Serious wildfire conditions continue

Dry conditions across the majority of West Texas have fire crews responding to an increasing number of fires each day. The Texas Forest Service reports from Nov. 11 to Dec. 12, Texas has experienced 184 wildfires for a total of 27,447 acres burned. Within the past few weeks, two firefighters have died in accidents responding to fires and two firefighters were critically burned fighting grass fires.

"It is important for everyone to understand just how serious the threat of a wildfire is right now," said Ron Perry, fire prevention specialist for the Texas Forest Service.

"Doing any outdoor burning at this time is not only ill-advised; it may also be illegal," said Perry.

Residents are urged to check for burn bans daily. Burn bans have already been established in 136 Texas counties and aerial fireworks restrictions have been implemented in 40 counties.

Observance of common sense safety precautions with fireworks and other outdoor fire use can prevent many wildfires and unnecessary injuries. The following are a few prevention tips suggested the Texas Forest Service:

·Avoid burning trash. Even a barrel covered with a screen can allow a spark to escape, igniting nearby vegetation.

•Be careful when pulling off a road or driving into a field. Hot catalytic converters can ignite vegetation.

•Maintain a defensible space around your home by mowing the grass, removing leaf litter and keeping other flammables such as a woodpile, at least 30 feet from your



Keep safety high on **Christmas** gift lists

The colorful ads are enticing, the lists long. Even children who have fought putting pencil to paper all year are spending hours revising and refining their wish lists.

It's the holiday gift giving season. Along with matching child to toy, the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) urges those selecting gifts for children to keep safety in mind. "Just taking a few minutes to think about safety precautions could save a child from injury or death," said Tom Matherly of the DSHS environmental and consumer safety section.

Always read labels attached to toys or clothing, Matherly said, especially for age recommendations. A label will tell a consumer two critical things: if a toy is not safe for younger children and why it is not

"Even the brightest child should not be given a toy labeled specifically for an older child," he said. "Toys meant for older children may have parts or strings that can choke or strangle a younger child."

A quick test will help determine if toy parts are a chocking hazard, Matherly said. "Take the cardboard tube from a roll of toilet paper," he said. "If the part can pass through the tube, it could choke a child."

Matherly also suggests that shoppers buy the appropriate protective gear to complement sporting equipment. "Always give a safety helmet with a bicycle," he said. "Or if you give skates, be sure to include a helmet and pads for the wrists, elbows, knees and shins.'

Other tips are:

•Be sure the instructions are understandable to the buyer and, when appropriate, the child.

·Look for sturdy construction such as tightly secured eyes, noses, buttons and other small parts.

•For an infant, buy large rattles, teethers and squeeze toys that cannot get stuck in the child's throat.

 Do not buy toys with small parts or items such as marbles, small balls or balloons for children under 3.


•For children under 8, avoid electric toys with heating elements and toys with sharp edges and points.

•If you buy arrows or darts, be sure they have rubber suction cups or flexible, protective tips that stay secured when used. If your children receive arrows or darts, teach them how to play with them safely. Arrows and darts are not recommended for children under 5.


•Discard plastic wrappings on toys immediately, before they become deadly playthings.

"Most of safe toy buying is common sense," Matherly said. "Make sure the tov is safe for the child's age, and that it is well constructed, durable and suited to a child's physical and mental development while still being appealing and interesting."




Roseanne 'Rosie' J. Orndorff, 72, of El Paso died peacefully in her home surrounded by her loved ones Wed., Dec. 14.

Hospice is care beyond a cure

CEA/FCS, Haskell County

"Hospice" stems from the Latin word hospitium meaning guesthouse. It was originally used to describe a place of shelter for weary and sick travelers. Today, eighty percent of hospice care is provided in the patient's home, a family member's home or nursing homes.

Hospice is not a place but a concept of care designed to provide comfort and support to patients and their families when an illness no longer responds to treatment. The goal of hospice care is to improve the quality of a patient's last days by offering comfort and dignity. Hospice care neither prolongs life nor hastens death. Often the patient is not the only person who benefits from hospice care. Care is also extended to the patient's family and friends to help deal with the emotional, social and spiritual impact of disease.

