### 260,000 Bu. Grain Elevator For S. E. Cone Under Construction

Construction is well under way on another large elevator in Muleshoe.

Completion of a 260,000 bushel plant for the S. E. Cone Grain & Seed Company, pioneer operators here, is projected for November 1, Roy Jordan, manager said today.

The plant will be almost identical to that of the Ray Griffiths & Sons elevator which has just been completed. One exception will be that the bins in the new elevator will be 18 feet in diameter instead of 20, giving considerably less storage space.

The Cone plant will have 22 bins, 18 feet in diameter and 118 feet high. The head house will go into the air some forty feet more.

Grain will feed by gravity from all bins back to the pit. So fast will the conveyor work that a 100,000 pound capacity railroad car can be filled from the elevator in 15 minutes. The pit has a capacity of about a carload, and a truck may be emptied in as little as a minute and a half.

The elevator will be of concrete and steel construction. Forms already have been built for the bin walls and steel arrived this week.

The company will continue to use the old elevator. A driveway will go through the new elevator and give access to the old plant. An arrangement will be contrived so that the old plant may be filled from the new without the necessity of using the old plant machinery. The two elevators give the Cone company more

300,000 bushels storage.

Roy Jordan is one of the veteran grain men of Muleshoe. He came here 23 years ago and has been continuously in charge of the Cone elevator since that time.

Already in place are the new scales, which have a 50 ft. platform and have a weighing capacity of 50 tons. The office has been moved to a new spot and remodeled to suit the needs of the enlarged plant.

### THE BIG PARADE

The biggest, most elaborate parade ever staged in these parts will move Thursday afternoon at 4 p. m. Head of the parade, which will feature a Marine color guard, Reese Air Force Band, high school band, four mounted patrols, and more than 40 floats, and other features will head north on Main from Avenue D, turn west on the Clovis highway, south on Morton highway to the courthouse and west to the junior high school. Walking components will fall out there while vehicles will go on to the rodeo arena.

A beautiful trophy awaits best Sheriff's Posse. The Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce has provided a 24-inch trophy to be awarded the winning patrol at the rodeo performance. During the parade a rodeo queen will be selected by impartial judges; the Round Up queen will be selected in a special program at the high school at 7 p. m.

Two big rodeo performances will be staged Thursday and Friday nights of the Will Rogers Memorial Round-Up in Muleshoe. The grand entry is to be at 8 p. m. each evening. There will be 16 different events in the rodeo, including many action-packed and thrilling performances plus several colorful and entertaining attractions.

The Portales, N. M. Mounted Square dance team will do a square dance on horses. This is

a beautiful performance and this square dance team has gained recognition all over the Southwest.

The stock will be fresh and full of pep and should prove hard for the bare and bull riders to stay aboard their mounts. The stock is being furnished by W. W. Branscum and the rodeo is being produced by the Muleshoe Roping Club and the Muleshoe Junior Chamber of Commerce.

The order of events for the rodeo is announced on another page of this issue.

More than \$1800 in prize money and a \$200 saddle await the champions of this year's rodeo. This will be one of the best rounded non-professional rodeos to be staged in Texas in 1951.

### Cal Farley Of Boys Ranch Is To Address Luncheon Crowd Thursday

The founder and director of Boys Ranch, 35 miles north of Amarillo at colorful Old Tascosa, will be the principal speaker at the noon luncheon Thursday of the Lions Club, Rotary Club, Jay-Cees and Chamber of Commerce and their guests in the Legion Home in Muleshoe.

Cal Farley is a humorous speaker but a sincere one. His work with the boys who really need attention and help has made him nationally known.

Farley was the welterweight champion of the American Expeditionary Force and in Inter-Allied Games in Paris, France, in 1919, on the same team with Gene Tunney. He came to Amarillo to play baseball in the old Western League in 1923. He took over a defunct tire shop and built it into a successful "one stop does it" store grossing more than \$700,000 a year when he sold it in 1947 to devote all his time to Boys Ranch without pay. Mrs. Farley is his able assistant in the ranch project.

The ranch today has 120 boys. During its 11 years, the ranch has handled more than 500 boys. It has its own 12-grade school, with 7 teachers. Six trades are taught in the vocational department opened this year. Some of the ranch graduates attend college, some take jobs and several are in the Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard.

Two hundred fifty tickets will be sold for the luncheon. Ray Keeling, mayor, will be master of ceremonies.

The Marine group will attend the all-service club luncheon at noon Thursday in the American Legion Home here; will furnish a color guard for the parade at 4 p. m.; and a firing squad at the Memorial Service to be held during the rodeo performance Thursday night under auspices of the American Legion Post of Muleshoe.

All the personnel mentioned are connected with the Marine Recruiting Service with the exception of Lt. Col. Johns, who is commanding officer of the Marine Air Detachment, Dallas. Col. Metze is the Officer in Charge of the Southern Recruiting Division with headquarters in Dallas.

Both Col. Metze and Lt. Col. Johns have a long record of responsible and courageous service in war and peace. Mr. Jones has made arrangements for billeting the visitors in private homes during their stay here.

Lazbuddy School To Open Monday Sept. 3, Supt. Shipp On The Job

Lazbuddy Schools will begin a new term the coming Monday, September 3, according to announcement of E. K. Shipp, superintendent, who said everything is in readiness to begin work that day. Mr. Shipp comes here from Borger, his former home, however he has been principal at McLean prior to accepting the post here.

It will be a full day Monday, with classes to run on schedule. The school lunch room will serve meals at noon and the buses will make their regular routes.

Mr. Shipp reminded that each child is required to have a small-pox vaccination before they register. An exception to this will be the football boys, who will receive their vaccinations November 7. The county school nurse will be at Lazbuddy school on opening day to give the vaccinations to all who haven't already had them. Diphtheria shots will be given at a later date.

The faculty is complete, Mr. Shipp said, with 12 teachers. The athletic coach, C. Brown, has already begun girls basketball practice and Monday he will

start the football boys out on their practice schedule. Lazbuddy fields a six-man team, and will play the season opener at Lazbuddy September 7.

The Shipp's moved to Lazbuddy last week. Mr. and Mrs. Shipp have a daughter, Judy, who will be enrolled in the second grade, and a son, Kenny, 5.

Gilbert Green, Chairman of District 8 of the Communist Party, Chicago, Illinois, is one of the Communist leaders convicted for violation of the Smith act who are fugitives from justice as a result of the forfeiture of their bonds in the Federal District Court in New York City on July 2, 1951. The FBI has called on alert citizens and law enforcement agencies to assist in locating Green. His description is as follows:

Age 44, born September 24, 1906, at Chicago, Illinois; height 5' 6"; weight, 150 pounds; eyes, hazel; hair, black, curly; high forehead; complexion, dark; build, medium; race, white; nationality, American.

Green is a quiet, convincing speaker and is not given to outbursts of emotion except on rare occasions. His appearance is neat and he frequently wears brown

suits and flashy ties. He likes to chew gum and smoke cigarettes occasionally. He has been known to drive a 1950 four-door Chevrolet sedan. He also travels by air. In the past he has worked as a writer, lecturer, electrician and machine shop worker.

