Indians open district play against Stamford

The battles have been fought; the real contests begin. District 8-2A will begin play Fri., Oct. 12.

The 1-4 Haskell Indians will travel to Stamford to take on the 3-2 Bulldogs. With all records and pre-season play behind both teams, each club will start even, 0-0, on

this night of hotly contested football. As in most years, this annual battle is shaping up to be a 'doozy.' The Indians will bring to the field an offensive rushing attack record of 219 rushes for 933 yards in five games. With the help of good offensive line play, the

backfield for the Indians, Adam Diaz, has 53 rushes for 336 yards, Eddie Guzman has 55 rushes for 307 yards, Jesse Martinez has 103 yards on 15 carries, Heath McCulloch has 17 carries for 56 yards, Justin Tidrow has 39 rushes for 25 yards, Wade Cothron has 3

carries for 10 yards, Jason Guadalucazar 10 yards on six carries, and James Jeans, one carry for three yards. Wide receiver, Eddie Loyd has four catches for 86 yards.

Both teams will be looking to get out in front on the Dist. 8-2A leader board. Kickoff at Bulldog Stadium is 7:30 p.m.

The 7th grade Warriors tied the 7th grade team from Cisco, 8-8 Thursday at Indian Field, while the 8th grade Warriors lost a close, hard-fought game, 0-6.

The 7th and 8th grade Warriors and the J.V. Indians will host the younger Bulldog teams this Thurs., Oct. 11, at Indian Field. Kickoff time is set for 4:00 p.m.

Coach Brad Brunson said Monday, "We are anxious for district play to begin. The Bulldogs are very fast on defense and very physical on offense. They have a great coaching staff, and their players are always well prepared. This will be a very intense week of practice. Our level of concentration and execution must improve. These kids always play tough in this game and we are expecting them to do the same this year."

