

June sales tax report

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander recently sent Texas cities and counties \$199.3 million in monthly sales tax rebates. June payments to the 1,103 Texas cities and 119 counties that impose a sales tax are up 8.3 percent compared to the \$184 million rebated in June 1999. Year-to-date sales tax rebates are up 7.9 percent, compared to 1999.

Comptroller Rylander sent sales tax rebates totaling \$183.6 million to Texas cities, 8.3 percent higher than last June's payments of \$169.4 million. Rebates of \$15.6 million to Texas counties were up 7.4 percent compared to allocations of \$14.5 million in June 1999.

June sales tax rebates represent sales taxes collected in April and reported to the Comptroller in

Haskell County had a 6.61 percent decrease for June, 2000 of \$20,061.24 in comparison to \$21,482.94 for June, 1999. 2000 payments to date of \$159,532.21 reflect a 3.50 percent decrease over 1999 payments to date of \$165,332.71.

The City of Haskell had a 7.55 percent decrease for June, 2000 of \$18,832.20 in comparison to \$20,370.24 for June, 1999, 2000 payments to date of \$147,004.77 reflect a 4.04 percent decrease over 1999 payments to date of \$153,203.75.

O'Brien had a 66.12 percent decrease for June, 2000 of \$15.53 in comparison to \$45.85 for June, 2000 payments to date of \$552.58 reflect a 4.33 percent increase over 1999 payments to date of \$529.62.

Rochester had a 27.29 percent increase for June, 2000 of \$463.04 in comparison to \$363.74 for June, 1999. 2000 payments to date of \$3,638.93 reflect a 10.54 percent increase over 1999 payments to date of \$3,291.83.

Rule had a 0.51 percent decrease for June, 2000 of \$642.49 in comparison to \$645.84 for June,





AUSTIN - Ninety-eight percent of Texas' class of 2000 passed all sections of the mandatory Texas Assessment of Academic Skills before the end of the school year.

The 98-percent passing rate is a record for the exit-level test, Texas Commissioner of Education Jim Nelson said last week.

"I'm pleased to see that these seniors stuck with it and passed the exit-level TAAS," Nelson said. "I congratulate them on their success, and I thank them for giving us another reason that we can be proud of our educational system here in Texas."

Nelson also thanked teachers, administrators, parents and tutors who worked with students to pass the test and get a diploma.

The exit-level TAAS tests students in reading, writing and mathematics. Students begin taking the test in the spring of their sophomore year and have eight opportunities to pass it while they are still in school. Most students pass the exit-level exam in 10th grade, when it is first given.

There is no limit on the number of times students who do not for local prosecution costs.

From The Inside Out

By Mary Kaigler

Along with a recent letter from Dr. Frank Spencer, Professor of at New University Medical Center, whom we briefly profiled a few weeks ago, he sent a promised copy of the speech he made in May to a group of faculty, graduate students and students at North Texas State University, and also some notes on his growing up in Haskell County.

His presentation to North Texas State was indeed interesting as it outlined the impact of North Texas State on a 15-year-old boy from the farm in 1941.

With great credibility he spoke of the importance of early education, hard work, persistence despite failures, and the possible achievements which can scarcely be imagined.

Although his chosen paths in life have led a long way from his childhood home on the farm, he has never disclaimed nor forgotten the role it played in forming the man he has become. In his Manhattan office, hanging as a reminder, is a picture of an old, sturdy mesquite tree which stood about 100 yards from the country house in which he

In some of Dr. Spencer's notes he writes about his father, and some of the struggles his father faced. As we come to the celebration of Father's Day, his words become a timely tribute from a man to his

'My grandfather, whom I never knew, was a horse and buggy doctor in Eastern Texas near McKinney, Texas, a small hamlet termed Weston. He died from a complex illness when my father was in his late teens and had not quite completed one year of college.

"Family financial circumstances kept my father, the oldest son, from ever returning to college. It was a lifelong frustration of his not to have become a physician. He often commented about this. I imagine with his ill health, his repeated goal

this sensitivity was enhanced in later years as he had a severe bout of rheumatic fever at age 30 which injured both cardiac valves, the aortic and the mitral."

Dr. Spencer said his father commented that he was told by physicians, who represented the limited medical knowledge available, that little could be done, as it would be fatal within a few years and that he should avoid strenuous labor.

"This must have been devastating news to a young man near the advent of the depression years. With remarkable instinctive courage, my father simply ignored the advice, stating that he had a farm and two small children. To his credit, he worked regularly as best he could for many years, gradually becoming physically limited during my later years at home, so that it was necessary to hire someone to do the more strenuous work on the farm.

"However, he lived for 30 years and died from congestive heart failure when he was about 60 years

Dr. Spencer tells of how his father bought him a pony to ride to the Haskell County country school of Gilliam, rather than have to walk the six miles each day. He rode bareback because of his father's caution about the danger of the young boy falling off, hanging a foot in the stirrup, and being dragged by the pony.

Helping with the work on the farm he spent lots of time alone in the rural environment. His father allowed him to own a shotgun and a rifle before the age of ten, and was given freedom for roaming around after school, during summers and on weekends with his dog, rifle and fishing pole. He attributes his father's attitude and the environment with being an advantage in helping him become self-reliant at an early age.

vision in that, despite the limited economic circumstances, combined for me was to attend college, hopefully medical school. He never once suggested that I remain at home to help him on the farm because of his health.

"In retrospect, this is somewhat astonishing. He was instinctively wise enough not to insist that I become a physician, but that it would clearly please him if I did. He simply insisted that I get a good education in a profession and do well in whatever I chose. I was given great latitude.

"A remarkable measure of my father's confidence in his 15-yearold son was that, when it was time to enter college, he had his checking account at the bank changed so I could write checks independently with my signature without his approval. He told me this and simply asked me to 'be Family circumsta were adequate but certainly not bountiful."

Dr. Spencer said that he believes that he treated each dollar as if it might be his last one, because with working as a laboratory assistant and "soda skeet" from 8:00 p.m. to midnight, he virtually paid all of his own expenses and, during his two and one-half years at North Texas State, his total personal expenses paid by his father were less than \$500.00.

"I have always remained with a sound appreciation of the value of a dollar," he said of this early training.

In combination with the confidence both of his parents had in their children's ability to achieve their goals, he said they had the good instincts of not directing, but simply pointing out different opportunities and then letting them use their own judgement.

Dr. Frank Spencer seems to have done very well in using his own judgement.



The maximum pay-in to a 401(k) retirement plan in 2000 is \$10,500. The mileage rate for charitable driving stays at 14¢ a mile, and the mileage rate for medical and moving expenses stays at 10¢ a mile.