### Small Grain Leaders Fight Diseases

An educational program to fight diseases of small grains is being conducted this fall in Texas by agricultural leaders. The object of the campaign is to reduce the annual losses which small grain producers suffer because of seed borne diseases and from planting seed that is mixed with weeds or other undesirable plants. Proper seed treatment with disinfectant can reduce the effects of seed borne diseases. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is taking an active part in the campaign and your local county agent can supply information on how best to do the seed treating job. In view of the great need for the continued high production of all grain crops and the shortage of manpower on the farms of the state, it is highly important that all known steps be taken.

### Big Meeting Of Bailey County Farm Bureau Is Scheduled Next Thursday

A county wide meeting of the Bailey County Farm Bureau, to be held in the high school auditorium in Muleshoe, next Thursday evening, September 6, at 8 o'clock will have as its principal speaker R. G. Arnold, of Auburn, Ala. Mr. Arnold is assistant organization director of the Southern Region, American Farm Bureau, with which he has been associated for 30 years.

O. C. Thomson, president of the Bailey County Bureau, said preparations are being made for a large crowd, and a program of entertainment plus refreshments, has been planned. In addition to the speech by Mr. Arnold, Loyd Alsop and his band will play and Tye Young will lead in group singing.

Other officials assisting in arranging for the meeting are: Baker Johnson, vice-president; H. E. Schuster, secretary; and Ray Carter, insurance service agent.

Mr. Arnold's keen interest in the farmers' need for organization, led the AFBF to seek his services as organization man for the South. As a result of his work, membership has increased in the 13 states of the Southern Region from less than 25,000 members to 479,453 at the end of 1950. The Southern Region stands second in membership among the 4 regions of the AFBF.

Mr. Arnold knows the problems of the farm people. His untiring loyalty and devotion to the cause of organization are responsible for the outstanding job he has done for Farm Bureau.

He will tell local people what the Farm Bureau is and what it does in his speech here.

The very active Bailey County Farm Bureau now has an office in Muleshoe, which is located in the office space formerly occupied by the office of Dr. B. R. Putman. Mr. Carter will handle all insurance matters coming through the Bureau, and in addition now has the insurance required under the new Texas vehicle responsibility law.

Mr. Carter will be in the office much of the time and the Bureau will employ a full time office secretary to attend to the business. The Bureau has accepted the job of helping farmers to file their certificates on gasoline tax refund and will have a notary to complete these forms. There will be no charge for this service.

**TO THE PEOPLE OF BAILEY AND PARMER COUNTIES AND ADJACENT TERRITORY**

A heinous crime has been committed in our midst and to date there has been no arrest. Joshua Blocher, inoffensive citizen of Progress in Bailey County, was found dead last Tuesday in a nearby cotton field, murdered by someone who evidently had robbery as the motive.

Peace officers, including the sheriffs of Bailey and Parmer counties and their deputies, and members of the Texas Rangers Force have diligently followed up every lead and every clue. They agree that the offering of a reward is appropriate.

A Muleshoe attorney has drawn up rules and regulations to govern this reward offer by the citizens of this territory. There will be three trustees, who will have the responsibility of disbursing the money should anyone qualify by furnishing the vital information; should no one qualify, the money will be returned to each donor to the reward fund. At the end of a two year period, the money will be returned if no one has qualified to earn it. The money will be deposited in the Muleshoe State Bank and an accurate record will be kept of contributions. No peace officer will be eligible to receive the reward; and should an arrest and conviction come about through the regular enforcement agencies, the donors all will receive their money back.

The reward is offered for "information leading to the arrest and conviction of the murderer or murderers" of Joshua Blocher.

Intolerable to people who believe in law and order is the thought that those responsible for the death of a harmless old person should be still at large. Let us do everything possible to bring this case to a swift conclusion.

**1950 LUBBOCK COTTON DEFOLIATION TESTS**

COLLEGE STATION, Aug. 27 — Results of cotton defoliation tests conducted on experimental plots and in commercial fields at Lubbock in 1950 have been released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.  
Hi-Bred, Stormproof No. 1 and Deltapine (TPSA) were the most easily defoliated varieties in this test, in which Aero Cyanamid, special grade, defoliant was used, reported E. L. Thaxton, Jr., junior agronomist at the Lubbock Experiment Station.  
In the test with three rates of several different chemical defoliants, best results were obtained with Sodium cyanamid at 10 lbs. per acre and Shed-a-Leaf at 7 pounds.  
Six commercial defoliants were

applied on a uniform field of cotton under the direction of a representative of each chemical company. The chlorate-based defoliants gave the best results for total defoliation in this test.  
Thaxton reported that at least 30 gallons of spray solution per acre were necessary to eliminate dry burn in a test on the best spray concentration.  
Complete results of these experiments are given in Progress Report 1382, which is available from the Publications Office, College Station, Texas.

**Cotton Demand Commodity Loan Should Make Good Prices This Fall**

Memphis, Tenn. August 27 — Consumption prospects, together with the commodity loan program, make it neither wise nor necessary for the cotton farmer to dump his crop at depressed price levels during the current harvest season, Harold A. Young, president of the National Cotton Council, said today in a message to producer-delegates of the industrywide organization.

The Council president emphasized that the demand outlook is still just as strong as was anticipated at the time the government requested a 16,000,000-bale cotton crop last December.

Department of Agriculture figures, he said, point to a domestic consumption during the coming crop year of 10,500,000 bales and exports of 5,500,000 bales, giving a total disappearance of 16,000,000 bales.

"With consumption at such levels, a crop of 17,000,000 bales indicates a carryover on August 1, 1952, of 3,200,000 bales, as compared with a carryover of 6,846,000 bales on August 1, 1951," Mr. Young said. "The carryover on August 1, 1951, was 2,000,000 bales, the smallest in 25 years."

"These figures give every reason for confidence in cotton's stability throughout the season ahead, provided an orderly flow of bales into the makers can be maintained during the harvest period."

The federal commodity loan program offers the major opportunity for orderly marketing of the 1951 crop, Mr. Young said, pointing out that conditions prevailing this fall are identical to those for which the program was created.

The loan program was never intended as a method of setting a price for cotton, but as a mechanism through which the farmer could avoid dumping his cotton on a glutted market in exactly the type of situation which now exists," he said.

"The loan program can and should be used in the weeks ahead to absorb the volume of cotton which is not needed immediately by domestic textile mills or for export, and which is in excess of the capacity of private financing facilities. Without it, the splendid response of cotton farmers to their government's appeal for a 16,000,000 bale crop could easily result in raw cotton prices substantially less than the minimum the farmer expected when he planted his crop last spring, and also substantially less than the level prevailing when the appeal for a big defense crop was made by military and civilian agencies."

Mr. Young complimented the leadership of various producer organizations on the aggressive work being done, and gains already made, in informing individual farmers regarding use of the loan program. "I trust," he said, "that you will impress upon all of your group the immediate importance of this program as a mechanism through which each member may decide whether he wants to dispose of his crop at existing levels or hold it for later sale."

**Bamert Has 13 Acres Of Fescue**

Now is the ideal time to seed irrigated pasture grasses and legumes providing you have a plot of ground with a good firm seed bed. REMEMBER to be eligible for PMA assistance in seeding your pasture you MUST get Prior Written Approval BEFORE seeding the grass, says the Bailey County PMA.

