

Texas Tech has their winning coach and Haskell High has their winning coach, but on the road to reaching his record of 800 wins, Haskell's Coach David Middleton didn't even fling a single chair across the gym floor.

The fact that Middleton is a "home town boy," makes it seem all the more fitting that he achieved his 800th career record win 'right here on our stage' last Saturday, when the Haskell Maidens defeated Stanton 36-31.

Of course, this is not the first acclamation that the coach has received in his 40 years of coaching. In 1979 he was named as State All Star Coach for the South. He was named "Coach of the Year" two years while at Brazoswood and two years at Klein Forest.

In 1987 he received the Basketball Golden Award of National High School Coaching.

He was also presented as "Scholastic Coach" by Scholastic Magazine.

The coach has had a lot of experiences, he said, and as Bobby Knight said about it, "That 800 win means you've been at it a long time, with a whole lot of wonderful young people that believe in you and care about what you do." For him, that makes it worthwhile.

Acknowledging that there are a number of Texas coaches with more wins, Middleton said it's a nice plateau to be on. "The credit goes to the many young people you coached who turned out to be solid, responsible citizens, involved in and successful in all kinds of careers," he said, adding that "When you play with a bunch of thorouhbreds, you can run fast."

With his 800 career wins and 393 losses, the coach said he hopes to keep the losses under 10 a year. The five games left for this season will alter the figures.

Saying he's proud to keep on coaching, he joked, "It beats working."

He is no doubt eligible to be named to the Coaches Hall of Fame, and individuals will be able nominate him. Stay tuned for further details.



Emergency farm loans being accepted by FSA

Applications for emergency farm loans for damages and losses caused by drought, excessive heat, and high winds that occurred from Jan. 1, 2006 and continuing are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Haskell, acting FLM Brand Cude said

Haskell and Throckmorton County are two of six contiguous counties that have been designated as disaster counties in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Mike Johann eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses and damages caused by drought, excessive heat, and high winds on Jan. 1, 2006, and continuing.

Cude said farmers may be

eligible for loans of up to 100% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue the agricultural business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 3.75 percent.


"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Cude said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to consider proceeds from those programs in determining their

"Application for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until Aug. 14, 2007, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying

could create backlogs in processing, with possible delays into the new farming season,' Cude said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who meet U.S. citizenship requirements and to farming partnerships, corporations, or cooperatives in which U.S. citizenship requirements are met by individuals holding a majority interest.

The FSA office in Haskell is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Chief execs outline priorities in inaugural speeches

AUSTIN-It was a cold inaugural on Jan. 16: so cold and icy, in fact, the smaller-thanplanned-for crowd moved inside the Capitol.

Texans and the rest of the world enjoyed access to the inaugural ceremonies via live webcast for the first time ever.

Gov. Rick Perry and Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst were sworn in. Both men made speeches broad in scope: so broad, in fact, their words, to many ears, belied grander political ambitions.

Perry regaled strong families as the backbone of society and outlined his agenda for his second full term as governor.

He spoke of the need for tighter immigration control, a secure border with Mexico, safer neighborhoods, affordable health care, improvements in education. substantial and long-lasting property tax relief, and budget reforms that would protect taxpayers.

He also echoed a theme that has a Washington, D.C.-ring to it: "Texas is better off when Republicans and Democrats work together because our potential is too vast to be spoiled by a politics leavened with partisanship," Perry said.

Diverging here for a moment on the subject of bipartisanship and possible higher aspirations, the governor flew to the nation's capital with Texas Democratic congressional representatives to meet with other Democrats.

The Washington, D.C., Democrats let Perry know they have not forgotten his role in bringing about the unusual midterm redistricting in 2004 that squeezed a few Democrats out of

Dewhurst also delivered an expansive inaugural speech, with emphasis on his "Texas Children First" package of legislation.

The legislation, he said, is based on the premise that, "Safe and healthy children learn, they grow, and they go on to lead lives that strengthen our state and make

Dewhurst asked lawmakers to pass tougher laws dealing with child predators, put defibrillators in public schools and take illegal steroids out through mandatory, random drug testing.

Dewhurst assured audience there would be a "Jessica's Law" in Texas, including an automatic 25-year sentence for first-time child molesters and a death sentence for those convicted a second time.

Speaker reassures ex-challengers

Texas House Speaker Tom Craddick told The Dallas Morning News, in effect, he's holding out the olive branch to members of his own party.

Craddick, R-Midland, was reelected speaker after Rep. Jim Pitts, R-Waxahachie, dropped his challenge.

Pitts threw his support behind Craddick when it was decided the vote for the speakership would be a recorded vote, not by secret

Earlier, Pitts and another former challenger, Rep. Brian McCall, R-Plano, individually expressed the need for a change in atmosphere in the House, because transparency and bipartisanship in the legislative process had eroded under the speaker's tenure

Craddick said he would do a better job of communicating.