Hospice offers a variety of bereavement and counseling services to families before and after a patient's

Patients are usually referred to hospice when life expectancy is approximately six months. While patient must have a doctor's referral to enter hospice, the patient, family and friends can initiate the process. Before providing care, hospice staff meets with the patient's personal health provider and a hospice physician to discuss patient history, current physical symptoms and life expectancy. After an initial meeting with physicians, hospice staff meets with both the patient and family.

Hospice staff and volunteers offer a specialized knowledge of medical care, including pain management. Hospice care is usually provided by a team-oriented group of specially trained individuals. Prior to service, staff and patients also discuss pain a terminal illness. and comfort levels, support systems, financial and insurance resources, medications and equipment needs. A "plan of care" is developed for the patient. This plan is regularly reviewed and revised according to

Hospice is usually paid for through the Medicare, Medicaid and most private insurers.

More than 90% of hospices in the United States are certified by Medicare. The hospice benefit is available to any Medicare beneficiary who receives Part "A," inpatient hospital service coverage.

It is your right as a consumer to choose or deny hospice services. Choosing hospice as well as choosing your hospice provider are important decisions for your end-of-life care.

Determining if a hospice is right for you may best be learned from interviewing different hospices and talking to those you trust who are familiar with hospice programs in your area. Other questions to ask when choosing a hospice program

•What services are provided? •What kind of support is available to the family/caregiver?

·What roles do the attending

physician and hospice play? •How are services provided after

•How and where does hospice provide short-term inpatient care?

·Can hospice be brought into a nursing home or long-term care facility?

Sometimes a terminally ill patient's health improves or their illness goes into remission.

If that happens, your health provider may feel that you no longer need hospice care and will not recertify you at that time. Also, as a hospice patient, you always have the right to stop getting hospice care, for any reason.

Hospice care is meant to ease the transition from life to death for both the patient and family. It is always important to remember that there is care beyond a cure for persons with





Judge puts DeLay proceedings on hold

AUSTIN - Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle's appeal of a dismissed charge against U.S. Rep. Tom DeLay is slowing down the legal process the former House majority leader's attorneys want to speed up.

Judge Pat Priest put a scheduled hearing on hold until Texas' Third Court of Appeals rules on the merit of a charge of conspiracy he had dismissed against DeLay. Priest's trial court is the venue where charges of money laundering and conspiracy against the Sugar Land Republican will be heard.

DeLay and his attorneys want everything to happen as quickly as possible, because DeLay hopes to win back his role as majority leader when the House reconvenes after winter recess.

DeLay stepped down from the role in September after he was indicted by a Travis County grand jury on charges of conspiracy to circumvent the state elections law and money laundering in the midterm election of 2002.

Also indicted were DeLav's associates John Colvandro of Austin and Jim Ellis of Washington, D.C., the men who ran DeLay's state and national political action committees. Redistricting cases on horizon

The U.S. Supreme Court scheduled March 1 as the date to hear oral arguments in cases against Gov. Rick Perry and the state of Texas over the redrawing of U.S. congressional district boundaries in 2003.

Party primaries in Texas are scheduled for March 7.

Four plaintiffs, including the League of United Latin American Citizens, Travis County, Eddie Jackson and the GI Forum of Texas. and others, allege violations in the Voting Rights Act in the 2004 redistricting that allowed the Republican Party to pick up five seats in Congress.

Former justice files for office

Rumors about another Democrat launching a gubernatorial campaign came true Dec. 15 when Bob Gammage filed papers with the secretary of state.

Gammage, 67, a former lawmaker, state supreme court justice and educator from Llano, joins two other Democrats in the quest to succeed Gov. Perry.

Gammage was one of the "Dirty 30"-a bipartisan group of Texas House members who mounted an

offensive against corruption at the state Capitol in the 1971 Sharpstown scandal.

In his campaign press release, Gammage spoke of "a corrupt political machine which stretches from Washington, D.C. all the way to Austin."