Carl C. Bamert, 4 miles North and 1 mile East of Muleshoe has 13.0 acres of "Kentucky 31 Fescue" grass that he seeded in the fall of 1949. He has been grazing an average of 4 head of cattle per acre on this pasture until about November 15th. Mr. Bamert has this pasture divided into two plots on which he rotates grazing and applies about 4 inches of water to each plot every two weeks. He also applies Superphosphate and Nitrogen to the pasture at regular intervals.

Mr. Bamert is feeding these cattle 1/2 scoop of ground bundy per day and is realizing a about 1 1/2 lb. gain per animal

per day. Over an 8 month period this would amount to about 1470 pounds of beef per acre during the grazing period. This figuring beef at 0¢ per pound, would amount to agross revenue of \$441.00 per acre, and at the same time he is building his land up and preventing erosion. This land is Bench Levelled which permits more equal distribution of water.

Mr. Bamert thinks enough of his pasture that he is Bench Leveling another plot of 53.0 acres which he plans to seed to the same kind of grass. PMA will assist Mr. Bamert with his leveling and grass seeding practice providing they meet certain requirements. Your farm must have been under irrigation at least three years before we can assist you with Bench Leveling. This three year time is not required on establishing pastures.

Water was struck in excavating for the new S. E. Cone Grain & Seed company elevator here at a depth of 17 feet, Roy Jordan, manager said. He said that he remembered a previous excavation struck water at 12 feet. Water was struck in the King Bros. elevator excavation at around 14 feet and in the Ray Griffiths & Sons excavation at 15.5 feet. Jordan figures the water level must be declining gradually.

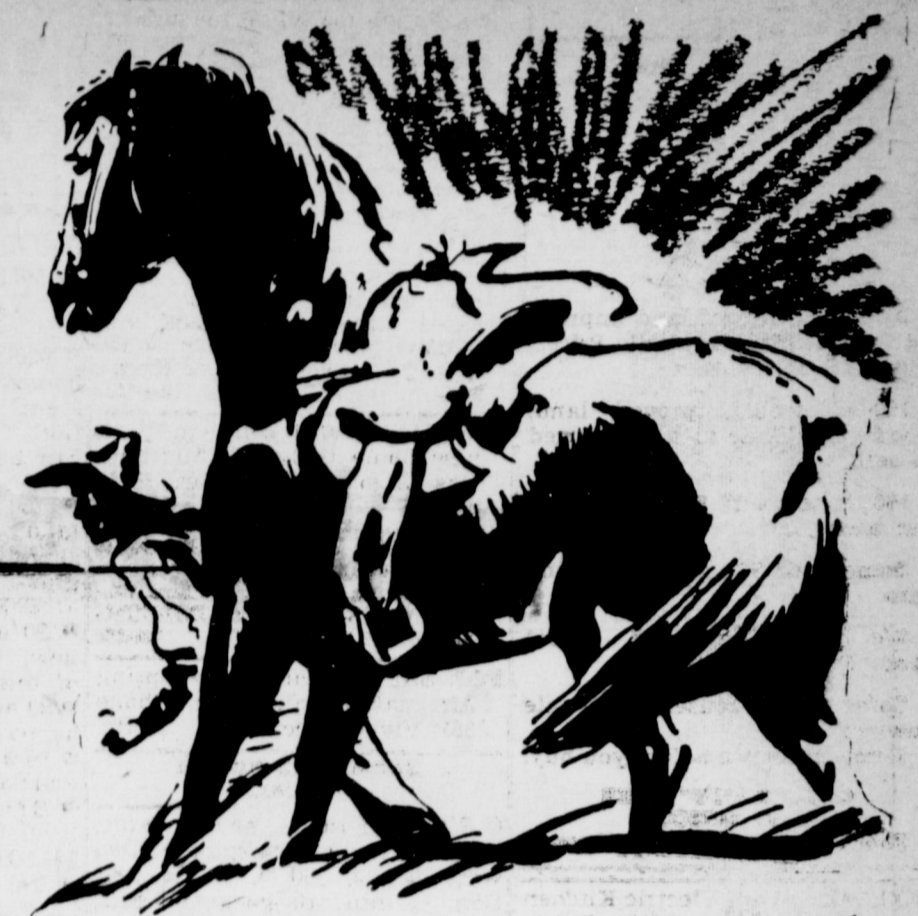

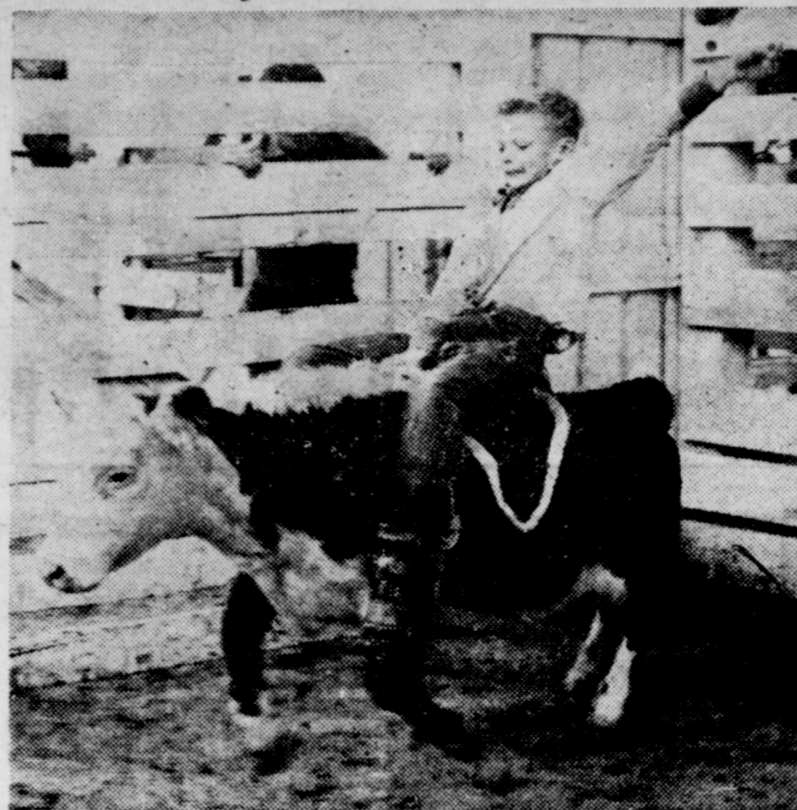
### DOVE SEASON TO OPEN THE COMING SATURDAY

