Tongue River Ranch wins ranch rodeo

Haskell seemed to be in good shape in game one, controlling a 4-2 lead. But in the fifth inning, one by one, the wheels came off. A couple of injuries and some good breaks for the other team proved to be the difference in the game. New Deal went on to win the game 8-5.

The Indians came back the next

day knowing they needed to play on top of their game to force a double header that day and a deciding game three. Haskell did just that. With a solid pitching performance from Ronald Chapman, and a patient, hitting line up, the Indians took control of the game and never looked back as they won 12-4.

Complementing his team, Coach Kent Colley said, "I was really proud of these young men—the way they came back in game two, and battled to force another game. A lot of teams

would have folded with the uphill battle facing them, but they didn't even think twice about giving it all they had."

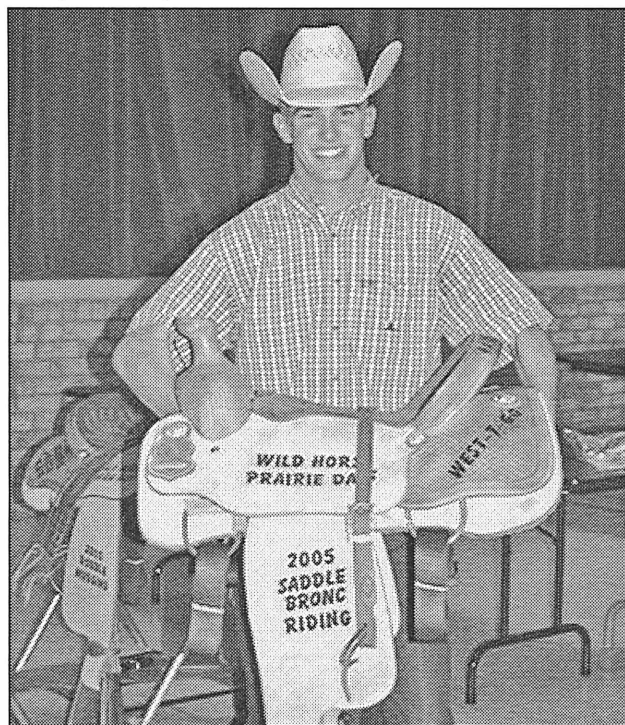

Haskell finished a great year with a 24-6 record and four more trophies to put in the trophy case.

