# County's January sales tax receipts reported

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn has delivered \$283.1 million in monthly sales tax payments to local governments. Sales tax allocations are down 1 percent compared to January 2002.

Strayhorn sent sales tax rebates of \$190.7 million to Texas cities, down 0.1 percent compared to city sales tax rebates in January 2002. Texas counties received \$16.4 million, down 2.7 percent compared to January 2002. Seventy-five special purpose taxing districts received \$7.9 million, up 3 percent compared to one year ago, and Texas' six metropolitan transit authorities and two city transit departments received \$68 million in sales tax revenue, down 3.4 percent.

January sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in November and reported to the Comptroller in December. The state's share of sales tax reported during this period was \$1.1 billion, a decline of 1.3 percent compared to a year ago.





# Combustible pollutants in indoor air may be source of health problems

Combustion pollutants are gases or particles that come from burning materials. There are many combustion pollutants that are of concern in the home. These include carbon monoxide, nitrogen dioxide, and sulfur dioxide.

Combustion pollutants in the home come from a variety of sources. Heating or cooking appliances that burn fossil fuels, such as furnaces, boilers, water heaters, space heaters, fireplaces, wood or coal stoves, gas ranges and ovens, and gas clothes dryers can produce combustion pollutants. Central heating systems that utilize natural gas is also a potential source. Other sources include tobacco smoke, exhaust from automobile engines operating in attached garages, other equipment with internal combustion engines, such as lawnmowers or generators, other combustion/burning activities, such as welding or soldering, and grilling equipment.

The health effects from exposure to combustion pollutants vary from mild irritation to death. Typical effects are headaches, sleepiness, dizziness, nausea, irritated eyes, and breathing or respiratory problems. People with allergies, asthma, or chronic respiratory or heart problems are particularly susceptible to these health effects. However, it is important to remember that these health effects can have many other causes as well.

How do you know if combustion pollutants in indoor air may be the source of health problems in your home? Janie Harris, Housing Specialist for Texas Cooperative Extension Service states, "If symptoms occur only in the home, if symptoms improve when you leave the home, or if more than one person in the home has similar symptoms, combustion pollutants could be the problem."

There are several ways to reduce the health risk associated with combustion pollutants in your home. First, every home should have a carbon monoxide alarm installed to alert the family members if an unsafe level of carbon monoxide is present in the home. Second, keep all combustion equipment maintained properly and inspected for safety. Third, exhaust all combustion pollutants to the outside of your home. Fourth, maintain an adequate pressure balance between the air inside your home and the outside air. Additionally, do not allow tobacco smoking in your home.

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If you would like more information regarding combustion pollutants in the home, contact your local County Extension Agent.

# Recognizing asthma

For millions of students with asthma and allergies, making an "A" can be difficult if they're focused on wheezing and sneezing. But, a new screening program—the American College of Asthma, Allergy and Immunology study-conducted by researchers at UT Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas could improve both the health and test scores of children nationwide.

Asthma accounts for more than 10 million lost school days annually and is the leading cause of absenteeism attributed to chronic conditions, the American Lung Association reports.

"One of the key problems in treating asthma in children is identifying whether they have a

problem," says Dr. Rebecca Gruchalla, chief of allergy and immunology at UT Southwestern. The survey of children in kindergarten through sixth grade is designed to help parents find out whether their children need some type of intervention/treatment for asthma and allergies.

"Unless partnerships are established in the community, asthma will continue to go unrecognized," Gruchalla says. "Many children with the disease will continue to receive inadequate treatment, and thus they will continue to sleep poorly, miss school and miss out on childhood activities because of breathing problems.'

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

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



# Senate in Review

Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn warned Monday that there will be \$7.4 billion fewer dollars available to the upcoming 78th Legislature. Included in that number is a \$1.8 billion shortfall for this fiscal year 2003 ending August 31. Figuring in \$2.5 billion for teachers health insurance and Health and Human Services funding for the next two years, this leaves the Legislature with a total shortfall of \$9.9 billion if it wants to meet the obligations of the remainder of this fiscal year and complete a new biennial budget maintaining current programs and obligations.