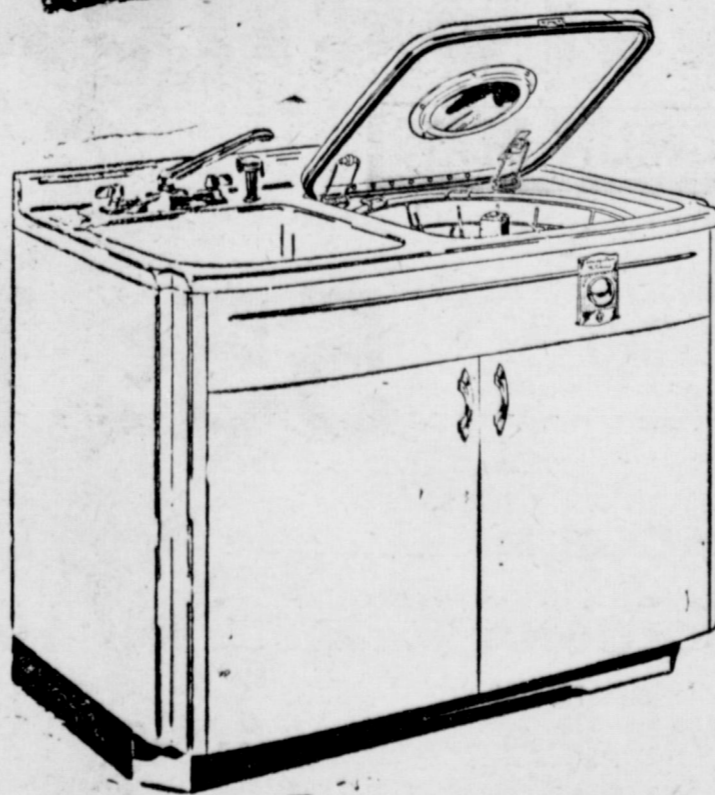

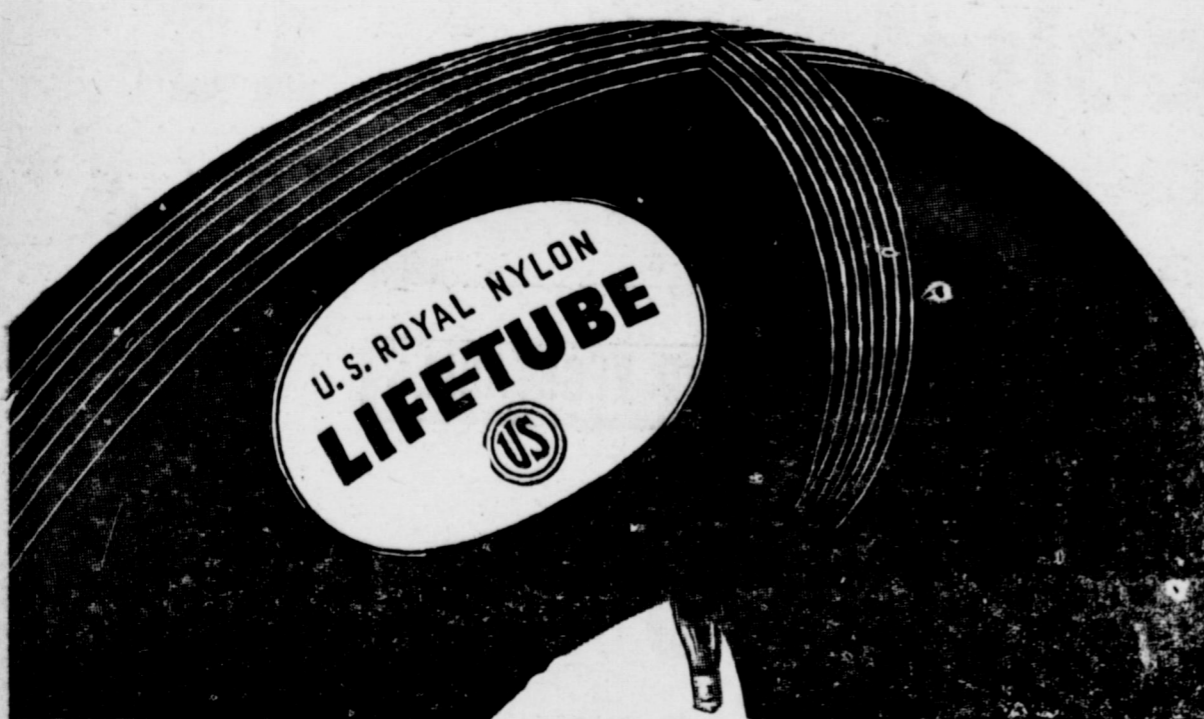

## Water Conservation District Vote Tentatively Set In Late September

The fate of a 211-county underground water conservation district will be decided by Panhandle-South Plains voters in an election tentatively set for late September.

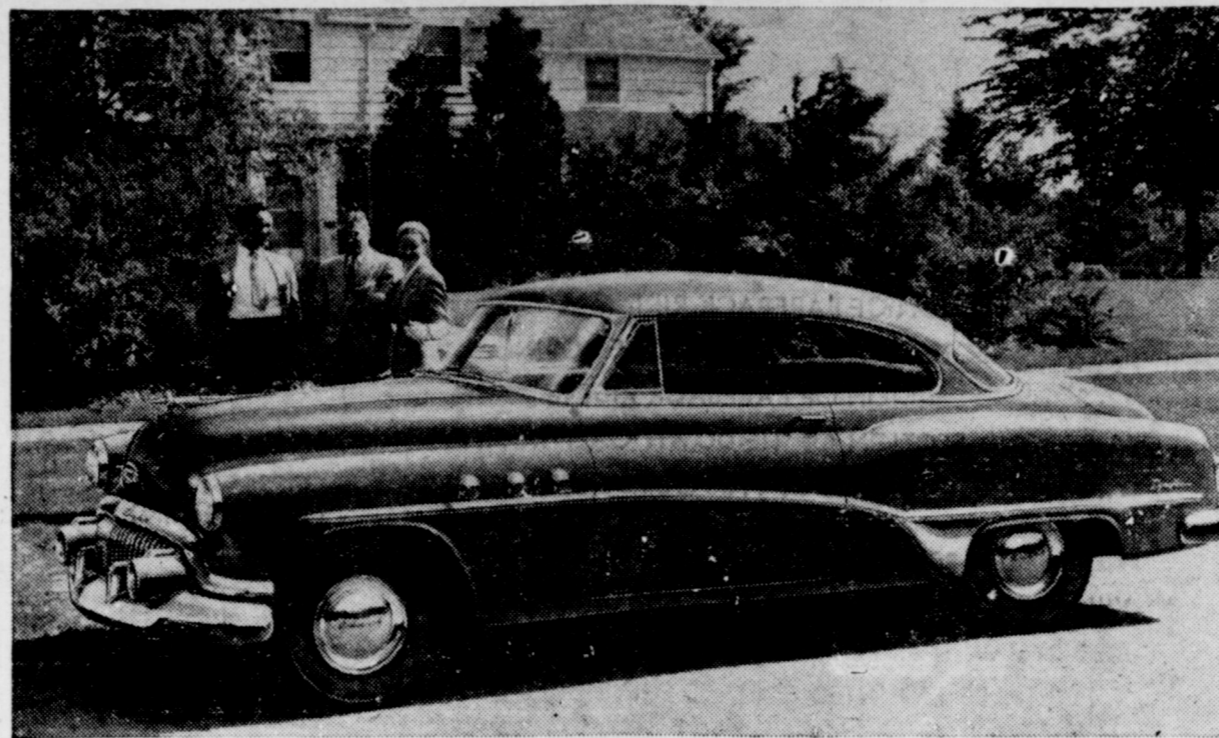
Plans for holding the water district election are being made by five directors who head the temporary district created Aug. 9 by the State Board of Water Engineers following a hearing in Plainview.

The election date will be announced by the directors, E. C. Hatton of Lubbock, A. C. Chesser of Littlefield, Jess Osborne of Muleshoe, Tom McFarland of Hereford and Tom Bostic of Plainview. Duties of these temporary directors are confined solely to holding the election, at which West Texas citizens may approve or reject the district proposal.

