Before you head outdoors this spring, don't forget to apply the

"If used properly, sunblock is very effective at preventing the harmful effects of the sun that may lead to both skin cancer and accelerated aging," say Dr. Sarah Weitzul, assistant professor of dermatology at UT Southwestern Medical Center at

"Ultraviolet light, made up of ultraviolet A (UVA) and ultraviolet B (UVB) wave lengths, has been shown to cause mutations that lead to skin cancer in skin cells. Such mutations and other effects can be prevented by the use of sunblock,"

To get the most out of sunscreen, Weitzul suggests the following: •Apply liberally at least 30 minutes before exposure to the sun for full absorption into the skin. If applied too thin, the protective factor can be reduced dramatically.

•Re-apply after immersion in water, sweating, contact with clothes or long periods of time (3 or 4 hours).

•Use a broad-spectrum sunscreen that covers both UVA and UVB. Look for products that contain avobenzone (Parsol 1789), zinc oxide or titanium dioxide.

·Use daily. Weitzul tells her patients if they are going to be out in the sun for 15 minutes or less, use a daily broad-spectrum sunscreen with a sun-protection factor (SPF) of 15. If the person will be out longer, a broad-spectrum sunscreen with an SPF of 30 is recommended.



AUSTIN—The final bell for the 78th Legislature will ring when it concludes business on June 2, but Texas lawmakers won't have to wait two years before they get a chance to vote on another bill.

It may not be until late this year, or early in 2004, but lawmakers will be back in Austin for a special session to ponder school financing.

"Following the completion of this session," Gov. Rick Perry said in a statement last week, "Lt. Gov. (David) Dewhurst, Speaker (Tom) Craddick, and I will turn our undivided attention to the issue of school-finance reform."

Perry said that as soon as "leadership has built consensus on a plan of action, I will call a special session...to immediately enact that plan.'

The first step in that direction came with the speaker naming a 21member House committee to come up with a financing plan for consideration in the special session. Four ex-officio members of the committee were to be selected by Perry.

Better known as the Robin Hood plan, Texas' school financing system is more complicated than second year algebra, a complex mixture of state and local taxes.

Apportionment of that money is based on the wealth (or, in many cases, lack of wealth) of a particular school district.

The more well-to-do districts, many of which have been forced to cut their budgets while kicking in funding for the less well-off districts, don't like the current system.

The last special session was more than a decade ago in December 1992. The topic? School finance.

Red-light runners get green light...

The House last week killed a bill that would have given cities the authority to photograph red-light runners and fine the registered owners of the vehicles.

House Bill 901, co-authored by Rep. Phil King, R-Weatherford, coauthor of House Bill 901, said the defeated measure would have had an impact on the 23,000 injuries and deaths red-light runners cause each year in Texas.

The bill would have allowed cities to impose a \$75 fine for each violator. The money collected would have gone to fund hospital trauma centers and the Texas Mobility Fund.

Arguments against the bill ranged from it fostering invasion of privacy to violating due process to raising revenue in the name of safety.

What did the bill in was an amendment by Rep. Gary Elkins, R-Houston, that would have made the bill apply only to communities with fewer than 50 residents.



"It is crucial that patients know how to recognize the signs of heart attack and take them seriously," says Keeley. "We, as doctors, have an unparalleled tool for treatment, but we have to count on the patients to put time on our side."





Joe Yates of Haskell and his black labrador "Dixie" were among approximately 75 dog teams from across the nation participating in a four-day water search training seminar, April 6-11. Sponsored by Louisiana Search and Rescue Dog Team, it was held in Fontainebleau

on the north shore of Lake Pontchartrain.

Training areas offered in the session included air scenting, trackingtrailing, cadaver location and water

Instructor for the water search course was Marion Hardy from Mid-Atlantic Search and Rescue (SAR) in Maryland. Involved with canine search and rescue for over 25 years, she is considered one of the leading experts in water search in the country. Early work done by her proved the effectiveness of using dogs to locate scent under water, sometimes after long periods of time, and at great depths.

The water training included locating human scent under water from both shore and boats, using several scent sources, including