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Tues., Jan. 14, the 31 Texas Senators, accompanied by their family and friends, convened to start the 140-day 78th Regular Session of the Texas Legislature. On this day, Senator Eddie Lucio, Jr. of Brownsville was elected and swornin as President Pro-Tempore. Senator Kenneth Armbrister of Victoria did his appointed duty as head of the committee to notify the Governor and the House of Representatives that the Senate is ready to transact business. The 31 Senators then randomly drew lots to determine who will serve a two-year term and who will serve for four years. Due to redistricting, this process was necessary to ensure that there cannot be a Legislature entirely made up of Freshmen.

Immediately following the second day's session of the 78th Legislature, Lieutenant Governor-Elect David Dewhurst held a press conference to discuss the budget situation. He is confident that they will be able to balance the budget, keep taxes low, and address other challenges, such as school finance reform. He promised not to reduce essential services that the people of Texas need and deserve and to provide these services more efficiently and economically.

Thursday, the Senators pass Senate Resolution 12, paying tribute to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and honored the great civil rights leader with speeches of their own. The Senate will not hold Session Monday in honor of the Martin Luther King

That same day, the Senate made their way to the House of Representatives in a Joint Session to count the votes cast in the election for Governor and Lieutenant Governor and officially declared Rick Perry and David Dewhurst the winners of the election.

Also that day, the Senate adopted the same permanent rules from the 77th Legislature with a few modifications. Bills or resolutions must be submitted by 3 p.m., an hour earlier than the previous rules stated, in order to be placed on the Intent Calendar. Also, a bill or resolution cannot be taken up until it has been posted on the Intent Calendar for two days. Bills may now come out of committee and be presented to the Senate as late as three days before the end of the Session on June 2. During the last session, that deadline was 17 days.

Changes were also made to abolish the Special Committee on Redistricting, to add the Committee on Government Organization, the Committee on Infrastructure Development and Security, and the Committee on International Relations and Trade, and to alter the membership of some of the Standing Committees.

The Senate will reconvene Tues., Jan. 21, at 11 a.m. and David Dewhurst will be inaugurated as Lieutenant Governor that same day

# Early detection needed in treatment of rheumatoid arthritis

More than 70 million Americans experience the nagging pains and physical limitations of arthritis. Rheumatoid arthritis is among the most debilitating forms of the disease, causing pain, swelling, stiffness and loss of function in the joints, and making even the simplest things-opening a jar, taking a walk, climbing stairs-difficult to manage.

But, through early detection and aggressive treatment, many of the 2.1 million people afflicted with rheumatoid arthritis still can enjoy a productive life.

"The individual has to take the first step by making the decision to come in and be evaluated," says Dr. David Karp, chief of rheumatic diseases at UT Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas. "People should see a physician if discomfort in their

bones, joints or muscles lasts more than a few weeks or interferes with their daily routine.

"In many cases, a visit to a rheumatologist is needed to confirm the diagnosis and design customized treatment that, for example, can prevent or limit long-term disability."

According to the Arthritis Foundation, rheumatoid arthritis affects mostly women. The onset is usually middle age, but it can occur when people are in their 20s and 30s.

"Rheumatoid arthritis is similar to other autoimmune or inflammatory conditions like type 1 diabetes and multiple sclerosis," says Karp, People quickly can become disabled, stop working and be unable to care for themselves or their

# Field Day set February 26 at Tongue River Ranch in Dumont

by Brandon Anderson Haskell Co. Extension Agent

Texas Cooperative Extension, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station (TAES), the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), and the Texas Sectionsociety for Range Management are sponsoring a "Rangeland and Wildlife Habitat Restoration Field Day" Feb. 26 on the Tongue River Ranch at Dumont.

Registration starts at 8:30 a.m. The program begins at 9:00 a.m. Three CEU's will be awarded to field day participants holding Texas Department of Agriculture pesticide applicator licenses.

