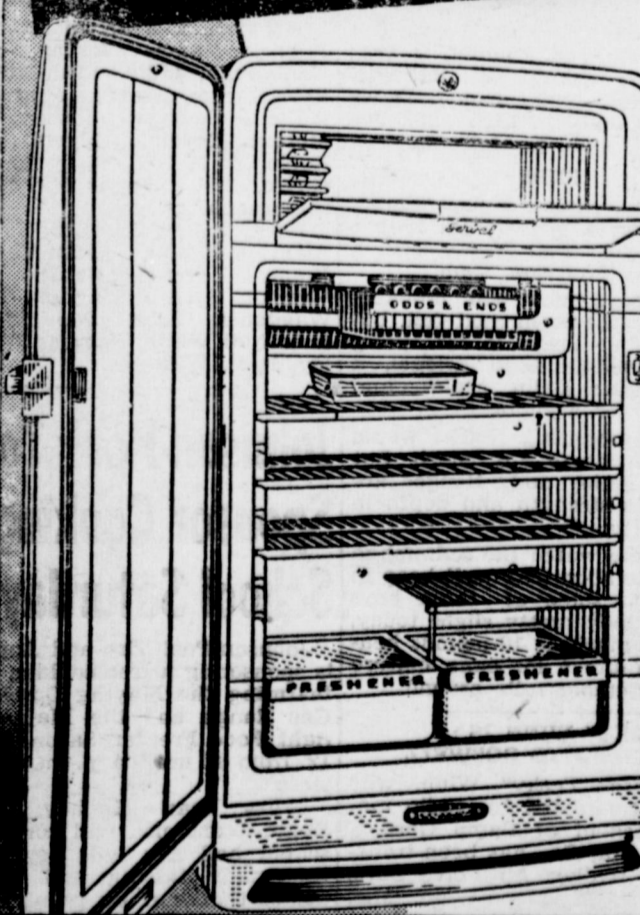

### TIMELY TIPS FROM YOUR H. D. AGENT

#### SWEET AND SNAPPY

When looking for ways to vary salads, a bright-flavored dressing may turn the trick.

As examples, here are recipes for two sweet-sour dressings, one thin, one thick, that go well with most kinds of salads from tossed greens to combinations of fruit:

#### Sweet French Dressing:

Ingredients to make 1 cup full: 1/4 sugar; 1/4 teaspoon salt; 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard; 1-3 cup vinegar; 1-3 cup oil; 1/4 cup finely chopped green pepper. TO MAKE: Combine sugar, salt and mustard. Add vinegar and oil and beat well. Blend in onion juice, pimento, and green pepper.

#### Cooked Salad Dressing:

Ingredients to make 1 1/2 cups: 1/2 cup sugar; 2 1/2 teaspoons sifted flour; 3/4 teaspoon salt; 1 teaspoon dry mustard; few grains cayenne; 1/4 teaspoon pepper; 2 cups of butter or margarine, melted; 2 eggs, slightly beaten; 1 cup milk, then the vinegar. Cook over hot water until mixture thickens, stirring occasionally. By combining mayonnaise or whipped cream with this cooked dressing, a richer dressing may be made, if desired.

#### FABRIC FINISHES:

When shopping for summer dress goods, try to keep up to date on fabric finishes and what to expect from them. Manufacturers, who

vie in experimenting with useful and novel finishes, are continuing to introduce new and improved ones.

Crease-resistant finishes, which are among the most popular and useful, are now applied to many cottons, linens, and rayons. Some shoppers fail to realize that materials thus finished differ greatly. A few are so treated that they might be used even for tailored frocks featuring sharp-pleated skirts or tucks. A few at the other extreme are so brittle and wiry that it would be hard to keep a hem pressed in firmly enough to look neat.

A shopper can judge whether she is getting more crease-resistance than she can manage, and more than is good for her chosen dress pattern, by crushing a corner of the material in her hand, and comparing the feel of different samples.

Some new lavens and organdies are given permanent finishes for crispness so that dresses or collars of these delicate fabrics need no starching to rescue them from a limp look.

