Summer food service

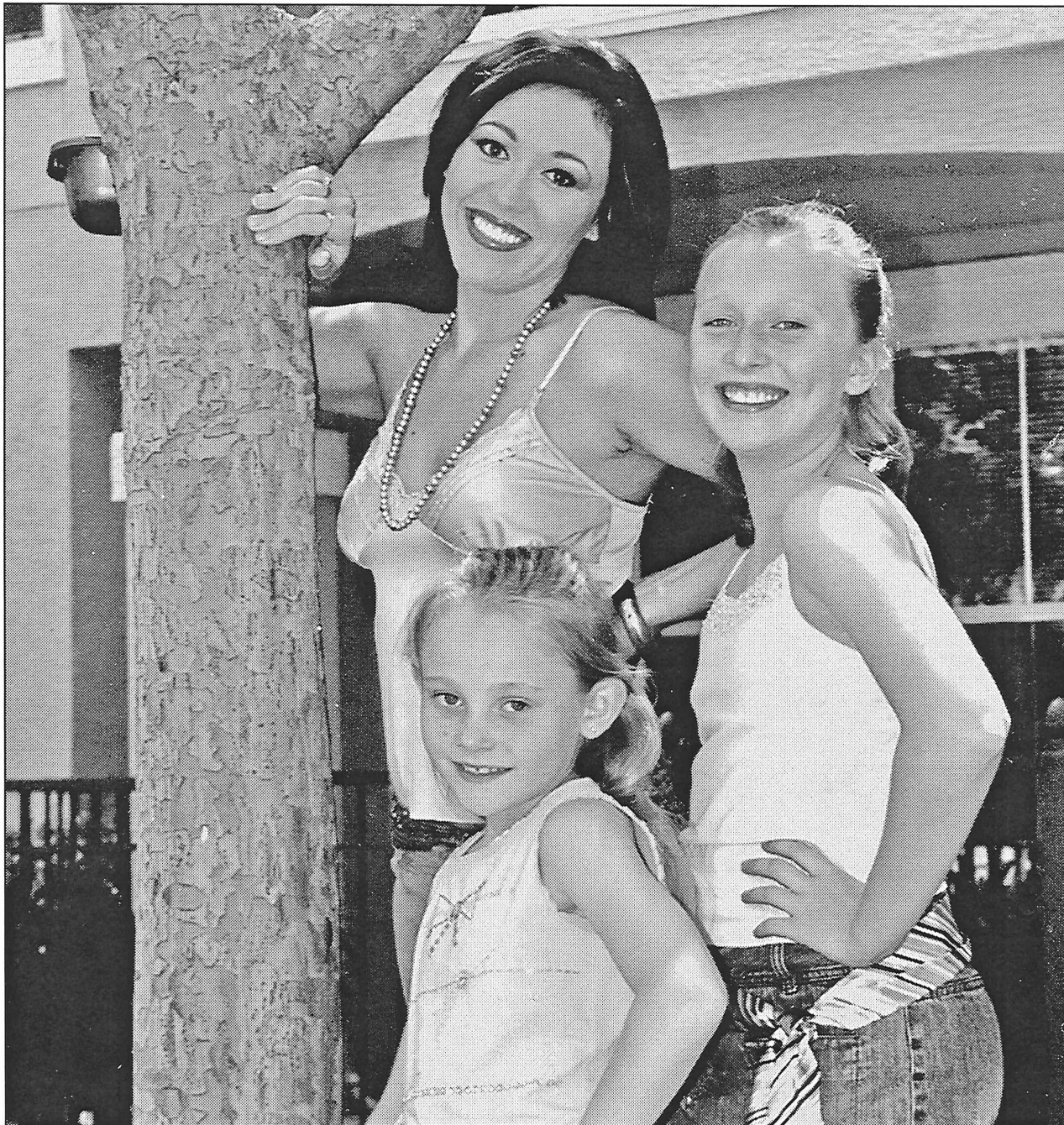

Local singing school scheduled July 10-15

The 40th annual Haskell Singing School, hosted by the Haskell Church of Christ, will be held July 10-15, and is expected to draw approximately 150 students from Texas and nine

neighboring states. Residents of the Haskell area are also invited and welcome to attend.

Although most students are teenagers, the school is open to

students 10 years old and up to "as old as dirt." Seven gifted instructors will be teaching rudiments of music, hymn appreciation, music theory, song leading, four part harmony, song writing and sight reading, all taught and performed "a capella" and appropriate to the student's age and skill level.