Gammage said that in a few weeks his campaign "will roll out an agenda for change in Texas."

Math, science boost coming

For those students who seem destined to leave high school without math and science skills needed to succeed in college and the workplace, help is on the way.

Children will get extra help via real-world learning activities in mathematics, science, engineering and technology, through the \$71 million Texas Science Technology Engineering and Math Initiative, or T-STEM.

Gov. Perry said the funds will go to 35 public, private and charter school campuses across Texas and called them "T-STEM academies."

The money is coming from these sources: \$50 million in grants from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, the Susan & Michael Dell Foundation and the Communities Foundation of Texas: \$20 million from the Texas Education Agency; and about \$1 million from National Instruments.

More time to get situated

The Federal Emergency Management Agency said it would comply with a court order to pay for hurricane Katrina and Rita evacuees to live in hotels and motels until Jan. 7. but for those actively working with the agency to receive house rent assistance the deadline has been extended to Feb. 7.

FEMA has provided rental assistance to some 653,000 families dislodged from their homes by the August and September hurricanes.

Heflin quits lotto job quest Former Houston State Rep. Talmadge Heflin, 65, decided to withdraw his name for consideration for the vacant position of Texas Lottery director.

Heflin, a Republican, said he would instead file to run for his former House seat, which he lost to freshman Democrat Hubert Vo in a close election in 2004.

Make Sure Your Children Know You Care This Holiday Season

Christmas is a time of giving, sharing and making memories, but it can also put a financial strain on parents as they purchase gifts or host families for a holiday meal. One way to make sure the holidays are a memorable time of year for your children is to pay your child support.

Child support enables parents to put a roof over their children's heads, clothes on their backs, and food on the table. During the holidays, these challenges are compounded as parents also try to put gifts under the tree or gas in their car for a long trip to grandma's house. That is why I am giving parents this special reminder to pay their child support.

To those parents who regularly pay their child support in full and on time, I extend my heartfelt thanks. Your faithfulness will reap great rewards as you help your children remember the holidays as a time of provision rather than hardship.

Sometimes circumstances arise, such as losing a job, that make it -difficult to meet one's child support obligation. For parents who are in a situation like this, I encourage you to contact my office so we can work together to determine a course of action. As an additional service, my office partners with the Texas Workforce Commission and workforce development boards across the state to help low-income parents find good-paying jobs so they can meet their child support obligations.

Ultimately, what children need most is to know their parents care about them. For unmarried parents, this begins with establishing paternity. When paternity is established, a child has a legal connection to his or her father that protects the child's access to a whole range of benefits fathers can provide, starting with having dad's name on the birth certificate. Through the Paternity Opportunity Program, my office trains and certifies employees of hospitals and birthing centers to assist parents with the process of acknowledging paternity just after their child's birth. We can also facilitate DNA tests to scientifically and legally establish fatherhood. As children grow up, my office encourages parents to stay involved in their lives beyond paying child support.

We also help parents who are having trouble getting access to their children. This year, my office administered more than \$500,000 in federal grants to 11 organizations across Texas that facilitate parents' access to and visitation with their children. One organization, Legal Aid of NorthWest Texas, operates my office's statewide Access and Visitation Hotline. The hotline is staffed by attorneys who provide legal information and assistance with child custody and visitation matters. Parents can call the hotline's toll-free number, 1-866-292-4636, Monday through Friday from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m.

Kids will remember forever what happens during this holiday season. Please, help make those memories good ones by being there for them and paying your child support.

Protect children from fire hazards

While risk of fire in the home increases during the holidays, you can reduce the chance of your child getting burned.

Choose either close-fitting or fireretardant sleepwear for your child.

T-shirts and other loose-fitting clothing made of cotton can catch fire easily, and burn rapidly.

Fire-retardant fabrics are treated with chemicals that makes them less likely to catch fire, and more likely to stop burning when taken away from the flame.

Caution is the important step to reduce fire risk. Keep candles, cigarette lighters and matches out of children's reach.

The lottery job came open after the Why Bridges Freeze First

Q: Why do bridges freeze over first when icing occurs?