Still another type of finish worth looking for is known to the trade as dimensional stability. This treatment, which tends to prevent stretching, shrinking, or sagging, is now given to some cottons, and would be desirable also for types of rayon likely to stretch or shrink.

Veterans must qualify by July 1 under the present ruling, he said. This applies to courses now being conducted for veterans and to veteran on-the-job training.

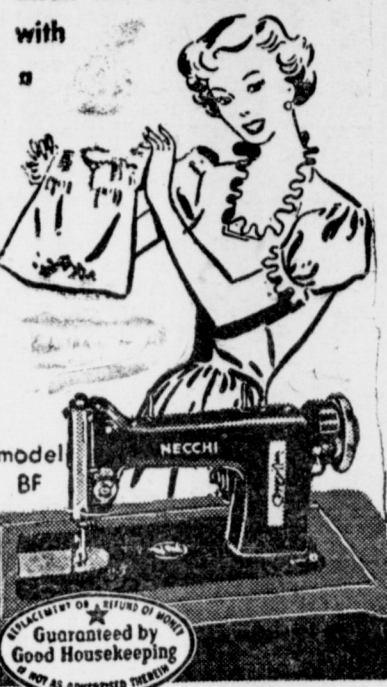
Any veteran who belatedly wishes to qualify before the deadline should see Mr. Grissom or one of the instructors who will explain how to proceed.

### Work To Begin Soon On Big Street Paving Project In City Of Friona

#### Air Cleaners Are Vital To Correct Tractor Operation

Did you know that to properly burn five gallons of tractor fuel requires the equivalent of air contained in a silo 15 feet in diameter by 30 feet high? W. L. Ulrich, Extension Agricultural Engineer, says neglect of your tractor air cleaner will result in wear of bearings, pistons, rings, cylinders, and other moving parts. This in turn results in excessive oil consumption, loss of power and waste of fuel.

He recommends servicing tractor air cleaners after each ten hours of operation to cut down this unnecessary wear.

While doing this job, check for worn air hoses, loose connecting clamps, and crushed or broken air lines. Remove the oil cup from the cleaner and pour out dirty oil—wash the cup thoroughly in fuel oil or kerosene, refill and re-

Work will be started in the next few weeks on the paving project at Friona which will more than triple the number of blocks of paving in the town, according to Roy Wilson, city clerk and water superintendent.

The new project, included in the \$100,000 bond issue passed by Friona residents, includes 62 blocks of paving in the town, in all of the main part of town and much of the residential area. There are now 27 blocks of paving.

Wilson said it was necessary because of advanced prices of materials and labor, to reduce the width of the paving in order to contract it for the money available.

At the present time the city is working on a plan to reduce the size of the proposed city hall, for which bonds have already been voted, because bids for the construction were higher than funds available. The new building is to include two offices for the use of the city and a fire station. The location will be on Main Street just north of the park, Wilson said.

### Baptists Plan Hospitals Gifts On Mother's Day

Dallas, May 2 —Texas Baptists will observe Mother's Day, Sunday, May 13, by giving to a special hospital charity fund in their churches.

The churches of the Baptist General Convention of Texas will take the offering in cooperation with the seven Baptist hospitals in the state. The money given on this day each year goes to the hospitals for care of patients who are unable to pay for treatment.

The theme of this year's observance is "Be a Good Samaritan in 1951".

Each Baptist is urged to give one day's care for one needy patient. The average cost for one day's hospitalization is \$16.25.

Churches and church organizations are being asked to provide for one or more patients for a week. The average cost per patient for seven days is \$113.75.

Baptist hospitals participating in the Mother's Day charity plan include: Hendrick Memorial, Abilene; Southeast Texas, Beaumont; Baylor, Dallas; Valley Baptist, Harlingen; Memorial, Houston; Hillcrest Memorial, Waco; and Southern Baptist Memorial, San Antonio.

Last year, these hospitals treated 3,279 bed patients and 10,786 other needy persons who could not pay for their care. The charity service of these institutions annually runs over the \$250,000 mark.

The Mother's Day hospital fund is used only for cases in distress and unable to pay for hospitalization. Its use must be approved by a Baptist church. Patients cared for under this plan receive statements marked "aid by the Baptist Churches of Texas".

