Toliver takes on Ford-Mercury dealer

with the recent acquisition of Bill Wilson Ford dealership, it has come full circle for him. His maternal grandfather, R. L. Burton, was a minority owner of the Ford dealership in Haskell, prior to selling it to the Wilsons over 57 years ago in 1946. Since Burton was with General Motors at the time, he was a silent minority partner.

"This is a positive thing for us, a positive thing for Haskell and it's positive for the Wilson's," Sam Toliver said of the new venture. "When a family can operate a dealership since 1946 and be successful, that tells a lot about the trade territory, the program and the people they had working for them over that many years; that's a success story of its own.'

Bill Wilson, Jr.'s first start in the car business was in Haskell. He started out here when he was 24 years old, just two weeks after being discharged from military service as a U. S. Major. They expanded to Snyder in the late '50s. Their son, Bill Wilson, III, added the General Motors store there in the early '90s.

"The Wilsons are fine people," Sam Toliver said, "and basically, the way this new change came about is that Bill Wilson, III, who was the last one to operate the Haskell store as a dealer for his father, Bill Wilson, Jr., wants to concentrate more time and focus on his Ford and Chevrolet stores in Snyder. He and I have been friends since the early '90s. We developed a good relationship through his having a Chevrolet store, and we shared ideas and strategies with one another. A business relationship became a friendship." Earlier this year, when Bill Wilson, III called, saying there were no more family members to pass the store on to, he asked if Toliver would be interested. "We said sure, because we feel that Haskell is a good car town, and has been for many years," Toliver said. "When you look at how many years the Medfords, the Wilsons and the Tolivers have all been able to stay and be a dealer, it's a compliment to this trade territory." He said knowing that more competition makes for a good trade territory, the Tolivers didn't want Haskell to lose its Ford dealership and representation. Toliver said Ford officials told both the Wilsons and the Tolivers that the recent change in ownership was the smoothest buy-sell agreement and transaction they have experienced. "I attribute that to the great respect for one another that my father and Mr. Wilson established as business competitors during the Wilson's 57 years as a dealer here in Haskell." Sam Toliver sold his first car at age 14 for his brother Brian, and knew then that he liked sales. Although he never dreamed that he'd ever be back in Haskell, one day his dad, Bailey, called and said, "Well, do you want to get into the car business?" By that time, his brother Brian Toliver, who had operated the local Chevrolet store eight years, was already in Sweetwater, and his brother, Joseph Toliver, had just been offered the dealership in Ballinger after operating the local store a year. "We don't have anyone to operate the Chevrolet store here in Haskell," his dad said. The young Toliver son moved back to Haskell in July 1989, after finishing his last term at Texas Tech University, and he has been operating Bailey Toliver Chevrolet almost 14 years.



New law requires schoolchildren to recite Texas pledge

AUSTIN-One more way to help your kids get ready for school: Make sure they know the pledge to the flag. Not the pledge of allegiance to the

U.S. flag, the pledge to the Texas flag.

While members of the Legislature battled over budget matters and other big issues, Rep. Dan Branch, R-Dallas, and Sen. Jeff Wentworth, R-San Antonio, succeeded in getting a bill passed that requires all Texas schoolchildren to recite the Texas pledge every morning before they start learning about reading, 'riting and 'rithmetic.

Oh, and they also have to pledge to the U.S. flag and observe a moment of silence.

Branch estimated all three requirements for public school students will only take a minute and 27 seconds. It doesn't take nearly that long for most Texans to realize they didn't even know Texas had its own flag pledge.

But that has been the case since 1933, with the Legislature adopted rules for proper display of the Texas flag and a pledge to honor that flag.

There has been some confusion over what flag to use. The 1933 pledge specifically mentioned the 1836 flag. But the 1836 flag, used when Texas first gained independence from Mexico, was not the same as the Texas flag flying over the state Capitol today.

The red, white and blue flag with the Lone Star in the blue was adopted in 1839. Lawmakers finally corrected that error in the language in 1965.

"Honor the Texas flag; I pledge allegiance to thee, Texas, one and indivisible.

You can't always believe the buzz...

A rumor has been sweeping Texas, via word-of-mouth and the Internet, that the Legislature has banned the use of cellular telephones while driving. Not true.

What is true is that Rep. Paul Moreno, D-El Paso, did introduce a bill that would have done that, House Bill 281. It went into the hopper Dec. 11 but died in committee on March

That's not to say that engaging in an animated conversation while you drive is a particularly safe activity. If you don't pay attention to your driving, police say, someone else might be making a 911 call on your behalf with their cell phone.

The Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division receives hundreds of complaints against debt collectors each year. The complaints range from abusive language to harassment in the workplace.

