



A monument honoring Texans killed in the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks or in the war that followed is being planned for the State Cemetery in Austin.

Gov. Rick Perry has appointed a design committee to review proposals from Texas artists, architects or engineers. Only Texans are eligible to enter the competition. The winning design will be unveiled at a memorial service on the anniversary of the attack.

The design entry must incorporate two steel beams recovered from the World Trade Center wreckage. The monument is expected to cost about \$100,000 and will be paid for with private funds, the governor's office said.

Four Texans were killed in the attack - three in the World Trade Cen-

With the possible exception of anti-acid manufacturers, the stock market hasn't benefitted many Texans of late, but the comptroller's office has come up with a little good news: The state actually gained jobs during the first half of the year.

According to the comptroller, Texas had a net gain of 27,300 jobs. Among the 10 largest states only Texas and California saw an increase in jobs, and Texas had eight times as many new jobs as the Golden State.

Another cheery piece of news is that for the first time since last December, sales tax collections grew by 1 percent in June.

Meanwhile, down on the farm ... The Texas Department of Agriculture is looking for farms and ranches that have been in the same family for a century or more. And now, no one's trying to buy them.

The department is taking applications for the 2002 Family Land Heritage Program, which honors longtime owners of agricultural land. Since 1974, when the program began, nearly 3,700 farms and ranches in 219 counties have been recognized.



Research shows that conditions that manifest themselves in middle age, such as heart disease and high cholesterol, begin in childhood. Parents who make smart meal and snack choices reduce the likelihood of their children suffering from obesity, high cholesterol, heart disease, diabetes and other health problems later in life.

"I'm not saying get rid of fast food completely," DiMarco said. "But



parents need to make better overall choices.'

Teach children healthy lifestyles

The first key to having healthier children is involvement-reading food labels, paying attention to what children eat (both the good and the bad), making sure children get

Food labels list how much fat, sugar and other substances are in a food product. "Ingredient labels list items by content-from most to least. So if sugar is listed first, what you're about to eat contains a lot of sugar," DiMarco said.

More milk is also needed in children's diets. One survey found that the average teenage boy is a day. Those are empty calories.

Milk contains essential vitamins and minerals for the body's development and is the most efficient way to ingest those essentials,

DiMarco said. A lifelong routine of drinking milk also helps women prevent osteoporosis.

Obviously, children also need to eat plenty of fruits and vegetables and have some protein in their daily

Physical activity is equally important to good health. "Instead of telling children to go outside and play, parents need to go outside and play some with their children. They can go for walks, exercise the dog, do any number of things that provide physical activity and models good exercise behaviors."

Show children that eating healthy and exercise are meaningful, DiMarco said. "Parents, after all, are role models."

Making healthy lifestyle changes for the whole family are important, she said. But she recommends making those changes gradually. "If you just jump in, you're more likely to fail. And when you fail, you won't want to try again. Take small, decisive steps toward a healthier lifestyle."

And plan occasional departure from the diet and exercise rigors. "It's okay to skip a day of exercise from time to time. It's okay to eat something decadent from time to time," she said.

"Parental involvement is key to having healthier children who are healthier adults."

West Nile virus

As West Nile virus moves rapidly across the United Stated, doctors are recommending that people be more cautious about the mosquitoes buzzing around.

Mosquitoes infected with West Nile virus can pass the disease to humans. While human infection is rare, some people exposed to the virus suffer mild-to-moderate flulike symptoms.

Dr. Elizabeth Race, an infectious diseases specialist at UT Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas, recommends using an insect repellent with a low percentage of DEET in it. A recent study found these insect repellents more effective that other repellents at keeping mosquitoes and other insects away. Parents should make sure the DEET percentage is low, Race says.

"Also, wear long pants and longsleeved shirts when outdoors this summer, and avoid being outside at dawn or dusk when mosquitoes are most active," she says.