### Work On Friona Gin Is Underway

At Friona the North Plains Gin Company will be ready for ginning the 1951 cotton crop, estimated at from 10 to 12 thousand acres in the Friona trade territory, which includes approximately one third of Parmer county.

In a recent survey made by J. Alan Romick, Friona Chamber of Commerce secretary, it was revealed that at least 10,000 acres will be planted to cotton in the territory and the gin owners believe the crop will run a little more than that.

Nearly two years ago the gin at Friona burned down, and farmers have been sending their cotton elsewhere since that time.

Wright Williams, manager, said Monday that construction will start on the new gin in the next 10 days at the location on the Muleshoe highway, just south of the railroad. Owners of the North Plains Gin Company are G. B. Buske, Williams, and J. B. McFarland.

Approximately half of the cotton acreage in the Friona area is on irrigated land, Williams said.

**Corbin Opposes Increase In Tax On Gasoline**

AUSTIN, May 8.—Kilmer Corbin, of Lubbock and Lamesa has taken a flat-footed stand against a one-cent gasoline tax increase as proposed in the omnibus tax bill voted out of State Affairs Committee in the Senate.  
At the same time, Corbin repeated his support for a tax on natural gas going into pipelines. He emphasized that 62 pct. of the natural gas tax would be paid by out-of-state users of Texas gas, leaving only 38 per cent for Texas citizens to pay.  
As a member of the state Affairs Committee, Corbin was one of only three Senators voting against the one-cent gasoline sales tax increase.  
"I will vote against it again on the floor of the Senate and from now on out every time they try to put this extra sales tax on the people of Texas," Corbin declared.  
The tax issue in the Legislature now has come to the point where the legislators must choose between a natural gas pipeline tax (which will be paid largely by the people in other states) and a higher gasoline tax (which will be paid almost entirely by Texans) Corbin continued.  
"There's no sense whatsoever in adding more and more sales taxes on the people of Texas when natural gas is going out of the state in ever-increasing volume without paying a fair and just tax for the support of the State," Corbin continued.  
Would Raise \$30 Million  
Corbin is supporting the natural gas pipeline tax which it is estimated would raise about \$30,000,000 a year. The money would be divided as follows: one-fourth, or \$7,500,000 to the available school fund for support of the public schools; one-fourth to the cities and towns of Texas for street construction; one-half to the counties for rural road construction.  
"This is a fair tax and a just tax," the Senator said. "It is a tax which will solve the State's financial predicament without hurting the people of Texas. It would raise more money than the gasoline tax, but it would cost the people of Texas many times less".

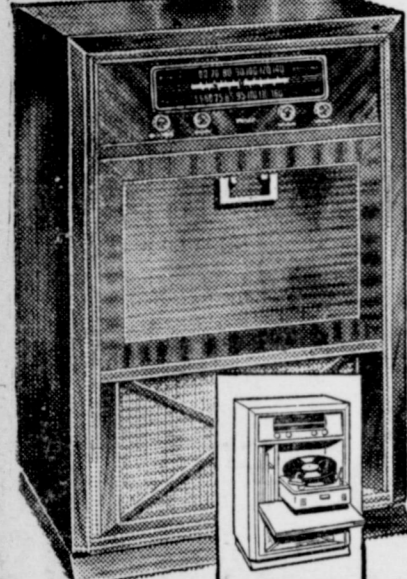

Babson Discusses

**MACARTHUR**

Babson Park, Mass., May 4.—Unless the leaders of our country can rejuvenate the common spiritual values which give meaning and purpose to the New World, America is licked as the leader of free nations.

**America Adrift**  
I get lots of letters these days asking me, "What can a man believe, anyway?" They come from business managers and production line workers alike. One man is as confused as the next. One doesn't like labor unions. Another doesn't like government bureaucracy. The next doesn't want price fixing. Still another doesn't want the United States fighting wars in Korea. But all have a good word say for General MacArthur.