Morning classes will begin at 8:45 with a devotional assembly. Students then break into groups based on students' background and age.

After lunch, served in the school gym, classes will resume until 4:00 p.m. Evening activities begin at 7:30 with worship, rehearsals, devotionals and preparation for the closing program. Several breaks are planned daily for fun activities and to encourage Christian fellowship.

A closing program, will be given on Friday evening at 6:00 for families and visitors. There is no charge for the program. Haskell area residents are welcome to attend.

Greg Garrison is new Haskell band director

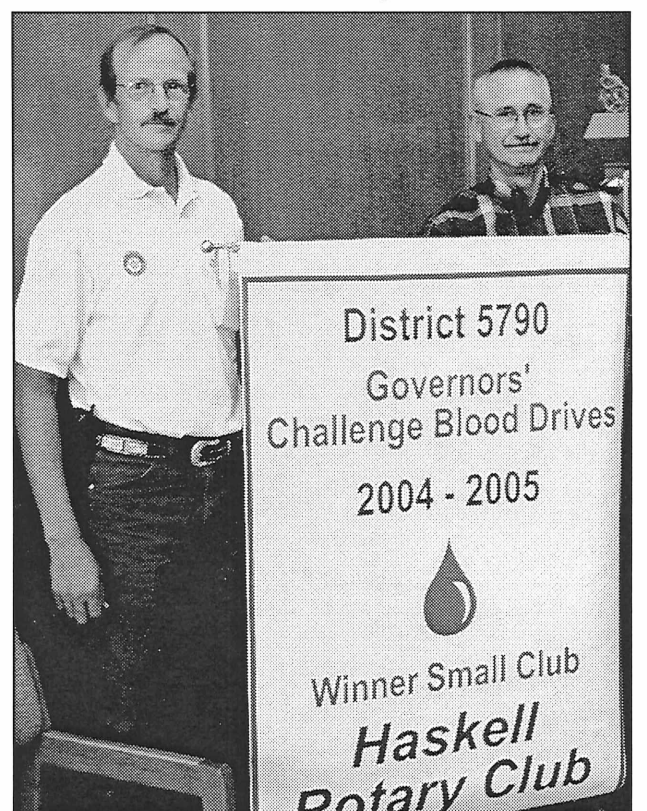
Haskell's new band director, Greg Garrison, moved to town last week, ready to begin the new season with Haskell CISD band students in August.

Garrison is coming to Haskell High School from Springlake Earth High School, where he spent the last three years. Previously, he was at Hart High School three years and Shattuck, Oklahoma two years.

A native of Sayre, Oklahoma, Garrison is a graduate of Southwest Oklahoma State University. He is single and has three grown children.

Visiting with friends was a big part of the day. Jim Belyeu of Plainview is believed to have attended all twenty of the fly ins.

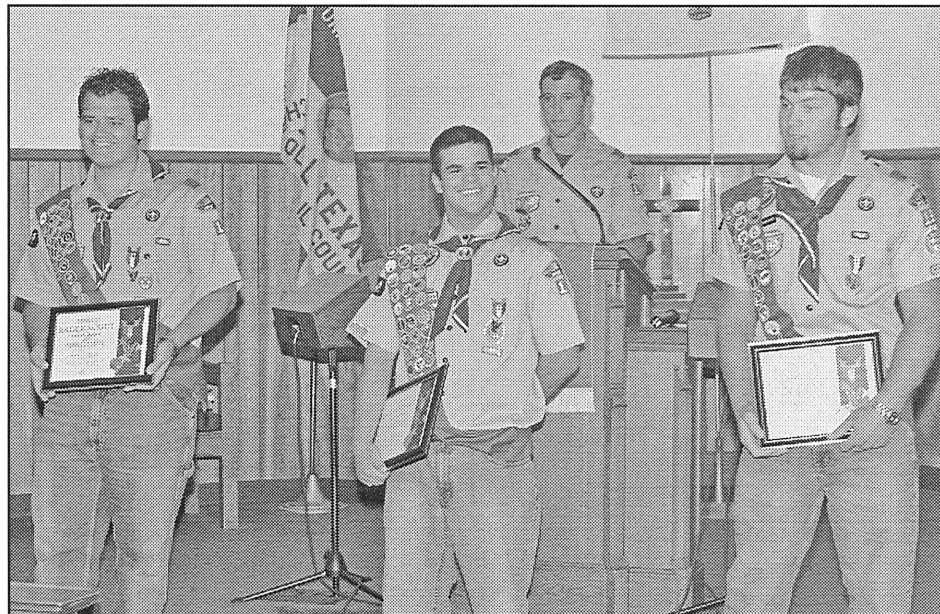
Use lower cooking temperatures

 Cooking fried food at a lower temperature could prevent a potential cancer-causing element.