Labor auction and lunch planned Sunday

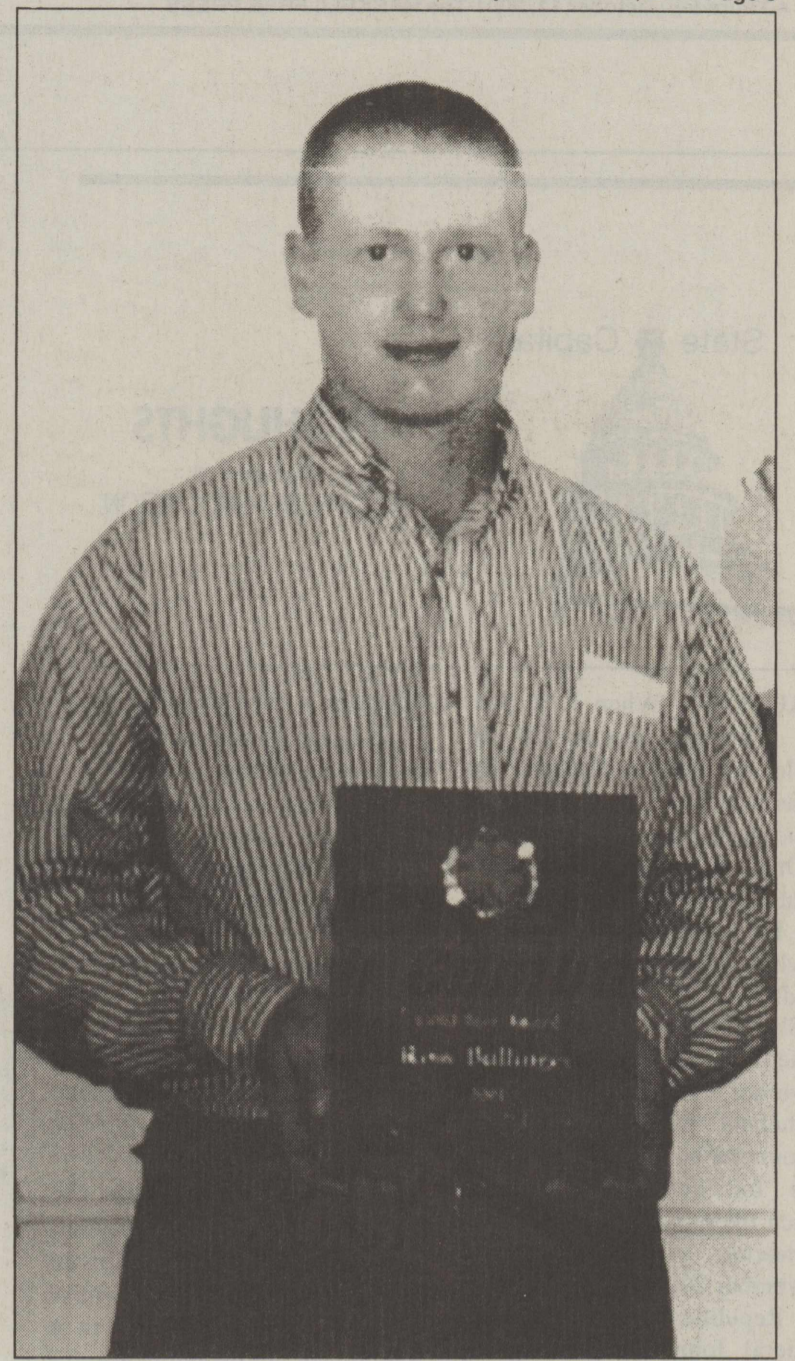

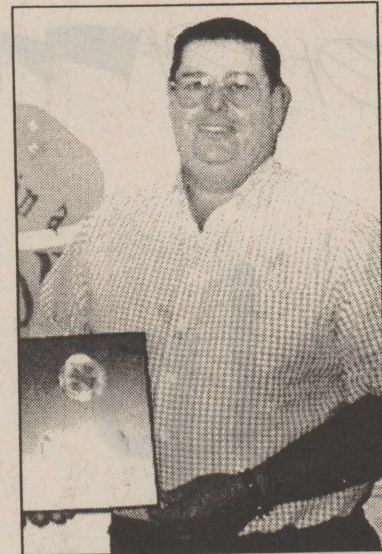

3. Space trees at least 25-30 feet apart.
4. Install spark arrester on chimney.
5. Keep roof and gutters clean.
6. In rural areas, know where existing water sources can be found, such as ponds, that can be used as a source of water for fire trucks.
7. Stack firewood away from home.

Prevent fire danger in your home:

1. Have your furnace or heating system checked by a competent service company at least once a year.
2. Take special care with fireplaces. Use a spark screen to prevent sparks from flying and be sure the chimney is unblocked and free of excessive creosote accumulation. Fireplace fires are very common.
3. Keep combustible items away from all heating units.
4. At any sign of electrical trouble, shut off power to the circuit and have it checked by a good electrician.
5. Check cords and plugs frequently for signs of broken insulation or frayed wires.
6. Keep matches and cigarette lighters away from children.

Practice home fire drills. Know your exits. Check your smoke detectors. Don't wait until it's too late!

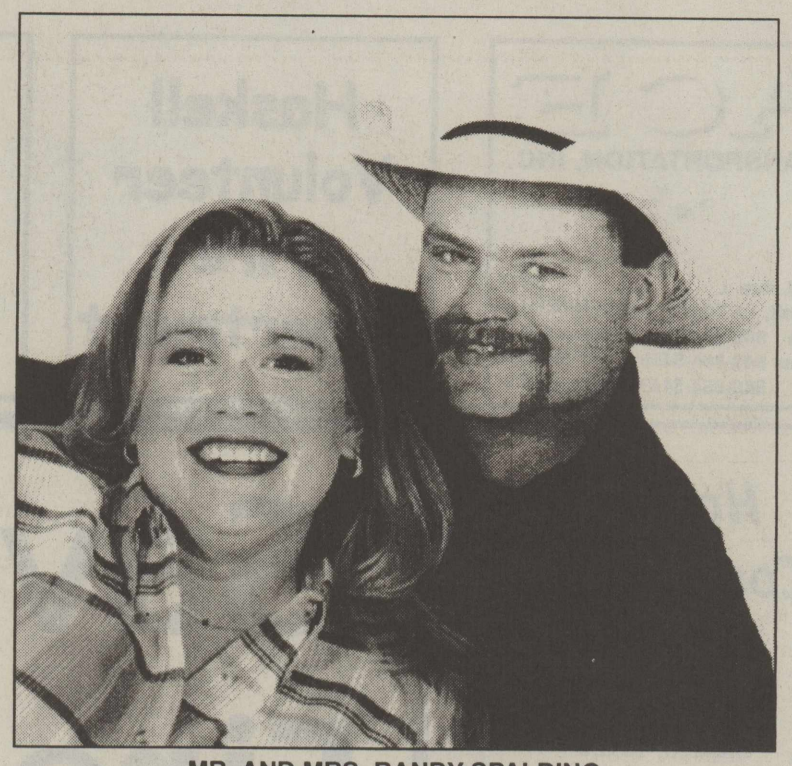
