# Area drug busts made

In a report of recent law enforcement drug roundups, Haskell County Sheriff David Halliburton announced that Wednesday morning, Sept. 19, a major sweep of drug dealers was made over five counties. Nolan, Fisher, Jones, Stonewall and Haskell Counties officers were busy rounding up the people named in warrants issued out of the five counties.

The Interlocal Crime Task Force has been conducting a year-long investigation in each of the five counties. They have made several cases in each of the listed counties and are now completing the investigations with the arrest of each of the persons charged.

In Haskell County, through the cooperation of the Haskell Police Department, Constable, District Attorney's Office and the Sheriff's Department, arrests were made on Haskell County warrants and Jones County warrants for delivery of controlled substance. At that time, it was unknown how many were arrested in all of the counties. More arrests are pending.

Fri., Sept. 21, Haskell County Sheriff Department Deputies Bill Glass and Winston Stephens made a routine traffic stop which resulted in taking a methamphetamine lab and the arrest of two individuals who are each in jail under \$25,000 bonds. This arrest was a joint effort of the deputies and Haskell City Police Officer Shawn Lewis and Canine Officer Jack assisting in apprehending the suspects. According to Sheriff Halliburton, this is a continuing effort with all of the local agencies working together to help stop the use of illegal drugs in Haskell County, not only in the city of Haskell, but also in all of the cities and communities of the county. He said law enforcement is doing its best to keep the drugs off the streets and out of the schools. "We still need the help of the local citizens. Any information that is given to us is confidential and will not be divulged. Again we appreciate the help from the local citizens and we commend the ones that have helped us." Sheriff Halliburton said.



AUSTIN – The nation remains in crisis, but state and local politics finally began to stir a week and a day after the East Coast terrorist attacks.

The biggest development by week's end was the announcement by Democratic gubernatorial candidate Marty Akins that he was dropping out of the primary race.

That puts Laredo oilman Tony Sanchez in the proverbial catbird seat, setting up a race with un-elected Republican incumbent Gov. Rick Perry.

As for Akins, he has set his political sights on the state comptroller's office now occupied by Republican Carole Keeton Rylander.

Though state politics is slowly returning to normal, most Texans still have their minds and hearts tied up with what happened in New York, Washington and Pennsylvania.

In announcing that Akins was switching horses in mid-trail drive, his campaign staff decided not to call a press conference "in light of recent national tragedies."

In a written statement, Akins said he had telephoned Sanchez with news of his decision to drop out of the governor's race.

"He supports my candidacy for comptroller 100 percent, as I do his candidacy for governor," Akins said.

happened last week at Padre Island would have been huge news.

Even considering the events of Sept. 11, the collapse of a portion of the causeway connecting Port Isabel with South Padre Island is having a tremendous impact in the Rio Grande Valley.

Five people died when vehicles plunged into the Laguna Madre after a barge struck the bridge on Saturday and three others still were missing late last

week.

Since the causeway is the only connection between the sandy island and the mainland, Padre Island and Port Isabel are back to where they were before 1952, when the only way to reach the island was by boat.

The Texas Department of Transportation moved a ferry down coast from Port Aransas, but it only will be used for local traffic. Tourists, the economic lifeblood of the island, will have to get over by boat and leave their vehicles on the mainland.

For island hotels, restaurants and shops, the bridge accident is almost as bad as a hurricane.

TxDOT estimates it may take four months to repair the bridge.

Attorney General John Cornyn already has filed suit against the owner of the tugboat involved in the bridge accident.

# Back to school driving safety

When children go back to school, parents develop a checklist: shop for clothes, buy new shoes, purchase pens, paper and notebooks. But one thing everyone should put on the top of their backto-school list is safe driving.

Through an online survey of 625 respondents, it was found that only 56 percent knew that you should wait for a school bus driver to disengage the school bus's red flashing lights before proceeding. while 33 percent of respondents said they had engaged in at least one of the following distracting activities while driving through a school zone: answering a cell phone, changing the radio/tape/CD, eating, drinking, or making a call on a cell phone. The survey also found that 26 percent of respondents would drive near a school zone cautiously only if school were in session.

On the positive side, the survey found that 95 percent of respondents come to a complete stop when approaching a school bus from behind that is displaying flashing red light, and another 95 percent said they slow down to the posted speed limit when approaching a school zone during school hours.