The election will be conducted under the local option system, with municipalities, counties and segregated irrigation areas voting separately. The vote of one such political subdivision cannot affect the vote of another. Under this system, a town can vote itself out of the water district while the surrounding rural area joins the district, or vice versa. The working district, when created, may thus consist of one or more counties, parts of any of the counties, or the entire area of the 19,649-square mile reservoir.

### Equal Yields

Editor's Note: The article printed below seems inconclusive, but O. C. Thomson, well known farmer west of Muleshoe has obtained some fine results with a skip two and plant two arrangement on dry land which he hopes to learn more about later on. What Thomson's experiment amounts to is a fallow plan, we suppose.

COLLEGE STATION, August 27—Approximately equal yields of cotton were obtained under irrigation by planting two rows and skipping one and by planting each row, according to D. L. Jones superintendent of the Lubbock Experiment Station.

Little difference in yields were observed between the two practices in tests conducted under irrigation at Lubbock during the three year 1948-50. Where each row was planted, an average of 382 pounds of lint per acre was obtained, while 70 pounds of lint was obtained from planting two rows and skipping one. During the two dry years of 1948 and 1950, the practice of allowing every third row to remain blank returned greater yields.

In tests conducted under dry-land conditions during the four years 1929-32, the practice of planting each row gave an average of 23 percent higher yields. These results were obtained where the "plant two-skip one plots" had two-thirds as many plants as where each row was planted. Jones points out that planting each row hastens maturity as compared to planting two and skipping one.

The results of this research are given in Progress Report 1384, available from the Publications Office, College Station, Texas.

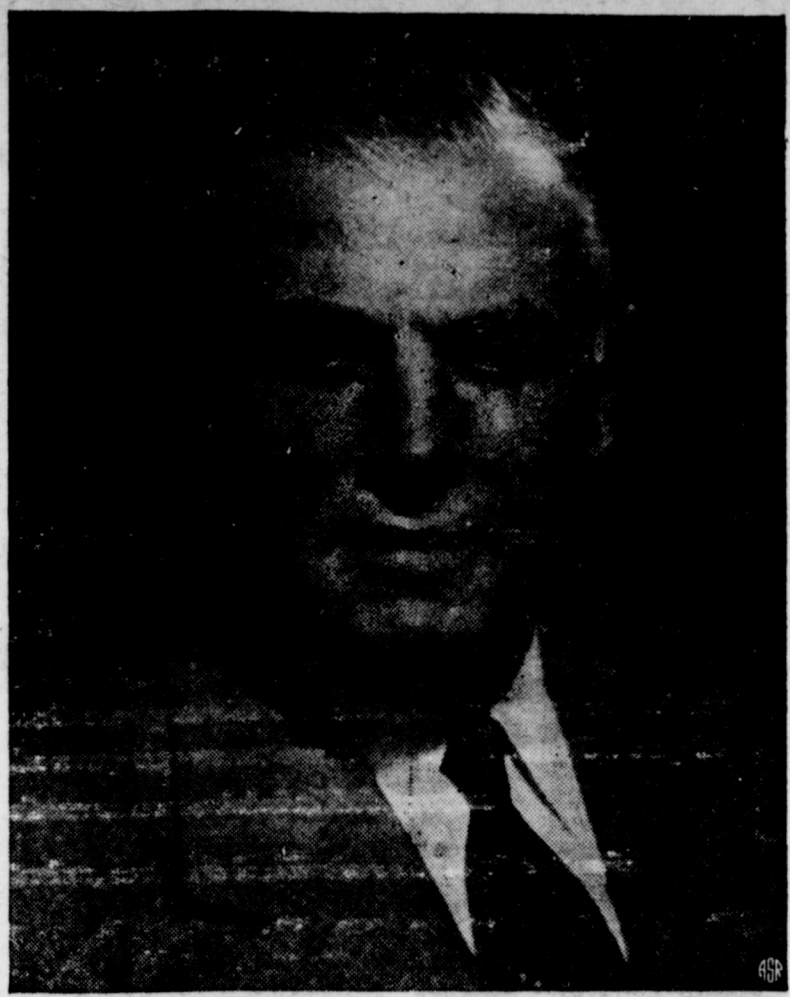

**Government Safeguards Farm Machinery**



Relief for farmers concerned by the growing shortage of tractors and other mechanized equipment is promised by the appointment of A. King McCord, president of The Oliver Corporation, as director of the newly established farm machinery and equipment division of the National Production Authority, which was announced on Thursday, April 12, in Washington, D. C.

Mr. McCord will work with the NPA and the United States Department of Agriculture to secure scarce materials in sufficient quantities for farm equipment manufacturers to produce the amount of farm machinery considered necessary by the USDA to reach expanded farm production goals.

The appointment answers the requests of defense authorities, government officials and national farm organization leaders, who have said that farm equipment must be available in large quantities to avoid the possibility of a serious food shortage in the United States arising from an increasing scarcity of farm labor.

