

AUSTIN — At least 44,000 hospitalized Americans die each year because of medical errors, according to a report released last week by the National Academy of Sciences' Institute of Medicine.

But the report does not cite how many accidental deaths of patients were recorded in Texas or any other state, for that matter.

Neither the Texas Department of Health nor the Texas Board of Medical Examiners keeps track of deaths attributed to "medical errors" that could include misdiagnosis or misprescribed drugs.

Texas health officials reacted to the report, however, saying physician- and facility-licensing procedures help to ensure patient safety.

"Our system has worked well, and physicians that don't meet our requirements are disciplined," Dr. Bruce Levy, executive director of the Texas State Board of Medical Examiners, told *The Dallas Morning News*.

"If a medical provider represents an imminent threat to the public, we can suspend their state license, and we now do that about a dozen times a year," Levy said.

In Texas, physicians do not have to be re-examined once they are licensed, but they must take at least 24 hours of continuing medical education each year.

More than 900 Texas physicians have been disciplined in the last six years for violating state rules and requirements.

Disciplinary actions ranged from license revocations and suspensions to public reprimands and fines, Levy told *The News*.

Ninety-nine physicians have been disciplined for malpractice or other infractions in 1999, including nine who lost their licenses to practice in Texas.

Licenses of 43 doctors have been suspended and 18 doctors have had restrictions put on their licenses, Levy said.

Texas hospitals are required to report any abuse, neglect or exploitation of patients to the Department of Health, said Nance Stearman, director of the Health Facility Licensing and Compliance Division at the Texas Department of Health.

TNRCC Sends Y2K Alerts

Failure to prepare for the year 2000 computer bug will not be accepted as an excuse if violations of state environmental regulations occur.

The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission has

sent a series of "Y2K" alert letters to companies that must comply with state environmental regulations.

"It is important that you understand that the failure of any aspect of your operation as a result of Y2K problems that cause noncompliance with TNRCC rules will not be considered an 'act of God,' "cautioned TNRCC Executive Director Jeff Saitas in an Oct. 26 letter.

"Consequently, any such failures will be subject to normal enforcement procedures."

Since August 1998, three letters have been sent to alert the regulated community of its Y2K responsibilities.

The most recent letter, mailed Nov. 19, was sent to about 900 small chemical companies and allied products companies that have less than 50 employees.

#### Other Highlights


General John Cornyn became the first Texas attorney general in 23 years to argue a case before the U.S. Supreme Court. Cornyn spent four months preparing for his 20 minutes before the Court, during which he defended a Texas sexcrimes law being challenged by a convicted child molester in Carmell vs. Texas. A ruling is expected next spring.

The unclaimed property list published by the Texas Comptroller in October soon will reunite 23,142 people with \$63.6 million in forgotten cash and other valuables. Claims are being processed as quickly as possible, Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander announced last week.

■ Texas Parks and Wildlife is accepting applications until Dec. 16 for a game warden class scheduled to start in July 2000. Applications can be obtained by calling 1-800-792-1112. More than 400 people applied for 25 positions in the previous class, which graduates Jan. 17.

Texas was one of 12 states honored for progress toward meeting national education goals created and endorsed by President George Bush and the nation's governors in 1989-90. Texas drew special accolades for its progress on student achievement. Texas Commissioner of Education Jim Nelson accepted the award from the National Education Goals Panel at a Dec. 1 ceremony in Washington, D.C.

## From The Inside Out

"Over in David's Royal City stood a lowly cattle shed, where a mother laid her baby in a manager for his head."

The Biblical account of the birth of Jesus is the greatest story ever told. We know it is true and we never tire of hearing it retold, again and again.

The tremendous meaning embodied in the event has evoked stories about it for nearly two thousand years.

In the songs and stories told through the years, we have always associated animals with the Bible story of the birth of God's Son in a stable in Bethlehem. Many legends have been handed down about these unknowing witnesses to this greatest event in history.

Among the legends that various writers and dreamers have imagined about the animals in the story are several sent from the Fontanini family about each piece of the nativity figures sent to the First Baptist Church in Haskell. Being a dreamer myself and having especially loved the sweet little donkey included in the scene set up at the church, I enjoyed his little story. It seems to say something that we might all need to stop and think about occasionally in our relationships with one another and the lesser creatures.

