During every young person's growing up years it is probable that they will experience a really good teacher who stands out in their mind, and some of them may be fortunate enough to have a dedicated teacher who becomes a mentor and positive role model for them for the rest of their life.

Haskell native and former Haskell High School Coach, Ray Overton, during a career spanning fifty-two years in the Texas public school system, has become all of those things to countless young people across the state. Teaching, coaching and serving, Overton has won their respect and admiration. To them he was truly a hero.

Born in 1924, Overton started his coaching career in 1947 in the home territory of Paint Creek High School. After one year there he moved on to Haskell High School

were too important to him to want to be away from in carrying out such added responsibilities as college recruiting, he said. For him, coaching at the high school level was an important and rewarding position in which he could help form young people into responsible adults.

Returning to Paint Creek, Gene and Mabel began a farming/ranching operation and were deeply involved in community activities. He

represented Paint Creek on the California Creek Soil and Water Conservation Board and was selected Conservationist of the Year by the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce and Lions Club International. He served on the boards of the Federal Home Administration, Haskell Hospital, Stamford Electric Co-Op, Paint Creek School, and the Farmer's Co-Op Gin. He served as Scoutmaster of Troop 48 in Paint Creek for 20 years and received the Silver Beaver Award which is the highest award presented by a Council to a volunteer. He was a Mason and a member of the Eastern Star, and was presented his 50 year pin from both organiza-

He taught the Adult Sunday School Class at Paint Creek United Methodist Church for over 50 years. In later years, he was well known for spending many afternoons at a domino table.

Water Smart 2000 Begins With reservoir levels at all-time ows, the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission last veek launched a statewide water nanagement plan dubbed "Water Smart 2000."

Passed into law as Senate Bill in 1997, the plan features a comrehensive campaign to educate consumers about efficient water use and stave off water outages.

Co-author of SB 1, Sen. J.E. "Buster" Brown of Lake Jackson, released a proclamation from Gov. George W. Bush urging all Texans to be "Water Smart" by repairing water leaks and limiting water us age in homes and yards.

A media campaign in English and Spanish will promote Water Smart 2000 in the coming months. **Bush Pardons Tyler Man**

Gov. George W. Bush on June 1 accepted the recommendation of the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles and issued a pardon for A.B. Butler of Tyler.

Butler was serving concurrent 99-year sentences for the abduction and rape of a Tyler woman in 1983. He was released on bond several weeks ago by the trial court judge pending the outcome of his pardon request.

Bush made the decision after prosecution and defense attorneys, the trial court judge and the Texas

Course to Educate Hunters Texas Parks and Wildlife will offer hunter education classes all summer long throughout the state.

All Texas hunters born on or after Sept. 2, 1971, must meet these requirements:

· Hunters age 17 and older must successfully complete a hunter education course.

• Hunters ages 12 through 16 must successfully complete a hunter education course or be accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 or older.

• Hunters under age 12 must be accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 or older.

The course is a 10-hour class that teaches hunting safety, skills and responsibility. Those who complete the course receive a certification card good for life and honored by all 50 states and 10 Canadian provinces. The card must be carried at all times while

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

The foliar spray or leaf spray treatment uses a mixture of 1/2 percent clopyralid herbicide plus 1/2 percent triclopyr herbicide plus 1/4 percent surfactant plus 1/4 to 1/2 percent dye and uses water as carrier. This mixture can be applied with small pumpup garden sprayers, backpack sprayers, cattle sprayers or sprayers mounted on 4 wheel ATVs. The recommended nozzle is a Conejet 550 X-8 capable of delivering a course spray. To apply the herbicide mixture, spray until all foliage glistens but not to the point of dripping. The optimum time to spray is in the spring after the soil temperature at a depth of 12 inches is a minimum of 75 degrees. This is about the time when the mesquite leaves change color from a light pea green to a uniform dark green. Do not spray when rains have stimulated light green new growth or when leaves are wet or when leaves show damage due to hail, insects or disease. Also, do not spray when you are upwind of desirable trees, shrubs or crops. Normally, mesquite trees greater than 8 feet in height cannot be effectively covered with the her-

bicide mixture. There are other treatments used in follow-up maintenance brush control programs, but these are the two most widely used for mesquite. The key to any successful brush management program is to practice proper grazing, a costly brush control program will be futile. A little management now will pay big dividends in the

For information on these and other follow-up maintenance treatments, contact the USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service office. Assistance is available on a variety of range management practices.

The American soldiers who died in our nation's wars were not forgotten in Haskell on Memorial Day, Monday, April 29.


Adjutant, Jim King.

Memorial Day has long been celebrated to commemorate and honor the dead of the Civil War, but was not proclaimed as an official day of remembrance and reflection until 1971. The custom of selling the red poppies was started after World War I to commemorate the dead of all wars.

The first poppies were silk and were made in France by war widows and orphans. In 1922, at the suggestion of American veterans, unemployed and disabled veterans in American Hospitals began to manufacture the flowers.

In 1924, the American Legion Auxiliary was given total responsibility for poppy production and distribution. The Poppy Program is now one of the oldest and most beneficial Auxiliary programs for veterans, and has kept alive the message of Col. John McCraes's famous little poem about the poppies blowing in Flanders Field.

This year in Haskell, Post #221 Finance Officer, Gene Plunkett raised \$109.50 by selling the poppies, mainly for the fund to support rehabilitation of veterans and the welfare of their families.
