

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

AUSTIN - Someone has stolen numerous significant pieces of Texas' past.

What happened inside an innocuous-looking building at the University of Texas' Balcones Research Center last summer was not terrorism, but to Texas archeologists and Caddo Indians in Oklahoma the effect has been almost the same.

Sometime prior to the morning of July 28, someone stole a collection of prehistoric Caddoan pottery from the Texas Archeological Research Laboratory's North Austin facility.

Still missing are 24 perfect or near perfect vessels, most of them vintage Caddoan artifacts. few were modern reproductions.)

"This is a profound loss to archeology, to art, and to the Caddo," said Mark Parson, East Texas regional archeologist for Texas Historical Commission.

UT, Austin police, the state and the FBI are investigating the burglary, but so far no arrests have been made and the ancient artifacts are still missing.

"While the motive behind this was not to terrorize, it is an emotional issue with the Caddos still living in Oklahoma," Parsons said. "It is a sad state of affairs, one of the largest cases of artifact theft that I know of."

The Indians are upset, Parsons said, because Caddo pottery generally is associated with a Caddoan burial. To them, the theft is an affront to their ancestors.

To the thieves, of course, it is only a matter of money.

Parsons said he fears the pottery has made its way to the underground Indian artifact black market.

"Pot hunters have been robbing Caddo cemeteries for years," he said. "I've heard stories of them tunneling under roads and even houses to get to

The missing pots were kept in a wired bin on the second floor of the TARL facility. The theft was discovered when someone found that one of the locks on the bin had been severed with bolt cutters.

"Someone got the outside door open without leaving any signs and then went upstairs and cut the locks on the bins," Parsons said. "They even brought replacement locks for some of the bins."

UT archeologists collected some of the stolen vessels in the 1930s, Parsons said.

The pots are invaluable to archeologists because they are used to identify other vessels.

"They are used for study and comparison," he said. "They are really invaluable, because they are the basis of classification."

To the thieves, however, the pots have a definite monetary value. They are sold to collectors for big prices, he said.

Parsons said one hope for recovery is that the thieves will try to peddle their stolen goods to a conscientious dealer willing to report their effort to police.

"You can help by keeping your eyes and ears open,' Parsons said in an email to Texas' archeology community. "If you happen to know collectors who buy artifacts, especially Caddo pottery, please notify them of the theft."

She held the cradle of the family's oldest baby and welcomed to her heart three babies more. She set the pace-the time-the place of

She was the mother ship we sailed through life upon-she held us up through all our happenings. Our time was on her bells; our heart within her hull; our every act

was at her beck and call. I didn't always really want to be there, and yet, it was the only place

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



DON'T LEND MONEY TO THE IRS

By the April 16, 2001, tax filing deadline, the IRS had approved over 72 million refund checks totaling nearly \$125 billion. The average refund was over \$1,700, up 5.5 percent from the prior year. While most Americans happily accept their tax refund checks, smart taxpayers understand that refunds actually cost them money. Here's why:

• The government pays no interest on refunds. Kept in your hands, those dollars could have been productive. For example, you could have invested the money or used it to pay off your debt during the year. If the money had been added to a 401(k) plan, tax would have been deferred on both the investment and its earnings. Even better, your employe might have matched all or part of your investment, adding to your retirement savings.

• Refunded cash is not available for use until actually received. Even though most taxpayers get their checks promptly, circumstances or errors can delay (or stop) a refund.

To prevent losing money on tax refunds, consider reducing your withholding or estimated tax payments. For most taxpayers, withholding must equal either the prior year's tax or 90 percent of the current year's liability. If your annual income changes little, it's relatively easy to avoid overwithholding. Determine the amount withheld so far this year, then subtract that number from last year's tax liability. Divide the difference by the number of pay periods remaining this year. Then ask your employer to withhold that amount each period.

For taxpayers with fluctuating income or multiple sources of income, the problem is more complex. The IRS provides a worksheet with the withholding statement (Form W-4), but many people find the form very complicated. If you'd like assistance adjusting your withholding, contact our office.
