Wildfire danger expected to worsen

Wildfires breaking out in parched, dry vegetation continue to be a real possibility and threat during this exceptionally dry, hot summer weather. Vegetation in these areas is extremely dry, and fire-prone. With long-range forecasts calling for hot, dry weather to continue, wildfire danger is only expected to worsen in the absence of significant precipitation, says, Mary Kay Hicks, fire prevention coordinator with the Texas Forest Service in McGregor.

In response to the growing danger of fire, Texas Forest Service wildfire prevention teams have been

dispatched to north central Texas, the Rolling Plains and the Big Country region. Team members are looking at fuel conditions, wildlife activity and fire causes, to gather information useful for planning possible fire response and fire prevention programs. The teams will operate out of Abilene, Granbury and McGregor.

"Our goal as prevention teams is to make the public aware of the magnitude of the wildfire risk across the region," said Hicks. "In addition we want to encourage use of outdoor fire safety precautions to prevent accidental wildfires from ccurring."

The risk of wildfire occurrence will only grow as hot summer weather continues, said Nick Harrison, Texas Forest Service regional fire coordinator.

"In the absence of precipitation, our region will face a critical fire danger situation," he said. "Thanks to early spring rains, vegetative growth across the region is more abundant than normal. As this vegetation dries, more fuel will be available to any wildfires that occur, creating the potential for very intense and dangerous

wildfires."

near dry grass and brush; or, where vegetation can't be cleared from the work area, use a field sprayer or backpack sprayer to wet vegetation both in and downwind from the work area.

Make sure all outdoor equipment such as mowers, chain saws and vehicles are equipped with working

Dispose of smoking materials properly, in an ashtray or crush it in bare soil. Keep matches and lighters out of the reach of children.

Keep vehicles out of tall, dry grass so hot pollution control equipment doesn't come in contact with flammable vegetation. Dragging chains cause sparks, so be careful when towing.

Obey outdoor burning bans which are intended to safeguard lives and property that might be endangered by escaped control fires. Hicks also recommended the

following fire safety practices to help safeguard homes and outbuildings.

Establish firebreaks around buildings and between buildings and road right-of-ways. Keep vegetation closely mowed for a least 30 feet from the buildings. Keep tall brush and grass out from under overhanging power or telephone lines to protect essential utility service. Maintain roads and bridges on your property so heavy waterladen fire trucks can get to your home and outbuildings. Identify your location with street name and house number, and make sure that your address is easily visible from roadways

Haskell County residents should remember that the County burn ban is still in effect. Failure to comply can result in a fine.

Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the Superintendent's office. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

For school officials to determine eligibility, households receiving food stamps or AFDC must list the child's name, their food stamp or AFDC case number and the signature and name of an adult household member. Households not receiving food stamps or AFDC must list: names of all household members; Social Security number of the primary wage earner; total household income and the amount and source of the income received by each household member; and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price policy Paint Creek ISD will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on the informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal may make a request either orally or in writing to Paint Creek ISD, Larry Shackelford, Rt. 2 Box 190, Haskell, Texas, 79521 or telephone at 940-864-2471 for a hearing on the decision.

Households that list a food stamp or AFDC case number must report when the household no longer receives these benefits. Other households approved for benefits are required to report increases in household income of over \$50. per month or \$600. per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below levels shown above.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for school meal benefits. If a household wishes to apply for benefits for foster children living with them, the household should contact the school for more information. The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for purposes of determining

eligibility and verifying data. In the operation of child feeding program administered by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250.

Under state law, the dollar amount of school taxes imposed on the residenced homestead of a person 65 years of age or older or of the surviving spouse of such a person, if the surviving spouse was 55 years of age or older when the person died, may not be increased above the amount paid in the first year after the person turned 65, regardless of changes in tax rate or property value.

Notice of Rollback Rate: The highest tax rate the district can adopt before requiring voter approval at an election is \$1.6540. This election will be automatically held if the district adopts a rate in excess of the rollback rate of \$1.6540.



HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN — The Texas Transportation Commission has approved a policy change that will end the long-standing practice of placing frontage roads adjacent to interstates and other major highways.

New highways in Texas will be more like those in most other states, where short driveways and ramps are used to provide access, not two-lane frontage roads.

Though the details still are to be worked out, the change in philosophy will apply to all future highway construction projects in the state.

The policy also may result in project delays for reengineering.

Highway planners also will be working to cut down on exit and entrance ramps, a move they believe will facilitate traffic flow and improve safety.

Economic storm clouds

Any Texas community with a military base should consider itself under an economic storm watch.

The Department of Defense will be asking Congress to set up an independent commission in 2003 to consider base closures and consolidations.

The last time that happened, in 1995, Texas lost Kelly Air Force Base in San Antonio. A previous round led to the abandonment of Bergstrom Air Force Base in Austin and other facilities across the state.

Look out doves

Dove season opens in the central and north zones on Sept. 1 and the license that will make it possible to hunt legally goes on sale Aug. 15.

