Food Distribution Center fills local fruition. Finally, on behalf of the

By Mary Kaigler Thanks to the efforts of many volunteers who donate their time, talent and funding, the Food Bank of Haskell is successful in helping the needy of the area.

Through its monthly, third Saturday distribution, approximately 195 families are now receiving six

to seven thousand pounds of food, which requires two trips to Wichita Falls for volunteers of the program, using their vehicles, to transport back to Haskell.


First opening in Jan. 2002, in a building on Ave. I that was loaned them for several months by a local couple; distribution was made to

approximately 25 families, taking about 750 pounds of food. Since that time, the program has grown, requiring more space and supplies.

Now located in a building at 206 South Second Street, made available by Haskell County and City officials and employees, the Food Bank has become the fulfillment of a dream

which had its beginning years ago with Eric Clark, minister of the Church of God.

Although considered as worthy by the Haskell County Ministerial Alliance, which operates a benevolent program, it was several years before it came to positive



Alliance, Pastor David Page of East Side Baptist Church stepped up to form a committee, getting it started. Today, under the name of the Haskell Ministerial Alliance, it is a joint ministry, open to all churches and all individuals of the area. A committee made up of

individuals from several churches meets regularly and reports back to their congregations. Funds come from these and private donations. The First Baptist Mission Board is currently committed to giving \$200.00 per month. Anyone wishing to assist the program, may make donations through the Haskell Food Bank account set up at the Haskell National Bank.

Additional volunteers and funding are needed for the ongoing, monthly distributions, said Roy Wright, who with his wife, Wanda Sue, volunteers many hours in maintenance, ordering food and seeing to getting it back to Haskell.

"Many sacrifices have been made by special people donating their time and vehicles to go to Wichita Falls and pick up food," Wright said.

"Special thanks must also be given to our local churches who support us with their prayers and funding."

Application must be made for receiving the monthly food, following guidelines set up for eligibility. The forms may be obtained at the Human Resources Office, East Side Baptist Church or First Baptist Church offices.

The next distribution day will be Sat., Aug. 16, at 10:00 to 11:30 a.m. On the Friday preceeding, volunteers meet at 6:00 p.m. to sort the food and box it for the following day. This usually takes about an hour. Anyone wishing to volunteer their help with the distribution may contact their local pastor for information.

Vitamin D makes beef more tender

by Brandon Anderson Haskell Co. Extension Agent Increased vitamin D intake before slaughter can make beef more tender. This vitamin D tenderizing method is being tested by the USDA across the United States.

Vitamin D3 helps promote strong bones and teeth. In tested cattle,

blood calcium was increased 20-30 percent by feeding them extra D3 two to three days before slaughter.

Elevated levels of calcium activate muscle enzymes that can help degrade structural proteins which toughen meat. Adding D3 in small amounts does not affect either livestock or consumer health.

If you feel a call is suspect, simply hang up the phone. If it appears to be a cell phone number, that should send up a red flag. If you are unsure, try asking for the caller's phone number or address. If the caller will not provide this information, immediately hang up and call the local Better Business Bureau or police.





20 state agencies render aid to hurricane victims

AUSTIN—Twenty state agencies have responded to help Texans in the aftermath of Hurricane Claudette and the list includes some unusual department names.

State agencies involved in the recovery effort include the Department of Public Safety, Texas Army National Guard, Texas Engineering Extension Service, Texas Forest Service and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Other agencies include the Public Utilities Commission, Texas Department of Transportation, Railroad Commission, General Land Office, Texas Department of Human Services and Mental Health and Mental Retardation.

Others are the Texas Youth Commission, Department of Criminal Justice, Department of Health, University of Texas Center for Space Research, Texas Water Development Board, Department of Information Resources, and Texas Animal Health Commission.

Eighteen counties were affected by the hurricane, which claimed two lives and left one person injured.

Property damage was worse than expected. A dollar figure is still being discussed and the full effects will sink in as recovery operations continue: Though Claudette was a Category 1 hurricane on the Saffir-Simpson scale, it did not act like one.

The scale ranks tropical cyclones from 1 to 5 with 5 being one you don't ever want to hear about, much less experience. A Category 1 storm, with winds of 74 to 95 miles an hour, according to the National Weather Service, is supposed to cause "no real damage to building structures."

Claudette, evidently, did not get

In reality, the damage left in the hurricane's wake reads a lot more like a Category 2 storm with "some roofing material, door, and window damage of buildings." In fact, one reported 104 mile an hour gust was well into Category 2 territory.

The bottom line message that state and local officials will try to get out is that given the effects of a so-called "minimal" hurricane, Texans who live along the state's long coast line need to give a bit more of their thinking to the possibility of "the big one" hitting Texas.

