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

Bomb threat evacuates nursing home

The usual early evening quiet at Rice Springs Care Home in Haskell was changed by the ringing of a phone call about 8:35 Monday, when an anonymous caller said a bomb was set to go off on the roof of the facility.

Within minutes, members of Haskell Volunteer Fire Department, Sheriff's Department, the Department of Public Safety, and Haskell Co. Emergency Ambulance Service were on the scene, evacuating patients to the Experienced Citizens Center and one wing of the Haskell Memorial Hospital.

When the Dyess Bomb Squad arrived with their bomb sniffing dog, fireman Danny Stocks led them through the facility and the

When no bomb was found, patients of the Home were returned to their rooms at about 1:00 a.m. Tuesday.

Rice Springs Administrator, Ann Decker, was quick to praise the local fireman, who did "an exceptional job" in setting up an ambulance crew, and helping get everyone evacuated across the street during the rain, some in wheel chairs and on stretchers.

She said the wonderful support from all of the community was great. Many family members came to sit with the displaced patients, helping to make the traumatic situation less fearful for them. "Even some of the Haskell Healthcare Center people came," she said appreciatively.

Dr. Bill Kemp, owner of the Home, said this was the second time that a threat has been made to the facility. The other was about ten or twelve years ago, when in one week all of the health care and hospital facilities in Haskell were targeted with threats.

Sheriff Johnny Mills verified that the last such threats occurred in 1984. He said there are no leads at this time as to the identity of the caller.

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

TxDOT urges construction zone awareness

Texans will be traveling to their favorite vacation spots by plane, train and the most popular mode, automobile. But all these cars must contend with another Texas summer favorite: roadway construction. To keep summer travels from becoming summer hazards, the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) has begun its annual "123 Safe Days of Summer" campaign to remind motorists and employees to put highway safety out front this

From May to August, the focus months of the campaign, TxDOT's goals are to increase employee awareness of work zone safety, prevent on-the-job accidents and educate the public about the dangers road crews face.

"Most of our construction is concentrated in the summer months because the warmer, longer days allow us to get more work done,' said Ed Sims, TxDOT's occupational safety division director. "But that also means we

have to double up our safety efforts," he said.

According to statistics compiled by TxDOT, 10 department employees have been killed on the job since 1994. Seven of the last 10 employee deaths have occurred during the summer and more than 30 accidents also occurred during May and August last year.

For TxDOT employees, the added emphasis on safety begins before they hit the highways. Workdays begin with checks of department equipment and regular safety meetings focus on accident prevention.

For all its internal measures to keep its employees safe, TxDOT must rely on the public to help. "Give Us a Brake" signs are posted at construction zones to emphasize the need for motorists to obey posted speed limits and pay attention when driving through work zones.

More than 300 new construction projects will begin around Texas between May and August and all will be accompanied by the

customary cones, barrels and construction workers. Prime conditions, TxDOT officials say, for inattentive or impatient motorists to turn construction

zones into injury and death zones. But safe construction zones and possible, TxDOT officials believe, if motorists follow some

simple rules of the road: •Keep a safe distance between your vehicle, other vehicles, traffic barriers, construction workers and equipment. Most crashes in work zones involve rear-end collisions.

•Stay alert. Driving conditions change in work zones. Be prepared to respond to any changes in traffic

•Merge at the first notice of a lane closure or change. Traffic flows better when you move to an appropriate lane at the first opportunity of an approaching work zone.

•Be patient. Traffic delays in work zones are often unavoidable while improvements are being made to the roads. Patience can prevent accidents.



Attorney General Dan Morales met with tobacco industry attorneys in New York and emerged saying that Texas could receive \$2 billion more than the \$15.3 billion settlement it already has with cigarette makers.

Morales said last week a deal for more money could be reached within two weeks and that the extra money should put an end to the issue of how much private lawyers will be paid by the state for their rule in the settlement.

The renegotiations are made possible by a clause in the previous settlement that allows Texas to claim better benefits based on subsequent settlements by other

"We believe that a minimum of \$2 billion is what is called for in the application of the Minnesota agreement to the Texas agreement," Morales said. Minnesota's settlement of \$6.1 billion is more on a per capita basis than the Texas settlement.

