# Reception to honor Abe Turner

Abe Turner, a 40-year veteran in the banking industry, will be honored with a retirement reception from 1-3 p.m. on Sat., Jan. 17, at the First National Bank.

"We invite Abe's many customers and friends to join us in honoring him," Bobby Hobgood, president and CEO of the First National Bank (FNB), said.

Turner joined the nine-year-old bank in October of 1994 as vice president of public relations and business development.

"We were fortunate to get him." People love him, and he not only brought us banking experience but also new business as well," Hobgood said.

Prior to Turner's employment at FNB, Hobgood and other officers shared the advertising, public relations and business development

The rapidly growing bank soon needed a full-time officer for the job, and Turner was hired.

"Abe was a highly respected banker known statewide, and we wanted his experience and leadership," Hobgood explained.

Turner became the bank's ambassador and kept a high profile in the community for the bank.

Following his retirement on Feb. 16, Turner will serve as an advisory director of the bank.

"And I'll work when they need me," the 65-year-old banker said as he looked at pictures of his grandchildren.

The grandchildren figure prominently in his retirement plans. He and his wife, Ruby, have three children and four grandchildren. Son, Mike, and his wife, Teri, have two girls and live in Arlington; Sharon, husband, Kevin Rinn, and two children recently moved from Belton to Bryan, and youngest daughter, April, and husband, Ty James, live in Montgomery at Lake Conroe.

Turner also says he'll help his wife more with the day-to-day operation of their historic bed and breakfast, the Bevers House.

"I'll be able to devote more time to being an innkeeper," the affable Turner said.

Turner is a 1949 graduate of Haskell High School and a 1954 graduate of Texas Tech University with a degree in agriculture education. He served 21 months in the U.S. Army during the Korean War, working with Nike Ajax surface to air missiles (SAMs).

Although the son of a banker, Turner did not enter the banking profession after college and the service. He was working in Canyon when the cashier of the Haskell National Bank, Charles

Swinson, offered him a job at the

"We had a vacancy at the bank, and Abe was recommended to us. I hired him over the telephone," Swinson said.

The rest is banking history. Turner and his wife moved back to Haskell, and he started his banking career as a teller. When Swinson left the HNB to pursue other business interests, Turner succeeded him He attended Southwestern Graduate School of Banking at Southern Methodist University. He then served six years as cashier before taking the job as vice president of Texas Bank and Trust in Sweetwater. He returned to Haskell in 1967 and served the HNB as vice president under Roy Johnson. Turner later succeeded Johnson and served the bank as president for 22 1/2 years. In 1994,

he joined the First National Bank. When reflecting on his life and career, Turner recalled three

"In high school, Joe W. Tyson, my physics teacher, took a special interest in the students in that small class. He started a sea scout ship and insisted us six boys become Eagle Scouts, and we did," Turner said.

Not only did Turner become an Eagle Scout, he has spent his adult life as a scout volunteer. In 1973 the BSA honored him with the Silver Beaver award, the highest volunteer award in scouting. He served as scoutmaster of the local BSA troop, on the board of the Chisholm Trail Council and the staff of the National Scout Jamboree.

His early scout work led to an interest in conservation, and he has served more than a decade as director and vice president of Sportsmen Conservationists of Texas (SCOT).

His second and third mentors were from the banking industry: Roy Johnson at the Haskell National Bank and Paul Cain, executive vice president at the Sweetwater bank.

"Both men were very knowledgeable about the industry which sharpened my skills and helped shaped my philosophy about community banking," he said.

In his banking career, Turner has distinguished himself in the business through service on district and state boards. He served one term as president of the NABAC(now the BAI, Bank Administration Institute), seven years as the Texas director of District I for the Independent Bankers Association of America (IBAA) and four years as a member of the Agriculture and Rural America Committee of the IBAA.

The banking industry has undergone drastic changes in the 40 years Turner has served Haskell. He cited computers and new banking regulations as two of the changes with the most far reaching effects. Also bank mergers have left citizens with few independent banks that are able to make decisions locally

Turner said the home ownership of the First National Bank is a positive for Haskell and the surrounding area.

"Decisions can be made locally. One of the most gratifying areas of the banking industry is working with customers. I especially enjoyed making a loan to a new business, then seeing the business develop and watching the owner become a good business person and customer," he said.

When asked what advice he would give someone entering the industry today, he said without hesitation "to know computers, to understand credit analysis and be involved in business development. The key element above all else is to know your customers-the way we do at the First National Bank."

Turner knows his customers and their needs well. He has served the city, the region and the state in a variety of volunteer service and elected positions.

The former two-term mayor also served as president of the school board, Chamber of Commerce, Rotary Club International, Jaycees, Haskell County Chapter of the American Heart Association, Kiwanis Club and commander of the Rogers-Cox Post 221 of the American Legion.

Turner is president-elect of the Texas Midwest Community Network, serves on the Loan Review Committee of Council Finance for WCTCOG, director of the Haskell CISD Education Foundation Board, member of the Development Corporation of Haskell and member of the West Central Texas Workforce Development board.

He was honored as Citizen of the Year in 1983 and named a Paul Harris Fellow by Rotary

The reception for Turner on Saturday is hosted by the bank directors, officers and employees.

"We look forward to seeing customers and friends on Saturday as we honor a banker who has given four decades of service to Haskell," Hobgood said.





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

Violent sex offenders would be locked up indefinitely and the death penalty could be assigned to repeat child molesters and drug traffickers under a proposal by Democrat John Sharp.

Speaking at a news conference last week, Sharp, state comptroller running for lieutenant governor, said, "Making Texas safer must be our top priority. My criminal justice reform plan will help accomplish that."