Dr. Darrell Ueckert, TAES range researcher at San Angelo and one of the program coordinators, said northwest Texas ranchers now have another battle to fight along with a prolonged drought and questionable economic times.

"Termites have eaten the world up here." said Ueckert. "The drought and desert termites have resulted in a major die-off of desirable warmseason forage grasses. Huge parts of many of these ranches have little or

no desirable vegetative cover. So, when it does rain, the soil seals over, resulting in little rainfall infiltration and a lot of runoff. Recovery of rangelands with this problem can take decades."

"The purpose of this program is to provide ranchers with an array of proven technology they can easily use to restore their degraded rangeland. We will be demonstrating this technology knowing full well that it will be adopted only if it can be done economically and won't hurt this area's very lucrative wildlife

The day-long program starts with a welcome by Gary Antilley, King County Extension agent. He'll introduce Bill Reed, the Tongue River Ranch's manager. Reed will start the formal program with a profile and brief background of the

The remainder of the morning's speakers and their topic include: "Grazing Management and Monitoring," Dr. Allan McGinty, Extension range specialist from San Angelo; "Weed and Brush Control-Chemical and Mechanical," J.F.

Cadenhead, Extension range and brush control specialist from Vernon; "Rangeland Ripping, Contour Furrowing, Re-seeding and Managing Desert Termites," Ueckert; "Cost Share Opportunities," Jon Weddle, Program Liasison for NRCS from Lubbock; and "Considerations for Quail," Dr. Dale Rollins, Extension wildlife specialist from

Following a noon lunch break, the program will resume with "Considerations for Deer," Dr. Dean Ransom, Assistant Professor and extension wildlife specialist from Vernon and "Deer Nutrition Study at Tongue River Ranch," by David Sikes, NRCS from Guthrie.

The formal session will conclude at 2:00 p.m. with closing remarks and distribution of CEU certificates before the day's activities reconvene on the ranch's demonstration site. The site will include demonstrations of equipment and procedures ranging from rangeland ripping, furrowing and seeding to boomless nozzles for weed spraying.

# Wash hands to avoid viruses

Sniffles and stuffy noses are an unfortunate part of the winter season. What can you do about it?

The leading cause of respiratory infections among infants and young children is a virus called respiratory syncytial virus, or RSV. It causes nasal congestion, coughing and some fever. In more extreme cases, it can lead to pneumonia, bronchitis or even respiratory failure.

Unfortunately, there is no medication to treat it, so all you can do is give your child plenty of liquids. Make sure that you keep infants' noses clear of secretions so they can breathe freely. Doctors at UT Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas say you should take very young infants, infants with chronic respiratory conditions and premature infants to the doctor when they have respiratory symptoms to determine whether their symptoms are due to the common cold or RSV.



Dr. Hasan Jafri, a UT Southwestern pediatrician, says RSV is most often spread when people get their hands contaminated, then rub their eyes or noses. 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

Haskell Hospital will host a blood drive Tues., Jan. 28. The Meek Blood Center Bloodmobile will be parked at the hospital from 1:00 p.m. until 6:00 p.m. Meek Blood Center provides blood for Haskell Hospital and sixteen other medical facilities in the Texas Midwest. "Our blood supply has been at a very low level this year. All types of blood are needed at this time," said Frances Baker, donor recruiter. "The last blood drive in Haskell, Dec. 3, was hampered by inclement weather," said Baker. "We usually average thirty donors each time we visit Haskell.'

As many as three lives can be saved with a single blood donation. In order to donate blood as person must be at least 17 years of age,

weigh at least 110 pounds and be in good health. The actual donation process only takes 45 minutes to an hour. Persons taking antibiotics may not donate blood, but aspirin and most maintenance medications are acceptable. Donors are asked to eat a meal and drink plenty of fluids prior to donating blood. Each donor will receive a complimentary cholesterol screening. Results may be obtained two days after donating by calling 915-670-2799.