MacArthur reports that Japanese intellectuals have been shocked by the inability of even our military officers to tell the Japanese what we believe in as a nation and what our long-term objectives are. We don't want the tyrannies of Hitler or Mussolini or Stalin. We don't want British Socialism. We don't want Communism; but, for the moment, we want MacArthur! We are fed up with the political mumbo-jumbo out of Washington. We are relieved and encouraged to find someone who has a policy, even if we don't agree with it.

**What Americans Want**  
I think most Americans want something substantial they can grab hold of, something to believe in, an ideology, a creed, a way of life. Something with more substance than a 50-cent "dollar" bill. There was a time when the Church gave a meaning of life to people. Apparently this isn't fashionable any more. Our neglect of the spiritual has brought about a great cultural lag in Western civilization.

**What was it that satisfied so successfully the wants of our forefathers?** Certainly, it wasn't fast automobiles, television, the 40-hour week or a soft life. I believe the happiness and success of our ancestors in this country was the result of their spiritual

and courageous approach to problems. The roots of our vitality are not economic. They go deep into the ethical and spiritual soil. Today the trouble is that a startling lack of religion has crept into our national economic thinking. Ask the average person what has made America great and he will probably reply, "Our vast resources and our unparalleled production system". People who think this way have the cart before the horse.

**Spiritual Rejuvenation**  
I am not a social scientist. Anthropologists tell me, however, that in order for any society, primitive or highly civilized, to hang together, it must have a courageous but simple rational creed, a set of spiritual values with strong emotional appeal which give meaning to life. This, I believe, is what we have lacked in the Western World since the disillusionment of World War I. This is what most Americans today long for—a vital, creative, forward-looking creed. We would like more brave leaders to help implement our beliefs for us.

Perhaps it is a defect that too many of us voters are waiting for someone else to come up with a real creed. This isn't the way our forefathers operated! **KILL THE GOOSE?**

Texas has been industrializing rapidly in the past decade. The process is still going on at full blast. Just the other day it was announced in Washington that certificates for Texas defense industries approved during the past 5 months come to 569,873,000. Only one state, Pennsylvania, is ahead of us. Texas is to get, twice as much new defense industry as the state of New York; nearly twice as much as Ohio; five times as much as New Jersey—all of them leading industrial states.

It is interesting to note that Louisiana, which like Texas has unlimited natural gas supply available for industrial use, was awarded only \$80,306,000 in defense plant certificates, or one seventh Texas' total.

Louisiana has approximately the same inducements for industry that Texas has, except for one thing. That is, tax policy. The neighboring state put a 1-cent tax on natural gas in 1948. That makes fuel more expensive both for domestic and industrial use. It also displays an attitude of indifference to the location of new industries in the state.

This is exactly what the Sewell bill, now before the legislature, would do. The 1-cent increase in tax on natural gas would be a 200 per cent jump. It could well cause many industrial concerns now interested in a Texas location to build elsewhere.

That 7-1 margin in Texas' favor in regard to defense plant authorization is significant. It cannot be explained on the basis of population, water supply, labor availability, or location in reference to raw materials and markets. It must be due in large part to the difference in fuel taxes and to the attitude toward industry which that difference points out.

It's easy to kill the goose that lays the golden eggs. Let's not do it. Any increase in natural gas taxes should be somewhat commensurate with the levies on other natural resources—not drastic and discriminatory.—Houston Chronicle

**Water Ass'n. Says Many Pumps Of Plains Are Having To Be Lowered**

With another heavy irrigation season under way, many farmers in the South Plains area are having to lower the pumps on their water wells, according to reports received by the High Plains Water Conservation and Users Association.

Illustrating the fact that the problem is widespread, one farmer reported that a Plainview pump company put him on a waiting list and said it would be at least two months before they could get to the job of lowering his pumps. Other reports indicate that a lot of windmill wells, used mostly for domestic purposes, have failed in the 60-70 foot upper strata and have had to be deepened to the irrigation well level. This indicates that the higher water sands are being depleted.

While water levels have not gone down much and there seems to be no immediate danger of the irrigation water running out, this lowering trend is interpreted by the association as a "danger signal."

"Now is the time to do something about the lowering of water levels while the problem is small enough for us to tackle", a spokesman said.