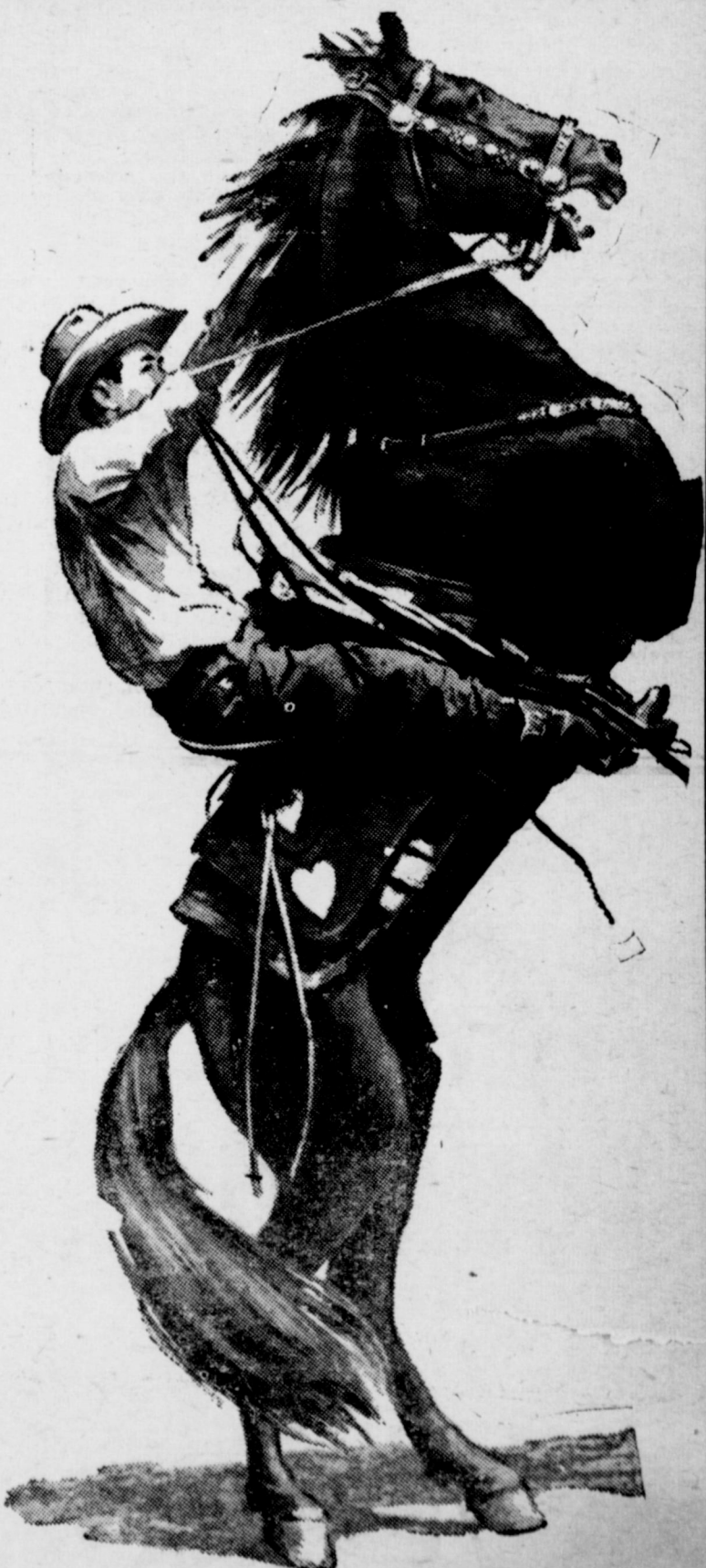

**Winners Allowed Price Increase**

The Lubbock District Office of Price Stabilization announced that action has been taken to allow cotton ginners a uniform adjustment in their charges for ginning, wrapping and baling during the 1951 season.

The action is covered by a supplementary regulation to Ceiling Price Regulation 34 effective September 1.

Section 8 of CPR 34 permits percentage increases in rates over those charged in 1950 to persons

engaged in seasonal services, such as ginning. These percentage increases are decreased by 1 percent in each of 7 seasonal periods beginning with 8 percent in the January 26, 1950 through April 30, 1950 seasonal period, down to 2 percent in the December 1, 1950 through December 18, 1950 period.

Since the season for cotton ginning does not begin at the same time for all sections in the cotton producing areas, it has been found that the decreasing percentage basis for adjusting rates is not equitable to those ginners in northerly areas who gin later in the year.

Data submitted to OPS indicates that cotton ginners generally make their commitments in early spring when their costs and cost increases are generally uniform. It is also indicated that ginning costs have risen approximately 10 percent since the 1950 season.

Based on these factors and taking into account the large cotton crop estimated for 1951, together with the fact that this is a decreasing cost industry, it is indicated that a uniform adjustment in ginning charges to reflect increased costs is desirable and necessary to provide equitable treatment.

Accordingly, the supplementary regulation permits ginners to increase their rates by a flat 6 percent over rates charged during the 1950 season, rather than using the graduated percentage rates now allowed under Section 8 of CPR 34. Also, the action applies to all cotton ginners regardless of the number of employees, whereas under Section 8 of CPR 34 a distinction is made between services which employ more than or less than 7 persons.

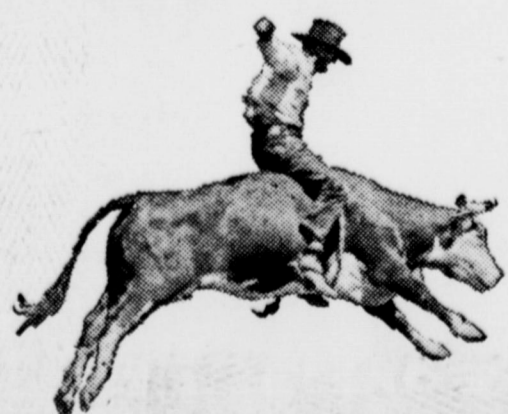

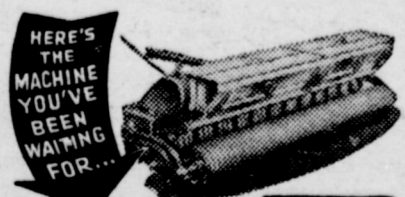

## Passion Play To Show In Lubbock

At the request of many Americans, the famous Passion Play was finally permanently transplanted in 1937 and a home was established for it in the Black Hills of South Dakota in the tiny village of Spearfish, and the largest Passion Play grounds in the world were erected with the stage more than 3 city blocks long and 8,000 seats in the Amphitheatre.

The first presentation was given in the summer of 1938. The script was translated and adapted into the English language, and this world famous drama is now being presented in the major American cities for the first time with the dialogue spoken in English. It comes to Lubbock after breaking all time attendance records in such typical American cities as Seattle, Dallas, Fort Worth, Washington, Baltimore and Chicago.

## Will Rogers' Wit And Humor Did Not Depend Upon Profanity or Vulgarity

Mrs. C. C. Mardis, one of the earliest settlers of the Muleshoe country, has furnished The Journal with a number of newspaper clippings concerning the late Will Rogers, whose Memorial Roundup here Thursday and Friday of this week.

Mrs. Mardis, like thousands of others in this section were great admirers of Will Rogers. At his death she kept clippings which told of his life and death, reviewed the humor, mixed with a native philosophy, which made Will Rogers one of the most loved Americans who ever lived.

Directly after his death, Willis Thornton, a staff correspondent for the National Editorial Editorial Association, wrote a series of articles on "The Life Story of Will Rogers" which were printed in The Lubbock Journal.

Thornton started his second article in this manner:

Will Rogers was much more than a jokesmith. There was a quality about his humor that had nothing to do with the kind of a story that starts out: "It seems there were two Irishmen"

In fact, Rogers personally disliked that kind of joke and was seldom caught punning.

To say that Will Rogers took his humor seriously is more to repeat the old truism that many humorists are really very lugubrious fellows at heart. They are serious because they are thinking of what hard work it is to be funny. Will Rogers never thought about that. He was serious because he was thinking of what might be the effect of his joke.

To Will Rogers a simple joke for the joke's sake was like

cornflakes without milk -- pretty dry going. He once said "A joke has got to have its foundation in truth if it's going to enjoy the process of getting over to the audience."

Typical of what he must have meant was this one, pulled during the Democratic convention of 1920: "Bryan was cheered 15 minutes, then voted against six to one."

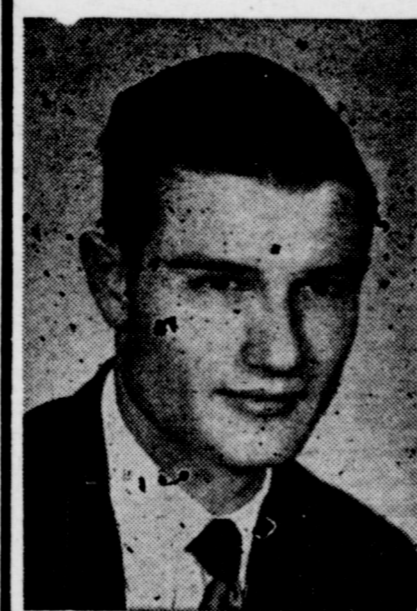

## Cotton Picker Shortage Looms

LITTLEFIELD, Aug. 25 — The Lamb-Parmer-Bailey-Castro county area is expected to be short about 12,000 cotton pickers this season, according to James Preston, farm labor specialist of Littlefield. To the expected 8,000 pickers, residents of the four-county area will add 1,000 persons.

Few Mexican nationals are expected Preston said.

Most cotton for the estimated 200,000 bales to be harvested will be hand pulled. Mechanical strippers cannot be used because cotton in this area is of a short staple type, Preston revealed.