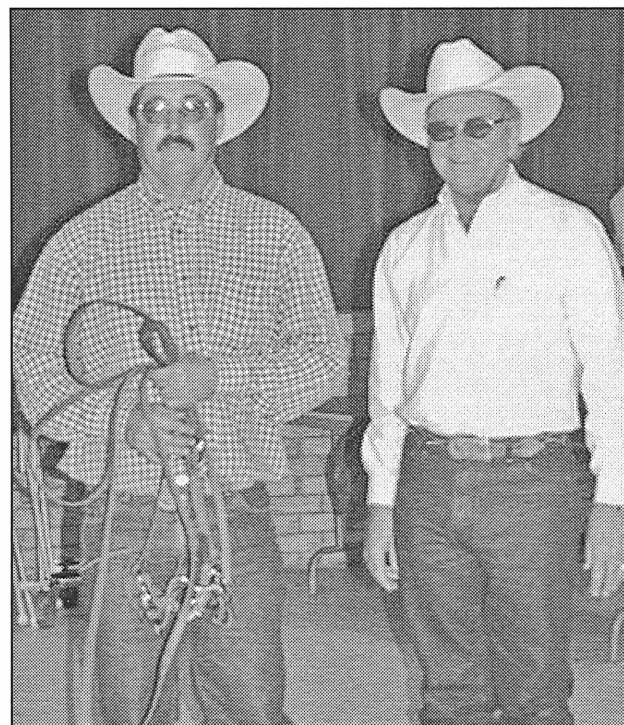

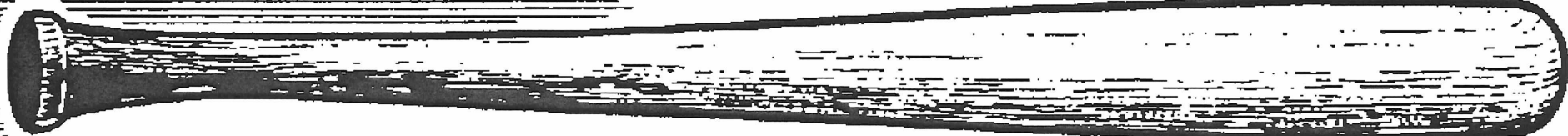

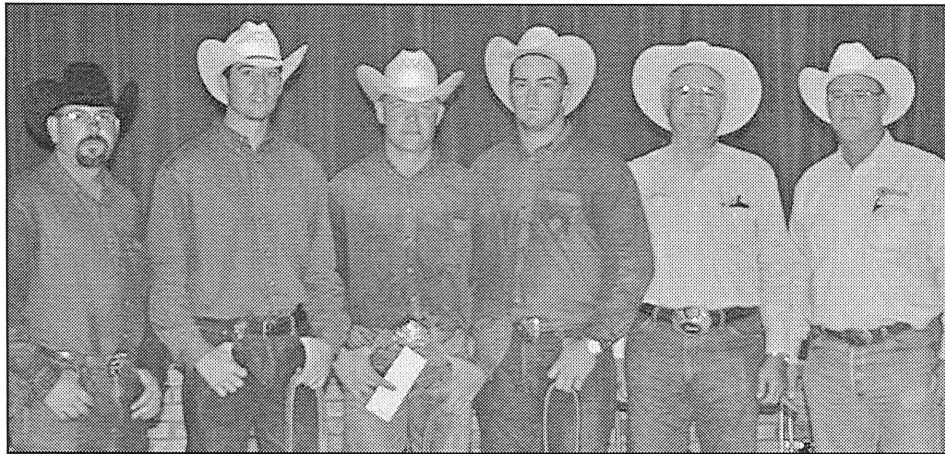

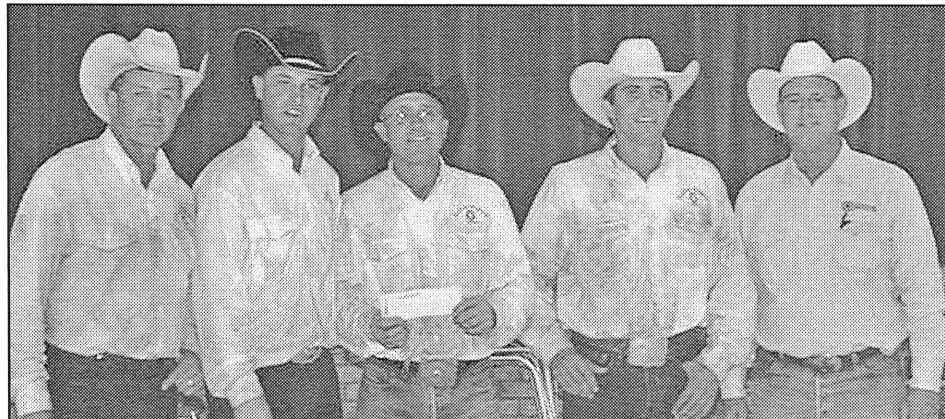