Unlike Texas, Minnesota left its private lawyers to deal directly with the tobacco industry on their fees. Texas' private lawyers were to receive 15 percent of the original settlement, of \$2.3 billion. But Gov. George W. Bush called the fees excessive and sued to reduce them

Texas Joins Missing Kids Network

Texas last week became the second state to join Missing Kids 100,000-a national database that carries pictures of missing children on the Internet.

The program allows local law enforcement personnel to "upload" pictures of the missing children to the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children site on the Internet, helping to speed search efforts.

Gov. Bush called the system a "real-time, all-point bulletin that can be accessed by anyone with a (personal computer) anywhere in the world."

Court Open Records Policy Drafted

The Texas Judicial Council's committee on court records met in Dallas last week to present a draft of a new policy that would increase public access to court records.

Last fall, Tom Phillips, chief justice of the Texas Supreme Court, ordered the committee to draft an open-records policy. Phillips' action came after he was criticized for overruling an opinion by Attorney General Dan Morales that state judge's telephone records should not be closed to the public.

The draft defines "public record," tells how much courts can charge

for copies of public records and explains how citizens can appeal if a court rejects a request for information.

According to the draft, judicial notes, personnel information and complaints against judges would still be privileged and unavailable to the public.

A final draft of the proposed policy must be approved by the Texas Supreme Court and voted on by the Texas Legislature.

•State District Judge John Dietz
last week refused to order the Texas
Department of Public Safety to
cease its raids on the operators of
"8-liner" casino-style gambling
machines. The Texas Department of
Veterans of Foreign Wars had asked
Dietz to order the DPS to stop
confiscating the machines declared
illegal by Attorney General
Morales.

•In 1997, the Texas Legislature approved up to \$4 million in revenue bonds for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to make state parks more accessible to people with disabilities. But Texas officials say it would cost \$20

million to bring state parks into compliance with the Americans With Disabilities Act.


•Kansas investor George Ablah has purchased for \$10 million a huge office building and laboratory building and 52 acres of land on the site of the defunct Superconducting Super Collider project near Waxahachie. The Texas General Land Office handled and announced the sale.

•In its review of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, the Sunset Advisory Commission last week released a report saying services for crime victims, which are divided among six state agencies, should be coordinated and inmates should receive training for real-world jobs.

•Gov. Bush last week asked Attorney General Morales to seek a federal court order to shut down slot machines run by the Tigua Indian tribe at its Speaking Rock casino in El Paso. Bush also asked the U. S. attorney's office to consider action against the Lucky Eagle Casino operated by the Kickapoos in Eagle Pass

•GEICO, Texas' fifth-largest insurance company, is following suit with other auto insurers. Last week, it agreed to cut auto insurance premiums by 5.6 percent for its 225,000 policyholders in the state. The rates go into effect for new polices on June 15 and for renewals on Aug. 1.

•The town of Jarrell received adequate warning before deadly tornadoes struck on May 27, 1997, according to a report by the National Weather Service. But the report reveals technical difficulties and staff management problems at the New Braunfels weather service office that serves 33 counties.

National survey shows newspapers experience delivery problems

If you sometimes get the feeling that your hometown newspaper, (even the *Haskell Free Press*) is being sent to you by way of the pony express, you are not alone.

In a survey conducted by the National Newspaper Association (NNA), 73 percent of America's community newspapers report that the Postal Service delivery of newspapers has become significantly worse over the past year. More than 1,000 community newspapers from 35 states, both non-daily and daily, participated in the survey, conducted with the assistance of the state newspaper associations.

"Community newspapers around the country report that is is taking longer than ever to get their products to subscribers, especially those who are outside the county and state," said Kenneth B. Allen,

Echoing the delivery timeexperience of the *Free Press*, key findings of the survey include: Incounty delivery is good. Non-daily newspapers report that 98 percent of in-county subscribers received their paper within five days

Out-of-county delivery is getting worse. Thirty five percent of non-daily newspapers must wait six or more days for their newspaper, and nine percent must wait eleven days or more.

Out-of-state delivery is worst of all. The out-of-state subscribers to non-daily newspapers must wait six or more days to receive their paper, and over over 50 percent have to wait eleven days or more.

Complaints about service delivery are increasing. Readers

around the country are cancelling their subscriptions to community newspapers, as a result of poor delivery.

