Sales tax receipts down

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander delivered a total of \$172.8 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,095 Texas cities and 118 counties, a 5.8 percent increase over the \$163.3 million allocated to cities and counties in March 1998 and 7.4 percent increase for the first three months of 1999, compared to the first three months of 1998.

"Texas' economic growth continues and consumer confidence remains extremely high," Rylander said. "Retail sales in many communities are above the levels of one year ago."

Rylander delivered monthly sales tax rebates totaling \$159.4 million to Texas cities, 7.8 percent higher than last March's payments of \$147.8 million. However, rebates of \$13.4 million to Texas counties were 13.3 percent lower than allocations of \$15.5 million in March 1998. Another \$5 million went to 38 special purpose districts around the state.

Haskell County had a 20.26 percent decrease for March, 1999 of \$19,486.61 in comparison to \$24,438.47 for March, 1998. 1999 payments to date of \$87,745.14 reflect a 6.49 percent decrease over 1998 payments to date of \$93,836.84.

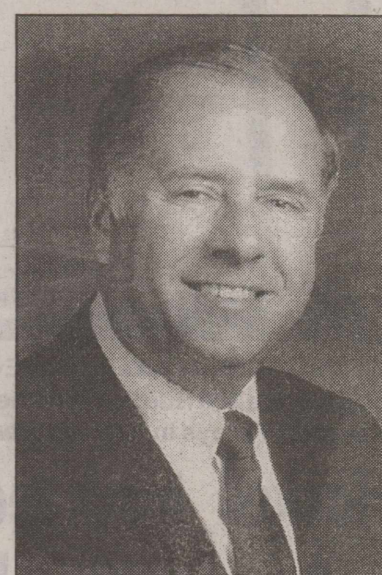
The City of Haskell had a 20.58 percent decrease for March, 1999 of \$18,312.09 in comparison to \$23,059.05 for March, 1998. 1999 payments to date of \$81,564.15 reflect a 6.14 percent decrease over 1998 payments to date of \$86,906.79.

O'Brien had a 5.48 percent decrease for March, 1999 of \$36.54 in comparison to \$38.66 for March, 1998. 1999 payments to date of \$264.87 reflect a 47.32 percent decrease over 1998 payments to date of \$502.88.

Rochester had a 12.42 percent increase for March, 1999 of \$431.48 in comparison to \$383.79 for March, 1998. 1999 payments to date of \$1,717.92 reflect a 5.62 percent decrease over 1998 payments to date of \$1,820.32.

Rule had a 27.42 percent decrease for March, 1999 of \$672.76 in comparison to \$926.97 for March, 1998. 1999 payments to date of \$3,584.40 reflect a 14.94 percent decrease over 1998 payments to date of \$4,214.14.

Weinert had a 12.46 percent increase for March, 1999 of \$33.74 in comparison to \$30.00 for March, 1998. 1999 payments to date of \$613.80 reflect a 56.29 percent increase over 1998 payments to date of \$392.71.

Hundley to speak at banquet

Charles H. Hundley, 57, now in his twenty-sixth year as a superintendent of schools in Texas, will be the speaker at the third annual Haskell CISD Educational Foundation Banquet, Sat., Mar. 27.

Recently named Superintendent of the Year by the Association of Texas Professional Educators, Hundley has been superintendent of schools in Abilene for the past eleven years. At age thirty-one Hundley was the youngest superintendent of schools in Texas. In 1996 and 1998 he completed the Superintendent's Leadership Academy at both Harvard and Columbia Universities.

He holds a bachelor's degree from Baylor University and a master's degree from Southwest Texas State University. After doing graduate work at the American University in Cairo, Egypt, he was designated a Fulbright Scholar. He holds two honorary degrees: Doctor of Laws from Abilene Christian University and Doctor of Humanities from Hardin-Simmons University.

While serving in the United States Air Force, he attained the rank of Captain.

With teaching being his major interest, Hundley has taught history at both the high school and university levels. He currently teaches history at Abilene Christian University and a Bible class at the First Baptist Church of Abilene.

He and his wife, Patty Hundley, a high school English teacher, have one son, Howell, a graduate of Baylor University.

An entertaining, educational and motivational speaker, Hundley has traveled extensively in the United States and around the world, including trips to China, India, Russia, Israel, and Central America.