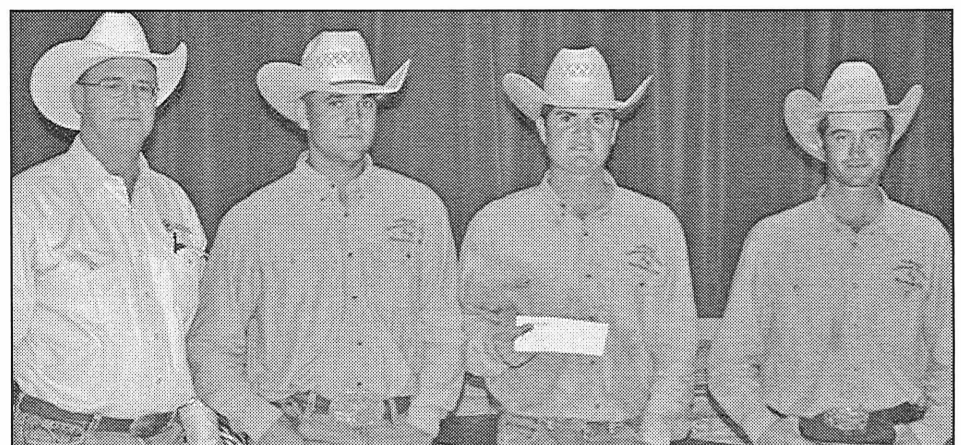

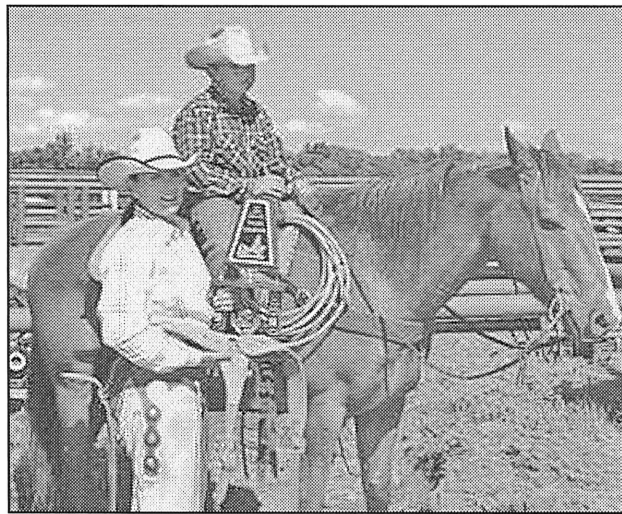

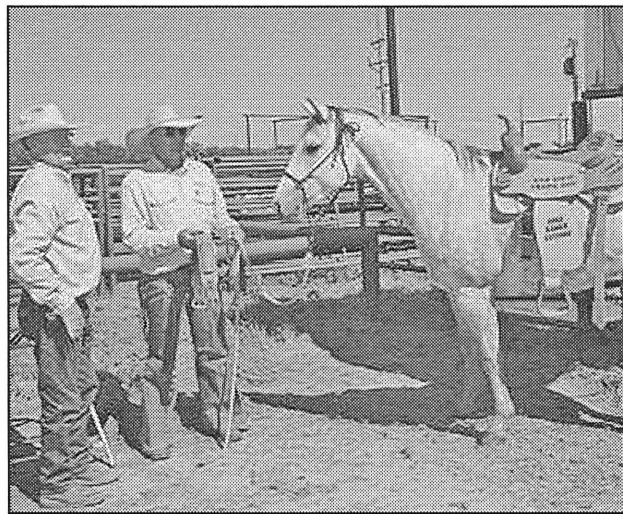

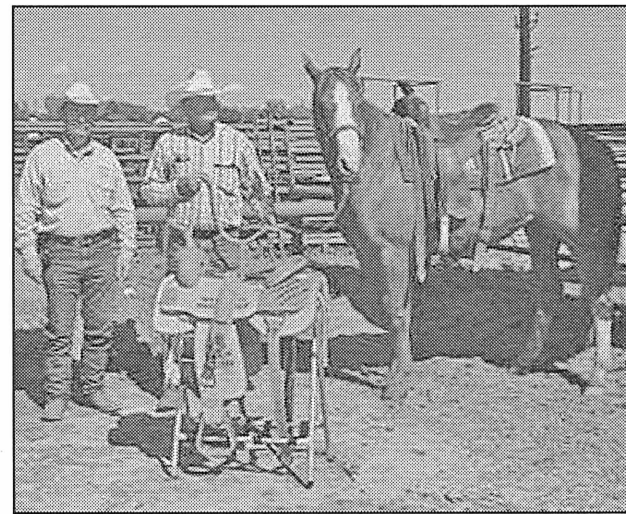

