



Entitled "Their First Time and Last", the annual booklet does an exceptionally fine job of traffic accident analysis, breaking down the subject into every conceivable category from age of drivers and autos involved to the causative factors contributing to accidents.

The "first" was the all-time high of 2,410 lives lost in traffic accidents in the State last year. These represented the more gruesome aspects of the twelve month period which saw a total of 202,-041 accidents and 68,801 personal injuries on the streets and highways of Texas. Total economics loss resulting from these accidents was reported in excess of \$96 million.

Texans can find even less to boast about in the fact that N. K. Woerner, Chief of the Public Division, indicates that the alltime traffic fatality toll of last year is due to be replaced this year by an even higher figure. 

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

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

## **OPS Warns Beef** Slaughterers Not To Overbid

Price Stablization Michael V DiSalle today cautioned livestock BACK FROM COLORADO slaughterers against over-bidding for cattle.

Unless these slaughterers stop overbidding the price of cattle he added, they may find themselves out of compliance with the regulation and subject to its penality provisions, including civil and criminal actions as well as reductions in their July slaughter quotas.

> "I want to caution them now to get back in line and to coopeate with this program'.

Mr. DiSalle said some slaughterers appeared to be paying \$1 to \$1.50 a hundred pounds above ceilings. To average out in compliance with the ceilings they will have to buy cattle later in the month at less than ceiling

The regulation does not set ceiling prices on individual cattle, but it establishes a "maximum permissible price" which slaughterers on the average, can pay for animals. A slaughtrer is in compliance so long as his average price paid for cattle is at or below the ceiling at the end of each accounting period. (Generally, a month).

Slaughterers who are now paying above maximum prices are gambling on the chance of getting cattle below maximum later in the accounting period.

OPS Enforcement Director Edward P. Morgan has instructed his agents to keep a close check on cattle sales at various markets both large and small, and to send daily reports to the National Office in Washington.

Agents at such markets are sending in reports on the names of purchassers, disposition made of the cattle and whether slaughterers of cattle purchased, either directly or through brokers, paid more than the maximum price.

If there are violations at the end of the accounting period, Mr. Morgan said the "penalties provided by the law will be inoked".

He joined Mr. DiSalle in urging slaughterers who are over-bidding for cattle to get in line so it will not be necessary to take such

## Official Charts Of Retail Prices On Beef Go Up In Markets Monday

Official charts of retail beef cut ceiling prices will be posted in meat shops throughout the parity. country on June 25, says the district OPS office at Lubbock. This date for posting ceiling prices is a week later than previously announced and was finally selected as the date to allow for lastminute price revisions and distribution.

Housewives can refer to the price charts which must be posted by butchers in a readily visible place, to be sure they pay in effect. no more than the ceiling price for beef set for this area. The district OPS explained that the ceiling prices for beef cuts have been determined by geographic zones of the country.

The listed prices are for the cuts that are legally required by OPS. In addition to the posted price charts, retailers are required to have separate grades in seperate trays with each tray tagged with its correct price.

New price charts showing lower prices will be effective August , and still lower prices will go into effect October 1. After the 45. last reduction, beef will be selling at retail from 8 to 10 cents turing regulation which produ-

Along this same line, the Office of Price Stablization is now engaged in a study of dollar-andcents price ceilings at wholesale for veal. Provisions for a retail veal price regulation have altogether and will be patterned after the beef regulations now

Gunter says it is usually better to have the spraying equipment mounted on the rear of the tractor. This keeps the insecticide ter from collecting on the tractor and getting on the operator.

Texas A. & M. agricultural engineers have developed plans for a new home made row crop sprayer. The design calls for rear mounting which will permit cultivation along with the spraying operation. Plans for constructing this sprayer may be obtained by requesting Plan No. 379 from county Extension agents.

Gunter suggests that cotton growers ask their county agents for copies of the 1951 Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects.

THRIPS OBSERVED HERE There are thrips and lots of them in some cotton fields of the Muleshoe territory, J. K. Adams, county agent, has reported after a visit to several fields near town.