Sharp also proposed placing more state prison inmates in work programs and retroactively eliminating mandatory early release for prisoners by passing a law that could be upheld in the courts. He also recommended a crackdown on juvenile gangs and shoring up penalties against those who assault teachers.

Republican Rick Perry, who is also running for lieutenant governor, said, however, that Sharp's plan "echoes" his own plan for criminal justice reform, The Dallas Morning News reported. Regarding Sharp's news conference, Perry's campaign manager Jim Arnold, said "Many of the ideas announced today are so good, they have already been proposed by state leaders like (Agriculture Commissioner) Rick Perry and Gov. (George W.) Bush."

Both candidates' criminal justice reform plans would have to be approved by the Legislature to become law. The lieutenant governor presides over the Senate and wields much influence over the passage of legislation.

Teen Drug Use Rising

The Texas Commission of Alcohol and Drug Abuse has compiled figures showing that illegal drug use by Texas students in grades seven through 12 increased in 1996.

Released by the commission last week, the survey showed an upward trend in teen drug use beginning in 1992. About 34 percent of all secondary students in 1996 had used some type of illegal substance during their lifetime – up from 22 percent in 1992, but below the rate of 39 percent recorded in 1988.

"Alcohol continues to be the most widely used substance among Texas secondary students," the survey said.

"In many ways, curtailing alcohol consumption is more problematic than reducing the use of illicit drugs because of the availability of alcohol and the perception among adolescents that

drinking alcohol is not as dangerous as using other drugs,"

According to the survey, parents can do much to keep their kids off drugs, such as:

•Encourage children to work at

getting good grades;
•Show support for children at

•Talk to children. Make sure they know that drug use is unacceptable.

The survey was based on responses of 106,924 secondary students (48 percent male and 52 percent female) in 72 school districts.

Fund-Raising Suit Settled

The Texas attorney general's office said last week that a telemarketer for Dallas police and sheriff's union has settled a lawsuit that accused it of fraudulent fundraising, *The Dallas Morning News* reported.

Merritt Productions Inc. misrepresented where money would be going and what contributions were charitable tax deductions, the state alleged.

The settlement prohibits Daniel Merritt; owner of the company, from exercising control over any future firm that does not comply with strict solicitation guidelines.

The attorney general's office filed the lawsuit as part of a multistate effort aimed at "police charities." The state's suit alleged that Merritt employees misrepresented that solicited funds were going to the police and sheriff's departments, when the money actually was going to support unions.

Some company solicitors also told consumers that decals provided in return for contributions entitled the person to break traffic laws with impunity, according to the

The fund-raiser kept 85 percent of money collected for the two unions.

Holzheauser to Skip Race Texas Railroad Commission candidate Rick Holzheauser, a Republican, dropped put of the race last week.

His announcement to withdraw came five days after former Secretary of State Tony Garza, also a Republican, announced he would run for railroad commissioner instead of land commissioner.

Garza announced his switch Jan 2 – the filing deadline – too late for Hozheauser, a six-term House member from Victoria, to file for re-election to the House.

# **Legal Matters**

Creek School will begin Feb.1.

More than half of all Texans live in rental properties. Landlord-tenant disputes are always among the top ten issues in the consumer complaints we receive at the Office of the Attorney General. This column explains some of your legal rights and obligations as a tenant in the state of Texas.

The most important source of information about your relationship with your landlord is your rental agreement or lease. Be sure to read the lease carefully before you sign it. Discuss with your landlord any changes that you would like to make. If the landlord agrees, the appropriate changes should be written in the lease and you should both initial the document.

Rights to peace and quiet
Under Texas law, by renting
you the property, the landlord
guarantees that it will be a fit place
to live. For your safety, landlords
are required to install window
locks, doorknob locks or keyed
deadbolts on exterior doors, sliding
door pin locks or security bars, and
peepholes.

You have a right to demand that the landlord repair any condition that affects your health and safety. The landlord, however, does not have an obligation to repair damage caused by you or your guests through negligence, carelessness, abuse or accident.

Unless you fail to pay your rent or electric bill, your landlord cannot turn off your electricity except to make repairs. The landlord must provide smoke detectors, and a tenant cannot waive that provision of the law. You may be held liable if you intentionally disconnect or disable the smoke detectors.

If you need repairs

The law is very specific in outlining how to proceed if your landlord refused to make necessary repairs. Send a letter, by certified mail, detailing the needed repairs. If the landlord does not respond within a reasonable amount of time (one to two weeks), send another letter describing the action you intend to take. Keep copies of your letters.

In some circumstances, you may have the problem repaired and

deduct the cost from the rent. You may do this only if

•the landlord fails to fix water or sewage flooding:

sewage flooding;

•the drinking water supply to
the dwelling has stopped

the dwelling has stopped functioning; or
•the landlord has been notified

by local health or building inspectors that a breakdown in the heating or cooling equipment, or some other problem with the dwelling, materially threatens your health or safety.

You do not have the legal right to withhold rent because the landlord does not make repairs if your health and safety are not materially threatened. You must notify the landlord in writing if you intend to make the repairs yourself and deduct the cost from your rent. The amount you deduct in any given month cannot exceed \$500 or one month's rent, whichever amount is greater, and you may not deduct repair costs if you are behind on your rent.

Your security deposit

A security deposit is intended to cover the cost of repairs that are needed when you move out. Under the law, a landlord cannot refuse to return the deposit without a valid reason. A landlord may not charge you for normal wear and tear of the premises – you can be penalized only for "abnormal" damages.

While normal wear and tear are difficult to define, you cannot be charged, for example, if the carpet becomes worn because you walked on it. On the other hand, if your leaking water bed mildews the carpet, your landlord may hold you responsible.


