

Firemen across the state gearing up for possible winter wildfires

State fire control leaders continue to gear up for what could be a long winter wildfire siege for the state's firefighters.

Additional in-state and out-ofstate personnel and equipment resources, including six dozers and seven engines from Wisconsin, have been ordered and mobilized to strategic areas to bolster the state's firefighting arsenal. Critically dry fuels (vegetation) exist across much of the state, a fact evidenced by several large wildfires that have already occurred. With no significant change in the weather pattern in sight, fire control leaders are planning for

the worst but hoping for the best.

Grasses, weeds and other vegetation in much of the state lie dead and dormant from a combination of drought and hard freezes, according to Mike Dunivan, fire behavior analyst with the Texas Forest Service. Areas hit by hard frosts earlier in the year are where the lion's share of the known large fires occurred, but essentially all of the state is now at risk, due to the presence of the dead vegetation, said

"Vegetation is critically dry in much of the state," said Dunivan. "Add winds and low humidity during the afternoon prime burning period, and you have a recipe for fast-spreading, dangerous wildfires. Most of the large wildfires that already occurred statewide resulted from this deadly combination of wildfire ingredients."

The fire analyst noted that the Texas Forest Service sent an advisory to fire departments in Texas warning of the possibility of dangerous fire behavior during periods of dry, windy weather and the need for diligent use of fire safety practices and protective gear. Already this year, two volunteer firefighters suffered serious burns upon being overrun by wildfires, and another firefighter lost his life in an accident when the fire tanker he was driving rolled over.

"Now that most summer grasses and weeds have gone dormant, any wildfires that arise will have more fuel available to stoke the flames.





Citrus drinks may challenge cranberry juice's urinary health reputation

Many people believe that drinking cranberry juice daily. cranberry juice helps prevent urinary tract infection, catheter obstruction and urinary stones.

But a study with 24 patients at UT Southwestern Medical Center has found that cranberry juice has a mixed effect on a person's propensity for urinary stone formation. Patients in the study published recently in the Journal of Urology drank one liter of

"Our study suggests that consuming the quantities of cranberry juice used in our study does increase the risk of calcium oxalate stone formation as judged by stone risk factors in the urine," says Dr. Margaret Pearle, professor of urology and internal medicine. "But no studies have been done looking at the long-term effect of large quantities of cranberry juice on actual stone

formation, the real test."

So, has Dr. Pearle sworn off cranberry juice? "I would not go so far as to discourage cranberry juice consumption," Dr. Pearle says. "I would only say that consuming large quantities of cranberry juice may not be advisable because of the negative impact on urinary stone risk factors. More benefit would be obtained from orange juice or lemonade.'



Cornelius receives Masonry degree





Judge lets stand 2 charges against DeLay

AUSTIN-Senior state District Judge Pat Priest let stand felony charges of money laundering and conspiracy against former U.S. House Majority Leader Tom DeLay, and dismissed other conspiracy charges also leveled by a Travis County grand jury at the Sugar Land Republican.

Charges that stuck allege DeLay and his associates moved campaign donations from Texas entities to Americans for a Republican Majority, his national fundraising committee in Washington, D.C., and the money was returned to Texas as donations to his Austin-based fundraising committee, Texans for a Republican Majority.

When DeLay was indicted in September, he stepped down from his leadership post in accordance with U.S. House rules.

DeLay did not deny the campaign funds in question helped a select few Texas House Republicans in their successful 2002 races. Their votes in favor of DeLay's redistricting plan in 2003 helped the GOP pick up five U.S. congressional seats in 2004.

Now, DeLay's attorney Dick DeGuerin of Houston is asking Judge Priest for a couple of things: (1) to speed up the trial date-so DeLay has a better chance of putting the issue behind him before he campaigns for reelection in the coming year-and (2) to move the trial away from Austin. (Trial) location, location, location

DeGuerin, a Democrat who also donates to Republican candidates, told reporters DeLay can't get an impartial jury and thus a fair trial in the state's capital city, where a jury panel is likely to include more than one or two Democrats.

After all, Austin is the Travis County seat, and Travis was the lone Texas county "blue" enough to vote against the proposed constitutional ban on gay marriage back in November.

Meanwhile, Vice President Dick Cheney attended a fund-raiser for DeLay in Houston and had to walk within earshot of hecklers to get in. A DeLay aide said the hecklers were "professionals" not from the congressman's district.

Take precautions to prevent deadly wildfires

Officials with the Governor's Division of Emergency Management urged Texans to take extra precautions this year to avoid the threat of wildfires. Many parts of Texas can suffer from extremely dry conditions, setting the stage for potentially severe fire seasons.

About 90 percent of all Texas wildfires are caused by humans, and the greatest single cause is burning debris that escapes from an area where it should have been contained. When weather is dry and the conditions for severe fires exist, Texans can help prevent fires if they:

·Avoid burning trash. Even a barrel covered with a screen can allow a spark to escape, igniting nearby vegetation.

•If you smoke in your car, extinguish cigarettes in vehicle ashtrays. Never toss a cigarette out of a car window, and don't put cigarettes out on the ground.