The carcinogen "acrylamide" (uh-kriul-uh-mide) is highest in foods like french fries, potato chips, oven-cooked potato products and deep-fat fried foods. Acrylamide is toxic to animal and human nervous systems.

Lowering the temperature to 118 degrees Celsius greatly reduced the amount of chemical present. It also lowers the amount of oil present in the end food product.

Diamond Dust

Q: You sometimes hear the expression "diamond dust" in regard to weather. What is it?

A: Diamond dust occurs usually when the air is very cold, says Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. "The dust is not dust at all, but tiny ice crystals," he explains.

"The dust is so fine that it hangs in the air, and when light is reflected off it, it produces some very strange looking beams that appear to go from the Earth straight up into the atmosphere."

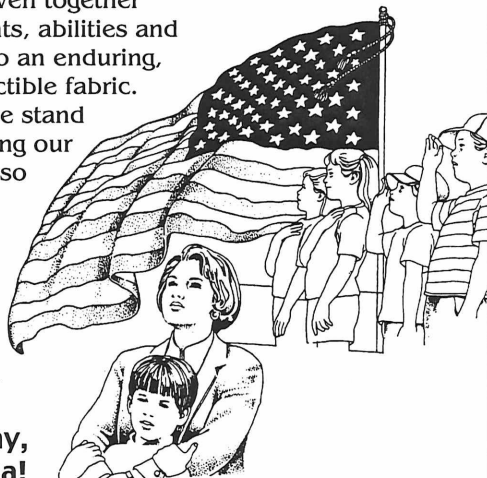
Q: What are these light beams called?

A: The most common name for them is light pillars, McRoberts adds. "When light is bounced off of these ice crystals—light from car headlights, streetlights, outdoor signs or other means—the light forms a pillar of light that is very unusual looking."

Diamond dust can also produce a halo around the moon or sun on cold days. This dust often occurs in very cold regions and can frequently be seen in Alaska, Canada and Siberia, and most often seen at night."

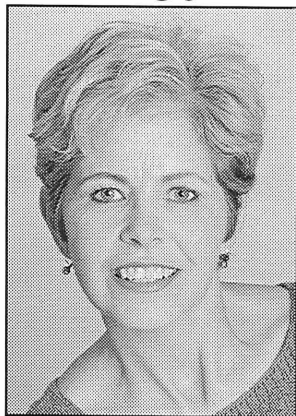


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Kaigler-Walker earns degree in theology

At the commencement ceremonies she spoke on behalf of the students who were receiving their Masters degree from the School of Theology.

At Fuller, she concentrated her work in the area of women's spirituality, and took an active role in the leadership of the Women's Concerns Committee. Part of her work with the WCC committee was developing and coordinating a monthly brown-bag lunch speaker series on women's issues.

Since 1987, Dr. Kaigler-Walker has been professor of marketing and psychology, and Chair of the Department of Marketing at Woodbury University in Burbank, California. She holds a B. S. and M. S. from Texas Tech University and a Ph.D from The Ohio State University.

She serves as treasurer on the executive board of the Educational

and Cultural Foundation, International, an inter-denominational, non-profit organization located in Monterey Park, California. ECF's mission is to build and support orphanages, schools, job training facilities, and facilities for senior citizens throughout Asia, and to develop DVD's and videos on the Christian movement in Asia and the Christian Asian-American experience in the U. S.