With the theme of "Teachers-Planting Seeds of Knowledge," the banquet to benefit the scholarship and grants program of the Haskell CISD Educational Foundation will be held at the Memorial Civic Center. During a recent house fire, the Martin's home suffered extensive damage to the kitchen and utility area.

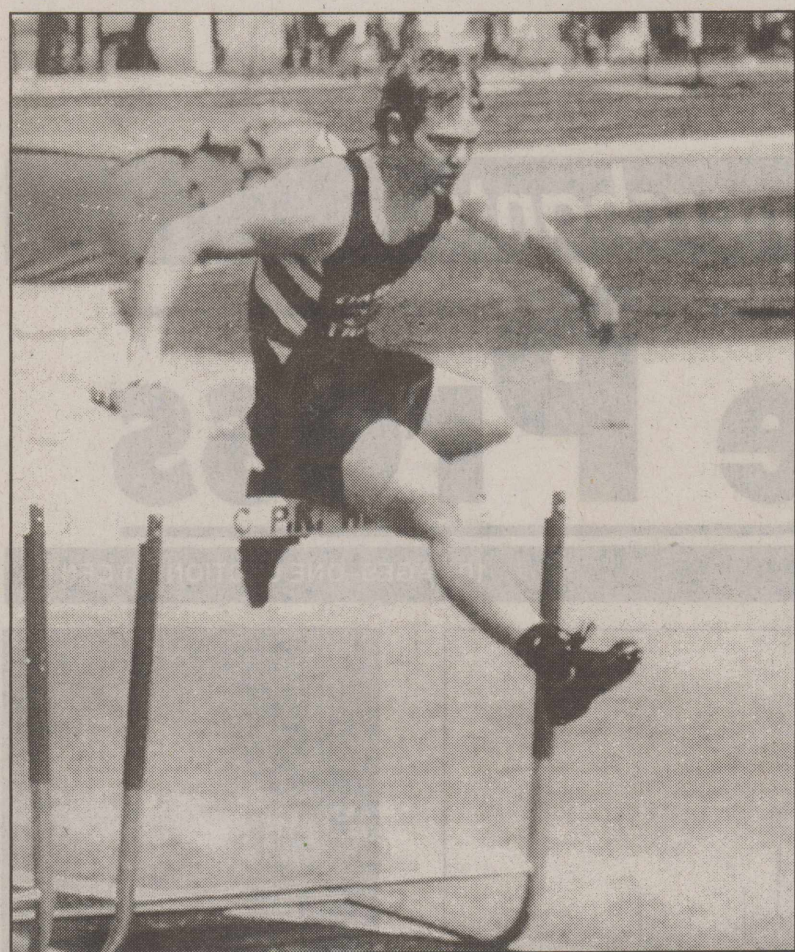

Dr. Tom Hairgrove attends seminar

Dr. Thomas Hairgrove is one of a distinguished group of veterinarians participating in the Beef Cattle Production Management Series held at the University of Nebraska Great Plains Veterinary Educational Center (GPVEC). This certification program provides in-depth training in areas related to beef cattle production, management and economic strategies. The approach is unique to continuing education for beef cattle practitioners because it combines a multi-disciplinary strategy, continuity between modules and an interactive format with skills assessment. The year long program consists of 21 days and evenings of course work and an extensive amount of continual self study.

The veterinarians are learning to actively integrate advanced technology with production management and agri-business concepts. Preventive health and proficiency in the use of the latest

computer technology are stressed. Participants work with their clients using actual production information in making decisions involving specific herd situations and interaction with key industry specialists, prominent scientists and educators, are integral components of the training.

Through this program the GPVEC is assisting veterinarians to develop a beneficial partnership with their clients and become a greater knowledge resource by working closely with allied professionals. Critical thinking, life-long learning and problem solving using management information systems are the goals of the program. The series has been coordinated by faculty from the University of Nebraska, Kansas State University, South Dakota State University and West Texas A&M University.