State unemployment rate drops

Texas' seasonally adjusted unemployment rate dropped to 4.5 in December, the lowest in five years, the Texas Workforce Commission said in a report released Jan. 19.

To illustrate the improvement, the unemployment rate in November was 4.7 percent, and a year ago, in December 2005, the rate was 5.2 percent.

Nonagricultural employment grew by 15,600 jobs in December as Texas employers continue

Over the last 12 months, the Texas economy grew by 213,200 jobs, and Texas employers have added jobs for 27 consecutive months, the agency reported.

Senator proposes smoking ban

Sen. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, said he would file legislation banning smoking in all public buildings in Texas.

Ellis is looking for a House sponsor of his bill and expects to file his version this month.

Eighteen states have laws banning smoking in public



Farmers to receive survey

Farmers will soon have the opportunity to set the record straight about the issues that affect them-and to help ensure that policies and programs are based on accurate, real-world data. This is the goal of the annual Agricultural Resource Management Survey (ARMS), conducted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS).

ARMS is USDA's primary source of information on production practices, resource use and economic well-being of America's farm households.

"Just about every federal policy and program that affects U.S. farmers and farm families is based on information from ARMS," said David Abbe, director of the NASS Texas Field Office. "This information is used not just by USDA and Congress, but also by university researchers, commodity farm groups, agribusinesses and others who make the decisions that shape the future of Texas agriculture.'

Between Feb. 1 through March 30, NASS field offices will contact 36,000 farmers nationwide by mail or in person to complete the survey. Producers will be asked to provide data on their operating expenditures, production costs and household characteristics.

"All farm operators rely on quality information and sound government policies in order to run a successful business. That's why participation in ARMS is so important," David Abbe "Producer explained. participation in ARMS ensures that decisions affecting farmers, their families, their businesses and their communities are based on the facts, straight from the source."

Survey responses will be compiled and NASS will publish the farm economic data in the annual Farm Production Expenditures report, to be released on Aug. 2, 2007. As with all NASS surveys, information provided by respondents is confidential by law. NASS safeguards the confidentiality of all responses and publishes only state- and national-level data, ensuring that no individual producer or operation can be identified. All NASS reports are available online at: www.nass usda.gov.

outh Tour is more than a thousand high school students going to Washington, D.C. every June, year after year, from towns and small cities all over rural America. They come because their rural electric cooperatives think education is importanteducation about rural electricity and education about America.

The purpose of the tour is to provide an opportunity for outstanding young people to better understand the value of rural electrification and to become more familiar with the historical and political environment of the nation's capitol. This is achieved through visits to monuments, government buildings and cooperative organizations. Also, the opportunity to visit elected officials allows youth to better understand how the federal government works.

In the beginning, the Youth Tour was inspired by then Senator Lyndon Johnson when he addressed the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association

(NRECA) Annual Meeting in Chicago in 1957. "If one thing goes out of this meeting," the Senator declared, he hoped it would be "sending youngsters to the national capitol where they can actually see what the flag stands for and represents."

Beginning that year, 1957 for several more years, some of the Texas electric cooperatives sent groups of young people to Washington to work during the summer in Senator Johnson's office, to learn more about government in action. The next year, 1958, rural

electric people in Iowa sponsored the first group of 34 young people on a week-long study tour of the nation's capitol. Later that same year, another bus load came to Washington from Illinois. The idea grew, and other states sent bus loads of young people throughout the summer. In 1959, the Youth Tour had grown to 130 youths. In 1964, NRECA began to

coordinate the program and suggested that the states arrange to be in the city the same week. The first year of the coordinated tour included some 400 young people from 12 states. The idea has continued to grow, and today more than 1,000 young people and chaperones participate in the Tour each year.





SBA to offer loans

businesses Shackelford County and the neighboring counties of Callahan, Eastland, Haskell, Jones, Stephens and Throckmorton may now apply for low interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA). "These loans offset economic losses because of reduced revenues caused by drought, excessive heat and high winds beginning Jan. 1, 2006," announced Alfred E. Judd. Director of SBA's Disaster Field Operations Center-West.

Small businesses may qualify for Economic Injury Disaster loans (EIDLs) of up to \$1.5 million to help meet financial obligations and operating expenses which could have been met had the disaster not occurred. "Eligibility for these loans is based on the financial impact of the disaster only and not on any actual property damage. These loans have an interest rate of 4%, a maximum term of 30 years, and are restricted to small businesses without the financial ability to offset the adverse impact without hardship," Judd said.

By law, SBA makes EIDLs available when the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture designates an agricultural disaster. Secretary Mike Johanns declared these disasters at the request of Governor Rick Perry.

Businesses primarily engaged in farming or ranching are ineligible for SBA disaster assistance. Agricultural enterprises should contact the Farm Services Agency (FSA) about the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) assistance made available by the Secretary's declaration. However, in drought disasters nurseries are eligible for SBA disaster assistance.