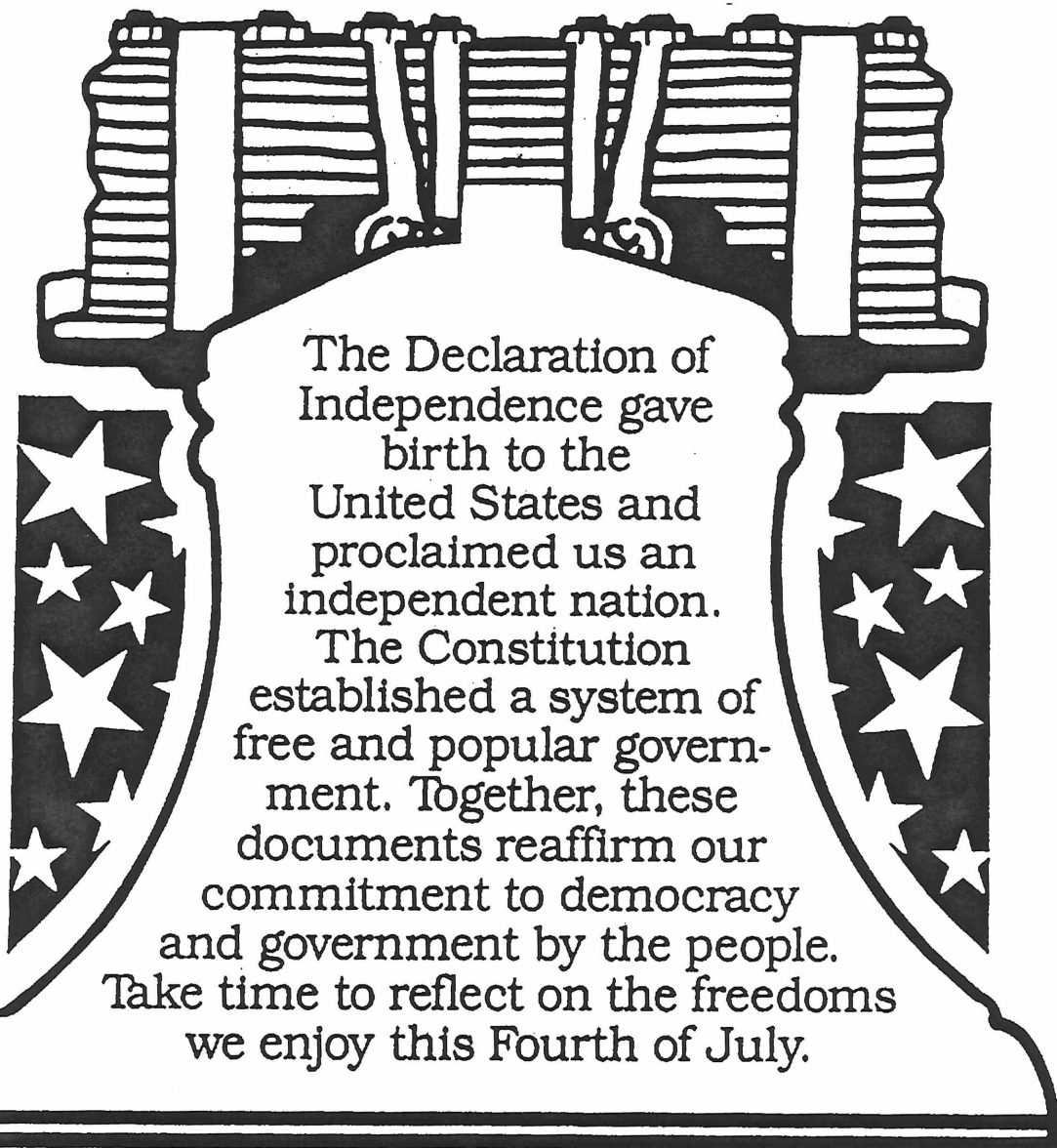

Choose your bug repellent wisely

The biting insects associated with summer can be more than an annoyance. Mosquitoes, biting flies and ticks can sometimes pose serious health risks.

To reduce this risk, use insect repellent when spending time outside. Many different varieties and strengths are available.

Repellents with higher concentrations of DEET, the active ingredient, provide longer-lasting protection. DEET doesn't kill bugs; its vapors discourage them from landing on you.

In order to use repellents correctly and safely, read the label carefully and follow directions. Don't apply repellents to broken skin or to the hands, eyes, or mouths of young children.

Make sure to keep it away from food and wash your hands after applying the repellent.

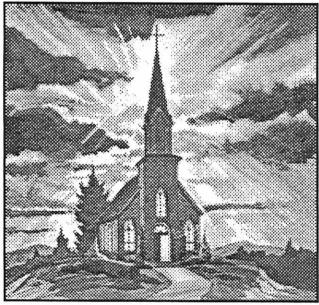

Buckle up in your pickup

Pickups are a common sight in Texas.

One out of every four vehicles in the state is a pickup. However, there are some safety concerns for these drivers.

Some pickup drivers don't wear a safety belt. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reports that pickup drivers and passengers in Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana,

Oklahoma, and New Mexico face higher odds of dying in a crash.

Out of the 699 Texas pickup drivers and passengers that died in crashes in 2003, nearly 75 percent of them died on rural roads. About 85 percent of those fatalities were male, and more than half are between 15 and 39 years old.