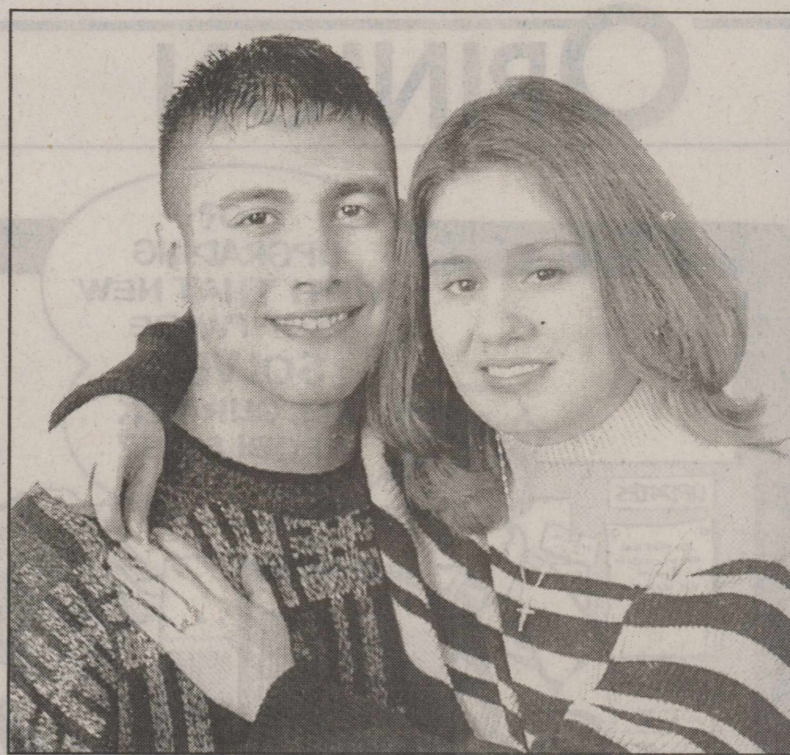
Drinnon started her presentation with a bio of her father, who is a native of Springfield, Ill. He studied at the Saint Louis School of Fine Art, American Academy of Art in Chicago and the Art Students League in New York City. His love of the west led to a

job as an illustrator. In 1963, Norman Rockwell recommended him to illustrate Brown and Bigelow's annual western calendar. "Sharing an Apple", "Split Decision" and "Sixty Years in the Saddle" are among his most famous prints.

In 1963, Ryan was invited to visit the Four 6's Ranch, where he found abundant material for his western paintings. His work is featured at the National Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City and at leading galleries and museums throughout the Southwest. He lives in Midland and is a member of the Cowboy Artists of America and the National Academy of Western Art. Among many awards, he received the Lifetime Achievement Award from the National Cowboy Hall of Fame and Western Heritage Center in 1996.

In August 1998, Ryan, his two sons and daughter, Kitsie, opened the Adobe House Gallery in Haskell, where they wholesale and ship prints to galleries in several states. They also sell prints, tiles and greeting cards from the Ryan collection, along with Wayne Baise prints, Bryan Asher prints, Ellis Barrier barbed wire art and Ben Henniger cowboy sculpture and metal art.