Depression is a disorder that many associate with the middle-aged. But it affects the elderly in increasing numbers and can exact a considerable toll, says a professor of psychiatry at UT Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas.

Dr. Myron Weiner, who specializes in geriatric psychiatry, says that it is not unusual in his

practice to encounter older patients who have been suffering needlessly from depression.

"Older folks with emotional disorders seek treatment less often than younger folks do," he says. "They grew up thinking that being depressed is a normal state when you get older, that you should just bear up and get on with it."



If the elderly exhibit signs of depression. Weiner encourages them to seek medical attention. "See your family physician or seek a therapist for a professional diagnosis." he advises. "If the thought makes you feel timid, talk to family members and ask them to assist you in finding help.

"You may be missing out on some of the best years of your life."



Report on food and ag policy given for upcoming century

Agriculture Secretary Ann. M. Veneman has released the Bush Administration's review of the food and agriculture system with a view toward identifying critical needs for the new century. The report, "Food and Agricultural Policy: Taking Stock for the New Century," details the enormous changes that have taken place in agriculture which continue to accelerate across the American food and farm sector. Given the enormity and pace of change, the report recommends that policy makers take stock to examine past policies and programs and, where necessary, define anew goals and principles that can best guide the future growth and development of the farm, food and agriculture industry in the new century.

"Our challenge today is to address the vital forces of change while at the same time modernizing the foundations of our farm and food system to ensure continued growth and development for the 21st Century," said Veneman. "Farmers today operate in a global, technologically advanced, rapidly diversifying, highly competitive environment that is driven by sophisticated increasingly consumers. The various policies, programs and supporting infrastructure that serve our food system will require updating to meet future needs."

The report recognizes that U.S. agriculture is driven by basically the same forces shaping the U.S. economy – globalization of markets and cultures; advances in information, biological and other technologies; and fundamental changes in the workforce and family structure. It examines the enormous changes faced by today's food and farm system as well as the lessons learned from more than seven decades of food and farm policies.

While describing the background of today's policies, the goals they were designed to serve, as well as the enormous changes that have occurred through years of growth and development, it also suggests that past policies designed for narrower purposes in an isolated economy simply cannot meet the current needs of our modern, rapidly expanding food and agricultural system.

The report offers a set of principles to guide policy development for trade, a farm safety net, system infrastructure, conservation and environment, rural communities, nutrition and food assistance and program delivery. The following is a summary of the key principles:

•Farm policy and programs must be tailored to reflect wide differences among farms with respect to production costs, marketing approaches, management capabilities and household goals.

•Farm policy, including providing a safety net, must promote more sustainable prosperity for farmers through market orientation without engendering long-term dependence on government support. This does not rule out helping farmers and ranchers when unexpected events beyond their control occur and cause output or income to plummet.

•Trade policy must focus on gaining access to foreign markets through tariff reduction and the elimination of trade distorting subsidies and be supported by domestic policy that meets our existing international obligations and provides ample latitude to pursue ambitious goals in trade negotiations.

•Domestic farm policy must not inadvertently reduce competitiveness at the same that trade policy seeks expanded export market opportunities for farmers.

•The infrastructure that supports market growth and efficiency, which includes everything from border inspection services to research endeavors, must be renewed and reoriented to fit today's realities, with input and cooperation from every link in the food chain. •Conservation policy must pursue

a portfolio of instruments, including

stewardship incentives on working farmland or retirement of environmentally sensitive land to respond to Americans' growing expectations about agriculture's role in promoting and protecting environmental quality.

•A strong commitment to ensuring the access of all Americans to a healthy and nutritious food supply must continue, with particular attention to improvements in the delivery of food assistance to lowincome families.

•Recognition of emerging diet quality issues is of paramount importance, as the nation's concern shifts from under-consumption and under-nutrition to that of the proper variety and quantities of foods and nutrients that promote health and well-being.

•Rural America is diverse and tailored policies must create conditions that will attract private investment, encourage the education of the rural labor force and promote alternative uses of the natural resource base, including through development of renewable energy sources and carbon sequestration to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

•Systems must be integrated to assure coordinated and collaborative delivery of food and farm programs and to citizen access to public services.

"This report suggests that fundamental, far-reaching changes in policy, programs, procedures and institutions may be required to best prepare our farmers, ranchers and food industry as a whole for the new world marketplace," said Veneman. "It is this broader vision that we want to encourage and support and to help bring into focus in the months and vears ahead."




