Safety Patrol Is Installed

Forty-five boys and girls have signed up for membership in the newly formed Junior High School Safety Patrol, installed in a ceremony performed Monday in the junior high building with members of the State Highway Patrol in attendance. The patrol is sponsored by the Muleshoe Rotary Club, and a member of the club's committee, Rev. A. W. Blaine, also attended the ceremony.

Other members of the Rotary committee which worked with school authorities and the Highway Patrol are L. S. Barron and Arthur Crow.

S. W. Walker, member of the faculty of junior high is faculty sponsor.

Only students who are passing in all subjects are eligible for membership in the Safety Patrol. The patrol members are assigned to duty during four periods of the day in groups of 6, thus giving 24 students some safety duties during each school day. The first patrol goes on duty from 8:30 to 9:00; another mounts duty at 11:55 and is relieved for lunch by another group at 12:15 and in turn is off duty at 12:50. Finally, a group goes on duty at 3:40 and remains on watch until all buses and students have left the vicinity of the school.

Principally, it was explained, the Safety Patrol watches the children, to see that they follow the rules laid down, but if a car is recklessly or speedily driven through the school block the license number may be taken down and handed to the faculty sponsor, who in turn will notify the Highway Patrol.

The Rotary Club bought 24 sets of badges and Sam Brown belts to be worn by the boy and girl members. The city authorities caused pedestrian stripes to be placed on the pavement of Avenue D, which runs along the south border of the campus. The Patrol watches at the Baptist Church corner, at the Yellow Jacket Inn, and at the intersection of Avenue D and West Fifth. A 12-mile an hour rule is in effect for vehicular traffic around the school grounds.

Jesse M. Osborn, Muleshoe Banker, To Seek Legislature Post

In keeping with the nationwide trend to put the government back into the hands of qualified business men came the announcement this week that Jesse M. Osborn of Muleshoe will be a candidate for State Representative, 96th district of Texas.

A successful banker, rancher and farmer, Mr. Osborn entered the race at the request of many friends over the newly formed

five county district. Backers of Mr. Osborn say that although his interests are still extensive, he will have sufficient time to devote to the office. His election, friends feel, will be in keeping with the trend toward closer supervision of spending of state money, and the replacement of professional politicians and college students in Austin by the kind of men who made Texas a great state.

Born at Okalona, Ark., Aug. 14, 1894, Mr. Osborn came to this area in 1924, when he became associated with the Friona State Bank. He remained in Parmer County until 1931, when he went to Muleshoe with the Muleshoe State Bank. He is still president of the Muleshoe State Bank, but is assisted by an active vice-president. In addition to the banking business, Mr. Osborn has also engaged in farming and now has a small herd of Registered cattle.

"I do not plan to make an active or extensive campaign," he said. "Many of my friends have come to me and asked me to make this race. If the people see fit to elect me to this office, I will do my best to represent these five counties honestly, to their best interests, and to the welfare of the State of Texas. If I could not go to Austin without obligation to any person or group of persons, I would not go at all. The campaigning will have to be done by my friends, and that's the way it should be. Like many of you, I feel that we must have some changes in our government especially in regards to wild spending. If the people of the district want me to try this job, I am willing to do the best and only way I know, the way I have always tried to live and conduct my own business."

Mr. Osborn has never before sought or held a public office, but has always taken an interest in community and regional affairs.

Friends of Mr. Osborn say: "We got Jesse into this race, because we think it's time the people who pay the bill take more interest. It will be a financial sacrifice on his part to accept, but he is willing on the basis of service. He is a successful business man, and we feel that more of this type are needed in our government. If you want more information regarding Jesse Osborn, just ask some of the folks who have known or been associated with him."

Vocational Guidance Program For High School Students Studied By C. of C.

Outlines of a program for vocational guidance and the responsibilities of citizenship for high school seniors was approved by the board of directors of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce at its regular monthly meeting Monday night.

The plan as presented to the board included talks on the opportunities presented young people by the various vocations and lines of business enterprise, coupled with an address on the personal responsibilities to be assumed by young people when they reach voting age.

Chamber of commerce officials will start contacting school superintendents and principals immediately to explain the program and to solicit their support and cooperation.

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce that sponsors meetings of this type on a larger scale is expected to furnish the principal speakers, and the vocational advisors will be selected from local business people.

The program, if it is approved by school officials, will include senior students from all high

schools in this area. Invitations will be extended to schools in Farwell, Lazbuddie, Sudan, Bula, Three Way, Morton, Bovina, Friona and the local high school. The morning session would present the principal speakers, followed by lunch in the cafeteria. The afternoon session would be devoted to group meetings presided over by leading businessmen and attended by students interested in the particular vocation being explained.

Various colleges in this area would be invited to send representatives to become acquainted with the graduating classes of the different schools, and also to furnish entertainment features, such as quartets, choral groups and instrumental combinations.

The program, if adopted by school people, will be the first undertaken by a local chamber of commerce, but its merit has been proved during the last three years by regional chambers of commerce. Tentative date for the Muleshoe undertaking is the last week in April or the first week in May.

BABSON DISCUSSES —

Lent

Babson Park, Mass., Mar. 21 — This is Lent. Millions of people throughout the world, Catholics, Protestants and others keep Lent. In fact, the "keeping of Lent" is partly based on Old Testament Hebrew fasting periods. The Lenten Season is a good time to ask, "What is wrong with the world and ourselves?"

THE VOICE OF LENT

Lent is an old Anglo-Saxon word meaning "spring." The connection is obvious, — the spring; therefore the name "spring" is given, which is Lent. But there is still another and better connection. Spring is the time of renewal of the earth, the promise of the soil. So Lent is a time for the renewal of the Spirit.