The other storm...

In Austin meanwhile, developments in the ongoing special session to deal with congressional redistricting continue to move about as fast as Hurricane Claudette did when it came ashore.

Maps showing proposed district realignments come and go like flying corrugated metal torn from a roof. And Gov. Rick Perry has indicated that he will call another special session if lawmakers don't reach an accord on map matters this session.

Best, and arguably the mostaccurate quote on the issue last week came from Sen. Robert Duncan (R-Lubbock): "We may never be able to get a consensus. But that doesn't mean we shouldn't continue to try." Former rangers buy land...

The tract is on Texas 173 near the Cowboy Art Museum in Kerrville. The sale was closed July 1.

Planned for the land is a \$6 million complex the Former Texas Ranger Association Foundation hopes to see opened within three years. The facility will feature Ranger artifacts and house research material dealing with the legendary law enforcement arm.

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"You've won a free trip to Cancun! All you have to do is pay taxes and a small fee." Sound familiar? Our Consumer Protection Division receives hundreds of complaints about telephone fraud each year.

Phone scams fall into two major categories: telemarketing fraud and unfair or deceptive practices by telephone service providers.

Telemarketing fraud involves calls you may receive offering free gifts. "fabulous" vacations or valuable items that have been drastically reduced in price. You are usually told that you have won a contest-all you have to do is pay the shipping and handling, taxes or "Ices." The fees may be worth more than the prize and the prize may never actually appear.

Many people have been swindled in get-rich-quick deals. Someone may call you and offer a no-risk, high-profit deal in real estate or oil and gas. These are generally bogus. High-profit investments are usually high-risk, and legitimate investment opportunities are not sold over the phone.

One of the most vicious phone scams is the foreign lottery. You receive a call from someone who tells you that you've won a huge prize and all you have to do is pay the taxes or "fees" in advance. Whatever money you send, they keep.

Once you have fallen for one of these lottery scams, the same criminals may try to rob you again by posing as law enforcement agents who will "help" recover your money. There will, of course, be a fee involved, and you will never recoup the money you originally lost.

There are several ways you can protect yourself. Most important: if F you believe the person on the line is trying to cheat you, just hang up. Remember, they called you.

Another common theme in telemarketing fraud is the misuse of T personal financial information. Phone scammers may try to persuade you to tell them your bank account information, social security number

"Slamming" is when your local or long distance phone service is switched from one provider to another without your knowledge or consent. "Cramming" is adding unauthorized charges to your phone bill. These include charges for products or services you are not familiar with, or regulatory fees billed by companies other than your service providers.

Read your phone bill carefully. Notify service providers about unauthorized charges or changes in your phone service. If you have been slammed, ask your local phone company to switch you back to your preferred long distance provider. If you are a victim of cramming, ask to have the unauthorized charges removed. Under Texas law, you are not required to pay unauthorized charges

It is hard to imagine our lives today without the convenience of the telephone. Use it safely and remember: if someone calls and says you have won millions in a lottery, hang up! Do not send the money.

Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn recently reminded shoppers that they can stock up on clothes and shoes without paying sales tax August 1-3. During the Sales Tax Holiday most clothes and shoes priced under \$100 are exempt from state and Strayhorn estimates Texans will save \$43.8 million in sales tax,

including \$34.6 million in state sales tax and \$9.2 million in local sales taxes.



HJR 68, Section 1 would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to use excess receipts in the Veterans' Land and Veterans' Housing Assistance funds for payment of revenue bonds, and use excess assets in those funds to provide veterans homes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to use assets in certain veterans' land and veterans' housing assistance funds to provide veterans homes for the aged or infirm and to make principal, interest, and bond enhancement payments on revenue bonds."

> **PROPOSITION 2** (HJR 51)

HJR 51 would expand from six months to two years the period in which the former owner of a mineral interest that was sold for unpaid property taxes may buy back the * mineral interest.

Also, the amendment would authorize the legislature to allow local elections for the issuance of bonds to improve and maintain parks and recreational facilities in the Tarrant Regional Water District or a conservation and reclamation district located in whole or in part in Bastrop, Bexar, Brazoria, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Montgomery, Tarrant, Travis, Waller or Williamson County.

This proposition applies only to local political subdivisions, whereas Proposition 8 applies to state and local political subdivi-

The seminar provides the students with a better understanding of their American heritage and the capitalistic free enterprise system.



1) Any person, firm, or corporation violating the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a separate offense for each day or portion of a day during which any such violation shall be held punishable by a fine of not less than twenty-five (\$25.00) nor more than two hundred (\$200.00).

SECTION 4: This ordinance shall take effect 10 (ten) days from and after its passage and publication in accordance with the provisions of state law, and it is accordingly so ordained.






