February referendum to decide boll weevil eradication program fate

with cotton production will decide in a Feb. 27 referendum whether a boll weevil eradication program should continue in the 23-county Rolling Plains Central Boll Weevil Eradication Zone.

Changes in the law made by the 75th Legislature require a retention referendum be held allowing eligible voters to confirm they want to continue a boll weevil eradication program in the zone. In addition, voters will elect a board member from the zone to serve on the statewide board of directors for the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Inc.

Cotton producers who farm in the zone and who have grown cotton for at least seven years may place their names on the Feb. 27 ballot for the board member position. Those wishing to be placed on the ballot must fill out a form and have it postmarked by Jan. 28 to the Texas Department of Agriculture at P.O. Box 12847, Austin, Texas, 78711 or fax the form to (512) 463-1104.

Nomination forms are available at local county extension service offices; the Texas Department of Agriculture in Austin at (800) 835-5832 or (512) 463-7476; and the

Foundation office in Abilene at (800) 687-1212 or (915) 672-2800.

Growers in the Rolling Plains Central Zone initially approved a boll weevil eradication program Dec. 1, 1994 and a maximum assessment of \$10 per land acre to fund it. The assessment rate will continue at that level.

Unlike establishment referenda where two-thirds of all voters must approve a proposition, a majority of those returning ballots will determine whether an eradication program will continue. The Texas Department of Agriculture will mail ballots to all eligible voters in the zone in early February.

The Feb. 27 election for the zone was established by new legislation that corrects constitutional problem found by the Texas Supreme Court with the statewide boll weevil eradication program. However, TDA takes on additional responsibilities that include setting new elections on assessments and eradication programs in regional zones and appointing advisory committees for

Contract workers and temporary employees cost at least \$41 million in the past state budget year, the Austin American-Statesman reported last week.

Those workers, however, do not appear on the state's annual \$6 billion payroll. Nor do they receive health care and retirement benefits.

Although state officials say they don't know how many outside workers perform state jobs and how much paying them costs, they acknowledge that both numbers are increasing.

"I don't think any of us have a handle on it," said House Appropriations Chairman Rob Junell, D-San Angelo. "I think we'd like to see where they are."

With more than 250,000 fulltime workers on the state payroll in 1997, the Legislature imposed a cap on full time positions, State officials want to ensure that the cap doesn't lead to an increase in hiring "temps."

Among the tasks assigned to temporary workers are programming computers, opening mail containing child support checks, nursing mentally ill patients in state hospitals and taking calls from victims of natural disasters.

State Auditor Lawrence Alwin said he will study the growing number of temporary and contract workers who perform tasks for the

Health-care Pool Opens

Texans who couldn't get health insurance because of their medical history gained access Jan. 1 to a source of coverage with the opening of the Texas Insurance Risk Pool.

"This is a milestone for Texans who have gone without health insurance because poor health made them uninsurable," said Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer.

The pool was created by legislation sponsored by Rep. Kip Averitt and Sen. David Sibley, both of Waco, and passed by the 1997 state Legislature.

The pool will sell two major medical plans that differ only in their deductible amounts and outof-pocket maximums. Both plans offer lower costs for patients who use health-care providers on the pool's provider network, but patients are free to use out-ofnetwork providers for an additional out-of-pocket cost.

Annuities Rules Approved Banks in Texas Cities of any size may obtain agents' licenses to sell annuities under interim guidelines approved by Insurance Commissioner Bomer last month.

The guidelines will govern

banks' annuity sales until the 1999 Legislature can amend the state's agent-licensing laws.

Bomer issued the guidelines in response to an October ruling by U.S. District Judge James R. Nowlin of Austin. Nowlin ruled that federal banking laws authorizing banks to sell annuities override Texas laws that prevent their doing so.

Annuities are investment contracts usually sold by life insurance companies. To sell annuities, a bank must be licensed as an incorporated insurance agent by the Texas Department of Insurance. A bank also must be appointed by at least one life insurance company to act as its agent for the sale of annuities.

Day-care Law Takes Effect

Jan. 1 was the deadline for daycare providers to comply with a new state law requiring people who care for three or fewer children to undergo criminal background checks by the state.

"The background checks are designed to ensure that no person with a criminal or substantiated child-abuse history is entrusted with the care of children," said Karen Eells, a spokeswoman for the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Service.

