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

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

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

AUSTIN-Now that the presidential election has finally been settled, a lot more than Christmas shopping is going on in Austin.

As Lieutenant Governor Rick Perry and his staff begin working on his transition to governor, the politicking over who will be Perry's replacement will gear up in earnest.

Interestingly, when the Texas Senate picks Perry's successor, that person will get all the responsibilities and benefits that go with the job, but not the title of lieutenant governor.

According to the state's Constitution, whoever the Senate elects to replace Perry will "perform the duties of lieutenant governor," but will not be called lieutenant governor. The formal job title is President of the Senate.

Want to see the Texas Legislature take favorable action on a bill you support? Contacting your House member or Senator is probably more effective than you might think.

Here's why: Except on the biggest of issues, lawmakers do not hear all that much from their constituents. (Given that only half of the electorate cast ballots in the presidential election, that should be no great surprise.)

So, assuming a lawmaker is going to vote the way his or her constituents want them to vote, reaching out to your elected representative important.

But, say the pros in the lobbying business, citizens need to follow some sensible rules.

For one thing, they say, be long-winded No arguments needed. Leave that to the pros. Members simply don't have the time for voluminous briefs from everyone with an opinion on an issue.

Secondly, be truthful in what

you do say.

Thirdly, be pro-active rather than re-active. But temper that

with patience. Sometimes it takes several sessions to get a particular piece of legislation

Finally, a super important point: Be responsive and respectful to legislative staffers. As in most organizations, the worker bees are the ones who really make things happen.

Have an idea for a project that would further water conservation along with food and aquaculture production in semi-arid areas?

If you do, you have until Jan. 2 to apply for research grants offered through the Texas Department of Agriculture by the Texas-Israel Exchange Grant Program. The program has \$1 million in grant funding available.

To gain funding, a proposal must involve both a researcher from Texas and Israel. The proposal needs to say how the research could benefit both the people of Texas and Israel. Also, there's a requirement that 50 percent matching funding be obtained from other sources.

Effective New Year's Day, rate increases averaging 20 percent go into effect for Texans who receive health insurance through the Texas Health Insurance Risk Pool.

The pool, which covers more than 11,000 Texans, is the third largest in the nation.

It was created by the Legislature to provide coverage for those unable to obtain health insurance anywhere else because of past or present medical problems.

Bottom line for the average pool member: A monthly premium increase from \$336 to \$403.

Live Christmas trees can pose fire threat

Live Christmas trees can pose a serious fire threat.

Dr. Ronald Charles, assistant professor of emergency medicine, says keeping your tree well-watered and away from heat sources is the best way to prevent a fire.

But even artificial trees can be dangerous, Charles said.

'Children and pets are at most risk around a Christmas tree," he said. "The tree can be easily knocked over and the ornaments can break and cause injury, too."

Charles suggests keeping your home clear of potential hazards like discarded gift wraps or toys. Don't overload wall sockets or extension cords, turn off indoor-electric decorations when you leave home and always have a working fire extinguisher in the house. Also keep a close eye on the little ones in your home.

Falls are most common injury for those over 65

Throw rugs on polished floors, worn spots on carpet and dark hallways may appear innocuous but can provide the perfect setting for an accident. "Falls are the most common

cause of injury among people over, 65, accounting for 87 percent of all fractures," says Dr. Susan Murphy, clinical assistant professor of physical medicine and rehabilitation at UT Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas. "Older adults may experience more falls because of poor vision and coordination and muscle weakness.'

She recommends a pre-visit inspection to prevent accidents. "Make sure rugs are secured around the edges, attach electrical cords to walls or moldings, minimize clutter in rooms and have appropriate lighting in stairs and doorway entrances.'

In the event of a fall - even if you don't suspect serious injury -Murphy suggests contacting your doctor. To decrease pain and swelling, apply an ice pack.

Holiday plants can be poisonous

Everyone knows the poinsettia plant is poisonous. But just how poisonous?

'Actually, a 50-pound child would have to eat 500 poinsettia leaves before experiencing any symptoms of poisoning," said Dr. Greene Shepherd, clinical assistant professor of emergency medicine and director of the North Texas Poison Center.

The greater danger is from mistletoe, which can cause upset stomach and cardiac problems if eaten. The holly berry can cause vomiting and nausea, but it is usually not fatal.

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

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
Deck the halls; Just don't eat the holly

The holiday season can be a dangerous time for accidental poisonings, UT Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas toxicologists say.

"With holiday decorations around the house, there are more opportunities for a child to eat something they shouldn't," says Dr. Greene Shepherd, clinical instructor of emergency medicine at UT Southwestern and medical director of the North Texas Poison Control Center. "While many

decorations are not harmful, some can be highly toxic and can cause severe nausea, vomiting and diarrhea. The leaves and stems of mistletoe and also toxic. Eating them can cause changes in blood pressure, confusion and vomiting.

But the poinsettia, commonly considered poisonous, is only dangerous in large quantities. A 50-pound child would have to eat 500 leaves before experiencing any symptoms of poisoning.

Don't mix drinking and driving

Holiday parties and alcohol often go hand in hand. But Dr. Kathleen Delaney, professor of emergency medicine and medical director of the emergency room at Parkland Memorial Hospital, warns that alcohol and accidents often go hand in hand, too.

"During the holidays, a large percentage of the trauma victims we see in the emergency department have been drinking alcohol," Delaney said. "A person may be impaired after only two drinks, even though they may feel

Finding a designated driver or choosing not to drink can make the difference between staying safe and getting injured, she said.

"If you've had a few drinks and feel intoxicated, call a taxi,' Delaney said. "A taxi costs a lot less than a motor-vehicle accident."