All current hunting and fishing licenses—about 3.5 million-expire at the end of August.

Prices for the new licenses, which are available at most Texas sporting goods stores and more than 100 state parks and 28

Parks and Wildlife Department field offices, range from \$19 for a hunting or fishing license to \$49 for the Super Combo license.

If you spend much time in the outdoors in Texas, the Super Combo is the best bang for the buck. The combination covers hunting and fishing plus all seven hunting and fishing stamps. If someone bought all those stamps separately, that would bring the cost up to \$82.

For those older than 65, the combo costs \$25. Single hunting or fishing licenses for seniors are only \$10 each.

This year, in the hope of cutting down on long lines the Parks and Wildlife Foundation of Texas is offering prizes to those who buy licenses between Aug. 15 and Aug. 25.

Anyone who buys a license during that time automatically becomes eligible for a drawing with prizes ranging from an \$800 shotgun to a \$200 casting reel.

Health officials: Have a drink


Well, not that kind of drink.
But with Texas in the midst
of a hotter than normal summer,
the Texas Department of Health
is reminding Texans to drink
plenty of water.

If you wonder why tax dollars should be spent telling people to do something so obvious, consider that one recent survey showed that 10 percent of adults don't drink ANY water during the day unless they get it from coffee, tea or some other beverage.

Another consideration: Last year 58 people died in Texas from heat-related causes.

In addition to staving off a potentially fatal heat stroke, drinking plenty of water has been shown to reduce fatigue and increase mental alertness.

How much is plenty? At least eight glasses of water a day.

Paint Creek ISD receives E-rate funding monies

Congressman Charlie Stenholm has announced that Paint Creek ISD has received E-rate funding from the Schools and Libraries Division (SLD) of the Universal Service Administrative Company (USAC). This money will be used to help the district develop telecommunications services, Internet access and internal connections.

Paint Creek ISD received \$13,982.79 in funding.

"I support programs like the Erate that result in direct services to rural areas," Congressman Stenholm said. "By helping rural and underfunded school districts provide current technology for their students, the E-rate is helping to ensure that equal educational opportunities are available to students across the nation, regardless of location or income."

The E-rate program was created as a part of the federal Telecommunications Act of 1996 to ensure that all eligible schools and libraries in the United States have affordable access to modern telecommunications and information services. Application is open to all public and private K-12 schools and public libraries. Discount funding is calculated according to a school's level of economic disadvantage (based on percentage of students eligible for the national school lunch program) and their location, rural or urban.

Up-to-date immunizations needed by school children

While back-to-school needs often include notebooks, pencils and paper, clothing, shoes, backpacks and lunch boxes, one of the top items required is an up-to-date immunization record for children in schools and child-care facilities.

Immunization requirements remain the same for this school year with one exception, said Monica Gamez of the Immunization Division at the

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Texas Department of Health (TDH). "TDH is deferring for one school year the requirement that students have a booster dose of tetanus and diphtheria (TD)." This 10-year booster is usually given to students at about age 14.

Once the deferment is lifted Aug.

1, 2002, all student in Texas schools will be required to show proof of a Td booster. The deferment is due to a national shortage of adult tetanus and diphtheria vaccine that resulted when one of the two manufacturers discontinued production.

Vaccines required at various ages for all children are polio; diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis or acellular pertussis (DTP/DTaP); Haemophilus influenzae type b (Hib); measles, mumps and rubella (MMR); chickenpox (varicella); and hepatitis B.

All children attending public or private schools or licensed, certified or registered child-care facilities must have the required immunizations for their age group completed by the first day of attendance. State child-care facilities have the option of allowing children to attend if at least one immunization in each series has been received, but the remaining required immunizations must be received as soon as medically possible.

For example: To enter school, children ages 5 and 6 should have

had the following immunizations.

*3 doses of polio vaccine, including one on or after the fourth birthday;

*4 doses of DTP/DTaP vaccine, including one on or after the fourth birthday; *1 dose MMR vaccine on or

after the first birthday and one additional dose of measles vaccine that may be received as part of a second MMR;

*3 doses hepatitis B vaccine;

*2 doses hepatitis A vaccine (in 32 Texas-New Mexico border states only)

*I dose varicella vaccine on or after the first birthday for children born on or after Sept. 2, 1994.

School children born between Sept 1, 1978 and Sept. 1, 1991 (inclusive), in addition to those immunizations required at age seven, must show proof of having 2 doses of measles vaccine within 30 days after their 12th birthday (may be a part of a second MMR).

School children born between Sept. 2, 1988 and Sept. 1, 1992 (inclusive) must show proof of having 3 doses of hepatitis B vaccine within 30 days after their 12th birthday.

School children born between Sept. 2, 1988 and 1994 (inclusive) must have had 1 dose of varicella after their 1st birthday and within 30 days after their 12th birthday. If first dose is received after age 13, 2 doses are required.

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




