Nearly everyone knows this is an old building, but when The Journal man set out to unearth the facts, he found himself to be altogether ibnorant about it.

In the first place, says no less an authority than Connie Gupton, the building was not moved here from Hurley, but was erected especially for use as the Bailey County courthouse when the county was organized in 1918. Now, Connie came here when there was not a single building in Muleshoe, only a grade for a railroad, no depot, no nothing, so he ought

the largest room. When the American Legion Post bought the building after the new courthouse was erected in 1926, they just "scooted" it west across the street and put it where it now stands. The ground belongs to the county, which owns 100 ft. facing the square on West Second street. The Masonic lodge built the upper story and it remained the Lodge and Eastern Star meeting place until the present hall was completed a couple of years ago.

For freezing, eggs should be cooled to about 32 degrees F. Egg whites and egg yolks may be frozen separately or mixed. Egg whites need no treatment. Mixed whites and yolks or just yolks should have 1 tablespoon light colored corn syrup mixed with 2 cups of the eggs to prevent the yolks forming into a thick curdlike mass during storage, Salt, 1 teaspoon per cup of yolks, may be used instead of corn syrup if the eggs are to be used for making mayonnaise.

Clean each egg and break into a small dish to be sure there is no stale odor. Pour into a bowl, for several minutes before unmix thoroughly and freeze in small containers. Use promptly after thawing.






