# Highway by-pass to begin in 2004

Scheduled to begin as soon as early next year, the right-of-way acquisition to reroute Hwy. 277 through Haskell will set in motion the building of a 4.9 mile highway through the east side of town, along the old railroad.

During a public hearing attended by about 100 people, Tues., Sept 25. Texas Department of Transportation officials said the construction of the highway is expected to begin in spring 2004, with an estimated 18 months required to complete.

"The rerouting will reduce truck traffic along Hwy. 277 through town from 25 percent to about 10 percent," said Joe Higgins, TxDOT Hamlin engineer.

The road is planned to begin south of the Macias Ballroom south of Haskell, and have an overpass on U.S. Hwy. 380, rejoining Hwy. 277 just south of the Country Club Road intersection north of Haskell.

Although the speed limit has not been determined, the highway will be designed for 70 mph traffic, with two lanes of traffic in each direction, separated by a median. The project's cost is estimated to be between \$8 million and \$10 million.

Involved in acquiring the rightof-way are 110 parcels of land affecting 171 acres. The window blind factory and grain elevator are among the buildings in the path of the proposed road.

Tommy Jones, right-of-way administrator for the highway department, said up to \$10,000 is available for relocation expenses.

Haskell County Judge David Davis has reported receiving mostly favorable feedback about the highway project.

AUSTIN - Know what Proposition 8 is about? Didn't think so. Neither do most Texans.

Public awareness of the constitutional amendments up for voter approval Nov. 6 was not high even before the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks.

Proposition 8 would authorize an \$850 million bond issue that would provide funds to 11 state agencies.

More than a third of that money would go to provide maintenance and security improvements for the huge Texas prison system.

Though all 110 of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice's facilities would benefit from the bond money if voters approve, most of the work would be done at the system's 26 oldest prisons.

Of those, 13 units have been around 60 years or more. Portions of the Walls Unit in Huntsville, the state's oldest lockup, have been in use for 153 years.

"I think every homeowner can identify with this maintenance," TDCJ executive director Gary Johnson said in a statement released by the prison system. "It is just like at home when a 20-year-old roof starts leaking, you either repair it or replace it—or you will have more damage than just the roof."

Though \$300 million is a lot of money, TDCJ says the cost of replacing the entire system, the nation's largest, would cost some \$7.5 billion.

The biggest project on the prison system's "to do" list if Proposition 8 passes is to spend \$8 million on the Montford Psychiatric and Regional Medical Facility at Lubbock.

The facility, which handles a caseload from 27 other West Texas and Panhandle prison units, would be upgraded to handle around the clock minor emergency cases. In addition, bed capacity would be increased and surgical facilities would be expanded.


That doesn't happen any longer, but the day before deer season opens over much of Texas on Nov. 3, fewer folks are likely to be at work.

If you don't want to keep the venison you harvest, don't forget Hunters for the Hungry. The non-profit organization collects deer meat each season and sees that it goes to a family that can use it.

Last season, Texas hunters donated 72,000 pounds to the cause. But they killed 450,000 deer, so the amount going to feed the hungry was not nearly as high as it could be.

All those wanting to participate in the program need to do is take their deer to a participating processor and pay \$20. That is considerably below what it would cost to have the deer prepared if you wanted to keep the meat.

## **Treating fall** armyworms may not be economical

Haskell Co. Extension Agent

Recent rains and cooling temperatures have spawned outbreaks of fall armyworms. But Extension entomologist James Robinson says it may not be economical to treat armyworms this year, even if the worms talk half of the grass in a pasture. Robinson says it takes about \$10 an acre to treat.

Unless you need the excess forage, he says it usually isn't cost efficient. Fall armyworms may start showing up in home lawns as well, but Robinson doesn't recommend treating those either.

The best way to deal with pests is to keep them from entering the home. Weather stripping and caulking around doors and windows should be the primary way to keep pests out of your home. Changing to nonultraviolet light bulbs will also keep bugs away. If insects do get in the home, sticky traps and fly paper are safe alternatives to insecticides

#### CUT YOUR TAXES WITH YEAR-END TAX PLANNING

It's never too early to begin year-end tax planning. A head start will give you time to take actions that could minimize your 2001 taxes. Unless you expect your income to increase significantly in 2002, the following strategies for lowering this year's tax bill should be particularly useful considering the decreasing tax rates associated with the 2001 Tax Relief Act.

• Defer income until 2002 if possible. Examples: Postpone bonuses until next year, and invest in CDs or T-bills that mature after December 31, 2001. If you're self-employed in a cash-basis business, delay billings to customers until 2002.

• Accelerate deductions into 2001. Examples: Prepay 2001 state income taxes this year, prepay real estate taxes, and pay for itemized deductions such as medical bills and charitable contributions in 2001. If you're a cash-basis business, prepay some expenses and elect to expense up to \$24,000 of equipment purchased during

• Take advantage of available salary reduction arrangements. Examples: Participate in 401(k), SIMPLE, and flexible spending plans.

• Review your investment portfolio. The depressed stock market this year may have produced investment losses in your portfolio. Selling those investments can generate losses to offset capital gains you might have from investment sales or mutual fund capital gain distributions. Up to \$3,000 of excess losses can be applied against ordinary income (wages and interest income, for example). Another strategy is to consider gifting income-producing investments, such as bonds or dividend-paying stocks, to a child age 14 or over who is in a lower tax bracket than your own.

If you might be subject to the alternative minimum tax (AMT), some of the above strategies may not be advisable. Contact our office for other year-end tax cutting suggestions and help in choosing those most suited to your individual situation.





Rosacea, a chronic condition that affects 13 million Americans, appears as flushing, broken blood vessels or pimple-like pustules on the cheeks, nose and chin, says Dr. Gene Jones, an associate professor of physician assistant studies at UT Southwestern Medical Center at

"These symptoms are often mistaken for sunburn, a complexion change or acne," Jones says. "Many people don't recognize rosacea in its early stages and don't seek treatment.'

Although there isn't a cure for rosacea, a dermatologist can provide topical or oral antibiotics to minimize symptoms, Jones says. Avoiding environmental and dietary triggers, such as spicy foods, alcohol, sun exposure and rigorous exercise, will also help to keep symptoms in check.