An underground water conservation district, if created, will have conservation powers which should stop the gradual decline of the water level, or at least retard the decline, the association pointed out. Proper spacing of wells, prevention of waste, better pumping practices and a re-charging program would help keep the water levels up.

### Sand Hills Philosopher Says He'll Worry Over High Prices After Few Others Do It First

Editor's note: The Sand Hills Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm reports on worrying this week, something he has very little knowledge of, if you ask us. Dear editor:

One of my neighbors went into town and sold a calf the other day and he came home so pleased over the fact he got \$150 for it that he almost felt guilty, like he had cheated somebody. Kept lookin' around like he felt maybe somebody was gonna take it back.

"Most money I ever hope to get for one calf," he said.

Personally, I don't feel that way about it. I ain't never seen a calf of mine I wouldn't rather get \$160 for than \$150, or any other lower price you can name.

The point is, with farm prices sort of high, a lot of my neighbors are worried. They have the idea they are maybe getting too much, although that's the least thing they'd want to look out and I ain't seen none of em sendin' any money back.

With me, the things I have to sell just can't get too high, although I could stand some reduction in the gouging I get when I have to buy something, and it has never bothered my conscience any to get a big price for cotton or corn or calves or anything else that works its way up through the Johnson grass out here.

But in order to help out my worryin' neighbors, to sort of ease their conscience when they get \$150 for a calf, I would like to point out that I found a newspaper out here this mornin' which quotes the United States Department of Agriculture on the question of high farm prices. According to it, farm prices have gone up recently, especially when not many farmers around here have much to sell but so has a lot of other stuff. Since the Korea war started, for example, aluminum 78 percent, clothes 32 percent, chemicals 27 percent, etc., while in the same period prices received by us farmers have gone up only 21 percent.

Now maybe we all should be worried about inflation and high prices, but personally, I'm gonna go sort of slow and hold back and let the tin boys and the textile boys and the aluminum boys, etc., get in their mornin' first. Let them worry their prices down to my level first, and then we can all worry along together.

### Wheat Growers Have Success In Cutworm Control

Texas wheat growers have done considerable poisoning this spring to control army cutworm infestations.

County Agent Hugh L. Clearman reports that good results were obtained from spraying 35,000 acres of wheat in Deaf Smith County with toxaphene and DDT. In each instance, when weather conditions were favorable, more than 90 percent of the cutworms were killed.

In Dallam County 30,000 acres have been sprayed with toxaphene DDT and chlordane and mixtures of these insecticides, according to County Agent Marvin J. Simms.

All three of these insecticides are recommended for army cutworm control. However, Dr. H. G. Johnston, extension entomologist of Texas A. & M. College, says toxaphene is preferred because it is less destructive to natural enemies of the greenbug than DDT and chlordane.

Per acre recommendations are: toxaphene, one and one-half to two and one-half pounds; chlordane, one to two pounds; and DDT, one to one and one-half pounds. Good results with sprays can be obtained by either airplane or ground machine application. All costs for airplane application vary from 250 to \$300 per acre.

Neither cattle that are being finished for slaughter nor dairy cows should be allowed to graze on wheat that has been poisoned for cutworms. Other cattle may be grazed if not more than one and one-half pounds of insecticide have been applied to the acre.

### 74 Texas Counties Are Below Bailey

There are 74 counties in Texas which have less population than Bailey County, an examination of the county figures sheet by the Bureau of the Census shows. The figures are the census of 1950.

Bailey County had a population of 9,592 in 1950, the Bureau reported.

This compares with a population of 6,318 in 1940. Bailey County's population has grown rapidly since 1900 when, according to the Texas Almanac, we had 4 citizens. The county was not organized until 1918. In 1910, there were 312 people living in what was to be Bailey County, and in 1920, two

years after organization, there were 517. In ten years the county multiplied its population by 10, for in 1930 the people numbered 5,186.

The percentage of increase in the ten years, 1930 to 1940 was 21.8.

Bailey County is larger in number of people than two of her immediate neighbors, Farmer County at this census had 5,787; Cochran County had 5,928.