After the background check is completed, the caregiver is issued a certificate of listing with the state



Legal Matters

In 1996 the U.S. Congress passed, and the President signed, the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996. Provisions in the Act were passed as part of Texas' welfare reform legislation in 1997.

One provision, which will soon become mandatory for all Texas employers, is the Employer Nev Hire reporting program. Texas ha had a voluntary new hire reporting program since September 1993. Beginning October 1, 1998, businesses will be required to report pertinent information about new hires and rehires to the Office of the Attorney General. The information will be used in locating non-custodial parents who owe child support.

> What is employer new hire reporting?

The new hire information provided by employers is compiled in a registry that is compared with a database of individuals who are legally required to pay child support. When a match occurs, a notice is sent to the non-custodial parent's employer notifying the employer to withhold child

In 1995, the Texas Legislature expanded the voluntary program and allowed the Texas Workforce Commission, the Workers' Compensation Commission, and the Department of Human Services to compare the information with their respective databases. This measure provides each agency a means by which they can bette prevent fraud in unemploymen compensation, workers compensation and public

The benefits

When employers submit ne hire information, they provide assistance not only to the child support program, but also to the children and families who depende on receiving child support checks. They also do a big favor for the

tax-paying citizens of Texas. The benefits employers provid are invaluable. Employers help improve each step of the child support process by assisting us in locating individuals who are attempting to avoid their child support responsibilities. Once a non-custodial parent is located, wa

can move forward with the ne appropriate action - such paternity establishment of enforcement action. When employers report thei

The following is a copy of a letter received by the Mayor and members of the City council of the city of Weinert. We wish to have it published so as to educate the Citizens of the City of Weinert of the legal requirements of an annual audit and budget for our city.

RE: Requirement of annual audit and budget

Dear Honorable Mayor and Council Members:

It has been brought to my attention that their may exist some confusion among the members of the City Council regarding the requirements under Texas Law as they pertain to annual audits and budget requirements. This letter is an effort to partially explain the requirements and to encourage the members of the council to take the necessary steps to ensure that the City remains in compliance.

Chapter 102 of the Texas Local Government Code, a copy of which is attached to this letter for your convenience, designates the Mayor of a municipality as the budget officer for the governing body, or if the municipality has the city manager form of government, the city manager serves as the budget officer. Section 102.002 of said chapter, states that the "budget officer shall prepare each year a municipal budget to cover the proposed expenditures of the municipal government for the succeeding year." Section 102.003 then specifies the contents required in the budget.

Likewise, Chapter 103 of the Texas Local Government Code, also a copy of which is attached

hereto for your convenience, requires a municipality whose records and accounts are not audited annually by a person prescribed by statute, by charter, or by a person in the regular employ of the municipality, to "employ at it own expense a certified public accountant who is licensed in this state or a public accountant who holds a permit to practice from the Texas State Board of Public Accountancy to conduct the audit and to prepare the annual financial statement."

I have been informed that the City of Weinert has failed to preform either of the above required acts in the past few years and that questions have arisen with regard to the tracing of the funds received by or on behalf of the city and expenses that are paid by the city.

Although it may be cost prohibitive to perform audits for each of the past years that no audit was done, I would strongly recommend the council consider an audit being performed that would at the minimum cover the 1996 and 1997 fiscal year. Due to the difficulty in obtaining all the necessary documentation and information that would be needed and assuming it is the opinion of the members of the council and Mayor that there is little likelihood of any wrongdoing or malfeasance regarding city funds for years prior to 1996, I feel you could use 1996 as a new starting point and not suffer the expense required in preparing budgets for all prior

Following the preparation of these audits and the related financial statements, the mayor, or City Manager, could then have a basis from which to formulated the

required budget for the remainder of the current year and for future years. It should be noted that these requirements are promulgated by the legislature to insure that all

cities are administered in a manner which protects the funds received by the city through its tax base. The law requires each city afford its citizens the right and opportunity to ensure that all funds received by a city are administered according to a properly prepared budget, and each citizen deserves the commitment of the city manager, mayor and each councilman to see that all laws regarding the administration of such funds are strictly adhered to. It should also be noted that

under Section 41.009 of the Texas Government Code, "If a district or county attorney learns that an officer in his district or county who is entrusted with the collection or safekeeping of public funds is neglecting or abusing the trust confided in him or is failing to discharge his duties under the law, the district or county attorney shall institute the proceeding that are necessary to compel the performance of the officer's duties and to preserve and protect the public interest. If you have any questions

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


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


