
Two Big Parades In Round-Up

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of pur-chasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State, (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or cor-poration.

"All lands thus purchased shall be ac-quired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veterans' Land Fund. "The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, and to Texas Vet-erans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this pro-gram by legislative act, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and regulations as are now provided by law, or as may hereafter be provided by law. "All moneys received and which have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred pay-ments, shall be credited to the Veterans' Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in like manner as provided for herein, for a period ending December 1, 1959, to pay principal of and interest on the bonds here-tofor ensued and on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 1, 1959, all moneys received by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, gr so much thereof as may be necessary during the period ending December 1, 1959, to pay principal of and interest on the bonds here-tofor ensued and on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 1, 1959, all moneys received by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, gr so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds after approval by the Attorney General of Texas, recistration by the Comptroller of the State of Texas, and deliverey to the pur-chasers, be incontestable and shall consti-ting obligations of the State under the Constitution of Texas. Of the total One-Hundred Million Dollars (\$160,000,000) of bonds herein authorized, the sum of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) has here-tofore been issued: said bonds are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be obligations of the State of Texas. This amendment shall become effective upon its adoption." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the second Tuesday in November.
