There will be two ballot boxes t the old Community House in Muleshoe. One box will receive ballots of voters who live in the city of Muleshoe. The other will receive the ballots cast by voters living outside the city limits.

Other polling places will be lo-cated at Old Enochs Gin Co. office at Enochs, at Three Way School and at Old West Camp

To determine whether one is entitled to vote he should refer to a complete description of the boundaries of the proposed district at the voting place.

Voting will be done in all of four and parts of 17 counties. The district may consist of all or any part of that territory, depending upon the number of voting districts that return a majority in favor of creation of the district.

Only parts of the 17 counties lie within the District because its boundaries must be the same as those of the underground watsame boundaries as in general

elections. Only those voting districts which return a majority in favor of creation of the District will be parts of it. A city or the porin or out of the District because of the local option method of holding the election.

The movement for creation of a political subdivision for conservation of irrigation water has been led by Plains farmers. They organized as the High Plains Water Conservation and Users Association to combat persistent attempts to establish state control of underground water.

A trend toward Federal control of this water has gained much momentum, these farmers point out. They cite this as another reason why this step should be taken to fix management of conservation at the local level. Voters will decide Saturday

whether the Board of Directors shall be given authority to levy a tax not to exceed five cents per \$100. Temporary directors of the district, all of whom are irrigation farmers, have stated that a tax of but 21/2 to 3 cents per \$100 will be sufficient.


Dear Mr. Smith:

Deltapine Gives Highest Yield In Lubbock Variety Tests

highest average yield in the dry land cotton varitey tests conducted at the Lubbock Experiment Station during the four years 1947-50, reported L. L. Ray, station agronomist.

An average yield of 313 pounds of lint per acre was obtained from Deltapine (TPSA), followed by 288 pounds from Paymaster 54

and 286 pounds from Stoneville

(TPSA). Other varieties in the dryland tests, in order of average yields were Stormproof, No. 1, C. A. 89A (storm resistant), Northern Star Stormmaster (storm resistant) i-Bred, Macha Early (storm (storm resistant), Western Pro lific. Rogers' Texacala. Deltapine (TPSA) also pro duced the highest average yield in the irrigated variety tests, with pounds of lint per acre for the four-year period. C. A. 89A. Paymaster 54, Hi-Bred, Stoneville (TPSA) and Stormproof No 1 all produced yields of over 500 pounds of lint per acre.

Other varieties in the irrigated tests, in order of average yields C. A. 122, Stormmaster, Early Foster, Macha Early, Lockett 140, Northern Star, Western Prolific, Rogers' Texacala, Floyd's Mebane 8G and Rowden (TPSA).

These results are given in Pro gress Report, 1381, which is available from the Publications Office, College Station, Texas.

This report also gives detailed information on the 1950 irrigated and dryland variety tests at Lubbock, including number of bolls per pound, percent of crop open at first harvest, percent of lint to snapped cotton and staple



This date has been established because of the wind erosion hazard and the farmer would no have time to get a good cover crop established later than this

Then October 15 is the dead line for seeding Austrian Winter Peas and Hairy Vetch to qualify for payment under the ACP, also is the final date for seeding permanent pastures. Prior written approval has to be secured for these practices for ACP assis-

Cookie making begins in earn est about this time of the year in homes where youngsters make a bee-line for the cookie jar on returning from school. The cookiedough that used to be kept in the refrigerator, ready for hurryup baking when the after-school supply ran low, now often is put in home freezers.

Either the dough or the baked cookies may be frozen successfully if properly packed, but the dough is easier to wrap and takes

ess space in the freezer. Baked cookies require careful packing to avoid being broken when foods are moved around in the freezer. Though cookies or cookie dough may be kept well for six months o a year in the freezer, it is best not to keep them more than three months' storage for freshest flav-

This is the recipe for "freezer"

Ingredients for 6 dozen cookies: 34 cups sifted all-purpose flour; teaspoon soda; 1 teaspoon salt; 1 cup shortening; 1/2 cur granulated sugar; ½ cup brown sugar; 2 eggs; 1½ teaspoon van-

To make: Sift flour, soda and salt together. Cream shortening, add sugars gradually, and cream thoroughly. Add eggs, one at a time, beating thoroughly. Add vanilla and mix well. Stir in dry ingredients. Shape dough in rolls inches in diameter.

To freeze before baking, wrap rolls of dough closely in moisture vapor resistant wrapping, seal with pressure tape, and freeze. Before baking, thaw slightly in the refrigerator and slice. Bake on an ungreased baking sheet in a hot oven (400 F.) for 8 to 10

To freeze after baking, chil dough until firm. Slice and bake on ungreased baking sheet in a hot oven (400 F.) for 6 to 8 minutes. Cool. Package in moisture vapor resisting container and seal. Freeze immediately. Before serving, thaw cookies at room temperature before unwrapping.

Grain Stubble Deadline Set For October 1

October 1 has been established as the final date for producers in Bailey County to make applications for approval for leaving a 10 inch stubble of Grain Sorghum until January 1, 1952.

October 1 has also been set as the final date to make application for approval to Bench Level Land for irrigation. All earth work started on leveling land on which approval has been granted must be completed by November but remember you must get your approval before you start he work in order to be eligible for payment.

October 15 has been establishng approval to seed irrigation pasture grasses, and Winter Legumes such as Hairy Vetch and Austrian Winter Peas. Be sure to get your approval before you seed

If you have not already reported the acreage of the various crops and other information in regard to your 1951 farming operations you should call by the local PMA Office at your earliest convenience and do so that we may be in better position to pro tect the history of your farm should we have acreage allot ments in the near future.