•Be careful when pulling off a road or driving into a field. Hot catalytic converters can ignite vegetation.

•Keep a fire extinguisher and water handy when working outdoors with equipment that gets hot, or involves sparks, such as welding equipment. Water down outdoor work areas in advance if possible.

•Do not use fireworks during the

Some Southeast Texas communities continue to see declines in their sales tax revenue as a result of Hurricane Rita, but overall state and local sales tax revenues are up significantly, Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn reported.

The state collected \$1.58 billion in sales tax in November, up 9.4 percent compared to Nov. 2004. December sales tax allocations to local governments rose by \$50.8 million, or 15.8 percent, compared to Dec. 2004.

Strayhorn sent \$372.4 million in Dec. sales tax allocations to cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts, up 15.8 ercent compared to last Dec.

Texas cities received \$252.8 million in sales tax allocations, up 15.8 percent compared to Dec. 2004. Texas counties received Dec. sales tax allocations of \$21.8 million, up 17.2 percent compared to one year

Nov. state sales tax collections and Dec. sales tax allocations to local governments mainly represent sales that occurred in Oct.





Weather Whys

Q: What causes cold fronts? A: The simple explanation is that a cold front is where a cold air mass is replacing a warm air mass, says Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University.

"The air mass behind it is noticeably colder and it pushes out the warmer air," McRoberts

"As a cold front moves into an area, the heavier colder air moves out the warmer, lighter air its replacing. If the warm air is humid enough, water vapor in it will condense and rain can occur, which is why cold fronts often trigger thunderstorms. The rotation of the Earth helps to form the wind that flows between air masses."


Q: How fast can the temperature drop when a cold front arrives?

A: Amazingly fast, McRoberts adds. It is not uncommon for the temperature to drop 15 degrees or more in just one hour after a cold front arrives.


"There are some incredible stories about temperature changes," he adds.

"On Dec. 20, 1836 in Illinois, the temperature went from 40 degrees to 0 in just a few hours. And on Jan. 22, 1943 in South Dakota, the town of Spearfish was at the edge of an artic air mass but still under a temperature inversion area. At 7:30 a.m., the temperature in Spearfish was -4 degrees and within two minutes, went to 45 degrees above 0 because of warm winds associated with the inversion. By 9 a.m. the but the conditions changed and the temperature fell to -4 degrees. A 58-degree temperature drop had occurred in only 27 minutes, still believed to be a record."




Some valley crops like cool weather


In addition, the market prices of many cool-season crops are increasing because of crop damage from Hurricane Wilma in Florida.

THE NEW MEDICARE DRUG BENEFIT: WHAT TO CONSIDER

If you're a senior, you've probably read enough about the new prescription drug coverage offered by Medicare to realize that the idea behind it is straightforward: protection against the cost of drugs through the purchase of an insurance policy. What may be less clear is how to evaluate your options.

Here are three tips:

1. Assess your risk. A question similar to the one you ask before taking out any insurance policy applies: Can you afford to assume the risk of paying for drugs you need now or will need in the future? Because the program is voluntary, if you decide your prescriptions will be a manageable expense, you can choose to forego coverage. The decision is revocable, so you can change your mind later and sign up. However, waiting until after May 15, 2006, to buy a drug policy may mean higher premiums.

2. Review your present coverage. Are you still working? Your employer might provide prescription drug coverage that's equivalent to the new benefit. Veterans and union, federal government, or military retirees may also already have comprehensive drug benefits. You can keep an existing supplemental Medicare policy (known as Medigap) that pays for drug costs, though you'll want to make sure the coverage is comparable. However, note that present Medicare-approved discount drug cards will be replaced by the new benefit.

3. Know what you need. For a monthly premium, basic plans typically include a list of covered drugs and participating pharmacies, a \$250 deductible, and additional out-of-pocket expenses called co-payments. If you're taking a specific drug, check the list of drugs that plan will cover. You may want to verify that a convenient pharmacy is available, both locally and when traveling. Deductibles and co-payments also vary, so understanding what benefits matter most to you can help focus your decision-making. When you're ready to sign up, you can do so with the company whose plan you've chosen or with Medicare by phone (1-800-633-4227) or online (www.medicare.gov).







Also, wherever dead grass, weeds and other fine-textured fuels are present, even short periods of dry, windy weather can cause a rapid escalation in wildfire risk and difficulty of control," Dunivan declared.

Unless the weather cooperates and brings significant moisture statewide and/or the public exercises greater safety with all outdoor fire use, firefighters fear that additional wildfires are likely. Many wildfires result from careless burning of household trash, leaves and brush piles. The following are suggestions from the Texas Forest Service.

•Obey outdoor burning bans.

•Postpone all outdoor fires during periods of dry, windy weather.

*When outdoor fires are permitted, establish wide control lines down to bare soil before igniting your fire, and stay with your fire until it is cold to the touch.

•Dispose of smoking materials properly, either in an ashtray or crushed out in bare dirt.

•Avoid using welding or grinding equipment in or near dry grass and

 Avoid driving or parking in tall grass and weeds that could be ignited by the pollution control equipment on your vehicle.
