## Kitchens' found guilty; jury recommends life



After deliberating for less than an hour Friday, a Bailey County jury returned to the jury box and declared Larry Brent Kitchens guilty of the Oct. 10, 2003, murder of Vince Simnacher. recommending a sentence of life in prison.

Kitchens' trial began Monday afternoon, Oct. 24. It concluded Friday, Oct. 28, after the defense rested and restricted to 30 minutes.

In his closing arguments, Larry Kitchens. District Attorney Johnny jury, pointed at the defendant and said, "We have said that this man killed Vince Simnacher, and that he did it intentionally. ... There is no question that the facts listed in the

indictment are true." Atckinson told the jurors that government can have no stronger responsibility



Bailey County polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.


These propositions are as follows:

Proposition #1 - A constitutional amendment creating the Texas rail r"elocation improvement fund and authorizing grants of money and issuance of obligations for financing the relocation, rehabilitation and expansion of rail facilities.

Proposition #2 - A constitutional amendment "providing that marriage in this state consists only of the union of one man and one woman and prohibiting this state or a political subdivision of this state from creating or recognizing any legal status identical or similar to marriage."

Proposition #3 - A constitutional amendment "clarifying that certain economic development





Daughter Shawna talked about her father also, telling the jury under cross examination by Atckinson that she rebelled against her father during the months preceding the shooting. "I love my dad very much." she said.

Shawna also testified that Vince Simnacher would give her money and send her into town to purchase marijuana, which she said she smoked with him as called up to the bench by they drove around the countryside.

also testified about alleged drug use at the Simnacher house, giving evidence against their penal interest by stating they also purchased and used illegal drugs with Simnacher.

Atckinson countered their testimony by pointing out the defendant shot back. Simnacher apparently taken several drug tests prior to his death, none of which had disclosed signs of illegal drug use.

The defense capped off it's list of witnesses with the defendant taking the stand. "I want to testify," he said.

Kitchens talked about the hurt he suffered when his family broke up, and the frustration disappointment he felt.

He talked about seeing his son Toby's rifle at his feet on the night of the shooting. following a couple of particularly upsetting telephone calls to the Simnacher house, and picking it up.

"I didn't really know what was going on," Kitchens said. "I was just upset about the things that were going