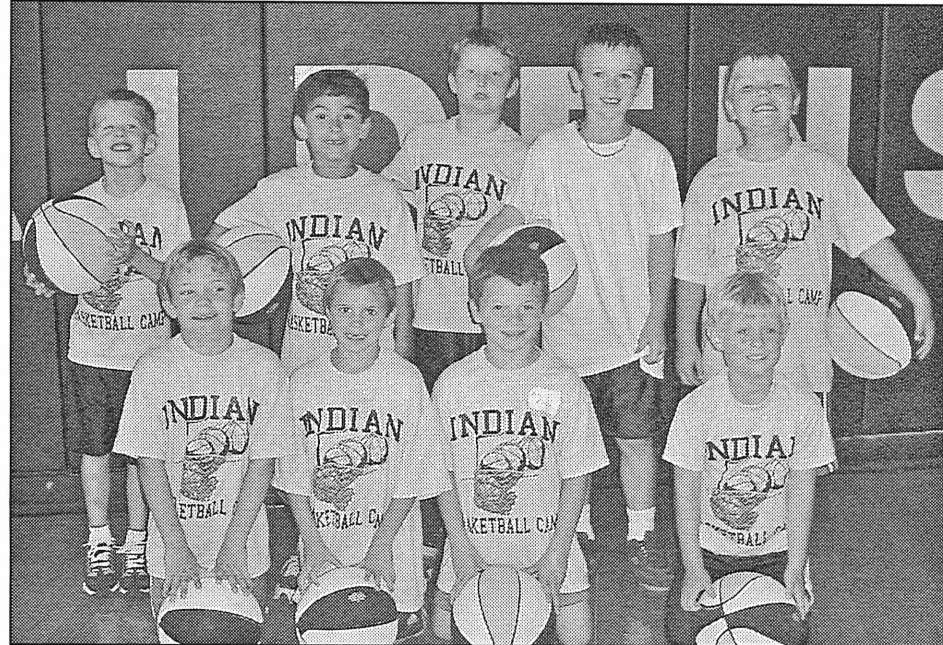

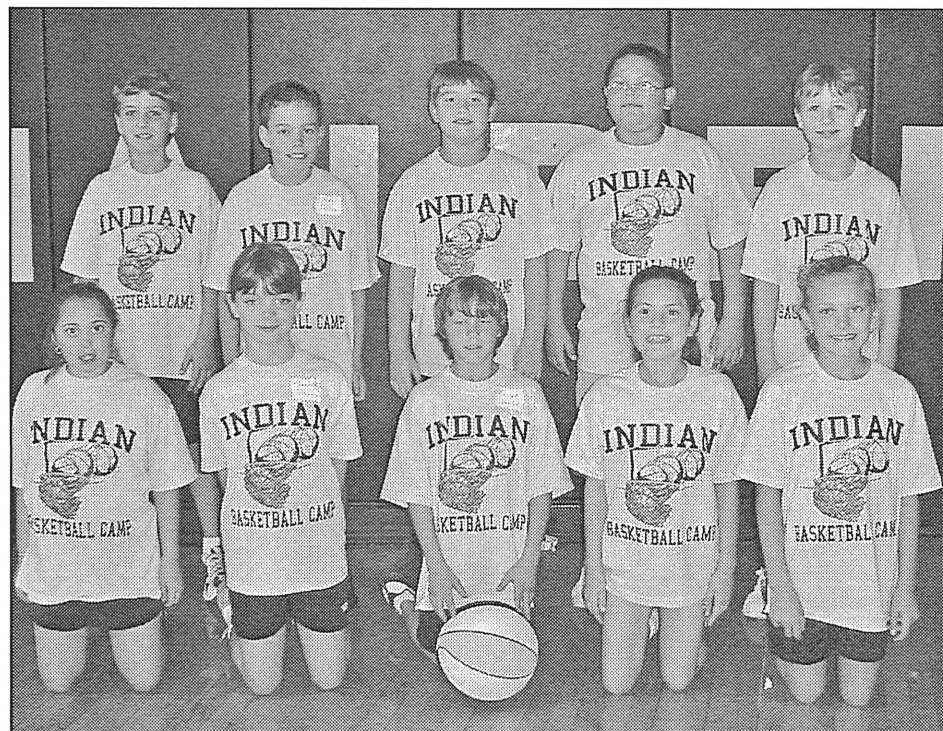

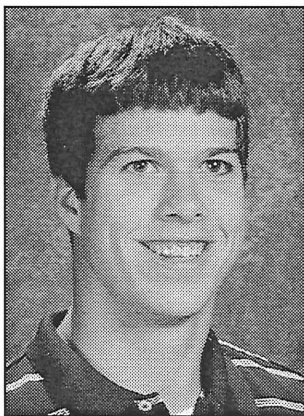

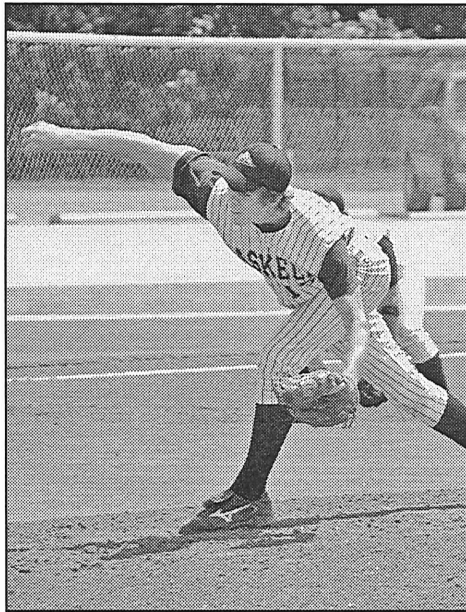
