Drug busts

Search warrants have also yielded the arrest of ten others for cocaine, methamphetamine and marijuana.

The Sheriff continues to give credit to the combined efforts of all law enforcement agencies and to the valued help of county citizens in making the drug bust possible. He urges the help of citizens countywide, volunteering their information, to aid in continuing the drug bust throughout the county. All information is confidential and may result in a reward.

native, 64 year-old Doyle Langford began to have severe headaches, weakness and fever that would not subside, neither he nor his doctors suspected that his would be the first human case of West Nile virus diagnosed in the Big Country.

Although confirmation from the Texas Department of Health is required to officially verify the disease, his attending physicians were "clinically confident" of the diagnosis. Early Monday, Langford waited to hear the final report from the TDH which confirmed he had West Nile virus.

After two separate sessions in the Haskell Hospital, he was transferred to Abilene Regional Medical Center, where tests showed symptoms of viral meningitis. An inflammation of the tissues that cover the brain and spinal cord, West Nile virus, in its most severe form can cause encephalitis.

The symptoms of meningitis may vary from person to person. The

Spray clothing with insect repellents containing permethrin or DEET. Insects can bite through thin or tight clothing. Make sure open windows have screens. Do not allow water to stagnate in old tires, flowerpots, trash containers, swimming pools, birdbaths, pet bowls, etc.

State budget deficit continues to grow

AUSTIN — The budget news has not been good and it's not getting any better.

An anticipated \$5 billion state budget shortfall that has been the subject of a considerable amount of hand wringing has become an estimated \$7 billion deficit. And the Comptroller's Office has not yet made an official revenue projection, nor has the Legislative Budget Board weighed in with its numbers.

The numbers have changed and probably will get even worse, but the bottom line on what elected officials are saying has not changed: The 77th Legislature will be painful. "Bloody awful" is how Lt. Gov. Bill Ratliff has described the situation.

Despite the desperate need for revenue, political candidates and just about everyone else continue to say, "No new taxes."

West Nile virus

The Texas Department of Health is recommending precaution, not panic, in dealing with the spread of the mosquito-borne West Nile virus.

So far one West Nile human fatality has been reported in Texas as of Aug. 22.

Mosquitos, which can transmit the disease to humans or animals, are attracted to standing water. They can propagate with only a thimble of water, going from egg to adult in only one week. An adult female will live about 30 days.

The Health Department recommends checking and emptying anything outside that could hold water, from plant saucers to old tires. Beyond that, use an insect repellent conWeb site at www.tdh.state.tx.us. Dove season starts Sept. 1

Dove season starts in the central and north zones on the first day of September. If you don't have a place to hunt yet, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department can fix you up for \$40 — about a third of what a dove lease costs.

That \$40 buys an annual public hunting permit that gives hunters access to more than 1 million acres of public hunting lands, including 158 parcels covering more than 61,000 acres leased by the state primarily for dove hunting.

Hunting and fishing licenses for the 2002-03 season went on sale Aug. 15.

•Cook all food to the proper internal temperature. Cooking destroys harmful microorganisms such as E. coli O157:H7, Salmonella, Campylobacter, and Listeriosis. A food thermometer is the safest way to determine if food has reached the proper internal temperature, especially for foods such as meat, poultry, pork, egg casseroles, other protein-rich foods and combination

microorganisms from one food to another. An example of crosscontamination would be cutting vegetables on the same cutting board as raw meat without washing the cutting board in between.

•Chill refrigerated food at 40 degrees F or below and frozen food at 0 degrees F or below. The temperature of the refrigerator and freezer is best monitored by an appliance thermometer. Always keep food out of the temperature danger zone, or temperatures between 40 degrees and 140 degrees F. This can be done by refrigerating or freezing perishables, leftovers and prepared food within 2 hours. When thawing frozen food, it is safest to do it in the refrigerator.



Q: My son is going to be a senior in high school this fall. In addition to college brochures, we have been receiving invitations to attend college scholarship seminars. These ads promise that they will obtain a scholarship for my son. I'm thinking about attending because we will need help funding his education. Is there anything I

should be aware of when I go? A: The Consumer Protection Division of my office receives many inquiries from consumers about college scholarship programs each year, especially when college application time comes around. Although I cannot vouch for the legitimacy of any one organization, I can offer these tips to help you make sure you don't waste your hard-earned money paying for research you can do for free.

First and foremost, you should be aware that if you attend one of these seminars, you will probably be subjected to a high-pressure sales pitch. The salesman may tell you that you have to make a decision right then and there to take advantage of their special offer. If

this happens, it is a sure sign you should walk away immediately. A legitimate company will want you to take your time and review their offer. Be especially wary if the organization tells you it is providing information that you can't get anywhere else.

Second, any organization that says it can guarantee your son a scholarship, for a price, is probably not being honest. This is especially true if the organization says it will handle the application process for you. A legitimate service will not make promises it can't keep. If you want to pay for a service, look for one that sells you a list of available scholarships. You will still need to apply for the scholarships on your own. Other legitimate services charge a fee to compare a student's profile with a database of scholarship opportunities and provide a list of scholarships for which the student may qualify. Again, you will have to fill out the application forms yourself.

One parent reported that her student received an award letter announcing that he had been selected by a national foundation to receive a scholarship. The foundation then asked for a processing fee to release the scholarship money. An offer like this is not likely to be legitimate; students have to actually apply for scholarships and meet certain criteria. A scholarship is not like a sweepstakes with a few lucky winners.

If you do choose to pay an organization or individual for assistance with research, make sure you get the refund policy in writing







Dear Melissa,

In one of your earlier columns you said a patient must be homebound in order for medicare to pay for home care. What do you mean by homebound?

Sincerely, Janet Wilson

Dear Janet:

The patient experiences a normal inability to leave the home and, consequently, leaving their home would require a considerable and taxing effort. If a patient in fact leaves the home, the patient may nevertheless be considered homebound if the absences from the home are short and infrequent. Generally speaking, a beneficiary will be considered homebound if he has a condition due to an illness or injury which restricts his ability to leave his place of residence except with the aid of supportive devices such as crutches, canes, a wheelchair or walker.

Some examples of homebound patients are:

- A patient paralyzed from a stroke.
- A patient who is blind or senile and requires the assistance of another person in leaving his home.
- A patient who has just returned from a hospital stay involving surgery.
- A patient with arteriosclerotic heart disease of such severity that he must avoid all stress and physical activity.

Also, the law requires that a physician certify in all cases that the patient is confined to his home. If you still have questions, check with your physician or a Haskell Home Health nurse. Thanks for the question,