Allen noted, "Many community newspapers depend upon the Postal Service to reach their subscribers. When the Postal Service fails to deliver on time, community newspapers lose customers." He added that although this problem has been brought to the attention of postal officials, 48 percent of the newspapers participating in the survey reported that the Postal Service has been unresponsive to complaints.

"Community newspapers have few alternatives and must rely on the Postal Service," he said. "Every community publisher would agree with the publisher who wrote to NNA: 'Please help.'"

Buckle up-it just might save your life

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, (NHTSA) experts remind motorists that buckling up is the most effective measure they can take to protect themselves in a crash, and they urge them to make it a habit.

According to the Texas Department of Public Safety, 3,082 people were killed in motor vehicle

crashes in 1996. Of that number, 1,662 were unrestrained. Of the 70 children under age 4 who died in crashes, 43 were unrestrained. When used correctly, child safety seats do save lives of children. The best practice is for children age 12 and under to ride properly restrained in the back seat of all motor

The NHTSA, the American Academy of Pediatrics and other

safety experts emphasize that children should ride rear-facing until at least one year of age. Children 12 and under should never ride in the front seat with a passenger air bag. Air bags save lives, but they work best when everyone in buckled and kids are in the back, properly buckled up.

Wearing a safety belt is the most important method of protection in a motor vehicle crash. While the back seat is the safest place to ride in a car, if occupants ride unbuckled, they place themselves and other occupants in a lifethreatening position.

So, the answer is simple: Buckle up in every position of a motor vehicle; it just might save your

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

TxDOT helps Haskell with Project Graduation funds

Haskell High School is among 29 high schools in the Abilene district receiving a \$300 mini-grant each from the Texas Department of Transportation for Project Graduation 1998.

In addition to the grant, Brenda Mitchell, Abilene district traffic safety coordinator, visited each high school and presented the Project Graduation chairperson key chains for each of the graduates who attend their high school school event. These mementos bare the slogan, "Zero Tolerance—Think. Don't Drink." T-shirts baring the same slogan were also donated as door prizes.

"These graduation keepsakes are intended to be a reminder to the students to remain alcohol-free around prom and graduation time," Mitchell said.

through its Traffic Operations division to support Project Graduation. The money is divided between the state's 25 districts who then determine the amount of each grant based on the number of high schools participating in their individual district.

Transportation officials report that this program is one of TxDOT's most popular and well-received projects offered throughout the state.

Project Graduation was originally developed to assist rural schools with their celebrations and began 1984 with only two schools. In 1989, the first year the department provided mini-grants to rural schools, they had 59 recipients. The program proved so successful, it was expanded to include all high schools. The more than 500 schools that participated last year effected 110,000 students.

These mini-grants are not intended to fully fund a Project Graduation event, Mitchell said, but to provide "seed money" for schools to start and support

Speed can kill-Slow down

by Lou Gilly Haskell Co. Extension Agent Everybody's in a hurry. You. have to get to your part-time job on time, but you spend a few extra minutes in front of the mirror before you leave. You want to see your girlfriend before you have to be home and finish your homework you were supposed to do yesterday. You're going to a party where all your friends are already having a great time. Maybe you are not even aware that your foot is pushing the accelerator pedal a little further. Or maybe you love the feeling that comes from the gunning of the

There are a lot of reasons young people drive too fast. Here are some reasons to let up on the gas.

First of all, speeding won't really save you much time. For example, if you drive 65 mph instead of 55 mph on the highway, over a 10-mile stretch, you'll only arrive two minutes sooner. In city of residential traffic the time saved is even less. If you're caught speeding, you'll pay a heavy fine. If you strike a child on a bicycle or cause a fatal crash, nothing can ever make up the time lost in those human lives or the devastation

Many drivers feel secure speeding if they are not drunk or driving carelessly. I'm a good driver, they say. I'm in control. But simple math tells another story. It takes 3/4 of a second to

move your foot from the gas to the brake pedal. If you are traveling at 60 mph, you'll cover 66 feet before you even reach the brake! From the time you begin to react to the time the car actually stops, you'll cover nearly 300 feet. That's 300 feet of potential collision space-300 feet in which you cannot stop.

Lower speeds save fuel, money and lives. Take your time. Next time you're tempted to save time by speeding, think of the lives you may save and take it easy. Enjoy