Housing for workers will be plentiful in Lamb and Bailey counties, but Parmer and Castro farmers are not so fortunate.

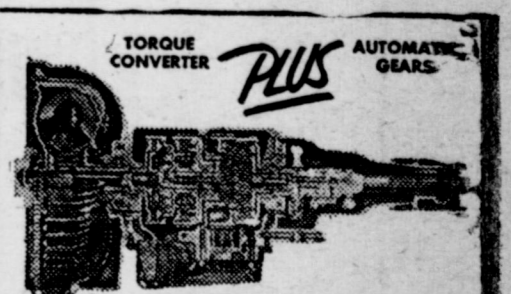

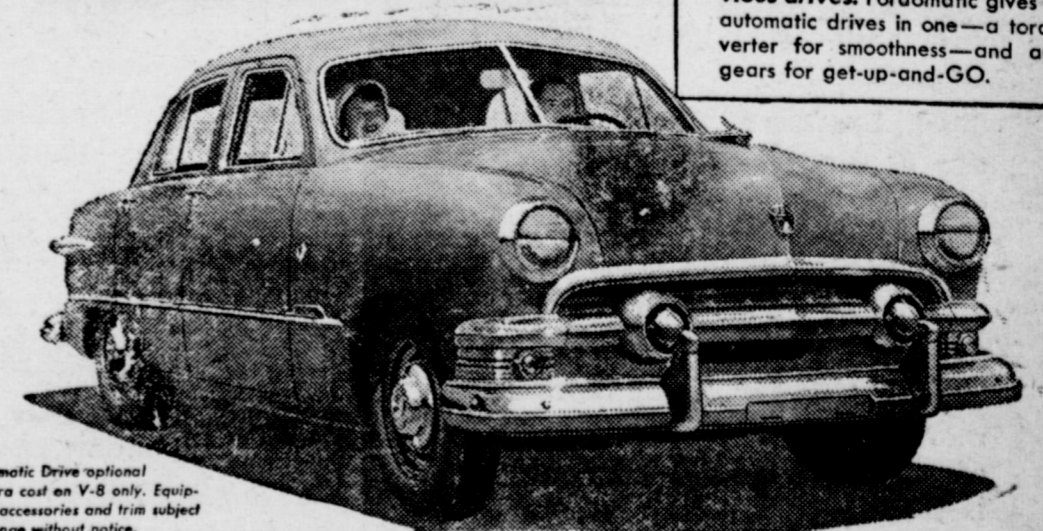

## WHERE TO WORK

Gloucester, Mass., August 24.—Many young people are now wondering where it is best for them to get a job and settle down. This year they have a choice of several jobs and can pick and choose.

### Avoid Big Cities

I advise against taking a position in one of the biggest cities—certainly not in one of the 12 cities which Washington says is liable to be bombed in case of World War III. As for settling down and raising a family in one of these twelve cities, this seems almost suicidal to me. Here is the list: New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Los Angeles, Cleveland, Baltimore, St. Louis, Boston, Pittsburgh, Washington, D. C., and San Francisco.

A study of the latest atomic bomb information leads me to believe that about sixty miles from the center of such a big city is the safest location. You will then be both free from bombing and free from the radio waves; also you should not suffer from the refugee problem which could be very serious to the suburbs of these twelve big cities.

### Small Cities Look Good

Not only are small cities better places to bring up a family but they offer the best long run business opportunities. Before the present day of high taxes and high living expenses the city offered attractions to the young man who wanted to make money quickly; but not now.

Today, smaller places offer the best long-run, money making opportunities. Real estate in the above cities is now at top prices; but real estate in most smaller cities could double in price. Some day the manufacturers who are now in these twelve cities will flock to the smaller places. The time to buy small city property is now, before the rush begins.

### When To Buy Or Sell

The time to buy most property is when no one wants it. Such

opportunities always exist somewhere—but few persons are wise enough to take advantage of such bargains. The time to sell property is when someone else wants it badly. But there again most people will not sell then. The average man will not use his brain or else lacks courage when he buys or sells.

Here is another thought: Buy land by the acre just outside any good city and later sell it by the foot. But buy it on the right side of that city—that is, in the direction in which the community is growing. Every city—large or small—is growing best in some one direction where the best houses are being built.

### Better For Small Businessmen

A small city is sure to offer opportunities for young businessmen. "A small load is better off in a small puddle"; he is apt to get drowned in a big pool. In the same way the small business man may get drowned easily in some big city where he may be forced to pay tribute to racketeers or be bled by crime gangs.

In the smaller cities any young man of good character can join the local Chamber of Commerce and one of the Service Clubs and work up to be a director thereof. This he cannot do in one of the twelve big cities. He can buy stock in a local bank of smaller cities and perhaps become a director thereof. His wife can become active in the Women's Club and in the Parent Teacher Association.

### Have A Church Affiliation

I never feel so lonesome as when I go into a big city church. It is not the fault of the church; I do not blame the members for having no interest in me. The same applies to the Y. M. C. A.'s of the biggest cities. But a small city church always makes me feel at home.

Certainly no one should attend any church just to help himself in business or even to get acquaintances. Yet, we all must have some social life and it is

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 57**  
proposing an Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section after Section 11 thereof to be designated as Section 11a, providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the necessary proclamation and publication, and calling of an election therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after Section 11 thereof a new section to be designated Section 11a, which shall read as follows:  
"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Permanent University Fund may be invested in such other securities, including bonds, preferred stocks and common stocks, as the Board of Regents of the University of Texas may deem to be proper investment for said fund; provided, however, that not more than fifty per cent (50%) of the said fund shall be invested at any given time in stocks, nor shall more than one per cent (1%) of the said fund be invested in securities issued by any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase; and provided that bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors. This amendment shall be self-enacting."  
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:  
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution"; and  
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution."  
Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such Amendment shall be paid out of the proper appropriation made by law.

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8**  
proposing an Amendment to Section 45-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts so as to provide that the Legislature may authorize an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Section 45-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:  
"Sec. 45-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."  
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following:  
"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts"; and  
"AGAINST the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."  
Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.  
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

### 18 Year Olds Not Registering

AUSTIN, Texas, Aug. 18—The number of 18-year-old Texans failing to register under the federal draft law is increasing, Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, said here today.

State draft headquarters records indicate that registration has been falling off since the end of March. General Wakefield estimated that 2,000 to 2,500 18-year-olds currently are unregistered.

"We've been watching this situation closely since late spring with the hope that the trend would stop," the state draft director said. "We've asked the local draft boards to act under a provision of the regulations whereby a letter will be sent to men in their communities suspected of being delinquent under the law."

General Wakefield reminded male subjects to registration of penalties if convicted of failure to comply with the law. He quoted from a section of the law providing maximum penalties of fine up to \$10,000 and imprisonment up to five years.

Under the draft act, all 18-year-old males are required to register with the nearest draft board on their 18th birthday or within five days thereafter.

"It's up to local boards whether or not they want to turn any man over to federal district attorneys for prosecution," the state Selective Service director said. "Our board members are patient, considerate men, and usually give a man better than a fair chance, if he's willing to co-operate."

"If the registration record doesn't improve within the next two or three months, we're going to advise the boards to be a little tougher than in the past. After all, the man who doesn't register on time isn't pulling his share of the load our people are carrying. He isn't being fair to the man who does register on time."