CHANGING JOBS? WHAT ABOUT YOUR 401(K)?

When you change jobs, knowing what to do with the money vested in your 401(k) plan can save tax and retirement dollars. You can (1) leave your 401(k) money where it is, (2) transfer it to your new employer's plan, (3) roll it into an IRA, or (4) take a lump sum distribution.

The best choice is the one that fits your investment and retirement goals. Also consider such factors as your age, your cash flow needs, and the investment options available in each

For example, if you are under age 59-1/2, a lump sum distribution may result in a 10 percent penalty, as well as ordinary income tax. Leaving your 401(k) where it is or transferring it to a new retirement plan or IRA avoids the penalty and allows all of your money to continue to grow tax-deferred.

If you will need some of the cash in you 401(k) for expenses, consider taking only what you need and rolling over the rest to an IRA. (This is known as a partial rollover.)

If you don't have attractive investment choices in your old 401(k) plan, you may want to transfer the assets to your new employer's plan or to an IRA. Either alternative might offer better diversification and control over your investments.

If you need time to review a new employer's 401(k) plan, a rollover directly from your old plan to a new, separate IRA may make sense. Creating a separate IRA to hold your 401(k) funds leaves you the option of later moving the money to your new employer's plan.

Uncontrolled diabetes and its dangers

mean you just can't have sweets? Not too much of a problem, true? No, not true.

Look at the possible results of having uncontrolled diabetes blindness, irreversible kidney failure, amputations, heart disease, stroke, complications in pregnancy. And diabetes mellitus was the sixth leading cause of death in Texas in 1998, increasing from 4,753 deaths in 1997 to 4,888 in

Diabetes is a serious disease. With it, the body either does not produce insulin (Type 1 diabetes) or does not effectively use or produce adequate amounts of insulin (Type 2 diabetes). The hormone insulin allows sugar or glucose to enter cells and be used for energy. Insulin also is needed to make protein and store fats. In uncontrolled diabetes, sugar and fats remain in the bloodstream and, with time, damage vital organs.

The Diabetes Program at the Oh, if you have it, doesn't that Texas Department of Health (TDH) estimates that more than 1 million Texans 18 years and older have diabetes. About 890,000 of these -6 percent of the state's population have been diagnosed and the remainder are not aware they have

> In Texas, African Americans, Hispanics, Asian Americans and people who are overweight are more likely than others to develop diabetes. In 1999 in Texas, 7.8 percent of African Americans, 7.1 percent of Hispanics and 5.6 percent of whites and other ethnic groups had diagnosed diabetes. A family history of diabetes, high or low blood sugar, limited physical exercise and being age 45 or older also point to those who may develop diabetes.

Early detection, good care and education on self-management are essential for people with diabetes," said Dr. Philip Huang, chief of the

TDH Bureau of Disease, Injury and Tobacco Prevention. "These steps are especially vital to take since the incidence of this type of diabetes linked to obesity, Type 2, has jumped significantly in children and adolescents as the percentage of overweight youngsters has increased.

Once diagnosed, careful management of diabetes is vital to prevent or delay serious complications and premature death.

"There is no known cure," Huang said. "Diabetes is certainly treatable, but it is a chronic condition that people must learn to deal with daily.

Among the keys to keeping diabetes in check are to:

• Eat healthy meals and snacks that can include veggies such as carrots, celery or cucumbers; small fruits such as apples or oranges; popcorn; or a small bagel.

• Take the proper medicine. Monitor blood sugar and keep · Exercise at least three times a

week for 20 minutes. • Live a healthy lifestyle including no smoking, less stress, adequate sleep and avoiding

excessive alcohol. · Lose weight if overweight and then maintain recommended

Reduce and control high blood

 Adjust meal plans and exercise to keep blood sugar in the desired

· Check and take special care of

feet and skin every day. · Make and keep follow-up appointments with health care

Symptoms of diabetes may include blurred vision, fatigue and a lack of energy, extreme thirst or hunger, frequent urination, sudden weight change, numbness or tingling in hands or feet, slow

infections or depression. Many of these symptoms go unnoticed, so people most likely to develop diabetes should be tested. Current guidelines also recommend that everyone age 45 and older consider being tested every three years. In addition, people with diabetes should get pneumococcal and annual influenza vaccinations because they are more likely to die with complications of pneumonia

Alzheimer's affects Baby Boomers

Alzheimer's disease, perhaps the most feared disease of our time, is starting to worry Baby Boomers more than ever. Millions of them are watching their parents fade away from it if they are not actively caring for them already. Unless a cure for Alzheimer's is found, it looms on the horizon for up to 14 million Americans by the year 2050. Is there any way we can protect ourselves and even our children now from Alzheimer's disease later on? New research suggests that there may be.

Much of the research is aimed at curing Alzheimer's disease through drugs and other treatments after a person has already developed the disease. But there's another way of looking at it, a way that is more relevant to today's generations because it involves taking action today. That approach involves the shoring up of mental reserves against the onslaught of Alzheimer's the way animals fatten themselves up for the winter. In other words, you build up the brain the way you strengthen your muscles through exercise. This

approach seems to lower one's risk of developing Alzhimer's, and even if the disease does strike, you may be able to linger longer in the early stage, when much of your mind and personality are still

Dr. David Bennett of the Rush Alzheimer's Center at Rush University in Chicago says, "We know people have different abilities to tolerate disease. Rather than focusing on the pathological effects of Alzheimer's disease, I'm looking at how to manipulate people's cognitive reserves.'

Dr. Bennett believes that by promoting maximum mental fitness through lifelong learning, we can build up our ability to withstand the damage of Alzheimer's disease.