A: The main reason bridges freeze quickly is heat-or lack of it, says Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. Roads and highways, even though they are made of asphalt and concrete, are protected by the ability of the soil underneath to

absorb heat. "But bridges and overpasses are suspended in the air, which means they do not have the means to absorb heat," McRoberts says. "So when temperatures start dropping to below freezing, it takes a while for the ground temperature to reach freezing. But bridges and overpasses, with freezing air on top and below the structures, will cool down and freeze

Q: So bridges are affected more than roads by the outside temperature?

A: True, adds McRoberts. "Bridges don't have a way to trap heat, so they lose heat quickly and this allows them to freeze up quicker than roads," McRoberts says.

"The simple explanation is that bridges tend to follow the outside air temperature very closely. So if the temperature drops below freezing and it starts to sleet or snow, the bridge's surface will also fall below freezing and snow and sleet will stick to it very quickly. Ice can form on bridges and combined with a layer of snow, it makes driving conditions dangerous. That's why bridges and overpasses are the first to be sanded down when icing is about to occur."







Nuts can be excellent source of nutrition

Americans, it seems, are going healthy move, they should be nuts over nuts. The tasty morsels are showing up everywhere-toasted walnuts on salads, pecan-crusted fish, and macadamia nut oil in the latest diet. Is it wise to add nuts to your diet? Although fat- and calorie-laden, nuts provide healthy, cholesterollowering fats, vitamin E and fiber.

Dr. Jo Ann Carson, professor of clinical nutrition at UT Southwestern Medical Center, warns that although including nuts frequently can be a

substituted for other foods. "Adding rather than substituting nuts can tip the energy balance in favor of weight gain," she says.

For example, replace some of the chicken in chicken salad with pecans and celery for a delightfully crunchy texture; or substitute an afternoon candy bar with trail mix that includes nuts; and instead of a ham sandwich, build a brown bag lunch around fruit, yogurt and nuts.

Several nuts are especially hearthealthy.

English walnuts contain primarily polyunsaturated fats, including alpha-linolenic acid, an omega 3 fatty acid. Our bodies convert a small amount of alpha-linolenic acid to the longer chain fatty acids found in fish oils. Research suggests walnuts have cardiovascular benefits

Pecans, peanuts and macadamia nuts, however, are high in monounsaturated fats that can lower your low-density lipoproteins, or "bad" cholesterol.

Almonds and pistachios are among the lowest in fat and calories, while macadamia nuts have the most fat and calories per ounce.

Advice for fighting extra holiday pounds

Our promises to eat less during the holidays seem to disappear when we're faced with parties and family gatherings laden with high-calorie food and drinks. Year's end can also bring out the worst in our eating habits, but a UT Southwestern Medical Center dietitian says breaking those habits can be easier than you think.

Lona Sandon, assistant professor of nutrition at UT Southwestern, says there are some simple tricks everyone can use to keep from getting stuffed this season.

"On average, we gain one to two pounds over the holidays, but unfortunately, we often don't lose that weight," she said. "So over the course of 10 years, you can find yourself 20 pounds heavier and

losing the weight can be quite difficult."

If you're hosting holiday parties, she suggests setting a table featuring lots of high-fiber, high-water foods such as a big green salad and fresh vegetable tray. This will encourage you and your guests to start the meal with a low-calorie appetizer.

You can also provide lowercalorie dressings, such as light vinaigrette or dips that are made with light sour cream or low-fat cream cheese. Crispy appetizers like pickles, fresh vegetables and fruit can also help guests consume fewer calories at the buffet table.

"I also recommend using smaller sized cocktail plates or even cocktail napkins instead of large plates," Sandon said. "That discourages guests from piling food onto their plates. When you're serving casserole dishes, serve from a tablespoon rather than a giant serving spoon. People are more likely to serve themselves less food."

Using pre-sized portions also keeps people from sampling large portions of the main entrée or dessert. Cutting a pie into slices prior to setting it out on the buffet table keeps guests from cutting larger portions.

Sandon also recommends limiting food choices. "Make two appetizer platters instead of four and limit desserts to one choice," she said.