Recently, we received one from a citizen of Dallas. She had been in debt to a company, and the case was referred to a collection agency. She made arrangements to pay off the debt and had completed her obligation. A few weeks after she sent in her final payment, the woman started receiving calls from the collection agency about the same debt. She tried to explain that she no longer owed money to her original debtor, but the calls continued. She even came close to losing her job when the collection agency started phoning her at work.

Creditors have the right to collect debts. It is reasonable to think that persistence and tenacity must be used at times in the collection process. However, the Texas Debt Collection Act prohibits unfair, harassing or abusive collection tactics.

Violators of the Act face civil and criminal penalties. If you want to dispute a debt that has been referred for collection, notify the debt collector in writing. After receiving your letter, the debt collector has 30 days to determine if the disputed item is correct. Incorrect items must be corrected, and the collector must notify anyone who has already received a report containing the disputed item. If, at the end of 30 days, the debt collector is unable to determine the item's accuracy, he or she must still make the change you request and notify anyone who received a report containing the disputed item. If it is later determined that the item was correct, you will be notified and collection efforts may resume.

If you feel you have been harassed or deceived by a collection agency, you can file a complaint in the Consumer Protection Section of our Web site at www.oag.state.tx.us or by calling (800) 621-0508. You can also review the OAG's information on debt collection in the Consumer Protection Section. Consumers are also protected by the federal Fair Debt Collection Practices Act (FDCPA), which applies.solely to collectors working for professional debt collection agencies and attorneys hired to collect debts. The federal law is similar to its Texas counterpart, but also prohibits calls to the workplace if the collector has reason to believe that the employer does not allow such calls. Calls before 8:00 a.m. and after 9:00 p.m. are also prohibited under the FDCPA, unless the collector has information that such times are more convenient for the debtor. You can find more information about the FDCPA and file a complaint on the Federal Trade Commission's Web site at www.ftc.gov. The non-profit Consumer Credit Counseling Service (CCCS) provides debt counseling to families and individuals. If you need assistance, you can reach the CCCS at (800) 388-8887. If a collection agency contacts you about a debt that is not yours, you may be the victim of identity theft. Promptly review your credit file with all three of the major credit reporting bureaus.

Restaurant portions too big

If you're a member of the cleanplate club, you may be eating more than you need.


Many of us learned a bad habit in childhood when we were taught to clean our plates. This habit that apparently carries over into adulthood. A recent study released by the American Institute for Cancer Research found that most Americans clean their plates at mealtime-no matter how big portions are.

People surveyed in the study said they usually ate their whole meal when they were eating at restaurants. People also tended to eat more food in a clinical setting when a larger portion was put in front of them. Most people in this study didn't even realize they were eating more.

This is particularly troublesome when you realize that restaurant portions have grown significantly over the past few decades. For example, an order of french fries in the 1950s was less than half the size of a typical order of fries today.

Dietitians at UT Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas say that restaurant servings are generally much larger than the portion sizes on which nutrition guidelines are based. To get a sense for what a serving really should be, use measuring cups at home when you serve your food, so you'll have an idea what a proper serving size looks like. A serving of rice, vegetables or pasta is about half a cup. When was the last time you had that small a serving at a réstaurant?

Instead of cleaning your plate, ask for a to-go container and save the rest of your meal for later.

Weathers Whys: Thunderstorms

Q: You hear about thunderstorms, severe storms and supercells. What's the difference?

A: Thunderstorms are strong storms often associated with a front, and they can produce intensely violent severe storms and even supercells, says Andrew Odins of Texas A&M University.

"All can be responsible for rough weather such as tornadoes, hail, strong winds and flash floods, which are the biggest weather-related killer

just 30 minutes or so for a thunderstorm, and they can travel hundreds of miles while producing tornadoes along the way. Some of these supercells go as high as 60,000 feet or more, producing incredibly strong downdrafts and large hail."

Q: What's the worst outbreak of thunderstorms on record?

A: In the U.S., the storms of April 3-4, 1974, are in a class by themselves, Odins says.

The conditions were perfect for supercell development, with cool air sweeping down from the Northwest colliding with warm, humid air from the Gulf of Mexico, and the jet stream was blowing hard across the Central U.S.

"The results were devastating," Odins reports. "The storms produced a record 127 tornadoes in the twoday period, and winds in at least six of those tornadoes were over 261 miles per hour, meaning they were classified as an F-5, the most severe. It has since been termed the Super Outbreak. In all, 315 people were killed in 12 states, more than 6,100 people were injured and the damage totaled over \$600 million in 1974 dollars."

The hardest hit town was Xenia, Ohio, where an F-5 tornado destroyed the town and was strong enough to lift freight cars off their railroad tracks and deposit them across the street. The area directly affected by the Super Outbreak covered 490,000 square miles.



My mother is on a home health service, and I'm just not happy with the care they provide. Can we change home health agencies? It seems they are always in a rush.