"A man is dealing fairly with his neighbors if he obeys the law just as they do. We hope parents and public spirited citizens will

keep 18-year-old men reminded of their responsibility under the law," General Wakefield concluded.

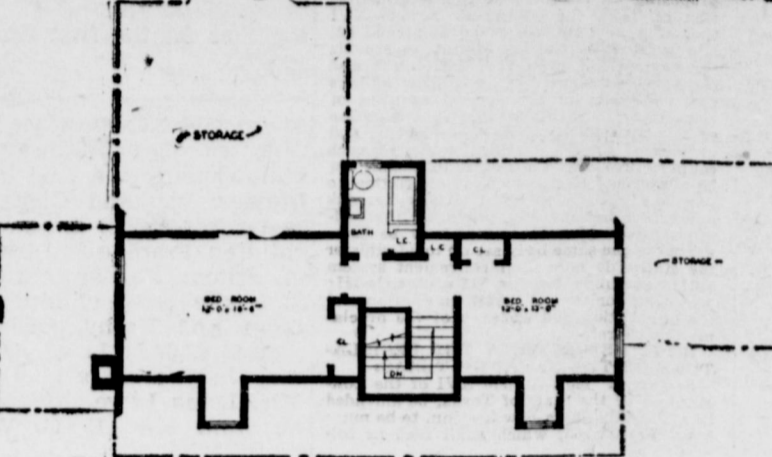

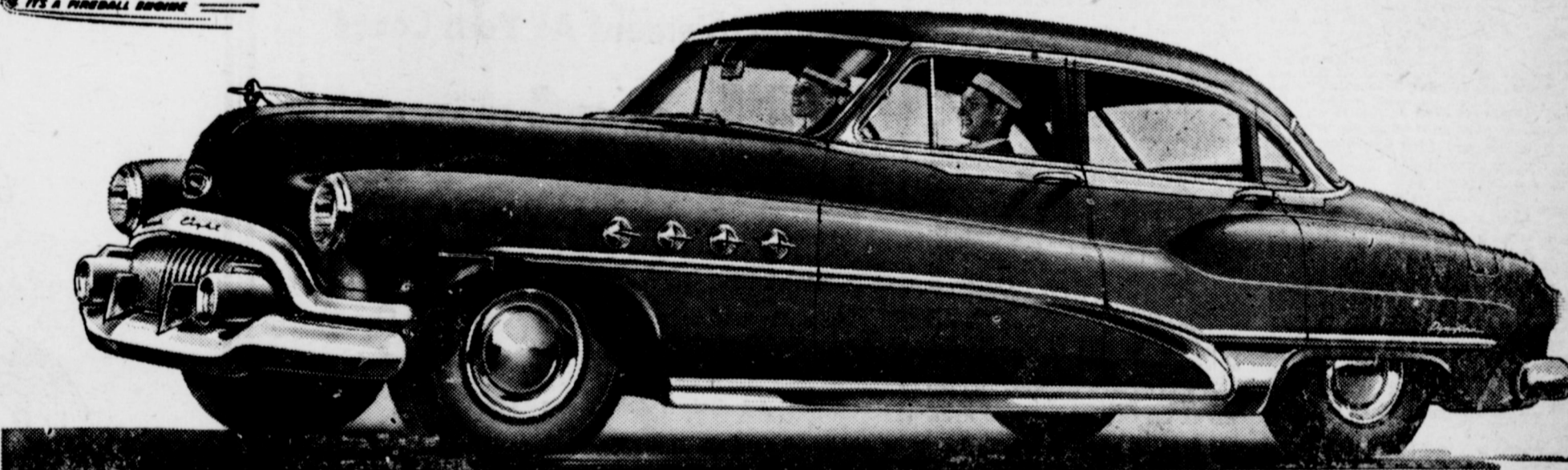

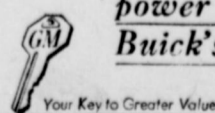

There will be no dollar quotas, Mr. Adams said in a letter to Jesse M. Osborne, Defense Bond chairman for Bailey County.

"Instead, Treasury Secretary John W. Snyder has asked us to sell as many Defense Bonds as possible, to back up our armed forces and to help resist the pressure of inflation," Mr. Adams said. He urged the local chairman, however, to set for the county a goal "high enough to be a challenge to you and your committee."

"The people want a part in the nation's defense effort," he said. "Right now the most practical way for them to help is for them to buy U. S. Defense Bonds."

Mr. Adams said that volunteers are being organized in every community of the state to conduct intensive campaigns during the drive, which is the first since outbreak of the Korean war more than a year ago. Emphasis will be placed on increasing sales through the payroll savings plan, which permits employees to buy bonds by having deductions made from wages or salaries, and the Bond - A - Month Plan, through which bank customers can buy bonds automatically.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 12** proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new section to be numbered 49, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to administer the said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51 of Article III, providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation thereon.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 49. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county; provided further that the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein.

**Section 49.** The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county; provided further that the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein.

**Section 2.** The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."

Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed Amendment.

**Section 3.** The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed Amendment published and distributed to the qualified voters of this State.

**Section 4.** If at said election, a majority of the voters favor the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees, the foregoing proposed Amendment shall become Section 49 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, and the proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereon.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6** proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Article III, Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the authority to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to residents of the State of Texas who are needy persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) limitation upon expenditures for such purposes; and providing for a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) upon such expenditures; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; prohibiting payment of assistance after disposition of property under certain conditions; providing for acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States of America for such assistance; providing that the payment of such from State funds shall never exceed the payments from Federal funds; providing for the necessary election, and providing for the form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same be hereby amended so that the same shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other conditions, restrictions, and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

(1) Needy aged persons who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate is confined in such institution; provided that any person who is a resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years continuously immediately preceding the filing of such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not exceed Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month.

"Any applicant for or recipient of assistance, including the spouse in each instance, who shall dispose of any property within one (1) year after the date of application for assistance after June 1, 1957, who has disposed of any property within one (1) year prior to the date of application, shall be ineligible to receive assistance; provided, that if such property was disposed of for value commensurate with the actual market value thereof, such disposition shall not affect eligibility for assistance; and for value commensurate with the actual market value thereof, such disposition shall not affect eligibility for assistance; and if it is shown that all proceeds from such sale have been used by such person and spouse for normal living expenses, or for the purchase of other real property of the value, if any recipient of assistance or spouse shall retain any real property, neither such recipient nor spouse shall thereafter receive assistance until all net proceeds of said sale have been expended for normal living expenses; and in case of disposition of such property by gifts or for an amount less than its actual market value, such person and spouse shall not thereafter receive assistance until the expiration of the period of time during which the net proceeds of said sale would have paid their normal living expenses had the actual market value been realized therefrom.

(2) Needy blind persons who are over the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate is confined in such institution; provided that any person who is a resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years continuously immediately preceding the filing of such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not exceed Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State of Texas on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

"FOR the amendments to the Constitution giving the Legislature power to set up a system of payments of assistance to needy persons over sixty-five (65) years of age; to needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) limitation upon amount of State expenditures for such purposes; disqualifying persons who dispose of property under certain conditions; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; providing for the acceptance and expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; providing that expenditures from State funds shall not exceed the expenditure from Federal Funds with respect to any individual; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to be eligible to receive assistance; and providing a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year on State Fund expenditures for such purpose each year."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published and distributed as required by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas.