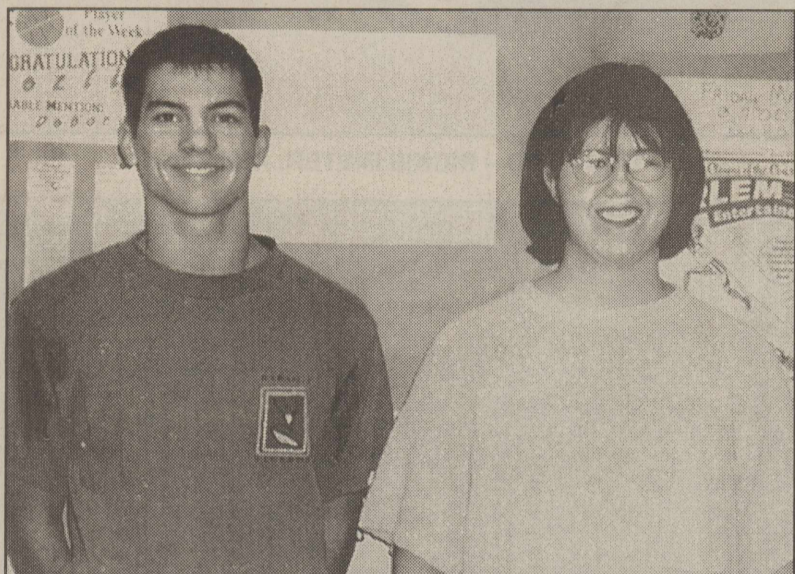

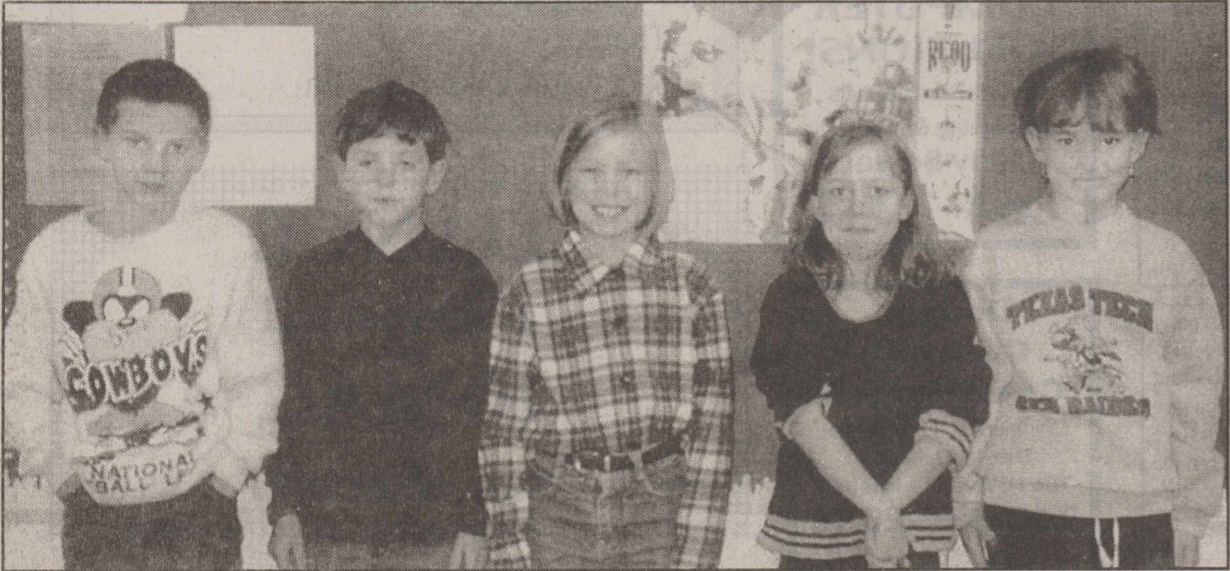

Rain showers not enough to provide relief from fire danger

Texas Forest Service officials warn area residents not to develop a false sense of security because some rainfall has been received from the passing front. The rain showers have generally not been enough to provide long term relief from fire danger, particularly if very windy weather follows as forecast. In fact, agency fire control leaders note that the scattered showers may actually contribute to an increase in fires as a result of carelessness, due to the false sense of security that these showers may create.

Rains that occur while vegetation is dormant generally do little to lower fire danger over an

extended period of time, says Les Rogers, regional fire coordinator with the Texas Forest Service in Canyon. He noted that fire danger will quickly jump back to high levels if dry, windy weather follows closely behind the rains.

"Some people will think that because it has rained, they don't have to worry about wildfires any more," said Rogers. "If this false sense of security leads to an attitude of carelessness, a spurt in accidental wildfires may result."

Fire dangers will be lowered while precipitation is falling, but dormant vegetation has to get its moisture from the air, Rogers said. If very dry, windy weather

immediately follows rain, the dead vegetation will dry quickly and may become fire-prone once again in only a matter of hours.

"Rains bring an immediate, short-term reduction in fire danger and eventually, as subfreezing temperatures end, a longer term reduction in danger with the growth of new, green vegetation," said Rogers. "In the interim between rain and the growth of new vegetation, though, fire danger can be expected to rise quickly in areas where dormant fuels are present."

Continued attention to outdoor fire safety practices will be needed if senseless wildfires are to be avoided, Rogers declared.

Sailplane contest set this weekend

The Texas Chiefs Model Airplane Club will host a Radio Controlled Sailplane Contest at the Haskell Model Airport Sat. and Sun., March 27 and 28. Entries have been received from Amarillo, Dallas and Odessa. Dwayne Landreth will be the contest director for the event.

Each day will be a separate

contest but overall winners will receive prizes as well. The contest will be divided into an Expert Class and a Sportsman Class for those who are just getting started or have never placed in previous contests.

The events will be thermal duration with a spot landing at the conclusion of each flight. Models

may be launched by either a rubber high start or an electric winch, which will put the models up about 300 feet and then it is up to the pilot to find thermal air (rising air) to enable the model to remain aloft for the designated time.

Spectators are invited to attend the contest.