The Donkey
Two thousand years ago in the city of Bethlehem, a little donkey

was born. He looked just like other donkeys. Long brown ears, sincere chocolate eyes and a sway back. But that's where resemblances ended. You see, this donkey was born with a vision of the future that included a brotherhood of man and animals.

Because philosophy was an activity that was supposed to be reserved for man, this donkey had a difficult time of it. To his masters, it appeared that the donkey didn't want to work. But in reality, he would simply stop to ponder an unkind word or deed and to wonder why people and animals didn't treat each other with love and respect.

Most donkeys don't concern themselves with such matters, so it wasn't long before other animals were anxious to avoid him (as were a series of owners). He was puzzled. # Ask the AG

## Don't drink and drive

Q: I had heard that the state lowered the level for drunk driving offenses. Can you give me some information?

A: With all of the parties that occur during the holiday season, the number of alcohol-related traffic deaths increases dramatically.

In 1997, Texas led all other states in the number of alcohol-related traffic fatalities. These deaths accounted for about half of all traffic fatalities in Texas, well above the national average of 39 percent.

About a fourth of alcohol-related deaths in Texas involved blood alcohol levels of less than .10, the previous standard for legal intoxication.

As a person's blood alcohol concentration (BAC) increases, his or her abilities are impaired. Many tests report that the vast majority of drivers exhibit impairment of critical driving tasks with a BAC of .08. This impairment can result in problems with attention, reaction time, speed control, etc., substantially increasing the risk of a crash.

During this year's legislative session, lawmakers passed a bill that changes the definition of legal intoxication to a BAC of .08 or more.

The law defines "intoxicated" as not having the normal use of physical or mental faculties as a result of alcohol, a controlled substance, a dangerous drug or a combination of these substances.

It is hoped that a lower BAC level will serve as a deterrent for those who might consider driving after drinking. In addition, the lower BAC standard will result in more drivers being eligible for Driving While Intoxicated charges.

Currently, approximately 16 states have .08 BAC laws. Several of those states saw significant decreases in the number of alcohol-related fatalities after adopting the lower BAC standards.

A first-time offense of driving while intoxicated is a Class C misdemeanor with a minimum sentence of 72 hours in jail. If the driver is found to be intoxicated AND has an open container of alcohol in the car, the minimum sentence in increased to six days.

A second-time offense is a Class A misdemeanor and carried a minimum 30-day sentence. A third Driving While Intoxicated conviction results in a third degree felony charge. Keep in mind that these sentences are only for driving while intoxicated. They do not address any additional charges that may result if an intoxicated driver injures or kills someone.

In addition to safety reasons for adopting the lower standard, Texas now qualifies for additional National Highway Safety Administration grant money which can be used for highway safety or construction projects.

Regardless of what the law classifies as legally impaired, no one should ever drive a car after drinking. No one should ever ride in a car with a driver who has been drinking or allow someone who is impaired to drive. Get the keys and call a cab or have a designated driver.

Many cities offer free cab rides for drivers who have had too much to drink, and many bars and restaurants offer free sodas for designated drivers.

Let's have a safe and happy holiday season.

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

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

#### PUBLIC NOTICE OF APPLICATION TO INCREASE RATES

Pursuant to Tex. Utilities Code § 104.103 (1999), TXU Lone Star Pipeline, a Division of TXU Gas Company ("Applicant") hereby gives notice of intent to change the city gate rate of TXU Lone Star Pipeline (formerly known as "Lone Star Pipeline Company") established by Order of the Railroad Commission of Texas in Gas Utilities Docket No. 8664 ("GUD 8664").

Applicant proposes a two-part transportation rate that consists of a demand charge per MMBtu based upon the contractual demand for city gate service and a volumetric charge per MMBtu based on actual delivered volumes. This transportation rate would result in a revenue increase to Applicant. Applicant also proposes to increase the storage rate applicable to city gate deliveries established in GUD 8664. The storage rate would consist of a monthly demand charge for capacity and a monthly demand charge for deliverability. The deliverability demand charge would only be charged during the months of November through March.

