Suspect arrested in Rule break-ins







Lawmakers eye non-property tax hikes to aid school finance

AUSTIN-With the 79th Legislature getting under way in Austin this week, lawmakers are putting the final touches on a plan that will erase the chalkboard on how Texas handles public school funding and put up a whole new set of numbers.

Key lawmakers have been saying for months that the plan likely will cut property taxes by a third while raising badly needed revenue for schools from other sources.

The buzz is that legislators will seek to come up with "new" money by changing how the franchise tax works, increasing the sales tax by half a penny, increasing the motor vehicle tax, raising the cigarette tax by 50 cents and implementing various other adjustments to existing taxes.

The possibility of a new form of business tax has been bandied about, but whether enough support to pass it can be developed remains to be seen.

Bottom line, it's all preliminaryno bills have been filed-but the way the state finances public schools could change.

More money for CPS...

The money the Legislature earmarks for schools will be in the billions of dollars, but lawmakers also will be considering a \$329 million plan to overhaul the Child Protective Services component of the Department of Family and Protective Services.

Gov. Rick Perry said last week that he will be asking lawmakers to fund the hiring of more than 800 new caseworkers and hundreds of support staffers for what a press release from his office termed a "heleavered".

"beleaguered agency."

For those still on the agency's

payroll, the governor asked for a 5 percent across-the-board pay raise and \$5,000 retention bonuses for current CPS investigators.

Reacting to the announcement, Center for Public Policy Priorities executive director Scott McCown said the plan only amounted to a starting point. He said the governor's plan would reduce agency caseloads to 45 per investigator even though national accreditation standards call for a caseload of only 12 to 15.

Who could have guessed?

Gov. Perry's campaign apparatus, Texans for Rick Perry, put out a press release last week saying that seven statewide elected officials support his reelection in 2006.

The list includes the lieutenant governor, attorney general, commissioner of agriculture, General Land Office commissioner and the three members of the Railroad Commission.

One state official absent from the list was Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn, who was not asked.

University funding may pick up some strings...

Texas' universities gained legislative authority to set their own tuition and other fees in 2003, but legislators will be looking at attaching some accountability strings to that new-found financial freedom this session.

With some schools having raised their tuition and fees by as much as 25 percent, the Legislature is expected to come up with up a system to assess how good of a job universities are doing in using the money they get.

One notion being considered is that if a university could not show where the money from higher tuition was being used, the Legislature might do away with that school's tuition-



Weather Whys

Sleet and freezing rain
Q: What's the difference between sleet and freezing rain?

A: They are formed a bit differently, says Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. Freezing rain is rain that is supercooled and will usually freeze when it comes into contact with other surfaces, such as cars. "Freezing rain can form when warm, moist air moves over cold air near the surface," McRoberts explains. "Sleet is often confused with freezing rain.

Sleet is made of frozen rain and forms in advance of a warm front and is often sandwiched between an area of snow and freezing rain. When rain is being produced in warm air and then falls into a layer of colder air below, the raindrops can freeze. Sleet forms ice pellets that make the familiar crackle sound as they hit the ground, trees or cars."

Q: So can you have snow, freezing rain and sleet at the same time?

A: You can, McRoberts adds. "Winter storm systems frequently contain all three," he adds. "Sometimes, you can have two of them at the same time. Freezing rain is difficult to forecast because just one or two degrees in temperature difference can mean either rain or snow or freezing rain. Freezing rain is extremely dangerous because it tends to coat roads with ice. If the surface it hits is 32 degrees or lower, it will freeze on contact, and the resulting ice storm can shut down an entire city quickly."

Ice on bridges

Q: Why does ice seem to form on bridges and overpasses first?

A: The main reason is heat-or lack of it, says Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. Roads and highways, even though they are made of asphalt and concrete, are protected by the ability of the soil underneath to absorb heat. "But bridges and overpasses are suspended in the air, which means they do not have the means to absorb heat, McRoberts explains. "So when temperatures start dropping to below freezing, it takes a while for the ground temperature to reach freezing. But bridges and overpasses, with freezing air on top and below the structures, will cool down and freeze much quicker."

Q: So bridges are affected more than roads by the outside temperature?

A: True, adds McRoberts. "Bridges don't have any way to trap heat, so they lose heat quickly and this allows them to freeze up quicker than roads," McRoberts says. "The simple explanation is that bridges tend to follow the outside air temperature very closely. So if the temperatures drop below freezing and it starts to sleet or snow, the bridge's surface will also fall below freezing and snow and sleet will stick to it very quickly.

Ice can form on bridges and combined with a layer of snow, makes driving conditions very dangerous. That's why bridges and overpasses are the first to be sanded when icing is about to occur."

First Ag Credit issues dividends