For guests attending parties, Sandon recommends eating something before you go so you don't arrive ravenous. This can help you from getting into the tempting treats.

Decline the nut-covered cheese balls and high-fat cold cuts and start with fresh fruits, vegetables, small portions of nuts and lean cuts of meat such as turkey breast.

During the holidays, people also tend to give and receive food. To keep the pounds away, Sandon said rather than giving a box of chocolates, choose one or two gourmet or specialty chocolates and a nice card. For those who receive gifts such as pre-wrapped sausage and cheese baskets, she suggests donating them if you want to avoid temptation.

"Wrapped foods and candies that you don't want to eat you can consider taking to a food bank," Sandon said. "They would be more than happy to have it and you wouldn't have it in your house tempting you to indulge."


With New Year's right around the corner, Sandon also suggests people to stay away from drinks that can quickly pile on calories and maybe even lead you to eat more.

"When we start talking alcohol, calories can add up very quickly, especially in mixed drinks with fruits and sugars added," she said. "Simpler beverages like wine have between 120 and 150 calories per glass, which isn't too bad compared to a margarita which may have up to 400 calories."

She said consuming alcohol can make you feel hungrier, so it's a good idea to politely decline a cocktail until you've eaten. Another alternative is to drink club soda or diet soda. Holiday drinks such as eggnog are very high in calories and fat, so drink those in moderation, or better yet, avoid them altogether.

Lastly, Sandon says that not every holiday gathering needs to be centered on food.

"You can plan a party that doesn't include dinner, or plan a gathering at your house at a later hour after your guests have eaten dinner," she said. "You might want to offer fruit and some nice specialty cheese that people can sample."

City Council report

Haskell City Council was held Dec.

Mayor Ken Lane called the meeting to order, and the invocation was given by W.L. Wolf.

Mayor Lane reported from his trip to Austin, that the last session of the state legislature passed a state wide right-of-way contract that will apply for every city in the state. In this, a town the size of Haskell has the option of using the contract or not, but, not having a contract is not a good option. He advised that what Haskell needs is to pass a city ordinance to the effect that anyone using our right of way should have a state wide right-of-way contract, which requires that they pay the city of Haskell 5% of their gross revenues as a franchise fee.

Approval was given by the council for the city to have opportunity to replace all plumbing under Highway 380 and 277 with the ability to borrow the money at a low

Approval was given by the council for amending the original zoning that was denied to Fred Draper for change from general residential to single wide mobile home at 202 S. Ave. C.

In the matter of the search committee's recommendation to rehire Sam Watson as City Administrator, the matter died for lack of a second to the motion.

It was the consensus of the council that another salary raise cannot be made for the city manager job.

The request by Franciene Johnson, representing the Haskell Civic Center, to rescind the order for the Civic Center to employ city or county law enforcement for dances was approved.

Johnson requested to pursue a federal grant, presented by TxDOT, that has to be sponsored by an entity like the city. This is a 20% matching project, with several things that can be counted toward the city's 'in kind' part. The state requires a 15% fee for April, and the estimate needs to be savings to all involved.

The regular meeting of the done by March. Johnson said there is a lot of labor available in the Progressive Study Club to do research and the leg work required. It would be a community effort behind this project. The council agreed for Johnson to pursue this, with the budget not to exceed \$1,000,000.

The computer network system needs some work, lacking the final hookup with HUB.

An update on the jail reported that the first building has arrived, and progress is being made by AllWire. Prisoner count stands at 491-2 the last two months, and employee count is at 155. Consultants say talks with the federal are going as expected on the expansion plans. Another prison industry has surfaced with a possible 8 to 10 jobs, and is being pursued. TxDOT has been advised of the complaints about the road being

It was reported that for the next grant from OKRA, a stand pipe for the prison backup water supply is being looked at, and for Farm Road 600 to Ruby Road Loop, to handle fire protection for the people in that

It was pointed out that as the dynamics of the city changes, the city needs to be looking at three areas of change; FM 600; north of town: along FM 2163.