The proposed effective date of the change is December 20, 1999. The change is a major change, and will result in an increase in annual revenues of approximately \$20.3 million or sixteen percent (16%). The change will affect 1.3 million residential and commercial customers. The rate change will affect transportation and storage rates at the city gate for TXU Lone Star Gas-Transmission, who in turn sells the gas to TXU Lone Star Gas which serves 1.3 million residential and commercial customers in Texas under the rates established by the local regulatory authorities in municipalities and the Railroad Commission in environs areas.

A Statement of Intent to make such a change has been filed with the Railroad Commission of Texas in GUD 8976 and is available for inspection at the Commission's office at 1701 North Congress in Austin, Texas, and at the offices of Applicant at 301 South Harwood in Dallas, Texas. Copies of the Statement of Intent have also been sent to the appropriate city official of each incorporated city served by TXU Lone Star Gas. Any affected person may file in writing comments or a protest concerning the proposed change in the rates with the Docket Services Section of the Office of General Counsel, Railroad Commission of Texas, P.O. Box 12967, Austin, Texas 78711-2967, at any time on or before 4:00 p.m., Thursday, December 30, 1999. Any person or agency who has a justiciable or administratively cognizable interest who desires to be designated as a party may petition for leave to intervene and request to become a party to this proceeding. The final date for intervention in this case shall be 4:00 p.m., Thursday, December 30, 1999.





# First Baptist Church nativity scene is more than just a work of art

"It is true that any beautiful thing raises the pure and just desires of men from earth to God, the fount of all," wrote the artist Michelangelo.

Alexander Pope wrote of "waking the soul by tender strokes of art."

During this Christmas season there is a nativity scene assembled in the foyer of the First Baptist Church of Haskell that is indeed just such a work of art. Depicting the most beautiful story ever told in the history of the world and set up in the humble surrounding of hay and stable, each piece of the nativity scene is an exquisite piece of art within itself.

It all began with an idea in the mind of one woman; the late Eunice Helwig.

Serving on the Flower Committee for many years, Eunice dreamed of having a beautiful nativity scene from the Fontanini Collection for her church. However, the cost was prohibitive, (\$800.00 to \$14,000.00 per piece). But for something or someone we love, the cost is never too dear. She never forgot her dream.

After her death, her husband Odell Helwig and their daughters, Susie Hommach, Beverly Powers and Kay Shaw gave the first three pieces, Mary, Joseph and the Baby Jesus, as a memorial to her. Two years later, after the death of their father Odell, the Helwig children added two wise men in his memory. Since that first Christmas in 1995, other pieces have been added through generous memorials given by others to the Flower Committee. Today, there are seven 27 inch tall human figures and a heralding angel, a donkey, two sheep, one large camel and a 48 X 26 inch stable included.

Each year during Christmas they are set up in display by the Flower Committee members, long-time chairman Golda Colbert, Evelyn

Cobb, Shirley Mickler and Sharon Lusk, who do a beautiful job of decorating the church for each changing season.

Bought through the World Trade Center in Dallas, the Fontanini Collection is made in Tuscany, Italy. Sculpted by Elio Simonetti for the Fontanini family, the figures are formed of polymer and resin and are meticulously hand painted by artisans. On close examination the details of workmanship can be seen, even to the veins in Joseph's feet and the intricate fluid folds of the clothing.

As it "wakes the soul by tender strokes of art," this beautiful artistic gift assemblage at the First Baptist Church again tells the old, old story as it brings to our mind the scene of the most beautiful artistry of our Creator; the gift of His Son.



Griffith is a graduate of Paint Creek High School and Texas A & M University. He was a paratrooper in the Army, and also served in the Texas National Guard.

This is not Griffith's first time to seek elected office: previously he has served on the Paint Creek school board and on the Haskell Memorial Hospital Board. Currently he is a Haskell National Bank director and a member of the board of the Natural Resources and Conservation District.

Griffith and his wife of 38 years, Earlene, are members of the First Baptist Church where Dan teaches Sunday school. Earlene is a second grade teacher at Haskell. The Griffiths have three grown children, Kimberly, Danny and Andy, and seven grandchildren.

Griffith said he planned to campaign the old-fashioned way – shoe leather and sweat.