Lent calls us to consider Religion as the needed driving force of existence. Jesus in whose name Lent is now honored, was unconventional and uncompromising. He preached repentance and forgiveness. He preached intensely; not habit prayers, but prayers springing from deep inner impulses. Jesus demanded of His followers, that they lead a life of service and self-sacrifice. His one principle of action was that men love one another; His creed was his belief in the intrinsic worth of every human being. The thing that set Jesus completely apart from men of all time was His deep-seated spiritual faith in God and the ultimate goodness of man. Every devoted Jew agrees to this.

SELECTING A PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATE

The most important question today should be this: "Is Jesus' religion something we can live by? Is it worth reproduction? Is it something to guide a Presidential Candidate? A lot of people who do not often think much or talk about religion are beginning to wonder if many of our political troubles do not come from a neglect of the Spirit. Do you remember the last World's Fair held in New York? That gave you a glimpse of "The World of Tomorrow." The World of Tomorrow showed super-airports, super-skyscrapers, super-

highways and super-everything. But I don't remember seeing a single church!

I have become pretty much convinced that two things are needed to save this world of ours: (1) a revolutionary invention, such as the harnessing of gravity, which would give people everywhere a great new source of power, and thereby make life's necessities cheaper and within closer reach of more people; and (2) a spiritual rebirth of the nations of the world, such as came to Saul of Tarsus. Remember, how, when he was pressing hotly the persecution of Jesus' followers, a light and a power from above took hold of him. The same was true of every great leader of history. Before I vote in November for a President I want to know which candidates are praying men. "Is he a man of the Spirit?" will be my first consideration. Because Saul of Tarsus was thus changed to Paul, through love, the regeneration of Europe began, and the foundations of a new civilization were laid.

SPIRITUAL REBIRTH NEEDED

Read Whitaker Chambers story titled, "I Was the Witness," if you want a picture of the ultimate in Godlessness. It will chill you to the marrow. The fruits of this way of life are to be found in the shambles of Europe and concentration camps of Siberia. Yet, were it not for the churches and preachers our country could be in the same miserable condition.

We are today caught in a great world-wide struggle, a struggle between a materialistic world and a world of the Spirit. There are those who do not yet feel the need for religion. They think Science and Technology will ultimately solve all of our problems. I cannot agree to this because I believe that the very freedom for which we are fighting is not a thing of the Mind; it is a thing of the Spirit.

A PRACTICAL SUGGESTION

I believe we cannot successfully fight Godlessness with Godlessness, indecency with indecency, cruelty with cruelty, or

Vague On Administration Change, But Sure On Wanting Weather Change

Editor's note: The Sand Hills Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm is taking a mighty bold stand this week, his letter reveals.

Dear editor:

There are a lot of people who will argue we need a change in the national administration, but there's only on change that's needed that outdistances that all to pieces.

It's the weather.

Something has gone wrong with the weather the past twelve months.

Here we are into Spring and as far as I can tell Winter hasn't gotten here yet. Of course it was cold in places in Texas this past winter occasionally, but on the whole winter just did arrive.

Skippin from Fall to Spring wouldn't be bad, but the situation has affected the weather in other ways. Take rainfalls. It used to be, and I don't believe the national administration had anything to do with it, we'd have rain spells. Rain would set in and fall for a week or two, sometimes longer, and when the sun finally came out everybody heaved a sigh of relief and school children ran wild, but it's been nearly two years now since we had an old fashioned rainy spell. It'll cloud up, thunder and lightning, and rain will beat down for maybe fifteen minutes, then it'll shower a little while, and the clouds will go off and the rain gauge will show .19 of an inch and you can plan that afternoon if that's what you had in mind. As for as the weather system goes now, that constitutes a rain. It's his mighty piddlin. Why I

got a pair of rubber boots I ain't had on but five times in the last 18 months, and a couple of those times I just put em on for sentimental reasons.

Now I ain't made up my mind on the national administration. I always follow the majority and I've seen lots of administrations changed without no noticeable difference in my financial standing out here on my Johnson grass farm, which manages to be pretty weedy regardless of who's President, but I ain't beatin around the bush about the weather. What we need is a change. The way it is, we ain't had year before last's rainfall yet, which is the reason I ain't planted year before last's crop yet.

COST OF IRRIGATION WATER

It costs between \$4,000 and \$5,000 to develop and equip a new irrigation well on the high Plains of Texas, according to a study just published by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

These averages are based on installation and operation costs reported during 1947, 1948, and 1949 in a study of a yearly average of 176 wells in Lubbock, Hockley, Hale, Floyd, and Swisher counties. Present costs may be somewhat higher than during the period of the study.

Installation costs included the drilling, casing and spillway for the well, which averaged \$1,272. Purchase and operating costs are given for four types of power units used to pump irrigation wells. These were electrical engines, small and large automobile engines and industrial engines. Respective initial costs during the period of this study were \$720, \$485, \$782, and \$1,320.

An average of 126 acre-feet of

water was pumped per well each year of the study. The cost per acre-foot varied with the type of power used and whether the unit was operated with electricity, butane, gasoline or natural gas. Price ranges are shown for each kind of fuel.

The study, reported in Bulletin 745, briefs the historical development of irrigation from wells on the Texas High Plains. About 1,860,000 acres of Plains land were irrigated in 1950 from about 14,000 wells. Most of this development has taken place since 1934, with the greatest expansion since 1945. Well drilling continued at a rapid rate during 1951.

Cooperating in the study were the Department of Agricultural Economics and Sociology of the Texas Station and the Bureau of Agricultural Economics of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The owner of any kind of real or personal property has three choices under Texas laws for transfer of property to heirs. He may let the estate be distributed to those specified by law, make a will or arrange for joint or single ownership of real or personal property.
